Open Letter

An open letter to all the people of Wheeler and Kellerville School Districts concerning the proposed consolidation election on Friday, June 12.

We, the undersigned feel that consolidation of the Wheeler and Kellerville School Districts' resources would be of great value to all of us.

Wheeler is a growing, energetic community, with a school system equal to any in our area and we have a potential for the future. Kellerville has fine, respectable people who want the very best for their children; and financial resources which, added to Wheeler's would bring the very best educational program to each boy and girl.

Wheeler, with a school valuation of \$4,107,000 and a tax rate of \$1.35; with a bonded indebtedness of \$56,000 plus Kellerville's valuation of \$2,220,000 would provide for a school district strong enough to offer quality education to everyone for the foreseeable future. All areas of a good school program which provides for college entrance, technical skills, and for full citizenship activity on the part of each graduate would be provided.

Nothing in the way of community life would suffer as a result of consolidation. On the contrary, this would be strengthened. Mutual interests such as the school, churches, and civic organizations would cooperate to give a fuller, richer life to everyone.

New church buildings, the new hospital, new motels as well as expanding businesses of all kinds are the sign posts along the road to true progress - Wheeler has all of these.

To the voters of both districts, we now ask, "what will be your decision on Friday, June 12?" How you decide this question will to a large extent determine the growth of both communities for many years to come. We have faith in you, that your final decision will be a wise one and in the very best interests of all - pupils, parents, and others, but above all for the pupils who are our future, our most precious resource.

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REGISTERED BULLS
Mr. Grady Harris of Mobeetie, consigned three Angus bulls to the First Intentional Performance Registered Bull Test & Sale according to announcements made by Coddling Amour Research, Forker, Oklahoma where the test was conducted.

The feed test was run for 140 days with a complete set of records kept on the weights and gains of each animal as well as lifetime gain and feed conversion. Additional information obtained included ultrasonic ribeye predictions and semen analysis.

These three bulls averaged 3.01 average daily gain for the test and finished with a 2.59 weight per day of age. Their average of 2.15 square inches of ribeye area per 100 carcass weight was the largest of any one group from one breeder among the Angus bulls. This ribeye was predicted by Ultrasonics.

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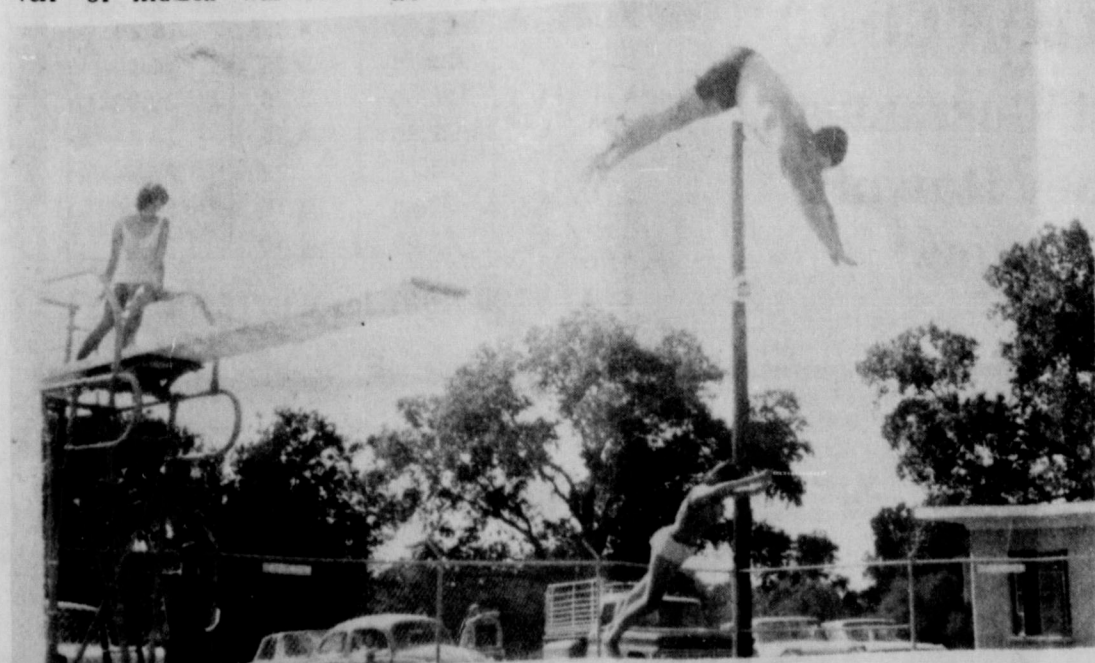

RULES

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RULES for JUNIOR RODEO

Pole Bending

The pole bending pattern is to be run around six poles. Each pole is to be ten-one feet apart and the first pole is to be twenty-one feet from the starting line.

A horse may start either to the right or to the left of the first pole and then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly.

Knocking over a pole, touching the pole with the rider's hand or failure to follow the course shall cause disqualification.

Pole bending is a time event. Each contestant will begin from a running start of clearly visible starting line. No electric timer will be used.

In the event of a tie, the horse declared the winner in the runoff must run the pattern within two seconds of its original time or the runoff must be held again.

Western type equipment must be used. Use of a hackamore or other types of bridles is the optional choice of the contestant; however, the timer or judge may prohibit the use of bits of equipment that he may consider severe.

Flag Race

Three flags used in the contest are about 6 x 8 inches in size, of different colors and should be on flag sticks about 14 inches long. The two buckets used should be conventional three gallon buckets, filled nearly to the top with sand. They should be about 30 yards from the starting/finishing line.

To complete the pattern a barrel should be placed in the center of the arena and about 30 yards from, and slightly beyond the buckets.

As each contestant enters the arena he is handed the first flag. His time starts as his horse reaches the starting line. He plants the flag in a bucket, then the rider can make the circle from either left to right or right to left. If he trips the flag on the ground he must dismount and retrieve the flag in order to continue the race. He must be mounted as the flag changes are made. If the flag falls over, but stays in the bucket, the contestant's time counts. But if it falls out of the bucket and the rider does not replace it, then his time does not count. If wind or weather causes it to fall out, the judge will have to dismount and retrieve the flag on the ground. Contestants who use a flag to strike their horses should be disqualified.

Keyhole Race

The Keyhole Race tests the ability of a horse to run a straight line, stop and run back. It is a timed event. It requires speed, of course, but it also takes good action and control to win this event.

The Keyhole Race is run in a pattern marked on the ground, usually with white lines. The pattern is in the shape of a keyhole, with a lane 40 feet long and four feet wide leading to a circle 20 feet in diameter. Starting from a line 20 feet back, you run your horse up the narrow lane, do a fast rollback inside the circle, then ride back out the lane to the finish line. The entrance of the lane is the starting and finish line. Time is measured as the horse's muzzle crosses the line, going and coming.

THE CONTESTANT IS DISQUALIFIED IF HIS HORSE STEPS ON THE LINE AT ANY TIME DURING THE RUN.

The contestant may start his run from a line 20 feet behind the starting line or the beginning of the narrow lane (10 foot lane). He will also have another 20 feet behind the first 20 foot line to steady or quiet his horse but cannot use this 20 foot area for a running start. A horse must be brought up to the 20 foot line back of the starting line at a pace not to exceed a walk and must have his horse at a standstill before he starts his running.

Bull Riding

Contestants must ride six seconds. Senior Boys, one hand. Intermediate boys one hand. The more the animal is contended the higher the score.

Calf Roping

The calf roping rule is Catch as Catch Can. Contestant is allowed two loops or 30 minutes to catch the calf.

Saddle Race

Saddles and Blankets are placed at one end of the arena and the boy riding bare back will be at a line on the other end of the arena. All contestants will go at one time at the flag of the Field Judge and the first five back riding with the saddle and blanket place.

Walk and Lead Race

Boys on horse back at a line on one end of the arena, all ride at one time, flagged to start by the Field Judge and the boys ride to the far end of the arena, get off the horse behind the line and lead their horse back. The first 6 places.

Barrel Race

All barrel races will be run in the clover leaf pattern and will be timed between the flags. The contestant must cross their trail each time they round a barrel. Five second penalty for each barrel knocked over. Breaking the pattern will disqualify contestant. The barrel course may be run either to the right or left.

Flag Race

Girls are horse back and are timed just like the barrel race. Contestants will be given a flag and she must carry it to the barrel at the far end of the arena, place it in a bucket of sand, remove another flag and return back across the starting line. Time is between the two flags.

Boot Scramble

Each Small Fry contestant will remove their right shoe or boot. It will be placed in a pile about twelve steps from the starting line and all contestants will run up to find their shoe or boot, put it on and run back across the starting line.

Ribbon Roping

Contestants will work in pairs, a boy and girl. The boy will choose the girl helper, but a girl may run only once. The boy ropes the calf and the girl takes the ribbon from the calf's tail and runs back across the starting line. The rope must go over the calf's head, and the boy must have the calf turned loose by the time the girl gets to the line. This is a timed event.

Wild Cow Milking

The contestant will run on foot from a point behind the starting line to the cow, which will be staked. Contestant must milk enough into a coke bottle for the judge to pour out back at the starting line. This is a timed event.

Ribbon Goat Race

Contestants run from a point behind starting line to staked goat. Contestants take ribbon from goat's tail, and run back to starting point. This is a timed event.

Stick Horse Barrel Race

Contestants must furnish their own stick horse. They will run the Clover Leaf Pattern, and will be timed between flags.

CONTESTANTS must go to school in Wheeler County to compete in the R-H Junior Rodeo.

CONTESTANTS must not have accepted prize money from other Rodeos.

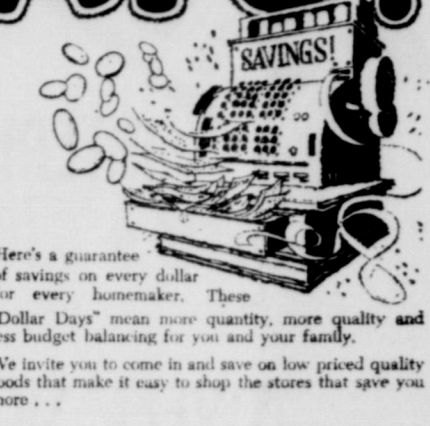

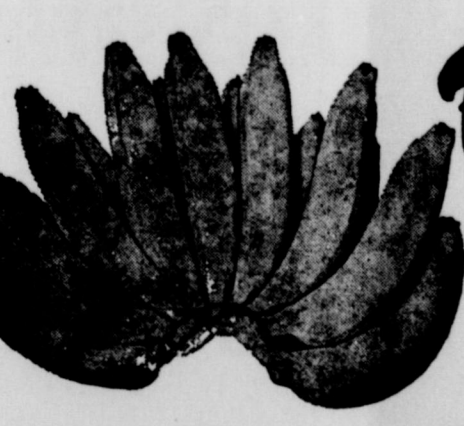

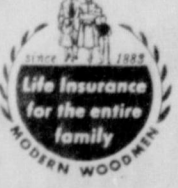
