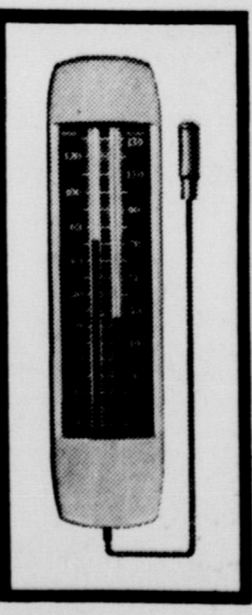

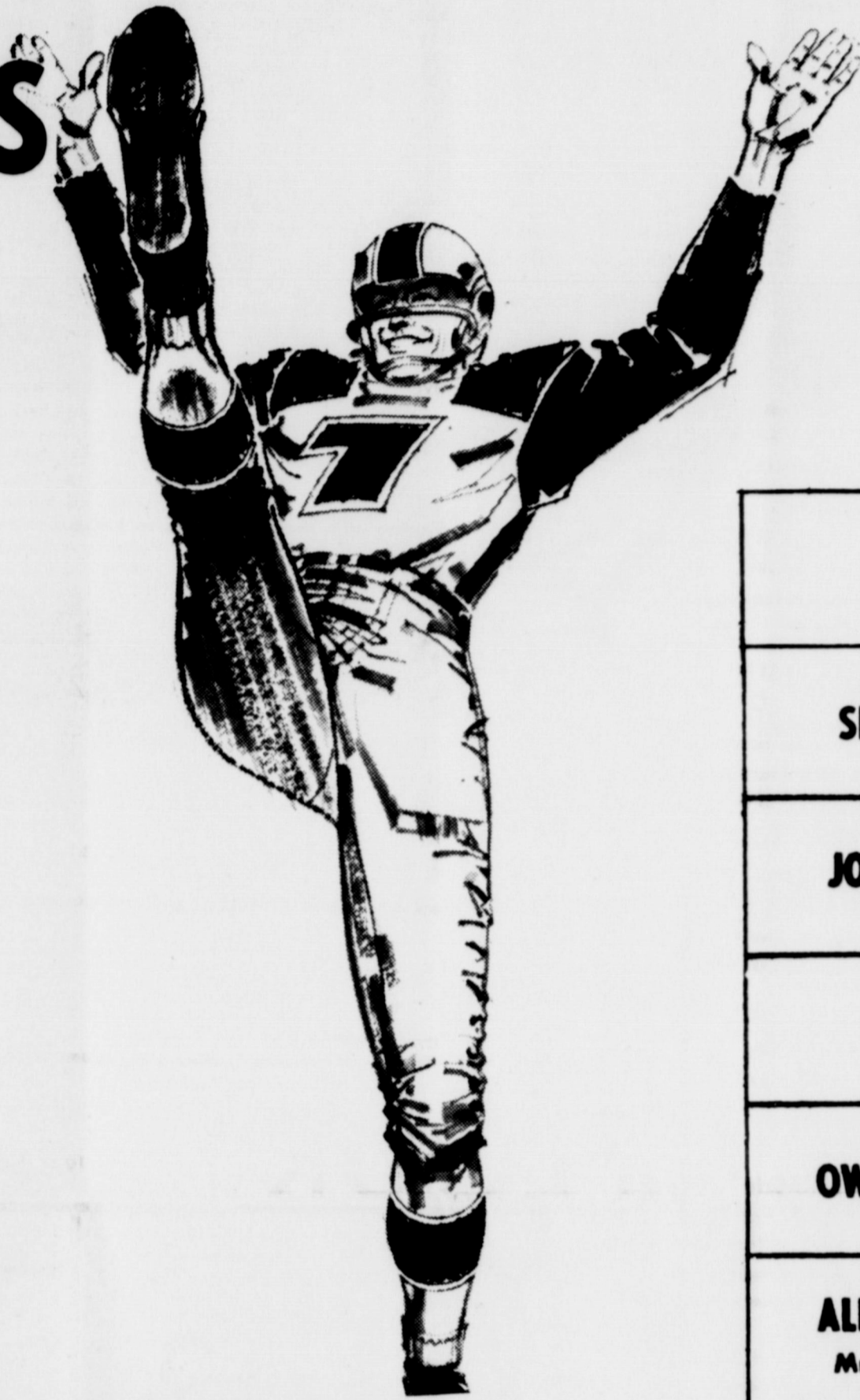

KNOWLEDGE OF TAX OPTIONS MAY INCREASE '64 NET INCOME.

The was farmers utilize the 1964 Income Tax Regulations will determine their net farm income for 1964," says James C. Murphey, Area Extension Farm Management Specialist, Amarillo. "Changes in this year's internal revenue code can be beneficial to the tax payer where certain qualifications are met."

The payment rate schedule on taxable income has decreased from that of 1963. This means tax is due for those who have the same taxable income as 1963.

TAX ADVANTAGES FOR "SENIOR CITIZENS"

Farm people over 65 years of age can have an additional tax advantage if they have sold their personal residence during 1964. Part of the gain can be excluded from taxable income if the sales price exceeded \$20,000 or all of the gain can be excluded if the sale price was under \$20,000. This exclusion applies to a one-time-sale of residence after the taxpayer is 65 years of age and if the home was used as a residence at least 5 of the last 8 years preceding the sale.

Taxpayers sixty-five years of age or over may deduct all medicine and drug expenses from income for tax purposes. Prior to 1964, the amount

deductible was that amount in excess of 1% of the adjusted gross income. Individuals with large fluctuations in income may be eligible for the income-averaging provision. If "average income" is more than \$3000 (excluding capital gains, wagering gains and income from gifts and bequests, etc.) a taxpayer's tax liability may be reduced.

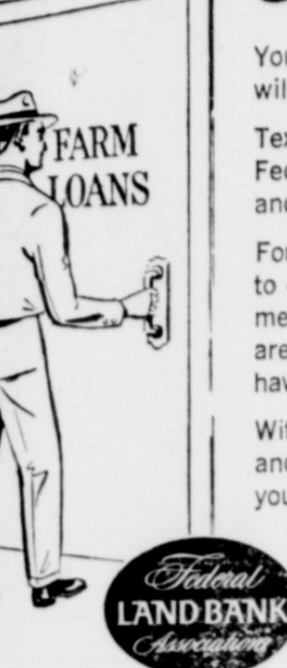

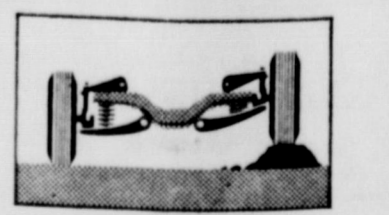
