INCOME TAX MEETING SET

There will be an Income Tax Meeting on Farm Accounting and Management, Dec. 19th at 1:30 P.M., in the District Courtroom in Wheeler. James C. Murphrey, Area Farm Management Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be in charge of the program and the speaker. Such topics as record keeping, depreciations and recapture, soil and water conservation expense, investment credit, trades condemnation and diseased livestock, and self-employment pension plan as well as federal and state inheritance and estate taxes will be discussed. Twenty to thirty minutes of the program will be devoted to personal problems and questions from individuals attending the program. All men and women interested in record keeping and income tax is urged to attend this informative program on Dec. 19th.

STILL NEWS

After posting bond of \$2,500.00 last week, J. Everett Smith, co-partner of the distillery discovered in Wheeler County last week, returned to the area last Fri. Mr. Smith and John Elizabeth Nelson, who remains in custody of Federal Jail in Amarillo, were apprehended last week by Wheeler County Sheriff, Bus Dorman and Deputies assisted by Federal and State officers.

2 gallons per day at a profit of anywhere from \$10.00 per gallon sold in larger quantities to \$15.00 per gallon sold in smaller quantities. The sale of this type of home-made brew is noted to be the largest tax fraud in operation in the country. The revenue derived by the Federal Government from the tax on beverage alcohol is second only to the income tax as a source of revenue. The amounts of revenue lost on this type of thing runs into the Billions of dollars. It is estimated that even at this the revenue derived amounts to only 55% of the potential income comes from the income tax. The sale of moonshine amounts to about 45% of the potential collectable tax. The sale of this type of beverage is larger today than ever before.

Both Smith and Nelson were filed on as equally liable in the operation of making the moonshine liquor. This is a felony which carries with it a possible sentence of up to 5 years in the penitentiary and/or \$10,000.00 fine.

Sheriff Dorman emphasized the fact that anyone caught with enough moonshine in their possession to be analyzed by a chemist is subject to the above mentioned sentence and the possibility of seizure of the vehicle, barn, house, or sight on which possession was discovered. He further noted that violators in this matter will be dealt with to the maximum of ability.
