These polling places will be open for the purpose of determining by vote of the people whether or not the Hospital Directors elected by the people will be authorized to avail the district of needed funds to do the job which the people elected them to do. If these Directors are to provide the needed medical facilities in this half of the county then they must have a source of funds with which to work. If the bonds are approved then they must have this source but if voters reject the proposal then they will have this source but if voters reject the proposal, then the Directors are helpless to act.

EDITORIAL

The issue is simply do we or do we not need a hospital in this area. If we need the hospital then we must arrive at some conclusion as to how it will be paid for. Since it is no longer the remotest possibility that some one will provide this for us then it appears that we must provide it for ourselves. We have been very fortunate for the past thirty years or so in having a hospital at our use but this is no longer the case. Now if we want one we must provide the funds necessary. The cost of providing necessary facilities is small compared to its benefits, then it is reasonable and logical that we should provide this answer to our common needs.

Actually the hospital in this area will result in a saving to most people since the average annual tax will amount to no more than a trip or two to another town to obtain medical assistance. It will save us money: it will save us many hours of time per year since we will be able to get to and from the hospital in so much less time, it will save us many miles of dangerous and costly travel.

From the writer's viewpoint it appears that we are obligated to think long and seriously before we oppose this bond issue. It seems that we are obligated to think of our old and indegent who need this hospital so badly. It also seems that we are obligated to our younger people since they are to stay here and make this area progressive and prosperous then they will have to have the necessary facilities to make this possible. Why should we put this off and force the bond upon this younger generation when it is reasonable and logical to face the situation now. It seems we have been obligated to aurselves in this matter for quite some time now. We have been using hospital facilities in other towns and counties. It is true that we pay for this service, but these people in other locations pay the same rate of cost we do and they pay taxes also to settle construction obligations. If we are to have medical facilities that are operated according to our concept our local management will be facing in the operation of the hospital, then we must take on the

Farmers will have an opportunity to sign up in the 1964 feed grain program early in February, according to Bob Byrd. Office Manager of the Wheeler County ASCS. The signup perriod will be for seven weeks, from Feb. 10 through March 27.

As in previous years, the feed grain program will be voluntant to young farmers just start- tary and each individual producer on farms growing one of the three feed grains covered ailable for corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

> To take part in the feed grain program, the farmer will agree to take out of production and devote to an approved conservation use at least 20 percent of the total feed grain

> Farmers who participate in the program will be eligible for diversion and price support payments, and for price support on their 1964 production of the three grains. The price support payments will be made to participants whether the feed grain produced in 1964 is fed on the farm, sold, or placed under a price support loan.

It is pointed out that two major improvements have been made in the 1964 crop feed grain program as compared with programs of previous years: (a) As much as 50 percent of the total feed grain base may be diverted on any farm (this is up from the 1963 maximum of 40 percent of the feed grain base); and (b) the average payment rate per acre for diverting 40 percent or more of the base will be substantially higher than last year.






