The big Black and Gold machine of Wheeler, the Mustangs took another step up that ladder to the district championship last Friday night and the Groom Tigers were brushed aside to the tune of 53-0.

Only two games remain for the Mustangs to complete their second undefeated season in a row and their third championship in succession.

Once more the Mustangs brushed aside the threat of a team that was supposed to give the local crew a test and the Groom Tigers were quick to learn of the power and strength of the Mustangs.

The Tigers put fear into Mustang partisans on the first play of the game when Cornett passed to Roberts hauled in on the Wheeler 35. Picking up another first down, the Tigers got as far as the 15 and there the roadblacks were thrown up and the Mustangs held and took over at their 18. For all intent and purposes, the Tigers were dead as the Mustangs began their scoring operations four plays later.

Little Bobby Vanpool put the drive in motion with a twenty five yard scamper and Burks and Porter sandwiched in another five steps between them. From the Groom 47, Vanpool broke around his right end and went the distance and after the pass failed for the extra

points the Mustangs had a

Drawing a five yard fine, the Mus tangs hit a snag when Vanpool fumbled and Groom recovered at the 29. Three plays lost nine yards for the Tigers and Black punted out to the Groom 38. Here Vanpaol stepped back into the picture and it proved to be bad medicine for the Tigers as the scatback covered the 38 yards in another dash on the first play. With still 4:50 to play in the quarter the Wheeler lead went up to 14 as Pater bulled over for the two points.

Adams put his third straight kickoff out of the end zone and Groom once more played in the Mustangs favor. Cornett fumbled and

got the call for three carries and on third down he blasted over his right guard from nine yards out to rack up the third TD of the quarter. Adams kick was wide and the score remained 20-0 in favor of the Mustangs.







"SENIOR CITIZENS" Farm people over 65 years of age can have an additional tax advantage if they have sold their personal residence during 1964. Part of the gain can be excluded from taxable income if the sales price exceeded \$20,000 or all of the gain can be excluded if the sale price was under \$20,000. This exclusion applies to a one-time-sale of residence after the taxpayer is 65 years of age and if the home was used as a residence at least 5 of the last 8 years preceed-
