Several farmers in the Mobeetie and Kelton communities have had difficulty with growing sorghum the past two years due to "Chlorosis," which is caused by iron deficiency. Chlosoris may also appear on ornamental plants in the yard.

Severe chlorosis or "Yellowing" of sorghum, commonly powered wetting agent to 50 caused by iron deficiency, occurs on soils on the High and Rolling Plains. 
