JAPANESE FILM RANCH

Wheeler was host to three Japanese visitors Wednesday of last week. The trio arrived Tuesday and stayed the night at the Honey Inn. They were met by County Agent, Charles Jackson, who served as their host during the visit. The group is with the largest TV network in Japan and is making a film of different phases of American life, as well as life in

several other countries. Tuesday morning, Mr. Jackson took the group to Britt Ranch. They were accompanied by the editor, Louis Stas. At the Ranch, the group observed ranch life as it has been lived for many years.

The ranch hands had driven a herd of cattle together to work the calves. The visiting Japanese filmed the activity and will use the films in a series of programs on life in the United States. It was pointed out by Mr. Britt that the method of roping and branding which they observed

CO. AGENTS REPORT

Wheeler County cotton farmers should maintain a constant watch on their cotton crop for seedling diseases and blight. Seedling diseases and blight has created havoc in a lot of cotton on the plains this season. Overall disease damage is worse this year than last. Ascochyta blight has been reported as close as Collingsworth County.

In addition to seedling diseases which cause rosettes and root rot conditions, two leaf spotting diseases are prevalent. These are Ascochyta and Rhizoctonia blight. Ascochyta blight is characterized by leaf spots with purple rings around the spot margins. Inside the purple margin, the center is white often with visible tiny black dots. After the recent rains, Ascochyta blight damage has crept up in many Plains fields. It's a "wet weather disease" and warm-dry weather will stop its spread. However, plants hit by this disease may completely die before they recover. Rhizoctonia blight is characterized by leaf spots similar to those caused by As-

cochyta blight. Difference in the two is that when the disease is Rhizoctonia blight, the spot within the purple margin is tan-colored. As with Ascochyta blight, cotton will usually recover and make rapid growth if warm dry weather prevails and the root system is healthy. Determining whether damage is severe enough for replanting is an individual farm question and choice.

For spot checking damage a farmer should go through the field and at random spots remove all the cotton plants for two or three feet row. Lay the plants out at each location and examine the root systems. Check for cankers, girdling effects and root rot damage. After several locations are checked, it should be easier to decide whether enough plants will survive the seedling diseases to still keep a good stand.

has been replaced by pens and a calf table. The modern method reduces the chance of hurting the stock.

When the branding was finished, the group was taken on a tour of the 30,000 acre ranch which is approximately 4 miles wide and 10 miles long. It was explained to the group that the Bitts could have a larger herd of cattle than they do, but the smaller herd prevents over grazing and insures a good stand of grass in dry years.

While on the tour, the spectators were shown the local menace, shinnery, and they observed the results the Bitts have achieved from grazing the scrub oak, which at one time covered a large percent of the ranch and is now cleared away.

It was further explained that the grass in the meadows is not grazed, but cut and baled for use as feed in the winter. This grass is submerged by water which is located only D' below ground surface. The grass roots grow to D' or more and reach the water.

Following the tour, dinner was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. David Britt to the honored guests, Mr. Jackson, Mr. Jerry Sinsie (Amarillo Globe News Reporter), Mr. Louis C. Stas and Mr. and Mrs. Tom Britt.

The meal was served buffet style and the menu included "T-bone or Sirloin Steak, prepared by the host at a charcoal grill - baked potato, a vegetable plate, corn-on-the-cob, and strawberry short-cake.

The Britt family then answered any questions they had about ranch life. They asked how much the price of beef fluctuated and how much government control was placed on the beef. They asked the means of selling the stock and inquired as to what crops were raised on the ranch, the number of ranch hands and the wages paid.

Louis and Dave Britt then saddled their most gentle horse and brought it up from the barn and each of the Japanese visitors mounted with straw hat to have their pictures made at the ranch.

From the Britt ranch the group was taken to the J.R. Heffel farm where they were shown Kesin's and Rich's cotton project. On their way into town, a stop was made to see Terry McCasland's feed-calf pens.

The afternoon was spent at the Wheeler Arena filming the 4-H Texans. The group

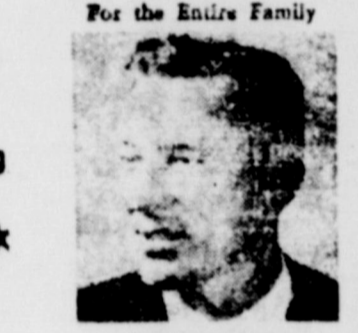

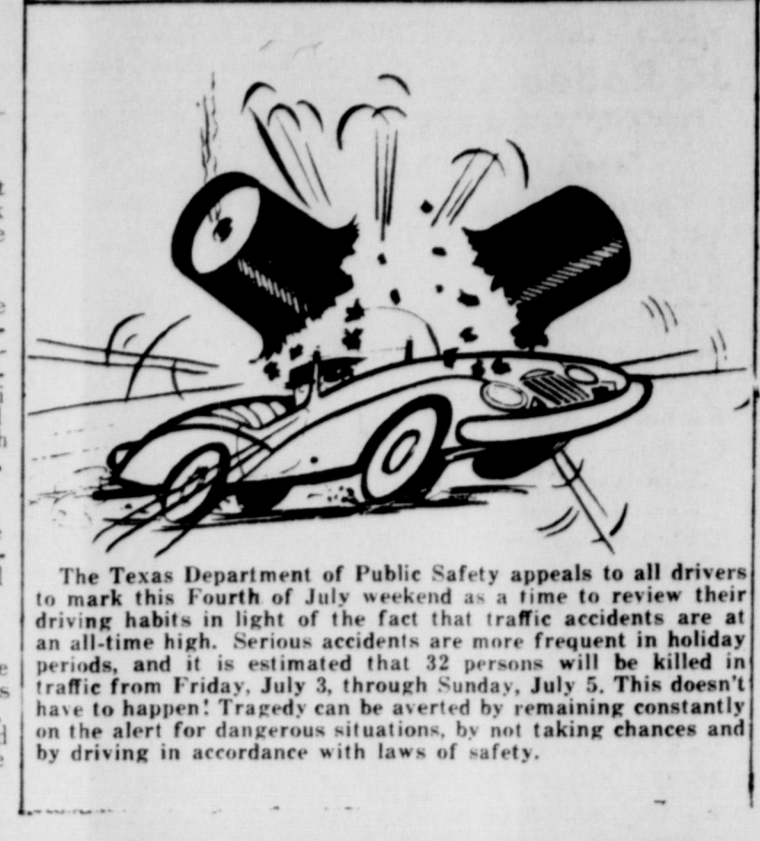

BASIC SURVIVAL SWIMMING OFFERED

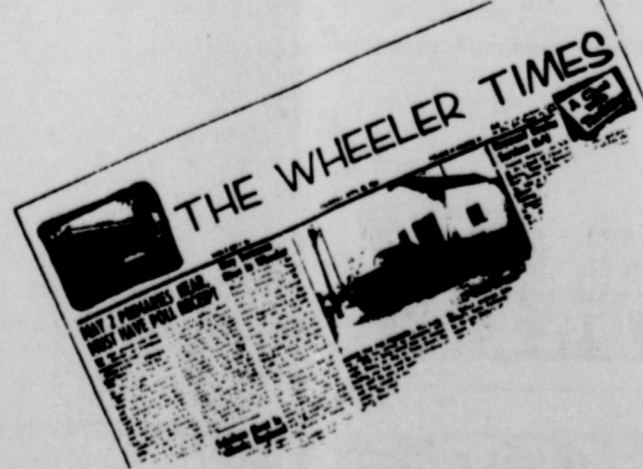

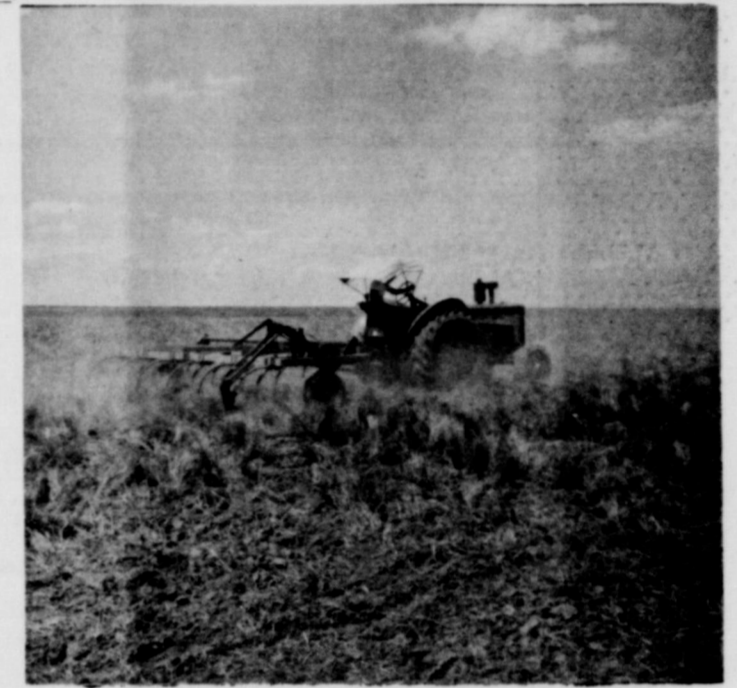

Soil Conservation District News

Small grain harvest time is
here. The light grain yield
on dryland brought about
by inadequate moisture will
also result in low crop re-
siduals.

Yet, in the long run, the
residues if properly managed,
could mean more than the
sale of grain in this dry year.
Each single straw that is
left following harvest will
do a job in soil and water
conservation.
The most effective method
of managing the residues for
soil protection is to leave
the stubble high on the sur-
face soil.
Research and experience
have shown that the expected
percent of residue lost for
each plowing operation for
various types of equipment

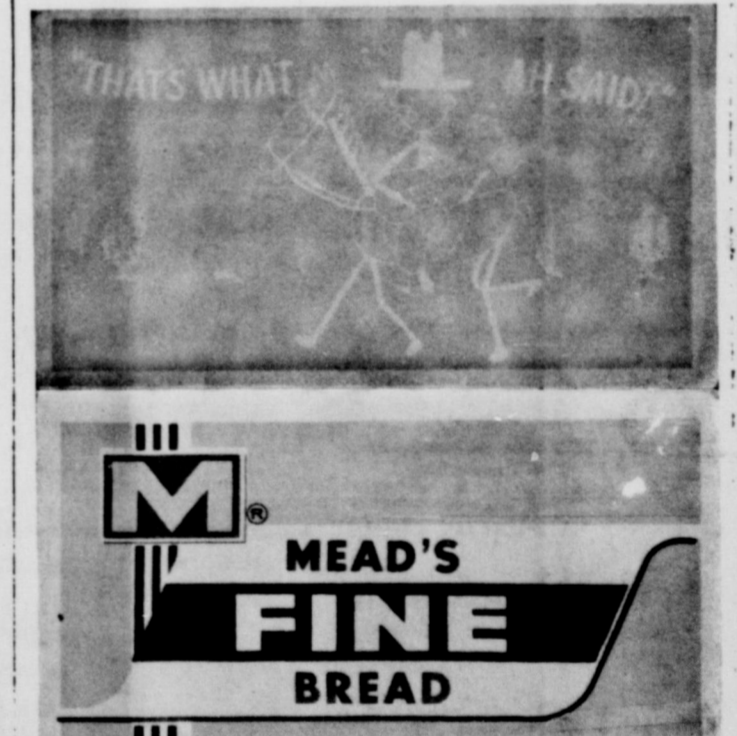


Wheat residues being stubble mulched by the use of combination sweep and rod weeder equipment.

is as follows:
a. Large sweeps, rod weeder and blade type - 10
b. Cultivator and close-spaced sweeps - 15
c. Tandem disk harrow - 25
d. One-way disk plow - 50
Several local clipping studies of dryland small grain residues (based on air-dry weight) by Soil Conservation Service technicians in the Wheeler Soil Conservation District have shown an average production of 2,000 lbs. per acre.
Research and local experience have also shown that a minimum of 750 pounds of residue must be left for protection on the "heavier" soils, 1250 pounds for "medium" textured soils and 1,500 lbs. for "sandy" soils for drilled crops such as small grain.
