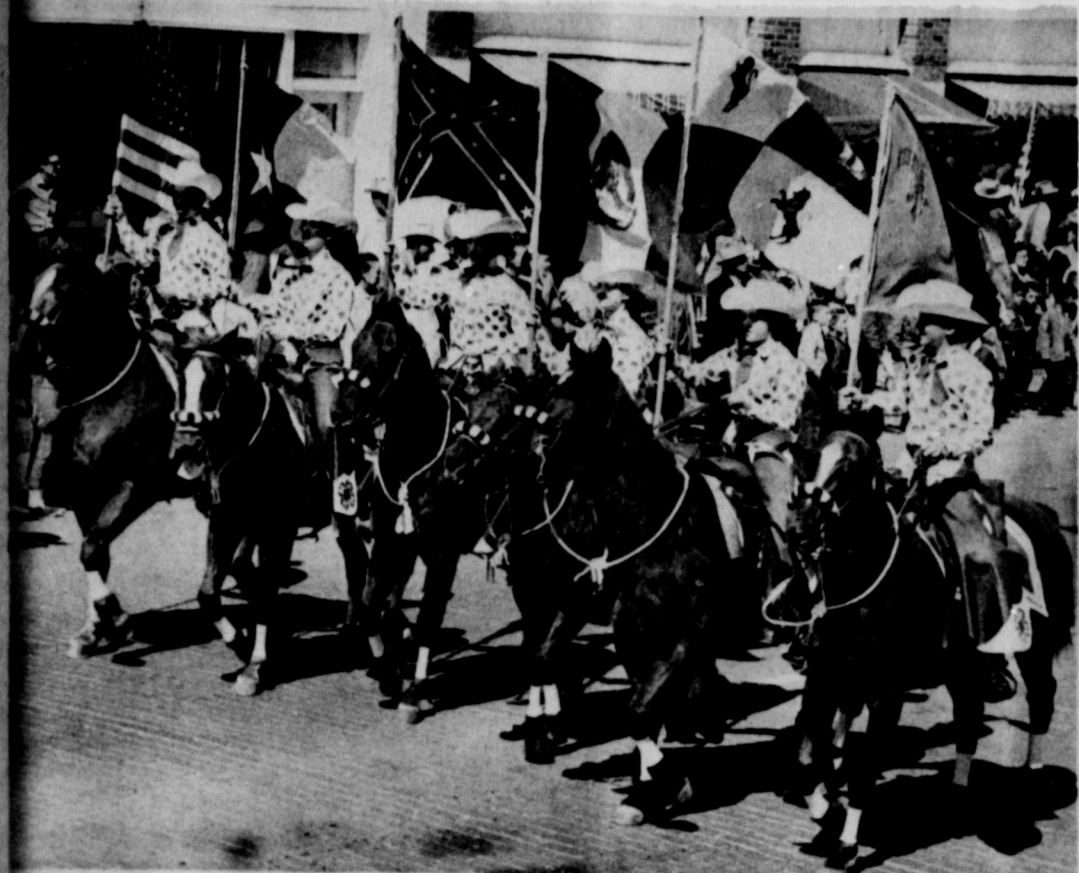

## ANNUAL EASTER EGG HUNT



Youngsters from Wheeler and the surrounding area will participate in the annual Easter Egg Hunt Sunday afternoon at the Rodeo Arena. This affair is sponsored annually by the Wheeler Riding and Roping Club and has become one of the traditional affairs for local youths.

Milton Liles, president of the club, said that many merchants and individuals are giving prizes to youngsters that find the "Lucky Eggs."

Each youngster who finds a prize egg is asked to report to persons in charge of the hunt so that the names of the winners can be obtained. Parents are asked to help their children cooperate on this matter.

Anyone desiring to donate eggs to the hunt is asked to bring them to the Wheeler Gin Saturday.

Participants in the hunt have been asked to meet at the rodeo grounds at 2:30 p.m. Sunday. The hunt will get underway at 3 p.m.

Riding and Roping Club members are urged to be at the rodeo grounds at 1 p.m. to help hide the eggs.

Children participating in hunt will be divided into four age groups—1, 2 and 3 years; 4, 5 and 6 years; 7 to 12 years; 13 years and older.

There will be a total of 72 prize eggs to be found.

# GOPHER CONTROL

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON  
It's Time To Rid Pastures Of Gophers.....

All across Wheeler County cattlemen are needing pastures to feed cattle instead of gophers. However, reports from many sections show that the gophers are getting the upper hand in lawns as well as pastures. In addition to killing the grass in pastures, gopher runs and mounds make pastures unsightly and rough. The mounds make combine harvesting of grass seed almost impossible.

Dirt is dug from the run and pushed to the surface in the form of a horseshoe mound. The gophers (salamanders) can be killed only in their runs which are about six inches deep. The tunnel from the mound to the main run is usually plugged with dirt.

Gophers may be killed by either of two methods, probe or machine. When using the probe method, push a

stick the size of a hoe handle into the ground over the run. Do not let the stick hit the bottom of the run. Place one teaspoon of poisoned grain in the run and cover hold with a chip or piece of sod and pour dirt over it to keep light out of run.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has developed a Burrow-Builder which simulates gopher runs and deposits poisoned grain in them. Plans for the machine can be obtained from the county agents office or by writing the Agricultural Information Department, College Station, Texas. This machine was demonstrated last year at the Wheeler Cemetery and it obtained excellent results.

When using the poisoned grain, special care should be taken to prevent accidental poisoning. Be sure to read the label on packages and accept only packages with printed labels. The Commissioners Court has purchased poisoned grain for Wheeler County residents and this grain may be purchased from Mr. McNeil, custodian for the Wheeler County Courthouse, at the County Judge Office.

# AMERICAN COLLEGE TESTING PROGRAM

"What's in a score?" Reading the above question, what score pops into your mind? The basketball score recently seen in the headlines? Perhaps the score you made on that English Test the other day? Or maybe the musical score of a number you play in the school band?

If you're a senior who has taken--or soon will take--a college admissions test, the question might bring to mind your "ACT" score.

(For those uninitiated in this alphabetical jargon, ACT is short for American College Testing Program.) Chances are, in fact, that ACT scores are currently assuming greater importance to college-bound seniors than scores of athletic events.

"I wonder if I passed the ACT tests?" is a question often asked by such score-conscious seniors. The truth is, you don't "pass" or "fail" ACT any more than you pass or fail with your golf or bowling score. But just as in sports, your ACT score may be used to place you in college classes with other students having similar scores.

Which colleges use ACT scores? More than 80 percent of all those in the Rocky Mountains and plains states expect ACT scores from entering freshmen. These colleges are listed in ACT information booklets available in the school counseling office.

These booklets also explain how different colleges use ACT scores, and provide answers to other important questions.

And believe it or not, most parents are far more interested in your ACT scores than those you rack up in sports competition. So---if you haven't already done so---take your ACT scores and accompanying booklets home and share this "inside" information with Mom and Dad.
