### Parker Files for Office

Parker has held public offices for 12 years in Gray county. He was elected county attorney in 1944, served for four years and was elected county judge. He held that office four years, then after a two-year interval was elected county judge again for four years.

Parker came to Gray county in 1930 after graduating from the University of Texas Law School and has lived in Pampa since that time. Parker holds three college degrees, A Bachelor of Arts degree from West Texas State University, a Master of Arts degree from the University of Texas at Austin and a law degree from the University of Texas Law School, also at Austin.

Parker grew up on a ranch in Lipscomb county and attended a country school. He also attended school in Higgins before entering college. Parker was admitted to the bar of the state of Texas in 1930. He is a member of the State Bar, Texas Bar and Gray County Bar Association. Parker lives at 1202 East Browning with his wife, Wilma and their two daughters, who attend Pampa Schools.

In a statement announcing his candidacy, Parker said: "During the time that I served as county judge there were filed in the County Court of Gray County, 3,023 criminal cases, 231 civil cases and 781 probate, lunacy and juvenile cases making a total of 4,035 cases, approximately three fourths of these cases came to trial before me."

"My experience in presiding over the County Court in the trial of these cases has qualified me for the trial of cases in the District Court. I contend that there is no

substitute for experience. Anyone who offers himself as candidate for District Judge should have more qualifications than just the desire to hold public office, he should have the proper educational background and experience plus the desire to work and stay on the job. While County Judge, I spent eight to nine hours each day working in my office at the Court House. This can be verified by the County Officials who served with me.

I invite the voters of Gray, Hemphill, Roberts, Lipscomb and Wheeler counties to check my record as county judge and county attorney of Gray county and to also check my record as attorney in private practice. I feel that being elected to the district judge office is a great responsibility and if I am elected I shall try to conduct myself in such a manner as to be worthy of that high office. I shall try to be fair to all persons who come before me regardless of color, religion or social standing."

Tamara and twelve other women and girls from the Castle Hills Baptist Church of San Antonio were sleeping in a tightly closed dormitory

Tamara awoke at 3 a.m. with a head ache and nausea. She awakened her mother, who lost consciousness before she could awake the others. Tamara then awakened Kathryn Major, 17 who turned, opened the windows and awakened the others.

Tamara and her mother are in the hospital at this time but are recovering. Tamara and her mother are the daughter and wife of Rev. Jack R. Taylor, pastor of Castle Hills Baptist Church of San Antonio, Texas. Jack R. Taylor is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Taylor of Wheeler.

### TRACTOR MAINTENANCE

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held January 10 through 13 under the sponsorship of the Mobeettie high school vocational ag. department, according to Mr. Paul Morris, Superintendent and Pat Bradley, teacher of voc. ag.

Mr. Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the vocational agricultural division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Wiedemann, a native of Mission, Texas received his B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A&M University in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Company of Mission and while serving 24 months active duty with the U.S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

Outstanding success has been the words associated with the tractor maintenance short course taught by Mr. Wiedemann according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through his office.

The short course at Mobeettie is scheduled to begin January 10 at 7 p.m. in the vocational ag. building. Other meetings in the series of the course will be held January 11, 12 & 13.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide on the farm instruction according to Pat Bradley. Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Mr. Morris or the Teacher of Vocational ag., Mr. Bradley. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged.

Tractor maintenance short course certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Wiedemann states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Wiedemann will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life. Throughout the short course emphasis will be placed on "Learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All students will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on these tractors.

Safety during both maintenance and actual operation will also be included in this course.

Short courses in tractor maintenance, as well as other subjects, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University, stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University who coordinates the program for Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program, states Jaska, is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational ag. to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialist are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Insect Control, Farm Management, Farm electrification, Farm Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Dairy Science, Pasture and Oxyacetylene Welding.

## 1966 Farmers Tax Guides

By Charles Jackson  
 The 1966 edition of the "Farmers Tax Guide" prepared especially for farmers to use in working up their 1965 income tax reports, is available at local county extension offices.

It would be hard to place a value on this publication. It is written and illustrated for farmer use and is just about a must for tax filing purposes.

One of its most useful sections is the example tax return. On this sample tax return, Schedules B, D, and F, are used. Also the major form of all, schedule 1040 is shown with the completed return and computed tax.

Every tax payer who received two-thirds of his gross income from farming is due to file his return and pay the tax by February 15 unless he files an estimate and pays this amount by January 17, 1966.

"Closing Time" for this year's farm records is close at hand. This means totaling the balance sheets on all farm and home enterprises and taking a look at what happened during the year.

A close look should point up problems that must be met in planning for 1966 and on into the future. A good set of farm records will reveal problems that are of vital concern to every member of the family. Records often reflect whether a management change cut costs and raised profits or whether a minor farm enterprise should be dropped or expanded.

Furthermore, a complete set of records is a must at income figuring time. Regularly kept records can save dollars at tax paying time, for deductible expenses are often overlooked, especially if paid in cash. A few missed items can run up the tax bill by many dollars.

Too, complete farm records are an asset when money must be borrowed for production or operating expenses. Knowing that the business is doing makes a strong talking point in effecting credit arrangements. Farm families also need facts on which to base their decisions and none are more reliable than those obtained from well-kept records.

There is much information available through my office on record keeping I will be happy to discuss the importance of record keeping and methods with interested persons.

## Report From The Co. Agent

 Pruning Trees

What is the best time of the year to prune trees? This depends on the reason for pruning.

Deadwood can be removed from trees at any time without injuring them. Spring pruning however, is recommended when doing correctional pruning, since the wounds heal faster than at other times of the year.

If your objective is to increase fruit and bloom set, prune before the blossoms form in midsummer. If, on the other hand, you want to decrease the number of blossoms, prune before they bloom after the blossoms have set.

Pruning trees during early fall tends to reduce plant hardness and in general, is not a good practice. Dead branches can be removed now.

Evergreens should not be sheared in late summer or fall as the cut ends will not heal over until spring.

An excellent guide, Modern Pruning Methods, No. B-977 is available at my office free to anyone that desires the information.

Enzyme Treated Meats  
 Throughout the year we get several calls concerning enzyme treated meats. These enzymes are normally plant enzymes which tend to break down the elastin and collagen which cause meat to be tough.

These enzymes are the agents which can be purchased in grocery stores and are tenderizers.

Many meat packers and restaurants use enzymes as tenderizing agents. These enzyme tenderizers have been approved for use by the Food and Drug Administration and in no way affect the wholesomeness of the meat.

Small cuts of meat are normally treated by dipping them into an enzyme solution immediately before freezing and packaging. In this way the enzyme does not become active until the meat is defrosted. Some packers inject enzymes into the live animals before slaughter, or into the carcass after slaughter. The enzyme tenderizing action begins when the meat is heated.

If a meat cut is treated with an enzyme in a federally inspected plant, the labeling must show that such treatment has been given. Of course, there is a constant check on the enzyme concentration being used in federally inspected establishments.

I thought perhaps this may be of interest to people since these treated meats are appearing in grocery stores more frequently as time goes on.

Public landownership leaflet  
 Recently I received a copy of the Texas edition of the government land acquisition publication. It was prepared by the American Forest Production Industries.

Some important information in the publication includes: The Federal Government owns 770,000,000 acres of the United States land surface or about 34 percent of the total. The total government i. e. Federal, State and local own nearly 40 percent of the U. S. land area.

## Conservation News

President Johnson, referring to November as Water Conservation Month, said the first session of the Eighty-ninth Congress made a number of significant contributions to the strengthening of the Federal Government's role in water resources management.

Legislation increasing the maximum flood storage capacity from 5,000 to 12,500 acre feet in floodwater retarding lakes built and operated by local people with the help of the Soil Conservation Service and other U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies was one of the important laws enacted by the Congress, according to Mr. H.N. Smith, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Texas.

"This law will permit better use of many upstream reservoir sites in multi-purpose watershed projects," said Smith.

Excerpts from the President's Proclamation designating November as Water Conservation Month include: "Of all the natural resources with which our nation has so richly been blessed, none is more important than water."

"Both urban and rural citizens rely on our water resources to satisfy human needs, to maintain farm and industrial production, and to provide electric power. Our rivers, lakes and similar bodies of water constitute a vital segment of our transportation and communication

system and provide recreational facilities that encourage our use of leisure time.  
 "The good health of the people of this nation is no small measure dependent upon the quantity and quality of our water."

"But none of our resources has been more grossly abused by waste and pollution than as to the quantity and quality of our supply. This is being expressed in quarters of the nation's problem in many places. Not a need to find new sources of water, but, is to develop sound conservation practices and to make effective use of water resources now available.

"We must be far-sighted and bold in managing our water. What must be done and done as soon as possible, is to reverse the trends of waste and pollution and contamination which have assured massive and lethal progress as to threaten the health economy and natural beauty of the nation."

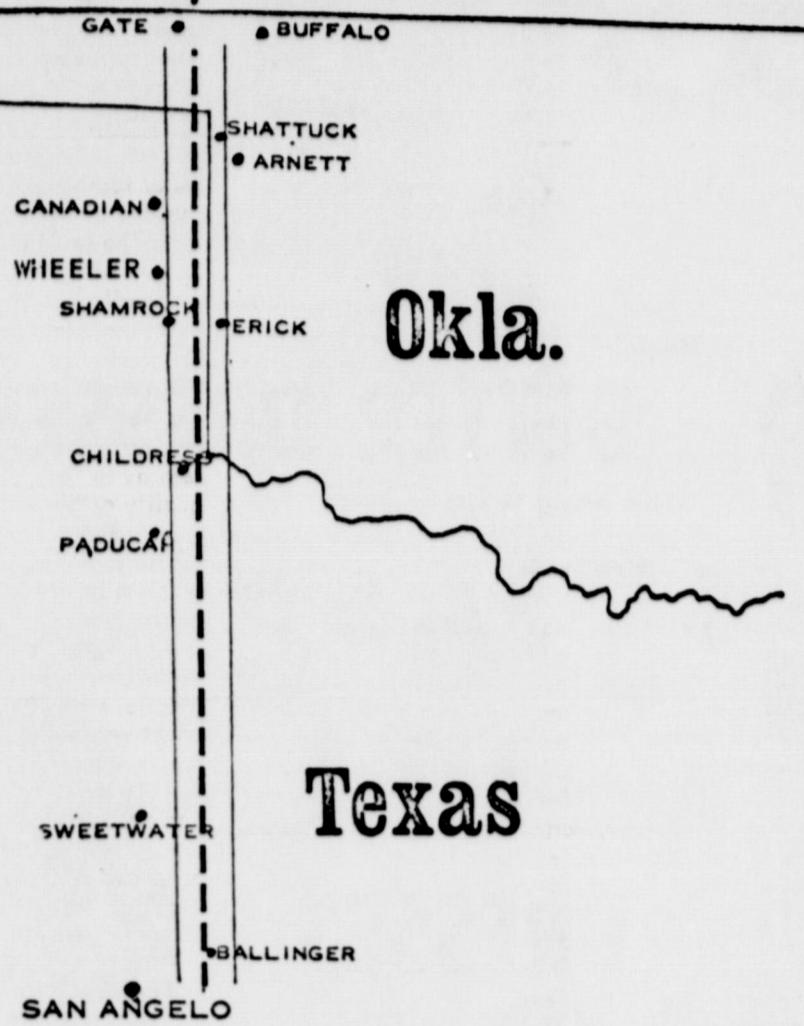

B-58 SUPERSONIC CORRIDOR

## Air Force Supersonic Booms

Supersonic training flights by Strategic Air Command B-58 Hustler bombers will be flown along a route starting from northeast of Perryton to a point near San Angelo beginning January 3 and ending March 31.

The 40 mile wide corridor passes near Shattuck and Arnett, Okla. and continues south passing Canadian and Shamrock and Erick, Okla. Flying out of the Oklahoma area at Childress, the corridor continues past Paducah Sweetwater and Ballinger and terminates northeast of San Angelo.

An Air Force radar bomb scoring unit will determine the accuracy of simulated bomb drops through the use of radio and radar signals. No bombs are carried by the aircraft on these training missions.

In order to reduce the sonic booms over major cities where scoring equipment is located, target selections are made to by-pass or to allow deceleration to sub-sonic speeds before reaching these cities.

The bombers will make a maximum of two runs daily, flying at supersonic speeds up to mach 2 (1,300 m.p.h.) at altitudes above 35,000 ft. Because of the high altitudes, the booms they create are comparatively weak in

strength. Although sometimes startling or distracting in the suddenness, the booms will in no circumstance cause personal injury or damage to a structurally sound building.

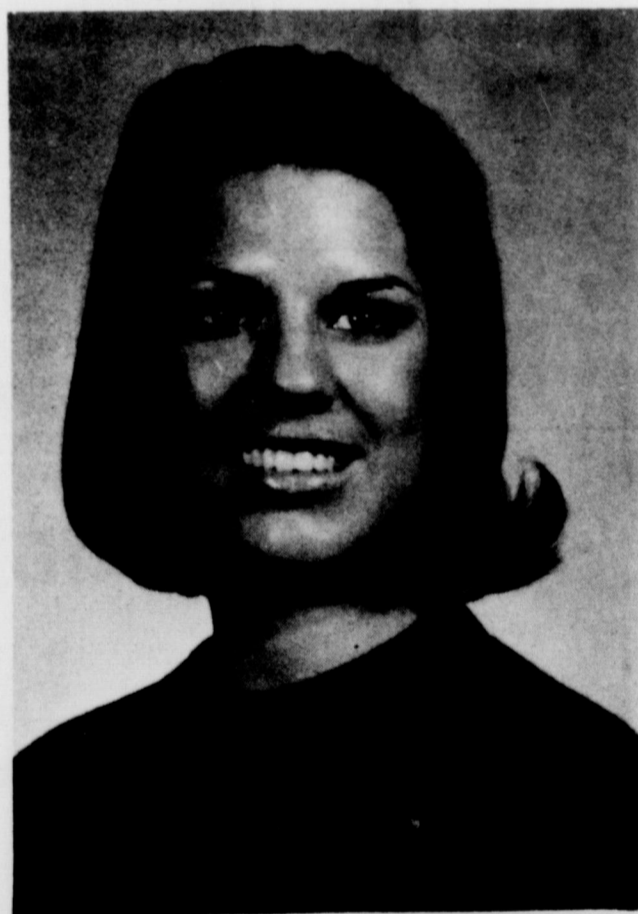

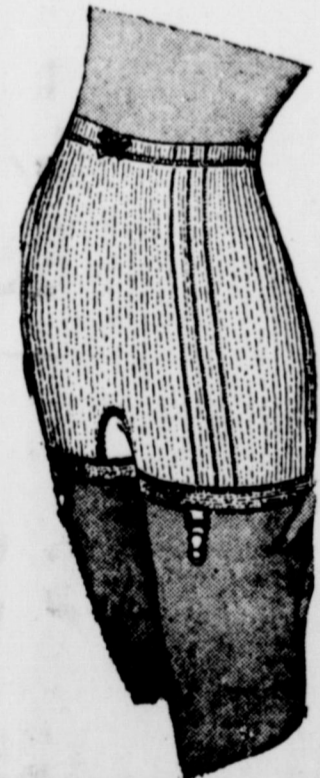
