SCD NEWS

County farmers have begun to plan terraces as summer crops come off. Dale Dyson and Wayne Treadwell are considering terrace construction this winter.

Several SCD cooperators were present Thursday at a program given by Bobby J. Ragsdale, Range Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Ragsdale reviewed some methods of maintaining maximum forage production on native rangeland. According to Ragsdale, proper range management will not only result in maximum beef production per acre but will also provide good soil protection and water conservation.

Ragsdale's talk was based on research and practical experience from around the state and nation. The talk backed up the idea of the

Soil Conservation District that Conservation farming and ranching will be the most profitable in the long run.

A bulletin on range management, co-authored by Ragsdale, is available in the County Agent's office. The SCS will be glad to work with any individual interested in improving range condition and production. Both offices are located in the basement of the Courthouse.

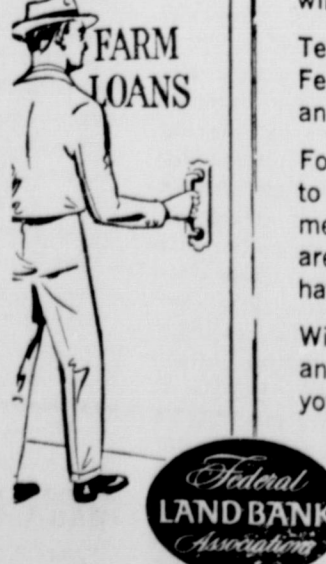

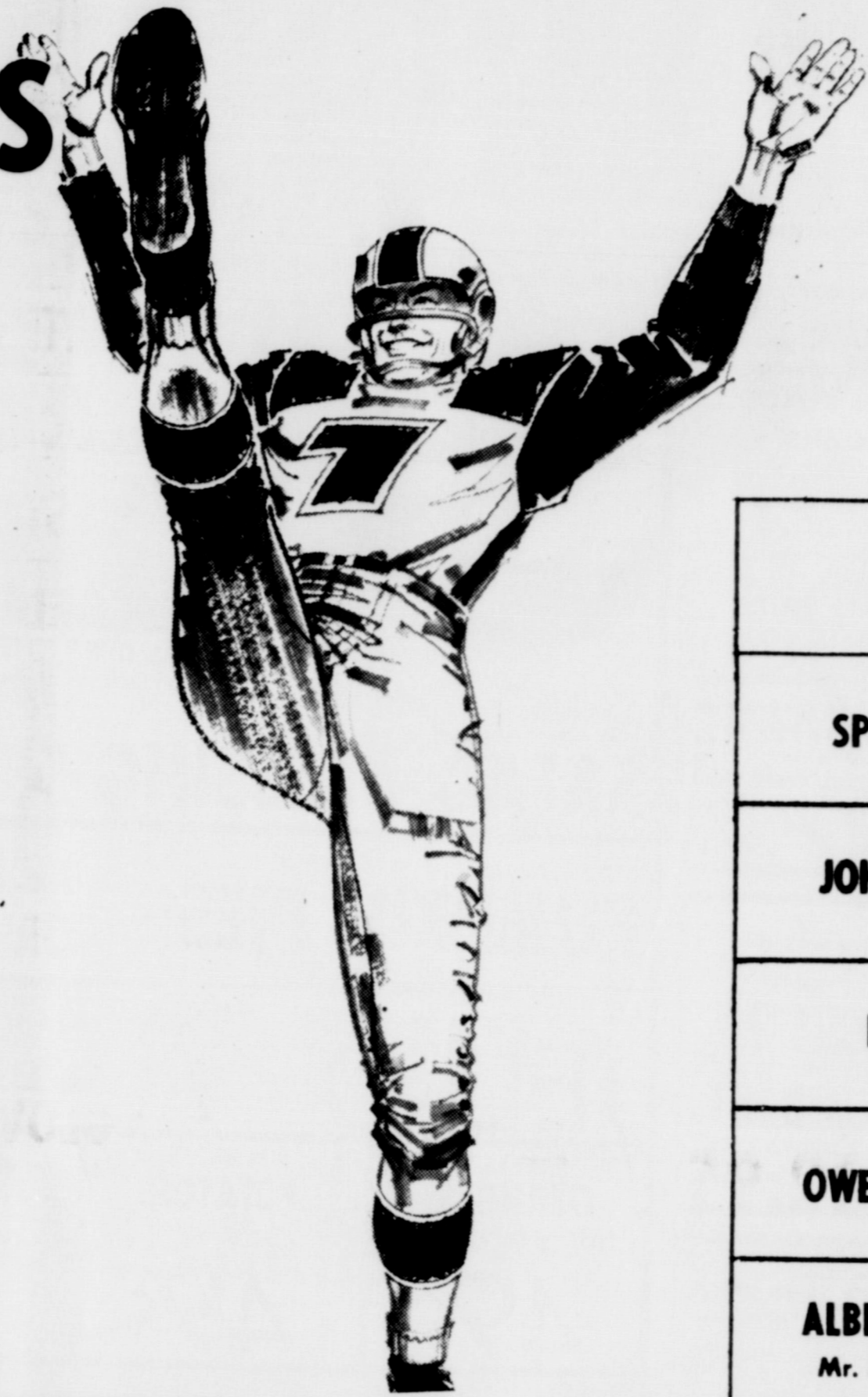
