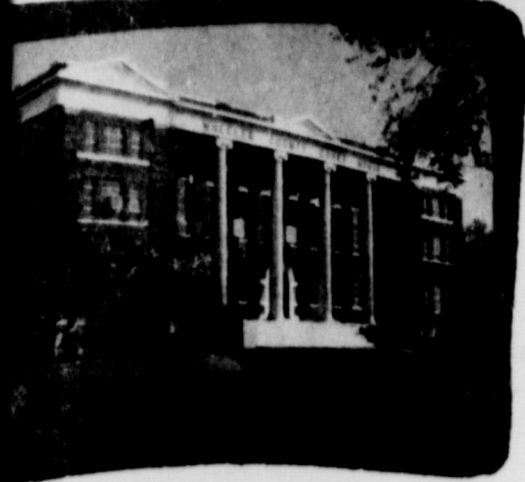

### St Patrick's Day Celebration Set

Shamrock--This Irish Capital of Texas is extending a warm Western welcome to neighboring cities, towns and communities to attend the 20th annual St. Patrick's Day Celebration on Thursday, March 17.

Launching this year's Irish Festival will be the Honorable John Connally, popular governor of the Lone Star State, who will be guest speaker at the Pre-St. Patrick's Day Banquet scheduled Wednesday evening, March 16 at the Armory. Everyone is invited to attend the kick-off event and hear the Texas Governor. Tickets, priced at \$2.50 each, may be reserved by calling the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce.

The governor will remain overnight in Shamrock & view the gigantic Irish Parade at 11 o'clock St. Patrick's Day morning. Featured in the parade will be some 30 elaborately decorated floats and a dozen or more bands and drill teams. The Irish Band Festival will be underway all day at the high school auditorium.

The downtown sound stage will be the scene of continuous program features throughout the day, ending with an Old Fiddlers Contest late in the afternoon.

Western entertainment at the Sheriff's Posse rodeo arena will include contests in headin' and heelin', calf roping and girls' barrel racing. Twenty-two beautiful colleens are competing for the title of Miss Irish Rose, who will be crowned in an impressive coronation at the Armory in the afternoon.

The celebration will end Thursday night with two dances. Willie Lo-Max and his Orchestra of Amarillo will furnish music for the regular St. Pat Dance at the Armory. Playing for a dance at Shamrock Skating Rink will be the Velasquez Bros. of Wheeler.

### WTSU Judging Team Places 1st

Canyon--The West Texas State University livestock judging team took first place at the Houston senior inter-collegiate livestock contest Saturday in Houston.

Shamrock students carried off the honors at the annual Spelling Bee Tuesday, March 8 and will represent Wheeler County in Amarillo in April. Kenneth Gragg placed first in the Senior group and Norman Rushing out spelled the junior group.

Competition in this year's spelling bee was greater in the number of words required to eliminate contestants. Fourteen grade and junior high students participated in the meet.

A total of 493 words were pronounced in the event. Grade school elimination required 412 words. The senior winner was determined with 81 words. Last year's groups used 432 words in the junior group and 76 in the senior group.

Schools represented at the county spelling bee were Shamrock, Wheeler, Mobeetie and Allison. Mrs. Bernice Hall was in charge of the spelling arrangements.

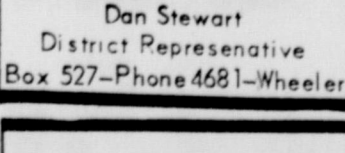

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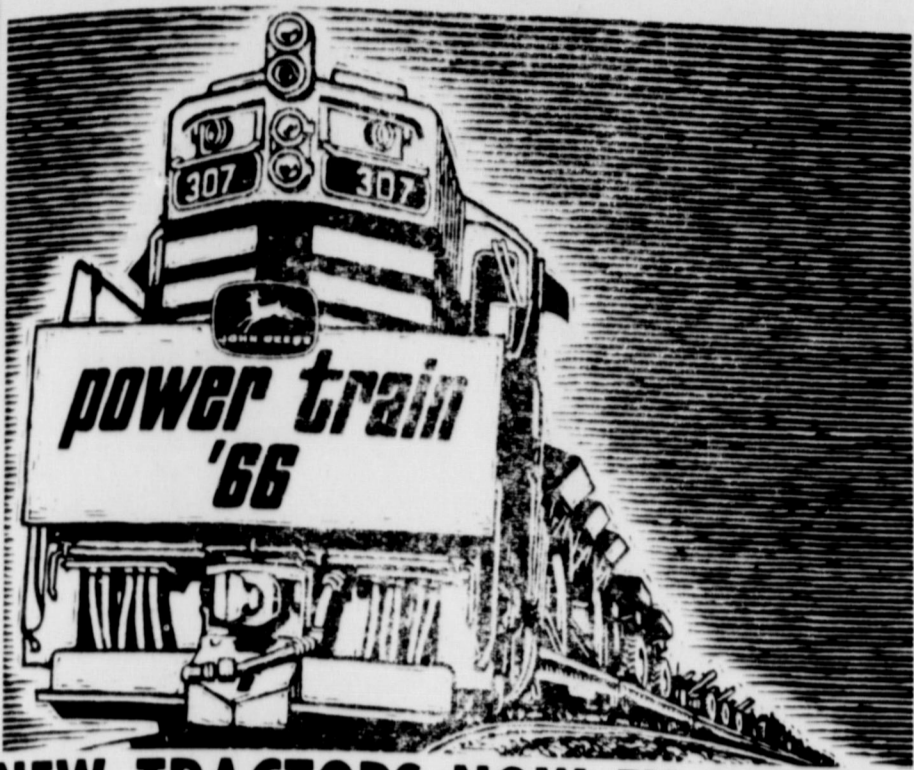

## County Agent Reports

By Charles Jackson

Several farmers in the Mobeetie and Kelton communities have had difficulty with growing sorghum the past two years due to "Chlorosis," which is caused by iron deficiency. Chlorosis may also appear on ornamental plants in the yard.

Severe chlorosis or "Yellowing" of sorghum, commonly caused by iron deficiency, occurs on soils on the High and Rolling Plains. Iron is unavailable to sorghum in these areas apparently because of high calcium content in the soil or calcium layers near the soil surface. Scattered chlorotic spots in a field may vary from short strips in a row to an area several rows wide and about 30 ft. long. All plants in this area may not be affected. The larger more severely affected areas are often called "hot spots" where in some years the sorghum seedlings turn white and die. In other spots, the sorghum plants turn yellow and produce little or no grain. On the Rio Grande Plain, a spray program with 2.5 percent copperas controlled the sorghum chlorosis and resulted in good grain production. This practice may not be profitable unless soil moisture is abundant. The extent of "hot spots" in previous years also should be considered in determining whether the spraying program will be profitable. The first spray should be applied before the plants are 10 days old and a second spray 14 days later. These sprays should be applied over the entire field since it is impossible to pre-determine where chlorotic spots will develop soon enough to avoid stunting of young plants! One or two additional sprayings generally are needed for chlorosis control

and good grain production. Later sprays should be applied only where yellow-streaked plants develop. The yellowing usually develops within 14 to 35 days after the second spraying.

The 2.5 percent copperas solution can be made by adding 10 pounds of copperas plus one level teaspoon of powered wetting agent to 50 gallons of water. Stronger solutions burn sorghum plants. Approximately 20 gallons of spray per acre should be applied on each of the first two sprayings.
