## BANK ROBBERY ATTEMPT FAILS

An attempt by five men to rob the First State Bank of Mobeetie failed in the early hours Wednesday morning. The robbery attempt was made at 2:00 and two of the men were captured in a stolen pickup 4 miles east of Mobeetie at 3:00 a.m.

The two captured were brought before Justice of the Peace Dick Guynes at Wheeler. Arrestee were Ray James, alias Ben Cowdry and Clifford H. Bowen. The two waived examining trial and charged with bank burglary and car theft. They are being held in the Wheeler County Jail with bond set at \$10,000 each on each count.

At press time a search party was covering the country east of Mobeetie in hopes of finding the other three who fled on foot.

S.B. Hooker, night watchman at Mobeetie, noticed a tan 1964 Cadillac circle the block. He watched as the car stopped in front of the post office next door to the bank and four men emerged from the auto. Hooker immediately went to the phone and called Deputy Doyle Ramsey. He then waited for Ramsey to arrive. After letting the four out, the driver of the Cadillac drove half a mile out of town and walked back to the bank. The group gained entry by knocking the lock off the west door. After entering the building, they knocked the knob off the vault door, but did not enter the vault.

Ramsey's arrival scattered the men. Two of the men went south and three went north. After letting the air out of the tires on the get-away car, help was summoned and road blocks were set up. Help arrived from Pampa, Borger, Canadian, Wellington and Oklahoma.

The officers mounted horses. Bloodhounds were brought from Mangum, Okla. The clothing from the car furnished a scent for the dogs to follow.

In addition to the dogs and horses, planes were circling the area in an effort to spot the escapees. R.J. Holt, Jr., of Wheeler, Joe Shelton of Mobeetie and Bowers of Pampa were using their aircraft in the search.

The robbery is believed to be the work of "The James Gang". The men arrested were from Midland. James had \$34,000 on his person at the time of his arrest. A carbine was in the pickup when the pair was arrested.

The abandoned car contained tools and clothing. The trunk was full of clothes. A set of walkie-talkies, a new sledge hammer and a shotgun were also found in the car.

Wednesday's robbery attempt makes the third time in 15 years that the bank has been broken into. A robbery attempt three years ago netted the burglars several hundred dollars in silver. A day light robbery occurred in 1933.

Mrs. J.T. Johnston stated local people should take warning not to leave their keys in the car. A car and a pickup were setting across from the bank with the keys in the ignition. The pickup in which the pair was apprehended belonged to Grady Harris.

### \$625,988 CONSTRUCTION BID ACCEPTED BY SCHOOL BOARD

Construction of Wheeler's new school plant will get underway in two or three weeks. Panhandle Engineers contractors submitted the lowest bid of \$625,988. The structure will be completed in time for the second semester of next year. Seven bids were received for the new building. The bids were opened at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 10. The lowest bid was \$625,000. Submitting bids were Culbertson and Hall contractors of Elk City; Floyd W. Richards of Amarillo; John Moss, Contractor of Amarillo; Page and Wirtz Construction Co of Amarillo; Southwestern Bricklaying Co of Amarillo and Timmons Construction Co of Amarillo. The accepted bid was \$988,000 higher than the estimated cost of the structure. In the bond elected which was held May 29, 1965 \$625,000 was set aside for the new building. The school board reports that the plans will remain as they now stand.

### Pat Patterson Dies Friday

Pat (Pat) Patterson, 65, of Pampa, died at 12:25 a.m. on Friday, March 11, 1966 in St. Anthony's hospital in Amarillo, following a month-long critical illness. Funeral services were held March 12 in Charnichael Colonial Chapel. Rev. Joe Hawn, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church officiating, assisted by Elmer Jackson, minister of Amarillo Southside Church. Burial was in Memorial Gardens under the direction of Charnichael Colonial Funeral Directors. Mr. Patterson was born in Oregon. He married Miss Lillie Snyder on March 18, 1920 in Aspermont. The couple moved to Pampa in 1922. Mr. Patterson was a member of Calvary Baptist Church and the IOOF. He was an automobile mechanic. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Lillie Patterson of the home, one son, Robert I. Patterson of Wheeler, one daughter, Mrs. Barbara Luedicke, Snyder; his father W.J. Patterson of Peacock; two brothers, Ivan and Herman Patterson, both of Andrews; one sister, Mrs. Jewel Morris of Dallas and three grandchildren.

Mr. Culberson gave his audience a brief history of the acquiring of industry by Pampa. The one point Mr. Culberson stressed was: "The individual is the prime factor in securing industry." The people of a community have to be conditioned for industry. Industry has to be wanted before it will locate in an area.

"There is no set formula for acquiring industry," stated Culberson. "The first step for the local group would be to check with Wheeler merchants. A word of encouragement might be all that is needed to expand. 'Growth from within' is one way of acquiring industry."

Why does Wheeler need industry? Industry would cause Wheeler to grow. Mr. Culberson quoted some of his literature on industry. An industry employing 100 workers would mean a 296 population increase; 112 new homes; 51 more pupils enrolled in school; \$590,000 income increase; 107 more vehicles registered; 174 more people employed in the community and 4 more retail establishments.

In choosing a location, industry will look for the availability of land, ample water supply, a good school system, good churches and recreation facilities.

In looking over the program, Mr. Culberson said, "When you have programs such as the Park Beautification and Landscaping of the Hospital grounds, you are preparing yourself for the attracting of industry."

During the business meeting it was reported that James Verden represented the Chamber at the auction of the Top O' Texas livestock show animals. In addition to spending \$100 for the Chamber, Mr. Verden bought hogs for Earney and Barton and Vanpool-Burton Motor Co.

Plans for the landscaping of Parkview hospital were on display. The plans have been completed and bids will be taken. The project is to be completed through donations. Labor and money may be donated for this project by an individual or organization. This committee is headed by James Verden. Committee members are Joe Weatherly, Wayne Edwards and Dr. Paul Stewart.

The Park Beautification project is under the direction of the same group. It was announced that drawings are being made and plans are being completed for the start of work. The city council has given their approval.
