SWEETWATER CREEK DAM IS EXPLAINED

Fred Parkey and Harry Frye of the Red River Authority met with the Mayor and City Council and the Chamber of Commerce Board of directors Thursday evening at Nora's. It was explained that the authority has progressed as far as they can without a statement from Wheeler and Shamrock as their interest in purchasing water from the reservoir.

Tests recently completed show the site is a good location for a dam. The drainage area would cover 288 square miles. Total output for the dam would be 49,260 acre feet of water with a capacity of 65,760 acre feet. Surface area would be 2,540 acres. Depth at the deepest point would be 44.8 feet with an average depth of 26 feet. There would be 32 miles of shoreline.

The dam, 12,000 feet long, would be 102 feet high. The width at the bottom would be 608 feet.

Water available would be 7,000,000 gallons per day. This would be more than adequate for both Wheeler and Shamrock for many years.

It was pointed out that an abundance of water would attract water users. The authority received one inquiry by a brewery as to the quality of the water in Sweetwater Creek. The water was desirable, but the fact that Wheeler County is dry discouraged further inquiry. A Carbon Black plant is also interested in the project.

If the dam were built for Wheeler and Shamrock to use the water, a line would be run to a location east of Wheeler, where the line would branch off with one line coming into Wheeler and the other running to Shamrock. It was pointed out that both Wheeler and Shamrock would have to cooperate before the project could be completed.

Wheeler's present supply of water is inadequate. The present wells owned and operated by the city do not meet the needs of the town. The City Council stated a definite interest in determining the exact cost of the water from the Sweetwater Dam. Wheeler's and Shamrock's wells are located at the

edge of the Great Plains Water Table which has been dropping for some time. This is a result of the large number of irrigation wells

pumping from this source. As a temporary water source, Shamrock City Council agreed to sell Wheeler water. The Shamrock wells are located

four miles south of Wheeler. This means of getting the much needed water would be cheaper than drilling and equipping a new well.

C. of C. Conducts Business

Twenty-one Chamber of Commerce members were present for the April meeting held at Nora's Cafe, Tuesday evening. Recognized as a new member present was Bob Frankenberry, Borden's Milk distributor for Wheeler.

Chamber president, Jim Wright called on the secretary, Betty Risner to give the financial report. The Chamber has \$2014 in the bank. Of this amount \$500 will be spent on the Park Beautification project. After all known expenses for the coming year have been deducted, a balance of \$885 will be maintained.

new members have been added this year.

James Verden, chairman of the Park Beautification committee, reported that work is continuing at the park. A Volley-ball tournament has been scheduled with the surrounding communities in an effort to raise money for the project.

In connection with Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up Week now in progress, the group was reminded that a truck will be around Thursday morning to pick up the trash swept up by the merchants to make possible the painting of parking stripes in the business district.

This project will be underway Thursday.

Hiram Whitener reported that the Hospital Board has set aside \$350 for the landscaping of the hospital grounds. Of this amount \$275 will be paid back to the board by donation. The Wheeler Garden Club with Cora Hyatt as President is in charge of collecting the donations. If you wish to make a donation, contact, Mrs. Hyatt.

Mrs. Laura Guthrie was put in charge of collecting information for new Brochures for Wheeler. She appears in her own committee. She stated that work on the project will begin immediately.

Father Dies

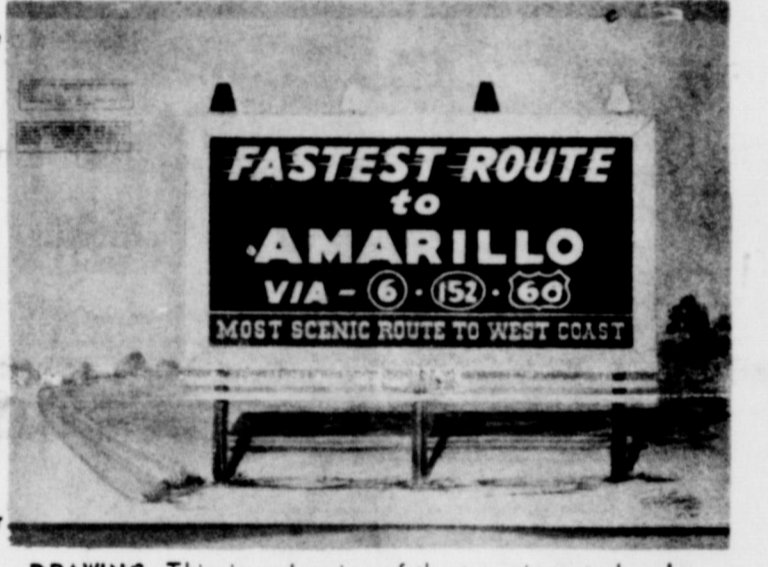

Preventive Control of Mesquite

by Charles David Jackson
Preventive Control Effective on Mesquite:

Mesquite control through preventive maintenance is gaining acceptance as an economical way to halt infestation and prevent reinfestation where other control methods have been used, reports a range scientist at the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur.

Preventive maintenance works like weed control in row crops because the mesquite is killed or suppressed before it seriously affects production, says Researcher E.D. "Doug" Robinson.

The method is suggested where mesquite infestation does not exceed about 50 plants per acre.

Robinson says it takes about five-cents worth of a solution of 2,4,5-T and diesel oil to kill one plant. Mechanical equipment and hand grubbing can also be economical where infestations are light.

Ranchers are applying the chemicals with everything from knapsack sprayers to truck-mounted rigs built for two and three man operation. Robinson said Jay Taylor of Amarillo and the 6666 ranch division near Borger are trying large scale preventive maintenance programs.

Control chemicals can be applied all year, Robinson said, but they are most effective when the topsoil is dry. Dryness causes the soil to pull away from the roots and allows chemicals to kill dormant buds below the ground.

Research at the Texas A&M University station indicates mesquite should be complete encircled with spray to the point of runoff from the groundline and up about one foot for effective control. **Charcoal Rot of Sorghum**

Charcoal rot of sorghum can be a serious disease in most of the grain sorghum growing areas of Texas. The fungus is known to attack at least 280 other species of plants.

The disease may cause seedling blight of late planted sorghum, but generally the greatest damage occurs as the plants near maturity. Sudden lodging occurs in the field at this stage. A red or black rot develops and quickly disappears, sometimes within 48 hours. Therefore, the rot is often overlooked.

If lodges stalks are split and closely examined, the pith will be in various stages of destruction. This may occur in several internodes above the ground and into the roots below the soil surface. At maturity, heads of diseased plants are not fully developed and a poor yield of shrunken grain.

The charcoal rot is caused by a fungus which can exist in more than one form. The one causing charcoal rot is called *Macrophomina phaseoli*. The growth of the organism and its ability to cause plant diseases are greatly influenced by temperature, moisture and association with microflora. The fungus is very resistant to adverse environmental conditions, being able to survive in the soil or in plant tissue for years. This ability to survive plus the wide range of hosts plants means that many soils are infested with the fungus.

High temperatures and moisture stress favor the development of the disease. Recent information indicates that moisture stress, temperatures of 95 degrees F. or higher, and sorghum plants that bloomed two to four weeks before these conditions exist are necessary for severe damage from charcoal rot. Plant population may have an indirect effect. Under conditions of moisture stress heavier stands appear to suffer more because of

Since all hybrid grain sorghums are susceptible, management practices which will develop the sorghum past the danger period before moisture stress and high temperatures occur should be used. Under irrigation needed moisture can be supplied.

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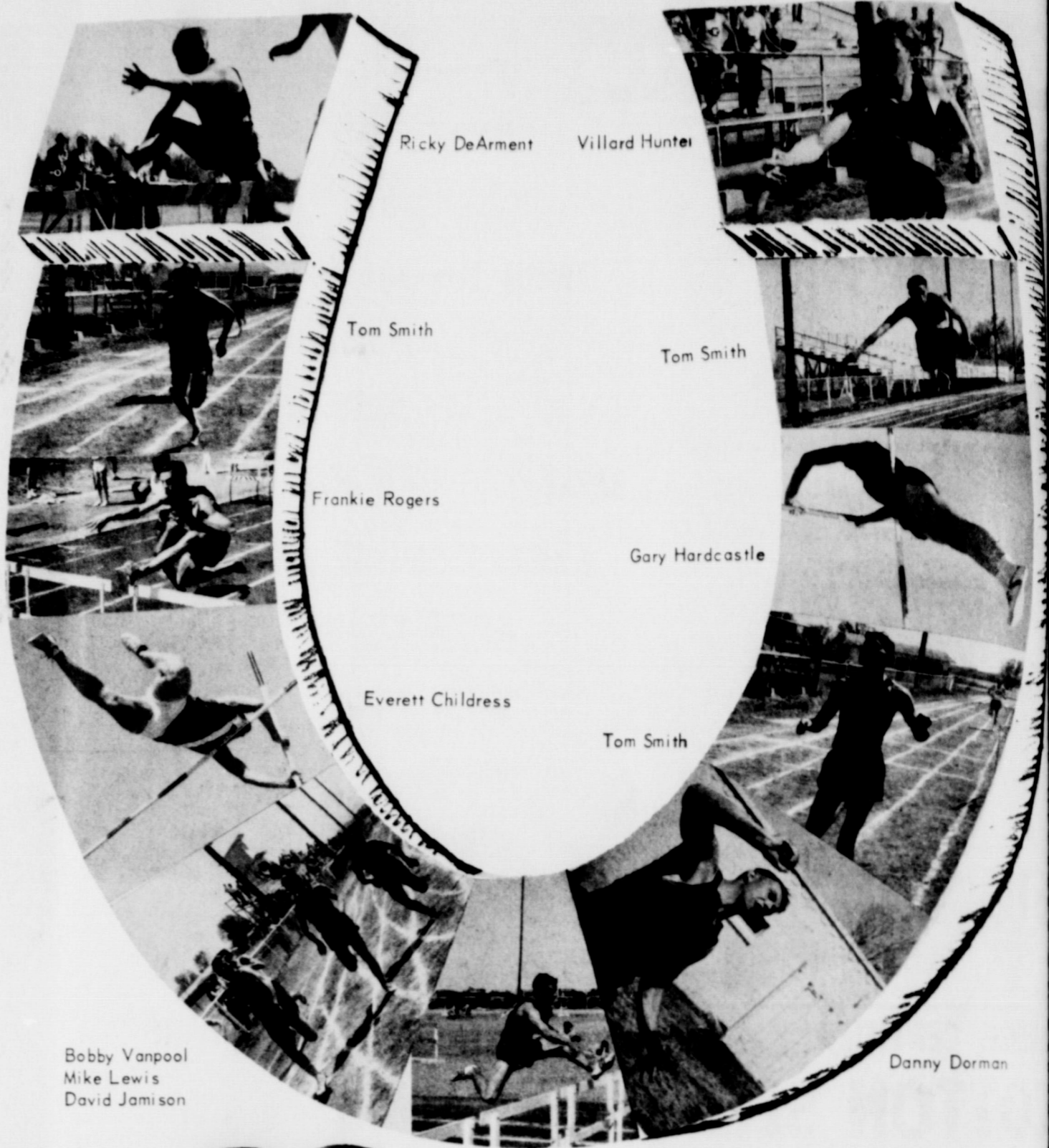
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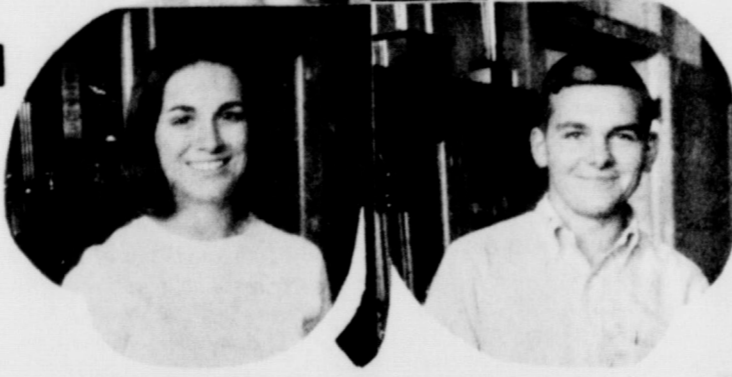
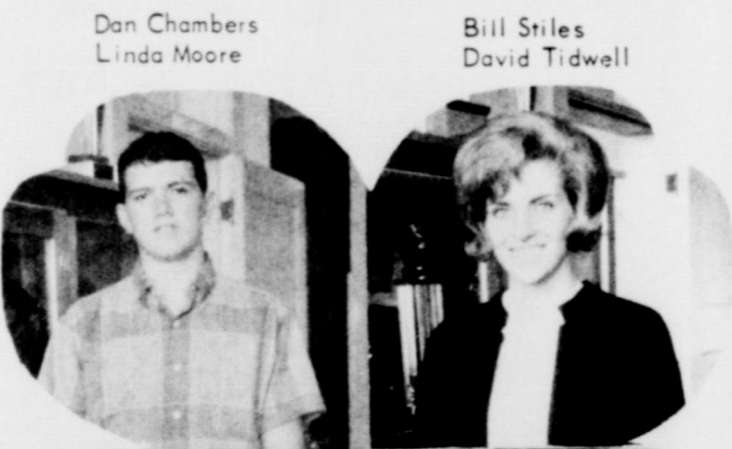
