## CLUB SCHEDULES PAGEANT TO SELECT MISS N. WHEELER CO.

Mrs. Robert Denson, president-elect of the Thursday Review Club of Wheeler, announced this week that the club will sponsor a pageant May 30th to select Miss North Wheeler County.

The winner of the pageant will represent north Wheeler county in a contest on June 1st and 4th at Lake Meredith under the sponsorship of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

The winner of the Miss Lake Meredith contest will receive an opportunity to become Miss Texas.

According to Mrs. Denson, the local contest will be composed of two divisions; the senior division, which includes girls from 18 through 24 years of age, who have been married, and the junior division which includes entrants 14 through 17 years of age.

All contestants must be sponsored by an abusiness firm or organization of the area. The sponsoring firm will be responsible for furnishing the entrance fee of the contestant, which will be \$15 for a senior girl and \$10 for a junior contestant, as well as a banner to be worn by the contestant.

Girls entering the senior division will model in evening gown and swim suit.

Entrants will also be judged on a talent performance not to exceed three minutes.

In addition to becoming an entrant in the Lake Meredith contest, the first place winner in the senior division will receive a cash scholarship. Second and third place winners will receive trophies.

In the junior division no contestant will be held and entrants will model both in swim suit and evening gown.

The first prize in the junior division will be a trophy, and the second and third place winners will be awarded sabbons.

The public is invited to attend the pageant in the Wheeler school gym on the night of May 30th. Admission will be 75c for adults, and 50c for all students will pre-schoolers admitted free.

All business firms and organizations of the area will be contacted by members of the Thursday Review club to find out if they wish to sponsor an entry. However, you have not been contact-

# PRIMARY ELECTION SATURDAY

## REPUBLICANS

The 1966 Republican primary will be held on Saturday the 7th day of May, 1966 for the purpose of nominating candidates to be voted for the general election and to nominate county executive committee officers.

The qualified voters residing in Mobeetie, Briscoe, Allison, McBee, Wheeler and Stanley precincts, (the North end of Wheeler County) will vote at the primary to be held in Wheeler, Texas, in the Don Earney Bldg., next door to Wheeler Times.

The Republican County convention will be held the first Saturday after the Primary election, the 14th day of May 1966 at the building next door to the Wheeler Times at 2:00 p.m.

George Porter and Dick Hefley will be the presiding judges at such election. The qualified voters residing in the south end of the county, Shamrock, Twitty,

Lela, Heald and Kellerville, precincts will vote at the high school auditorium in Shamrock, Texas. Don Vearner, presiding judge.

All qualified voters desiring to vote in the Republican primary, will vote at the above voting place, between the hours of 7 o'clock a.m. and 7 o'clock p.m. on Saturday the 7th day of May, 1966.

The precinct conventions for said precincts will be held at the two respective voting places on Saturday May 7th, 1966 at 2:00 p.m.

The Wheeler County convention will be held the first Saturday after the Primary election, the 14th day of May 1966 at the building next door to the Wheeler Times at 2:00 p.m.

## DEMOCRATS

County Democrats will go to the polls Saturday May 7 to vote for the state and county officials of their choice.

Democratic Party voters have a wide field of candidates to choose from when they go to the polls Saturday for the primary election.

Voting will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 7 p.m. in the usual voting places.

A. B. Crump, Wheeler County Democratic chairman said voters will be required to show their poll tax receipt or registration receipt before being permitted to cast ballots.

In Wheeler, those living west of highway 83 will vote in the gymnasium. Those living east of the highway will vote at the Stanley box which will be located in the commissioners courtroom in the courthouse.

At the close of the voting, returns from the county, district, precinct and state races will be posted as received on a large tabulation board at the courthouse.

County officials not drawing opponents are County Judge, G. W. Hefley; County Clerk, Harry Wofford; County Treasurer, Palmer Savage; and County Chairman A. B. Crump.

Two names appear on the ballot for the post of District Clerk. Paul Topper and Lillie Carlyle along with Rena Sivage who is staging a write in campaign.

George Weems has an opponent as he seeks re-election as County Superintendent. Wendell Morgan is principal of Lela Schools.

Locally E. D. Guynes is seeking re-election as Justice of the Peace for precincts 1 and 2. He is unopposed.

In the race for Constable of precincts 1 and 2, W. L. (Shorty) Erwin, O. F. (Pappy) Holt and John Holcomb are seeking election. Holt and Holcomb have staged a write in campaign.

Grainger McIlhany is seeking election to the office of District Judge. He is opposed by Bruce L. Parker and Thomas C. Braly, both of Gray County.

## Precinct, County Convention Scheduled

Dates for the County and Precinct Democratic Conventions were announced by County Democratic Chairman A. B. Crump. The precinct conventions will be held election day, Saturday, May 7. The county convention will be held in the district courtroom in Wheeler on Saturday, May 14.

The precinct conventions will be at 3:00 at each of the 13 voting boxes. Delegates to the county convention will be selected at this time.

At the county convention, five will be chosen to attend the State Democratic Convention in September.

The number of delegates allowed each precinct is as follows: Mobeetie 4, Briscoe, 1; Wheeler 8, Allison 1; Stanley, 4; McBee 2, Twitty

3; Pakan 1; Heald 1; Lela 3; Shamrock (south box) 12; Shamrock (north box) 14 and Kelton 1.

Wheeler is allowed 55 delegates at the County Convention. One delegate for each 25 votes cast in the last general election is allowed at the county convention. In the 1964 election 1,399 votes were cast which gives Wheeler 55 county delegates.

 If teenagers could only be

Officials of the American Medical Association have stated that "Many boys and girls of high school age are much more self-conscious than they need to be, simply because they let themselves become careless about their grooming. The AMA further emphasizes that "soap and water are your best friends" in the care of the complexion:

2) One bath a day is a minimum.

3) Freshness requires the use of a deodorant or antiperspirant after the bath.

4) Hair should be brushed twice a day and shampooed as often as needed.

5) Nails should be manicured and pedicured at least once a week.

Care of the feet is often overlooked phase of youthful grooming. But frequent foot-washing and wearing clean socks, are of utmost importance in preventing irritation and infection.

Let's all go out and vote on May 7th. Remember, the choice of whom you vote for is not necessarily limited to those whose name appear on the ballot. The election Code allows you to write in any name.

# Texas School Law Provides That...



WENDELL MORGAN

The County Superintendent shall have the immediate supervision of all matters pertaining to public education in his County\*

- (1) He shall confer with the teachers and Trustees and give them advice when needed.
- (2) He shall visit and examine Schools and deliver lectures that shall tend to create an interest in education.
- (3) He shall spend four days each week visiting the schools while they are in session.
- (4) He shall have authority over all public schools of the County except those having 500 scholastics or more.

\*Article 2690 - Handbook of Texas School Law, by J.C. Hinsley  
 Additional Duties of the County Superintendent of Education\*

- (1) Grade and Standardize all public Schools, prepare rules and regulation therefor, and prescribe courses of study for the Schools of the County and submit same to the County Board. Printed copies of such courses shall be supplied every Teacher and interested citizen.
- (2) Organize and attend County and local institutes for teachers and citizens, advise teachers as to their further study in professional reading, assist parents and citizens to acquire knowledge of the aims and work of the Schools, and call conferences with Principals, Teachers, School Trustees and Other interested Citizens to develop interest in education and improve the condition of the schools.
- (3) He shall prepare an Annual School Budget for the schools of the County and shall submit the same to the County Board; and shall in every way seek to secure funds for the support and Development of the Schools of the Schools of the County.
- (4) He shall annually publish in the Newspaper a full itemized statement of the Receipts and disbursements of the Schools of the County under his jurisdiction at the time he forwards same to the Texas Education agency.

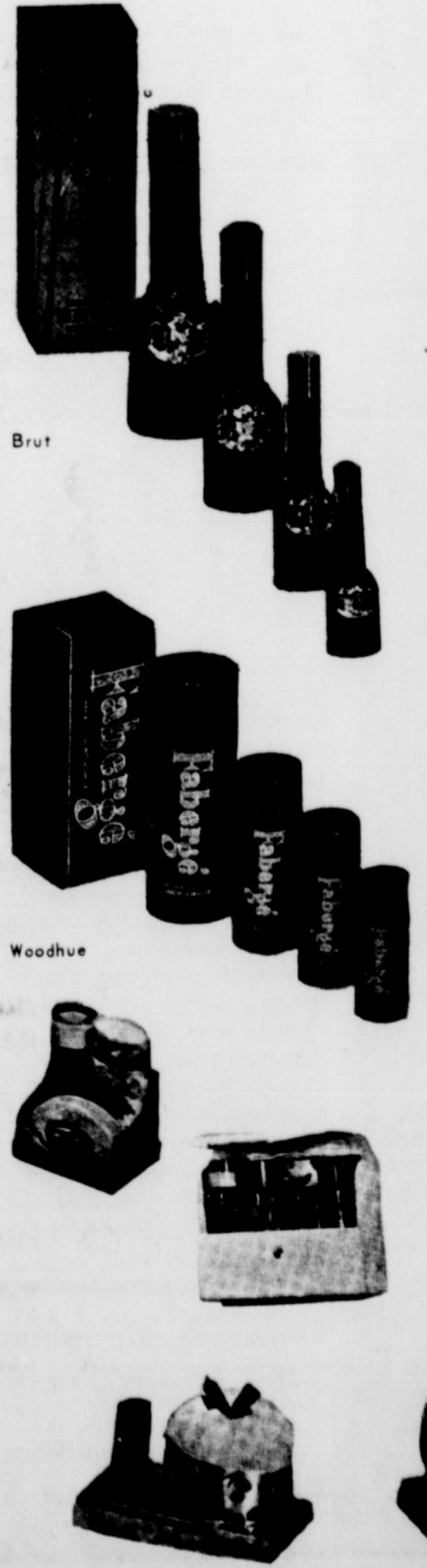

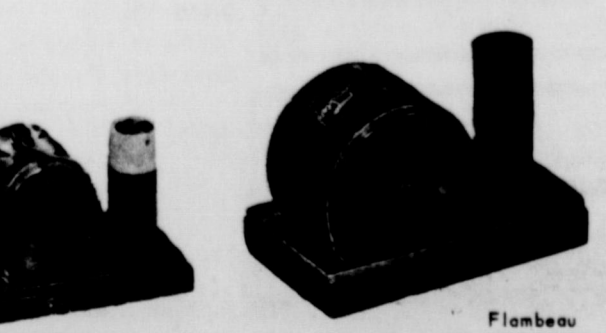

## Peach Orchard Demonstration

by Charles David Jackson

For many years Wheeler County has been called the "Fruit Basket of the Panhandle," but in recent years many of our orchards have deteriorated due to insufficient care and management. Several farmers have done a good job of caring for their orchard; however, very few farmers have planted young orchards, and young men have not been investing in orchards. The old orchards still produce some of the best fruit produced in the United States. People still come from several states to buy peaches produced here. Louie McWhorter of Wheeler reports that he has a difficult time supplying the demand for his peaches each year. He is one of the truck farmers who has taken proper care of an orchard as well as to add young trees in recent years. As a result he has made a peach orchard a profitable business.

By having an ideal soil and market for peach production, the crops subcommittee decided to add a peach demonstration to the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program for this year.

Since N.L. "Shorty" Sechrist of Wheeler was interested in establishing a young orchard this year, we have been working with him in establishing his orchard and it will be used as a demonstration for several years. Research information such as varieties, fertilization, tree spacing, pruning, planting, disease and insect control will be used for the next several years in caring for the orchard. B.G. Hancock, Extension Horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is in charge of the demonstration.

tension Service for Texas A&M was requested to assist with the program. He visited the county and assisted with laying the groundwork for establishing an 18 acre orchard on the Sechrist farm. Eight different peach varieties were ordered to plant in the demonstration. They were Dixired, Earlired, Red Haven, Ranger, Redglobe, Loring Jefferson and Redskin. Mr. Sechrist was able to obtain all varieties except Earlired and Red Haven. This demonstration contains varieties that will ripen early, medium and late so that all the fruit will not ripen one time.

There are very few orchards that will increase the value of land each year more than a peach orchard in this locality. This orchard will begin bearing in three years. Some varieties may be as long as four years. Some people say that this is too long to wait for a return on an investment. A few years ago I would have agreed with them, but now I would have to say that three years is not very long at all.

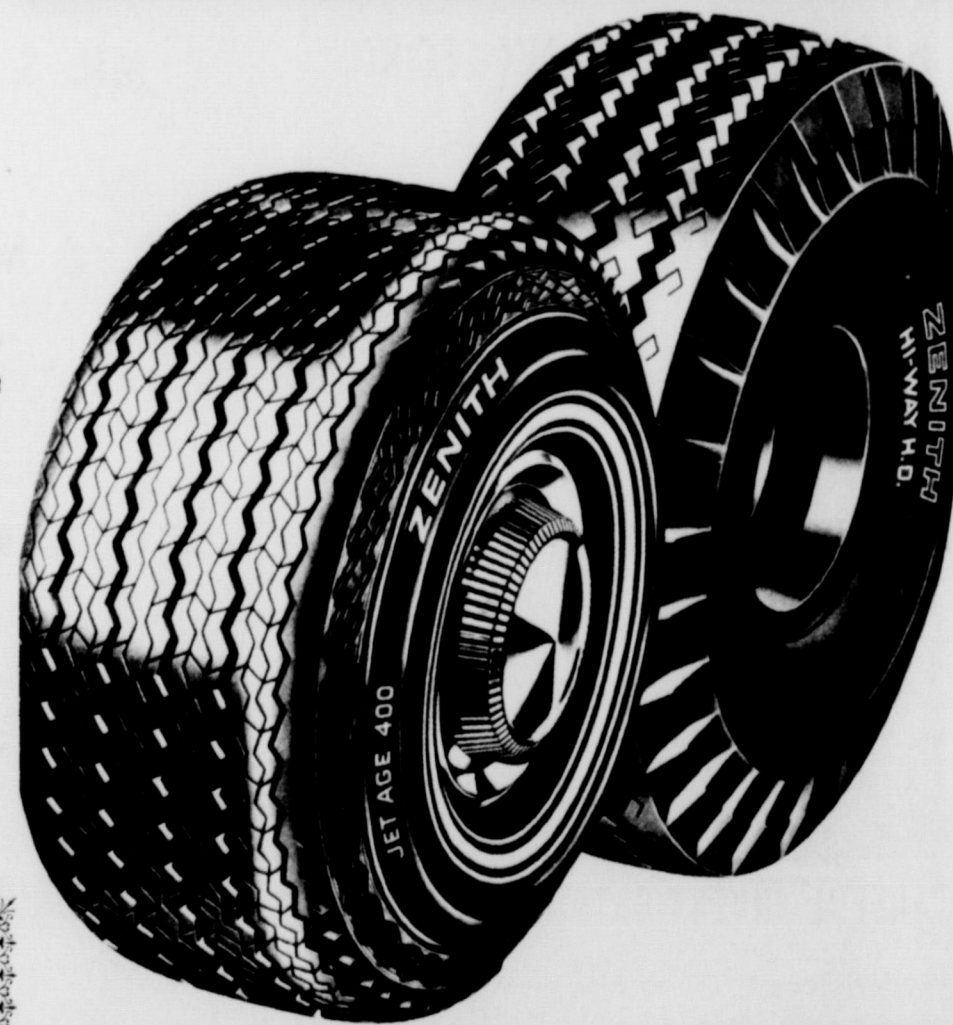

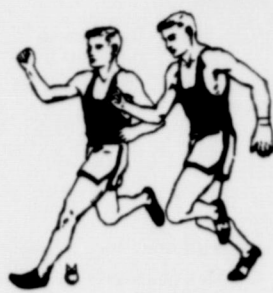

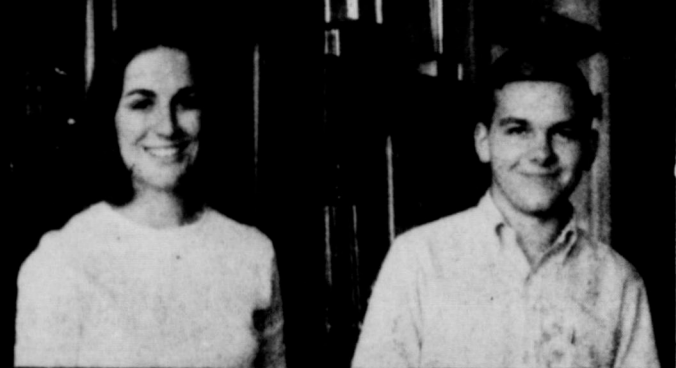
