H. CALLAN, FORMER RESIDENT OF WHEELER, IS BURIED IN SHAMROCK

Final rites for Herbert W. Callan, retired Shamrock peace officer, were conducted at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Meredith E. Wyatt officiating, assisted by the Rev. C.B. Melton, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Mr. Callan, 70, died at 11:30 a.m. Friday in the Veterans' Hospital at Amarillo. He had been in failing health for about five years.

Serving as pallbearers at the funeral services were: L.C. Adams, Jr., Loyd Braxton, Glen Clifton, James Hollabaugh, James Brothers, Bill Bush, George Howard and Roy Burckham.

Named as honorary bearers were fellow members of the Friendship Sunday School Class of the First Baptist Church.

Preceding the funeral services at 11 a.m. Sunday, a flag folding and presentation ceremony was conducted by M-Sgt. Doug Rives of the Shamrock National Guard.

Mr. Callan was a native Texan, born April 27, 1894 in Greer County. He had resided in Wheeler County since childhood, moving here from Bosque County He had made his home in Shamrock since 1926, moving here from Wheeler.

He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the First Baptist Church and Shamrock Masonic Lodge No. 929.

Mr. Callan was a veteran peace officer, serving as chief of police in Shamrock for many years before his retirement.
