GROUND BREAKING TODAY

SCHOOL ELECTION SAT., APRIL 2 CITY ELECTION SET FOR TUESDAY

Be sure to come to the Ground-breaking ceremony at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, March 31. Everyone is Welcome. News Media will be present to publicize this climatic event.

The new school plant being built should be completed in 350 days by the Panhandle Engineers-Contractors. The architects were Rittenberry-Rittenberry and Associates of Amarillo.

Ground breaking ceremonies will be on Thursday at 10 a.m. There will be speakers, and the student body will be turned out during the ceremony.

Election time is here. The school trustee election will be held Saturday with the City election set for Tuesday. In addition to the school election Saturday, the citizens of Wheeler and Kelton will each elect a director for Parkview hospital.

The voting places for each school district will be the school buildings. Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Two posi-

tions are open in the County Trustee election. T.M. Britt and Sol Blastein have filed in Precincts 2 and 4 respectively. Six people have filed for the three openings on the Wheeler school board. Retiring are Harold Kenady, W.A. Good, Jr., and Virgil Patterson. Kenady and Good have filed for re-election and are on the ballot with Leo Lamb, Bill Hampton, John C. Vise and Donald

Reeves. The Mobeetie ballot lists Irvin Seitz, Ben A. Eads and Clifford Walser. Three persons have placed their name on the ballot for the Briscoe Board of Trustees. L.D. Childress, Dean Tipps and Eddie George are running for election. Only one name appears on the ballot at Kelton. Bobby Calcote is seeking election as Trustee at Kelton.

David Britt has placed his name on the ballot for election to the hospital board at Kelton with Hiram Whitener asking to serve another term for Wheeler District. The citizens of Wheeler will elect a Mayor and two councilmen when they go to the polls Tuesday, April 5. Only one person, Don Earnley is in the running for Mayor with three having filed for councilman positions.

Mayor Archie Hibler and councilmen W.D. Mitchell are not running for re-election. Pete Burton, whose term expires, has filed for re-election. Appearing on the ballot for councilmen will be Robert Denson, O.B. "Pete" Burton and Richard E. Hefley.

The election will be held in the city office at 116 East Texas Street. The hours for the city election will be 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. A.B. Crump is election judge for the city election. Exercise your rights as an American Citizen and vote in these elections.

Meeting Called for Wheeler & Briscoe

INDUSTRY FOR MOBEETIE

Two meetings have been set for the discussion of locating a garment factory at Mobeetie. A meeting for the Wheeler area has been set for tonight, Thursday in the District Courtroom at 7:30. Briscoe people are urged to be present at a meeting in the gym Friday at 7:30 p.m. At this time the plan for organizing the factory will be explained to the people and each one will be given an opportunity to invest. Each person investing will own stock in the factory. The factory would be

located at Mobeetie. The school building in Mobeetie has been kept up by the school board and has been sitting empty for some time. With very little remodeling the building could be converted to meet the needs of the factory. The school board has agreed to lease the building for the first year for \$1.00. The building will be leased for a period of five years with an option to buy at the end of that period. The equipment for operation is available through

lease. Rather than invest the much needed cash, the equipment will be leased until the operation is well underway. The venture will offer employment for 75 to 100 increasing to a possible 200 women with a few positions available for men. It is hoped that the operation will help the financial situation of many young people trying to get a start in the county and keep them from moving to other areas. The type of clothing made will be uniforms for the federal government. It was noted in a news item that the government is having a hard time getting companies to take the government contracts. Mrs. Betty Rains, who has worked in all departments of a factory in Okema and Oklahoma City and Grady Harris presented the idea of putting a factory in Mobeetie at a mass meeting of the Mobeetie people. Several thousand dollars were raised at this meeting. At the present time 30,000 has been raised. It is felt that \$50,000 is needed before the final details can be worked out. To check the available labor, questionnaires were sent out. These were sent

out in the morning mail at Mobeetie and 25 were returned by afternoon. Of the many returned only two were not interested in working. The questionnaires have been placed in all the stores at Wheeler, Kelton and Allison. This proves that the work force is available. You are urged to be present at the above stated

meetings and get answers to the questions you might have. No investment is too small to be considered. This is not a get rich quick scheme for anyone, it is a venture to offer employment and open the door to industry in our area. This will not only help the Mobeetie people, but it will be an economic boost for the county.

BONDS TOP MILLION MARK FOR FIVE BURGLARS

The men are charged in Potter County with the possession of burglary tools and are being held on a bond of \$10,000 each. Polopeno County has a total of \$500,000 worth of bonds on the group. Upshire county set bond at \$25,000 each on the five. Two of the men are charged in Wichita, Kan. with a \$9,100 robbery of a Jewelry store. Kansas officers flew the Wichita couple in Amarillo to identify the pair. At the time of this robbery, the men were armed. A Governor's warrant has been placed on James for an armed robbery in Mississippi. A Bench warrant has been served on Brown for car theft at Norman, Okla. It is the opinion of the Times that Sheriff Bus Dorman is to be commended for refusing bond on these men. Had he been accepted, the above charges could not have been filed on the men at this time. During the time these men were free on bond, they could have been continuing their profession. The prisoners are now being held in Potter County jail by the Federal Government. The men are Jessie Ray James, alias Bennie Cowdry, 28, Clifford Henry Bowen, 34 and James Timothy Overton, 24, all of Austin, William Robert Brown, 40 of Oklahoma City and Fred Clinton Hedges, 24 of Midland. Mug shots of the five were made, but only three are available at the present time. The Times will carry the other two pictures at a later date.

Tips For The Weight Watcher

The first two items of food usually dropped by the weight wacher and bread and potatoes. This is not necessarily the right thing to do, since it is the total amount of calories consumed in a day that counts reports noted food and nutrition specialist.

Four or more servings from the bread group (enriched or whole grain) should be included in each day's diet. This does not mean that the servings should always be bread as such, for the bread group includes noodles, spaghetti and cereals. The nutrients furnished by the bread group are B vitamins, iron, a small amount of protein and a large amount of starch.

It is the starch which furnishes a cheap source of energy, but which also contributes a large portion of calories. One slice of bread, however, is not particularly high in calories, unless butter and jelly are added.

One slice of white bread (average slice) contains about 63 calories, while one slice of whole wheat bread has 55 calories. By adding one pat of butter (51 calories) and one level tablespoon of jelly (50) calories the caloric value of the bread is increased by 101 calories. Thus one slice of white bread becomes 164 calories and one slice of whole wheat bread becomes 156 calories.

The plain white potato need not be such a terrible offender for the weight watcher, either, if it is eaten plain without butter, sour cream or mayonnaise. In many instances, it is the dressing (sauce salad dressings, gravies) or seasonings (butter, fats or oils) served with the vegetables that increase the caloric value of the food.

The weight watcher would do well to select a balanced diet including foods such as meat, milk or milk products, breads and cereals, vegetables and fruits.

Nutrition Flashes on Dental Health:

Nature's Toothbrushes--the carrot, apples, oranges, tangerines, celery, grapefruit pears--work three ways. (1) They sweep the teeth and gums free of food particles. (2) They provide some of the substances needed for the teeth to grow and stay healthy. (3) At the same time, these foods help keep the body at a proper weight because they are not excessive in calories; for example, 60 calories per medium-sized orange.

Fresh fruits and vegetables are for people who do not find it convenient to brush after each meal (and how many do?) But, everyone should take the time to brush his teeth at least twice a day.

Dental decay and overweight are two of America's biggest unconquered health problems. Help to eliminate both with some fresh fruits and vegetables at each meal.

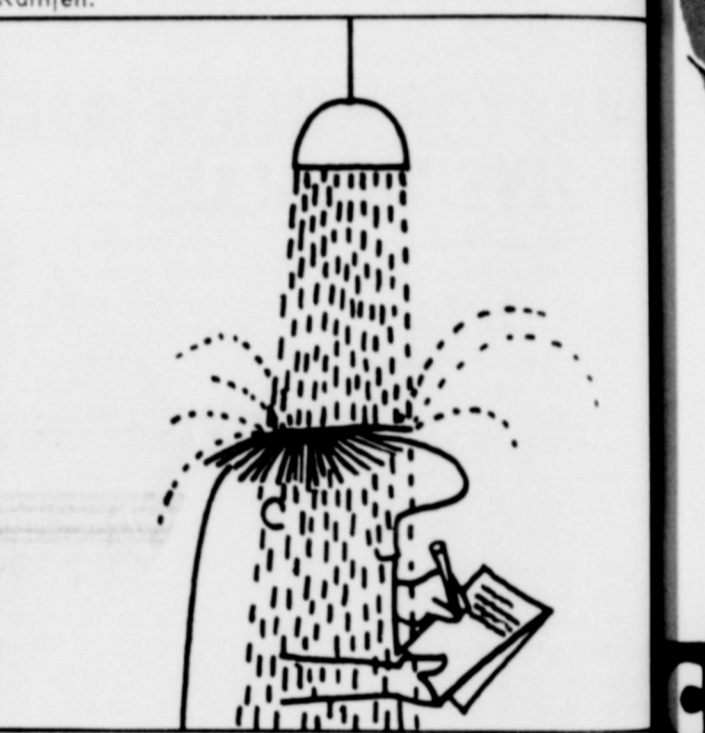

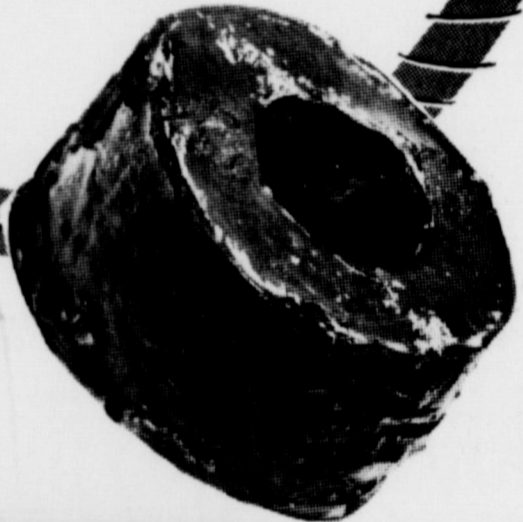

The ELM LEAF BEETLE

By Charles David Jackson

The Elm Leaf Beetle:
During the past two years, Wheeler County residents have received considerable damage from the Elm Leaf Beetle. This little insect determines to a great extent the appearance of an elm tree and whether it is enjoyed as an ornamental tree for the year. It is time now to start making preparations to preserve the appearance of your elm trees for the spring and summer months ahead.

The elm leaf beetle may be found on elm trees wherever they grow in the United States. It feeds on the leaves and skeletonizes them so that they dry up and drop prematurely. Heavy defoliation weakens the trees and makes them subject to attack by other bark beetles and borers as well as by diseases. Elms growing in urban locations especially those near buildings, are most heavily infested.

How to recognize it:
The adult elm leaf beetle is about 1/2" long, yellowish to olive green with a black stripe, some indistinct, along the margin of each wing cover. The eyes are black and the antennae and legs yellowish.

The eggs are orange yellow and shaped like a spindle and are attached in groups of 5 to 25 endwise to the undersides of the leaves. The newly hatched larva or grub appears nearly black because the yellow color of the skin is obscured by dark tubercles and hairs. The full grown larva is about 1/2 inch long and dull yellow with two black stripes down the back. The head, legs and tubercles are black.

The pupa is about 1/4 inch long, bright yellow with a few black bristles. **Life history and habits:**
These beetles pass the winter in the adult stage, on

or near the tree on which they fed. In the northeastern states most of them hibernate in buildings, especially in house attics, barns and sheds. During periods of warm weather in the winter many of the, become active and cause considerable annoyance by crawling into living quarters and onto the windows.

In the spring they come out of hibernation, fly to nearby elms, and begin to chew holes in the unfolding leaves. Egg laying begins late in May or early June and continues for several weeks, each female laying from 400 to 800 eggs. The eggs hatch in about a week and the larvae feed for 2 to 3 weeks in the under surface of the leaves. Only the veins and upper surfaces are left and the leaves soon dry up and turn brown. When full-grown the larvae seek crevices in the bark or at the base of the tree in which to pupate. After about 10 days the pupae have transformed to adults.

Control with Insecticides:
The elm leaf beetle is seldom a pest of importance in the forest, but frequently control measures are necessary to protect the foliage of elm shade trees. One thorough and properly timed application of a suitable insecticide will give protection throughout the season. (where elms have been properly sprayed in late dormancy with DDT for control of elm bark beetle feeding, no additional treatments are necessary for control of the elm leaf beetle.) Sprays for the elm leaf beetle should be applied to the undersides of the leaves, preferably when the foliage is three-fourths expanded. The best time to spray is soon after daybreak. The air is usually calm at this time, so there is less chance of drifting the spray to buildings.

Preparation of Spray:
One of the following insecticides in 100 gallons of water may be applied in a conventional hydraulic sprayer:

1/2 pints of 57 percent emulsifiable malathion; 1 quart of 25 percent emulsifiable DDT; 4 pounds of lead arsenate powder and 16 fluid ounces of fish oil or linseed oil; 2 pounds of 50 percent wettable powder Carbaryl.

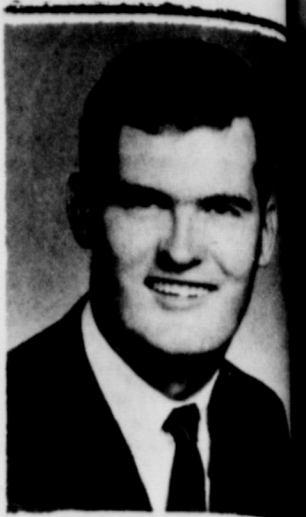
Precautions in Handling Insecticides:

DDT, Malathion, lead arsenate, and carbaryl are poisonous. Store them in plainly labeled containers away from all food products and out of the reach of children. In handling them, follow directions and heed precautions given on the containers. If you get them into your eyes, bathe your eyes with a boric acid solution or with plenty of water. Do not let sprays get into birdbaths or fishpools. Do not let them form puddles beneath the trees or along street curbs.

The first main speaker was Dr. Allan Weise from Texas A&M College. Dr. Weise is a very jolly speaker. He kept us laughing for awhile with his lively humor. His Topic was: The Profitable use of Herbicides:

Through years of experimentation men have learned to control weeds with chemicals rather than the goose neck hoe. And they are cheaper than hiring men to run the hoses.

There are three main types of application: First-The pre-plant type applied broadcast. Second-The pre-emergence type, applied after the crop is planted, but before the weeds show their heads. Third-The Post Emergence type applied after the little weeds begin to peep out.

Dr. Weise said the best way he had found to control grass burr and goat-heads in lawns was to fertilize and water heavily. The grass will crowd out the burrs then. Try it.

Jim Valentine of the Lubbock experiment station was next on the program. He told us much about soil testing in their great laboratory. It is about a one million dollar lab now. He said he was not used to speaking through a microphone.

"They are like a spittoon," he remarked, "If you are to far away you miss it. If you are too close it splatters."

He also said, "Keep cigar ashes out of your soil samples, they mess up the chemicals content."

Mr. Don Rummel was the last speaker. His topic was: Insect Control:

Cotton was the main crop studied for insect control. But Mr. Rummel did give some useful information on insects that attack other crops.

He told of new machines in the making that will apply chemical with an oil base to the stem of the plant. This will be done by rotary brushes that brush each side of the stem as the machine rolls down the row.

The Boll Worm has developed immunity to some of our insecticides.

He stressed the fact that we have many friendly insects including most of the beetles, the Lace-wing fly, and spiders. They feed on the eggs and larva of harmful insects. It is interesting to note how nature usually balances things.

All three of these men had some very splendid color slides that showed what they were talking about. A very effective tool in teaching. My intelligence is limited to grasp all the detailed information presented, but Mr. Charles Jackson can supply you if your interest in information on any one of these topics. He has the booklet entitled Results of: Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program 1965.

Hidetown Farms make AAA Herd

Performance Registry International has announced that Grady W. Harris, "Hidetown Farms," has qualified for the first AAA herd in the world. This is an early member of P.R.I. their lifetime membership card being no. 201. The herd number is 74000R being the second in the state of Texas and the entire herd on 12 computers. This Angus breeder has used the program scientifically to improve the herd and not as a sales gimmick. No calves are kept that do not make weaning weight themselves and culled if their first calf does not make weaning weight.

Herd bulls used must be qualified in weaning weight and yearling weights. Certified meat sires no. 22 and 33 were developed at Hidetown Farms and are in use there. The herd is now large enough that bulls of their own breeding are now being tested. First for Certified Meat Sire and then Production Registry which requires a 25 or more progeny for W and 10 or more for G.

The triple A (AAA) herds rating requires all sires to have individual performance registry certificates. All females at Hidetown have either I.P.R. Certificates or P.R. certificates (progeny except five heifers sired one of their production registered bulls these heifers bought from the first owner the sire.
