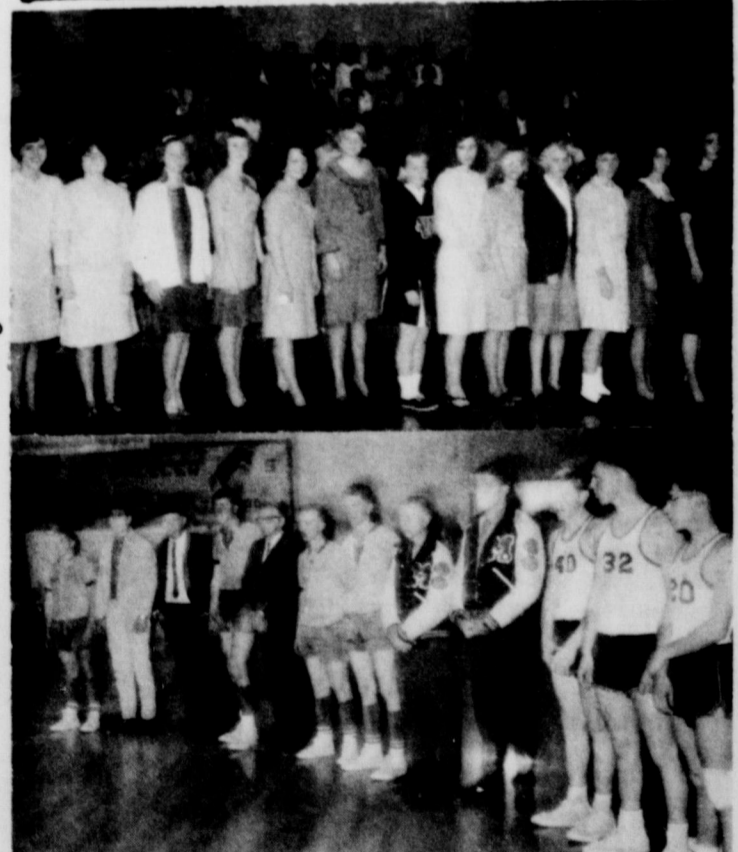

MARCH 19-26 National FFA

The Texas Association of Future Farmers of America is composed of over 38,000 boys in 1,100 FFA chapters in Texas. To be a Future Farmer, a boy must first have enrolled in a vocational agriculture class to receive instruction in farm crops, livestock, poultry, farm mechanics, parliamentary procedure, and current farm problems. It was born of a great need to assist deserving students to become established in their farming projects, to promote and stimulate agriculture leadership, to develop public interest in vocational agriculture. ATTEND CONFERENCE: Looking at the schedule of the program in the Memorial Student Center at Texas A&M is County Judge George W. Hefley, Commissioner Ernest Henderson and County agent Charles D. Jackson. This year's conference was the 8th annual County Judges' and Commissioners' Conference that has been held at Texas A&M University. The program is planned by the County Judge and Commissioners Association in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas A&M University officials. of the insecticides aldrin and dieldrin for use on certain vegetable, grain and forage crops.

A list of the crops is attached below.

USDA's action is based on recent scientific data proving that aldrin and dieldrin use on some of the crops-particularly forage crops and sugar beets-can result in illegal residues on the crops and in some cases, in milk from cows fed the crops. Aldrin and dieldrin have been widely used in insect control and have been most effective in the destruction of soil insects.

Soil Conservation NEWS

Several systems of parallel terraces have been constructed in the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. Those who have these systems are Loyd Lee, Jack Finsterwald and Fred Waters. At the present time Caperton and Palmer have a system under construction. Several other systems are in the planning stage.

The advantage of parallel terraces over standard terraces is to be able to terrace a field without making it difficult to farm because of point rows, or sharp turns. This is accomplished by doing "land farming."

The beginning of a parallel system is making a topographic map of the area to be terraced. Contours are drawn on the map. With the help of the map, terraces can be planned and a very close estimate of the dirt work needed can be made.

Such a terrace system will usually cost more than a conventional system, but when you consider that approximately 60 to 80 percent of the point rows are eliminated, it's worth it.

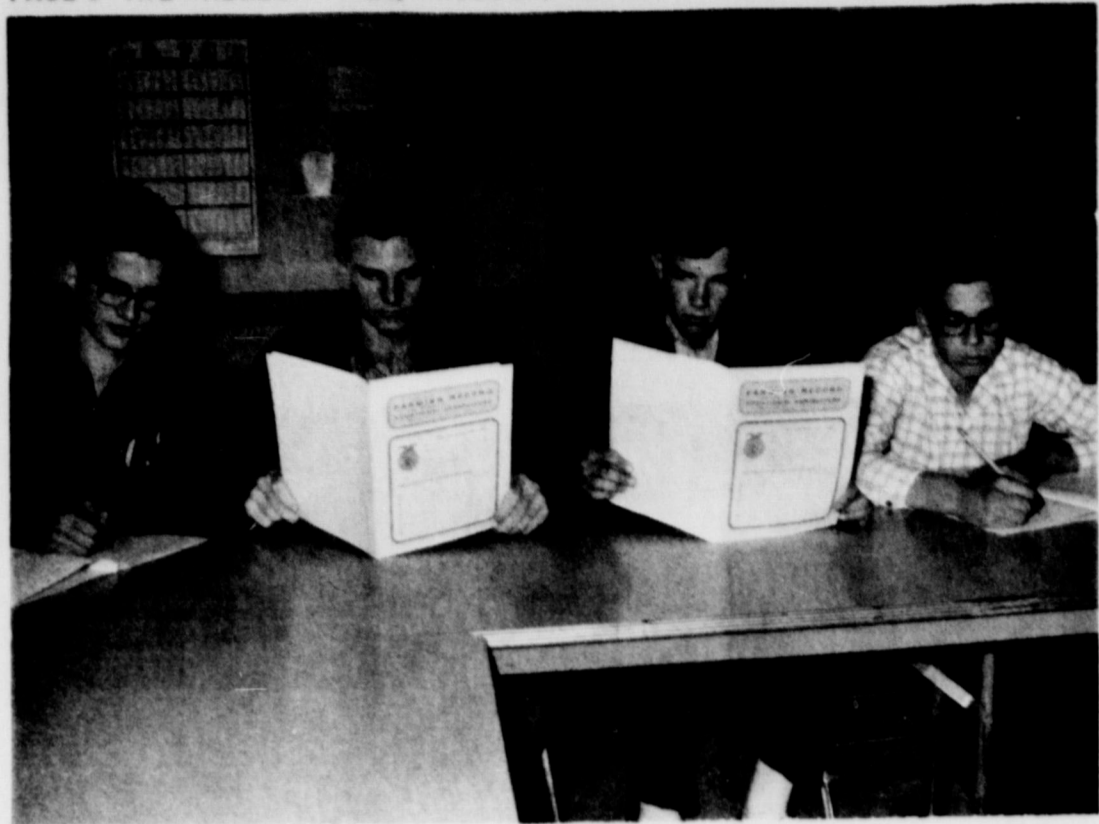

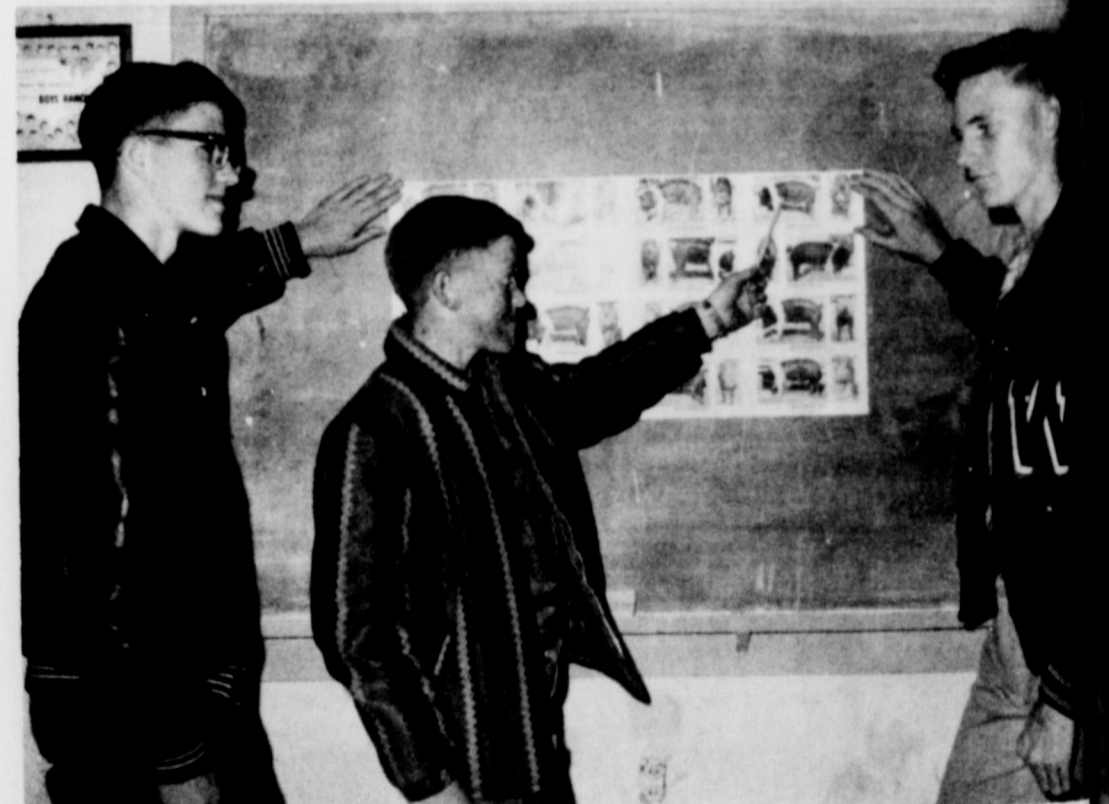
