## South Wheeler County to Decide Fate of Hospital District on May 5

The hospital bond election called for May 5 may not only determine whether South
Wheeler County is to have
a new and modern hospital,
but whether the area is to
have a hospital of any kind,
according to Glynn Bell,
chairman of the South Wheeler County Hospital District.
"Our present facility falls ler County Hospital District.
"Our present facility falls
far short of the licensing
requirements of the State Department of Health," Bell
said. "This has been true
for some time. An investigator from the Department recently inspected the hospital cently inspected the hospital and again pointed out the seriousness of our situation. "Although the present hospital does not, a has not for some time, m the licensing requirements, the State Department of Health has continued to renew the license because the manage-ment has been trying to do something about the situation.

The Department is aware that the bond election for a new hospital has been called and has once again licensed and hospital. If the election should fail, they could very well withhold their approval in the future," the chairman

declared.

Mr. Bell went on to explain what withdrawal of the license by the Department of Health would mean.

"We wouldn't automatically have to close. The present hospital could legally continue to operate — but — nearly all of the hospitalization insurance companreatment received in an unlicensed hospital.

"Well over one-half of our patients have some type of

hospitilazation insurance and are depending on it in case they become ill. If their insurance policies won't pay our hospital, they are going to some hospital where they will pay. The only alterna-tive would be for them to pay for the hospital care them-selves. This would be hard to do for many, especially to do for many, especially those persons receiving treatment under the Old Age As-

ment under the Old Age Assistance Insurance.

"The Department of Health wouldn't padlock our doors but for all practical purposes, they might as well!"

Bell urged voters to give serious consideration to what the situation would be if we had no hospital here. "We would have to go to Pampa or Amarillo or Wheeler or someplace else, and that

would certainly be expensive sick — we want a hospital right here where we live. It's bad enough just being ill, without also being separated from our family and friends."

He continued: "Without a hospital here medical facilities for emergencies would be greatly lessened, we would probably lose group fine. of Pennsylvania. ably lose some of our fine doctors. This isn't just scare talk — this could happen — and within a short time.

"The State Department of Health has gone along with us this far, but I don't know how much further they can, or will go.

legislative action relating to the 1964 wheat program, there are two very important dates to wheat producers according to County Agent Charles D. Jackson, Wheat producers who wish to participate in the program must sign an agreement at the County ASC Office before the close of the day May 15 This agreement must be signed if the producer is to be eligible for price support loand and is to qualfor marketing certificates. The second important date s May L If a producer wished to divert more than the minimum acreage, the wheat must be destroyed by this

If the producer wishes to

divert only the minimum acreage and is now over-planted, will be given 15 days to destroy the excess wheat fol-lowing measurement of his land and receipt of official notice from the ASC Office, even though this might be after May L. Measurement and official notice may come after the May I deadline but the 15 day period restroying the excess ill holds the county agent said.







that results in severe June backaches, and spare enough time from their planting ac-tivities to do the more pracwatering — Recent weather conditions have resulted in less than average rainfall. The windy weather that has provailed has a less than a l prevailed has also brought about exceptionally low soil moisture conditions for this time of year.

Gardeners should carefully analyze the soil mois-

ture conditions in their own garden and if the supply of moisture in the soil is low care should be taken to provide enough water to support the normal development of the plants especially when they are starting new growth. There are several methods that can be used to insure

that can be used to insure that a proper amount of moisture is supplied to the plants. First: when water is applied to the soil, let it run into the soil slowly and be sure it soaks in deep. This is much more satisfactory than applying small amounts of water at frequent intervals. Second: shape some shallow water holding basins from the soil around newly planted trees. Add mulching material such as pine bark or peat moss around older trees and shrubs end on flower and shrub beds after they have been well watered, they have been well watered. to conserve the moisture and to keep the roots on newly planted plants cool during the increasing number of warm days that will soon be-

This is an ideal time of the year to check all the equip-ment used to supply water to the garden plants to be sure it is in excellent working order before the watering check all the sprinklers, nozzles and garden hoses to be sure they are in working order and repair or replace those that are no longer of

In scheduling your water-ing operations, list the water requirements of your various trees, shrubs and other plantings and plan your watering procedures so that you apply water to your garden in systematic manner so that some plants will not have "wet feet" from overwatering while others suffer from excessive dryness.




