Wheeler High Is Granted Charter

Wheeler High school has been granted a charter in the National Honor Society. This was achieved through a project of the Student Council, sponsored by Mrs. Vida Brown. The charter was presented to Mr. Cordell and Mr. Barham in assembly Friday, March 18, by Donna Ford, sec. of the Student Council. A faculty committee headed by Mr. Barham, principal of the high school, will proceed soon with the selection and election of members. Basic requirements for membership are contained in the local constitution which has been approved by the national society. The election of members is on the basis of "four" attributes, not on scholarship alone. These attributes are service, leadership, character and scholarship—which is a minimum of B, 85%, or its equivalent in academic subjects. The object of all chapters is to create an enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote worthy leadership and to encourage the development of character in students of the secondary schools of the nation.

The search for the two men remaining at large in the attempted robbery of the Mobeetie First State Bank ended with the arrest in Amarillo of William Robert Brown, 40. James Timothy Overton, 50, was arrested Friday morning at Panhandle.

The three other men believed to have been involved in the robbery attempt were arrested last Wednesday. Roy James and Clifford Bowen were captured one hour after five men ran from the Mobeetie Bank at 2:00 a.m. The two men were driving a pickup belonging to Grady Harris when they were captured. Fred Hedges freedom ended at 5:00 p.m. Wednesday with his capture near Magic City, miles south-east of Mobeetie.

The search for the two remaining burglars continued in the Magic City area. Tracks along the Red River led the posse to believe the men had turned back toward Mobeetie. The tracking continued through Thursday with an interval of only a few hours for much needed rest by the officers.

Sheriff Bus Dorman stated Brown and Overton were believed to have broken into the Wheeler county barn at Lela about 1:45 Friday. The men stole a two-ton dump truck belonging to the county. As a road block was being set up near Panhandle Friday morning at 2:30, the county truck passed the officers. A highway patrol and Dorman's car followed the truck to the edge of Panhandle. In an effort to dodge the patrol cars, the truck driver went behind some houses where they struck a butane tank. Two men fled from the truck.

Overton was captured about 7:30 a.m. A vacant farmhouse west of Panhandle was the scene of the arrest. From Panhandle, Brown made it to Pantex. Brown approached the Pantex security guard's home and asked W. T. Gray for a ride into Amarillo. Gray was told that Brown's car had broken down.

Brown's appearance led Gray to report the incident after Brown had been taken to Amarillo. Brown walked to the Holiday Inn East where he and the other four had checked in earlier in the week. Brown cleaned up and picked up a 1961 automobile which had been left at the motel and went to a restaurant.

Officers spotted the car at the restaurant. Brown was arrested at the restaurant at 11:30 a.m. The two captives were taken before Justice of the Peace E.D. Guynes, where bond was set at \$30,000 each. The men were arraigned on two charges of burglary and on a charge of vehicle theft. Each charge carried \$10,000.

The automobiles, a 1966 and a 1965, belonging to Overton and Brown were searched. Potter County officers recovered a quantity of burglary tools, an electric drill, an extension cord, a U.S. Banks Directory, a large quantity of coinage, a set of handcuffs, a 45-caliber automatic pistol, 30 rounds of ammunition for an M-1 rifle, several keys for coin operated machines, about six lock picking devices for coin operated machines, and a quantity of gloves, razor blades and cigarets believed taken in two grocery store

burglaries March 7 in Grayford.

The five men arrested in the burglary attempt were taken to Potter County Jail in Amarillo. The five were returned to Wheeler Monday after Austin attorneys, John Flanagan and Brooks Holman attempted to post bond at Amarillo.

Sheriff Bus Dorman refused the bond and has stated a writ will be necessary before they will be released. Flanagan brought \$50,000 bond last week to free James, Bowen and Hedges. The bond for the five men now totals \$110,000.

Dorman sees no reason why they should be released to continue bothering people. A sheriff has a right to refuse bond which leaves only one alternative for the attorneys—a writ of habeas corpus.

To obtain the writ, the men would be taken before District Judge, Lewis M. Goodrich. A hearing would be held to determine if the five should be held.

The attorneys left Wheeler with no indication of their future plans. Flanagan was the attorney called by the first two suspects arrested. He arrived in Amarillo Wednesday and was stopped by Amarillo detectives. Flanagan had picked up one of the arrested men's cars at the Amarillo motel where the five had registered. Flanagan was released, but the car was confiscated.

Charges continue to pile up. Four more burglary charges, two of them involving banks were filed against the five men in Palo Pinto county. The five are charged with robbing of two grocery stores and a bank in Grayford and the burglary of the Strawn bank. Two of the men wanted in connection with an armed robbery in Kansas.

The Times made an error: The March 17 issue of the times stated that Bowen was carrying \$34,000. We are not sure where the other zero came in, but the amount on Bowen's person was \$3400 at the time of arrest.

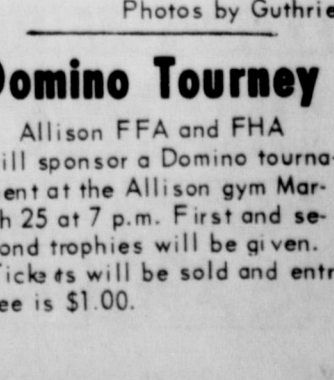
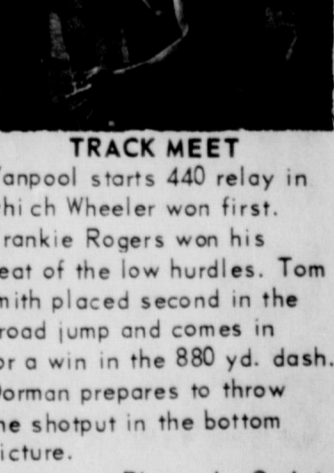

Plan with your children now for their future - decide upon their interests and abilities - determine what requirements they will have to meet for college entrance.

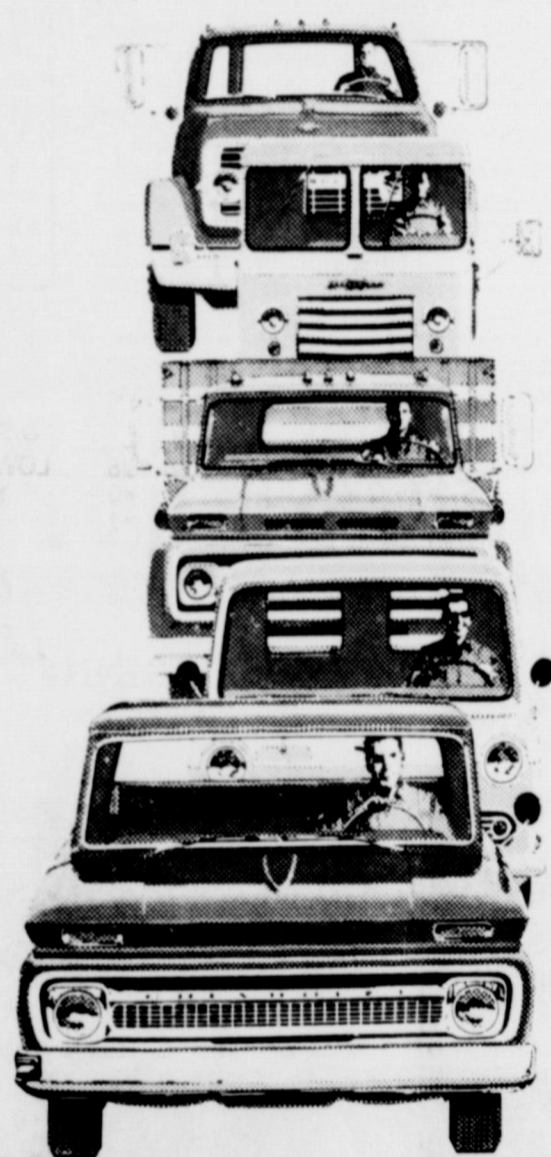

Poison Prevention Week, Mar. 20-26

By Charles David Jackson
National Poison Prevention Week March 20-26 has been proclaimed by President Johnson.

The proclamation calls attention to the need for every citizen to be careful with poisons especially when children are involved.

The proclamation says, "It was noted long ago that, 'Poison kills only where there is no antidote.' But no antidote will ever take the place of precaution. For when precaution is used, antidotes become unnecessary."

"Last year more than 600,000 American children were the victims of accidental poisoning. Nearly 500 of these children died."

"These poisonings took a variety of forms. Some were from medicines and some were from household products. But all had one thing in common: carelessness. To store drugs and poisons within easy reach of child, or to store them alongside of food, is as foolish as leaving a loaded pistol lying around the house and as dangerous."

"To alert adults to the dangers of accidental poisoning and to encourage them to take appropriate preventive measures, the Congress, by joint resolution approved Sept. 26, 1961, requested the President to issue annually a proclamation designating the third week in March as National Poison Prevention Week."

"I direct the appropriate agencies of the federal government, and invite state and local governments and organizations, to participate actively in programs designed to promote better protection against accidental poisonings among young children."

Economic Outlook for Wheat in 1965-66
Supply: The total supply of wheat for 1965-66, July 1, 1965 to June 30, 1966 is about 2,175 million bushels. Total disappearance is expected to exceed production

for the fifth consecutive year and carryover stocks on June 30, 1966 may decline by at least 70 million bushels from the 819 million bushels on July 1, 1965.

As a result, the 1966 crop of wheat may have a smaller carryover of about 750 million bushels with which to compete.

Disappearance: The disappearance in this 1965-66 marketing year is expected to be about 1,425 million bushels, some what above a year earlier and considerably above the 5 year average of 1,197 million bushels.

Feeding of wheat is expected to be heavier in 1965-66, pushing domestic disappearance to about 675 million bushels, the highest level in 12 years. Probably 100 million bushels will be fed. Wheat has been priced low enough to compete with feed grains.

Exports will continue large and may total 750 million compared with 728 million bushels last year. Government financed exports continue to play a major role in the exports of wheat.

Prices: The season average price received by farmers for wheat in 1965-66 is expected to be slightly above the national average loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel.

Fees for money orders, registry and C.O.D. were last changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

The fee changes, announced in January 11th Federal Register and confirmed in the registrar on February 25th are put into effect under the existing administrative authority of the Postmaster General.

The increases include: Money Order Fees: Domestic and international money order fees will be increased by 5 cents.

Insurance Feed: The minimum fee bracket will be increased from \$10 to \$15 and the minimum fee will be 20 cents instead of 10 cents.

The revised insurance fees will be as follows: \$0.01-\$15.....20 cents 15.01-50.....30 cents 50.01-100.....40 cents 100.01-150.....50 cents 150.01-200.....60 cents

Registry Fees: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75 cents for values up to \$100. Registry fees for articles valued in excess of \$100 will remain unchanged.

C.O.D. Fees: The present 40 cents fee brackets will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in the fees covering items above \$10.

Certified Mail: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents per item to 30 cents.

Losses incurred in the operation of special services are paid from funds drawn from the Federal Treasury.

The fee increases will shift a substantial portion of the special service cost borne by the public to the users of these services.
