EQUIPMENT BOUGHT

The recent severe cold left part of Wheeler residents without water due to frozen water lines. The City Council recognized the need of new equipment to cope with this problem in the future. A special meet-

ing of the council was called to consider sealed bids for a tractor front-end loader and back-hoe combination and a welding machine with a water pipe thawing attachment.

The Mayor and Council would like to thank the people of Wheeler for the patience and understanding during the time the water pipes were frozen or broken. We believe with the new equipment we will be in a better position to serve your needs.

The Council acquired four bids on the backhoe from John Deere, International and Ford. Only two bids were submitted by welding companies. The lowest bid for the welding equipment was submitted by Four R Industrial Equipment Company of Pampa, Texas for a total price of \$928.60. Mayor A.L. Hibler, owner of the Hibler Implement Co. and one of the bidders on the backhoe excused himself before the bids on that piece of equipment were opened. The council voted unanimously to accept the lowest bid of \$5469.87 submitted by Hibler Implement.

Copies of the bids on both pieces of equipment are on file at the city office if anyone would like to see them.

WENDELL MORGAN FILES FOR COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT POST

Wendell Morgan, who is serving his seventh year as principal of the Lela School, announced his candidacy this week for the office of County School Superintendent.

In submitting his bid for the important county position, Mr. Morgan stated: "It is my desire to give to the youth of our county the best possible education; to be of service at all times to all schools; and to work closely with every parent in the education of their children."

Mr. Morgan, 34, was born and reared in the Samnorwood community and maintains farming and ranching interests there at the present time. He was graduated from the Samnorwood High School and received his B.S. Degree from West Texas State University, Canyon.

He was administrator of schools at Community Center in Childress county for one year before being employed as principal of the Lela School seven years ago. Mr. Morgan is a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and the Texas Elementary Principals Association. He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Lela and serves as an assistant Sunday School teacher.

"I have been encouraged by many of my friends to seek the office of County School Superintendent and I am doing so with a feeling of confidence that I am fully qualified to fill the position in an efficient and satisfactory manner," Mr. Morgan said.

"There have been many changes in the field of education in recent years. Through my experience, both in the classroom and as an administrator, I have kept abreast of these changes on all levels and feel that as County School Superintendent, I can render beneficial aid to all schools in the county.

"I will sincerely appreciate the vote and influence of all of you in helping me attain my goal and making it possible for me to serve you," Mr. Morgan concluded.

Farm Bureau Membership Drive

The week of Feb. 7-12 has been officially designated "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Wheeler county. The local county farm organization will have a special enrollment drive underway as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas to 100,000 by Oct. 31.

An official proclamation signed by County Judge George W. Hefley called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wheeler County Farm Bureau."

Earlier Gov. John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Membership Week in Texas." The statewide drive is to be launched with big area rallies Feb. 2 in Lubbock, and Dallas and Feb. 3 in San Antonio.

Johnnie Burrell of Kelton is chairman of the local county Farm Bureau Membership committee. Officers at the Wheeler county farm bureau are President Burrell, Vice-president John Dabery; Secretary, Clarence Zybach; office secretary Vena Richardson and the Wheeler County service agent is George Richardson.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed "as a member and a leader" by the Farm Bureau.

"Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment, in capital, time and labor," he declared.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau will stage a county-wide drive for members beginning Feb. 10 and continuing through 12 according to Johnnie Burrell of Kelton, membership chairman.

The drive will be launched with a Kick-off luncheon at Nord's Cafe at noon on February 10 in Wheeler. Attending the rally will be community membership workers from all over the county.

Kick-off speaker will be Ed McKay of the Farm Bureau Research Department.

Wheeler County Farm Bureau now has 624 members and will be out to increase this number to 650. The drive is a part of a statewide effort to enroll 100,000 members in the Texas Farm Bureau in 1966. The state organization ended 1965 with 95,204.

Following is a text of the Judge's proclamation: "WHEREAS, Agriculture is essential to the economic well being of Wheeler County, our State and the Nation; and

"WHEREAS, the productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers have enabled our citizens to enjoy the highest standard of living in the world; and

"WHEREAS, this record of achievement has resulted from educational and technological advancement in agriculture under a free choice system; and

"WHEREAS, farmers and ranchers have recognized the value of joining together in organized effort to promote and protect their interest; and

"WHEREAS, the public schools of Wheeler County, do hereby designate February 7-12 as Farm Bureau Week in Wheeler county, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wheeler county Farm Bureau.

"NOW, THEREFORE, G.W. Hefley, County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby designate February 7-12 as Farm Bureau Week in Wheeler county, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wheeler county Farm Bureau.

K. McCasland On Judging Team

Canyon: Kenneth McCasland of Wheeler is one of a five member junior livestock judging team from West Texas State University which placed second in the Southwestern Intercollegiate Livestock Judging at Ft. Worth.

Three of the members were in the top 10 individual judging of the 85 entries. Johnny Newborn, Houston was 2nd; Dwan Phipps, Friona; was 5th and Kenneth McCasland was 10th with a 2nd place in individual hog judging.

The team placed first in judging Hereford cattle, first in sheep, second in hogs and fourth in quarter horses placing them in the runner-up position to Oklahoma State University who was in first place. Texas A&M University was third place.

Coach Don Beerwinkle, WTSU, Agriculture professor will accompany the team to the Houston Intercollegiate Livestock Judging contest March 4th.

OUTSTANDING FARMER AND RANCHER

Outstanding conservation farmer and rancher for Wheeler county for 1966 is Gordon Whitener of Wheeler. He was selected to receive this recognition by the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. His record will also be submitted for the Ft. Worth Press Award which is an annual award in the state of Texas.

Mr. Whitener is recognized for his conservation cropping system to prevent wind and water erosion. He is particularly effective in using cover crops to conserve soil and water. For many years he has been a supporter of soil conservation work. He was one of the first district supervisors to serve on the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District Board.

Besides being an outstanding farmer, he is one of the better known registered Hereford Breeders in the Panhandle. At the present time he is serving as the Vice-president of the Top of Texas Hereford Breeders Association.

Farmers Union supported 100% parity domestic wheat origination and supported the basic policy of the National Commission on Food Marketing that is presently investigating all phases of marketing to find why there is such a great difference between what the farmer receives for his product and what the ultimate consumer has to pay. We feel that the majority of farmers support his policy and ask them to join us in the fight to achieve 100% parity for farm products. Garland Abernathy has recently been appointed Farmers Union insurance agent for Wheeler County. He is now prepared to serve you with all types of farm, home, life, auto and liability insurance. Farmers Union also has a Blue Cross Hospitalization Group and is accepting new applicants and transfers from other farm organizations.



Food Expenditures are Up: Food expenditures in 1965 were above those of 1964 and further increases are likely for this year, reports Vivian Warminski, County Home Demonstration agent.

Family food costs vary according to family size, income, location, vacation, number of earners in a family and family preferences, she explains.

Single consumer in 1965 was spending an estimated \$675 for food, compared with \$570 per person for a two-person family and \$285 per person for a family of six or more.
