HERD HITS TRIBE FOR CROWN

The undefeated Wheeler Mustangs clinched their third straight district 5-B title Friday night as they roared over the Miami Warriors, 43-0.

The game, but outnamed Warriors were never in the ball game as the Horses took their fourth straight shutout victory, using reserves for more than half the game.

The Wheeler starters scored the first three times they got their hands on the ball, then retired for all but five plays in the fourth quarter, when they scored again. The reserves kept up the battle as they also had the ball four times and scored twice, penetrating the other two times before losing the pigskin.

Miami crossed the mid-field stripe only once, on a 12-yard pass from Dave Bowers to Lloyd Seitz, the pair's four aerial completions the only threat Miami ever produced.

Little Bobby Vanpool racked up the yardage once more in his brief appearance, gaining 155 yards in nine carries. Dunk Porter followed with 55 yards in eight trips, Freshman Freddie Goad led the reserves with 50 yards in eight carries before suffering a broken hand, Johnny Hutchison garnered 48 yards in nine carries and Tom Smith, eligible for the first time, had 28 yards in five tries.

In an extremely short first quarter that saw only 17 plays from scrimmage, the Horses galloped on a 13-play, 72-yard drive for the opening tally, Vanpool going the last eight yards and Porter running the conversion.

Wheeler took the ball on their 34 in the second quarter and went the distance in three plays, Vanpool going 60 yards in two carries, the touchdown trip being 28 yards. Again it was Wallace on the conversion.

Miami made their one threat, and punted to the Herd 22 as the second quarter started. Vanpool got 28 yards, Richard Wallace passed to Jamie Moore for 11 more, Vanpool went 34 and for the last five to pay dirt. Again Porter ran the conversion.

Wheeler's second team took a punt on their 49 and drove the distance in seven plays. Hutchison got 11 yards and Goad 18 in the march, with a pass interference call setting the ball on the three, from

where Hutchison went across. Sleepy Adams' conversion kick was no good.

In the third quarter Wheeler took a short punt on the Warrior 37 and went to the 17 before fumbling away the ball. Miami marched back to the 37, but lost the ball on the fourth-down gamble and the Herd started again. Grinding it out in 11 plays, they sent Hutchison over for the score from one yard out. Seitz broke up a conversion pass.

In the fourth quarter, Jamie Moore intercepted a pass on the Miami 32. A stubborn Miami defense dug in on their three and took the ball over on downs.

Bowers came out passing and hit for 18 yards, but the Warriors fumbled and Wheeler recovered on the Tribe 29. The Herd starters came in for five plays and Porter lunged over from the one. Adams kicked the extra point.

NOTE: The Wheeler Mustangs will play the Matador Matadors in a Bi-District game Thanksgiving day. The site has not been definitely set, but three towns have made offers. They are Shamrock, Memphis and Canyon.

4J RANCH RESULT OF HARD WORK & TIME



Top Picture shows the ranch on August 1961, before the cleanup began. Bottom shows the same spot just one month later after cleanup.

At a time when the nation is talking about the L.B.J. Ranch, we must recognize the Four Jay Ranch, located 3 miles from Wheeler, as a credit to Wheeler County. This ranch, owned by Dr. Calvin Jones, shows what can be done to a farm with a lot of hard work and money.

The farm was purchased in 1961. The 160 acre farm was covered with sage, shinnery and sand holes. One spring feeds into the place and two more are located on the farm. The water from these springs did not have a channel and made the bottom land a bog-hole. A bull dozer was hired to clean up part of the brush, build a pond, and dig a channel for the excess water.

Gwyn Edwards is the manager and the brown behind the successful results. Mr. Edwards and a few hired hands used a Ford tractor

and a brush beater to clean out the underbrush and sprig the Midland Bermudagrass.

With the completion of the clearing, the dam and the leveling, the work was not completed. 100 lbs. of fertilizers was applied per acre and the majority sprigged to Bermuda.

The 160 acres of sand and waste now raises 97 acres of bermudagrass, 12 acres Swiss grass, 39 acres rye and 12 acres alfalfa. These crops are all irrigated from the two spring-fed ponds. The grass grazes 55 head of Charolais cattle. The alfalfa produced 150 bales per acre its second year.

The new breed of beef cattle, the Charolais, are of great interest to most visitors to the farm. The Charolais originated in France and they are rapidly gaining in popularity in this country. This particular herd was bought from the Esque Ranch near Houston. The bull is a 1300 lb two year old. All heifers are kept, while the bulls are sold to other ranches when they reach breeding age.

Dr. Calvin Jones and wife, who spend weekends at the ranch, live in Pampa. They have a grown daughter and a son who is studying to be a doctor. The family and gwyn Edwards take great pride in their achievement with this farm. It is to be noted that all work was local labor and all materials purchased from local firms.

JOHN T. WRIGHT SERVICES HELD NOVEMBER 5

Funeral services were held for John Thomas Wright at the Methodist Church in Wheeler, November 5, 1964 at 2:00 o'clock with the Rev. Harold Perdue officiating.

Mr. Wright passed away at his home Southeast of Wheeler on November 2, 1964 at 10:55 o'clock p.m. at the age of 76. He was in bad health twelve years and seriously ill for the past few weeks.

Mr. Wright was born in Gardaville, Texas on May 9, 1888. He moved to Shamrock in 1908 from Indian Territory. In 1930 he moved to Dalhart and back to Shamrock in 1937. Then he moved to Wheeler County in 1940. He was a farmer most of his active life and was also employed by the Wheeler Gas Co. He was married to Nora Jinnett on November 26, 1912 at Shamrock, Texas. Mr. Wright was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Nora Wright of Wheeler and the children, J. T. Wright, Jr. of Houston, Texas; Herman L. Loyd Wright of Wichita, Kans.; Mrs. Gilbert Wynn of Dalhart, Tex.; Mrs. Roscoe Allen of Wichita, Kans.; and Harvey R. Wright of Elk City, Okla.; 13 grand children; 5 great grand children; brothers, Bill Wright of Amarillo and Fred Wright of Olney and sisters, Mrs. Art Fleming of Cordell, Okla., and Kathryn Wright of Houston, Tex.; Two brothers and two sisters preceded him in death.

Interment was in the Shamrock Cemetery under direction of Kirk Funeral Home.

In addition to the Gold Star boys and girls and their parents, many others will be attending this banquet. They include County extension agents, their wives (or

Tractor Accident Is Fatal to Lee Barry

Lee Barry, a 74 year old Briscoe man, was killed Tuesday afternoon when the tractor he was riding overturned, pinning him under the right rear wheel.

Mr. Barry was in the process of grading off a spot of land near his home at the time of the accident. He was seen working at 3:30 and was found under the tractor at 4:30 when his nephew returned home from school.

The nephew traveled a mile to the nearest neighbor to summons help. Enough neighboring men gathered to lift the tractor from the body. He was pronounced dead at 5:10 upon the arrival of a doctor. Death was believed to have been instant.

Mr. Barry was a retired mail carrier. He moved to the Briscoe community in

1936 and carried the rural mail until March 1, 1960 when he retired.

Mr. Barry and his wife, Bessie Barry, of the home, had lived in Briscoe prior to moving to the farm located 5 miles S.E. of Briscoe in December of 1963.

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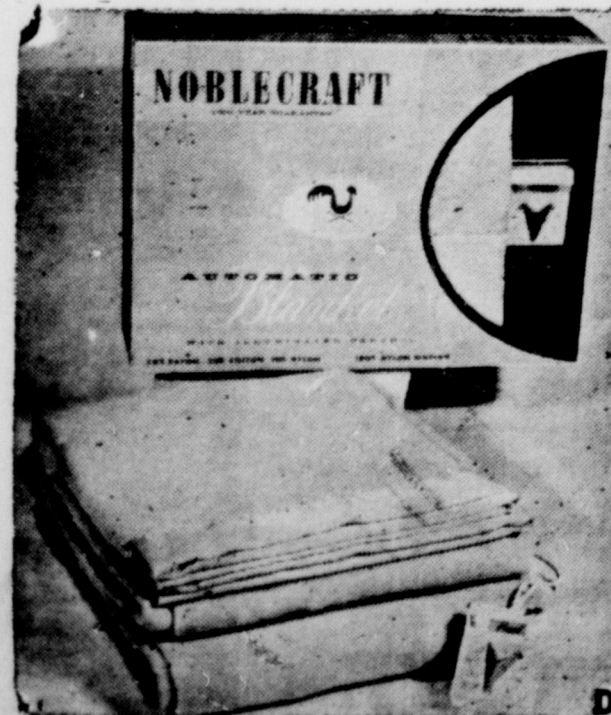

Terraces Help County Farmers

When the early settlers of this great nation first came to part of the country most of them were not very concerned about taking care of their land. If the soil they were tilling got to the point where it would not produce, they simply moved on to another part of the country and broke out more land. It is not possible to do this any more. In fact the leaders of our nation tell us that we will have to feed and clothe many more people in the near future and this will have to be done on less acreage. This of course is due to the "population explosion" of these United States! With this in mind we need to ask ourselves if we are using our soil in a way to preserve and improve it.

Much of our soil in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District needs to be terraced in order to preserve it so it will produce good crops in the years to come. Many times we hear landowners make a remark such as this: "My farm should have been terraced years ago, but I hate to work them so bad that I just would not build them." It is true that a field that is terraced is harder to work than a good level field with no terraces. However much of our cultivated land is rolling and if it is not terraced, soon there will be gullies through our fields that we cannot cross with our modern farm equipment. This is much more of a nuisance than the terraces.

A good terrace system on our farms will keep it from washing into gullies as well as stop the sheet erosion. Also terraces will help to conserve the moisture we receive and distribute it over our land more evenly. Here in Wheeler County this is one of the great assets of a terrace system, because we have periods of drought quite frequently. Some farmers report that terraces have increased their yield up to one third more than it was before terracing. This is due to the better moisture conditions as well as saving the valuable top soil. If all the inconveniences of terraces and all the benefits are carefully considered, surely the decision for a good terrace system will be made.

If you have an erosion problem on your farm and would like to do something about it, come into the office of the Soil Conservation Service that assists the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District with erosion problems of this nature. These technicians will be glad to work with you any way they can. You may also receive financial assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program of through your local ASCS office.

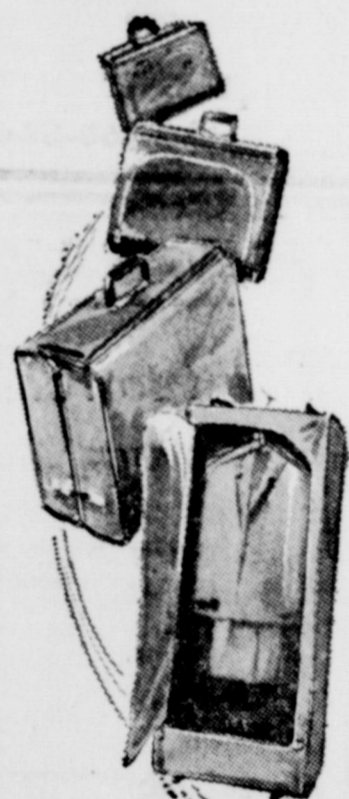

CO. HISTORICAL SURVEY COMMITTEE JOINS RAMPS

Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee will join in a dynamic 5-year program of historical recordation, appreciation, marking, preservation and surveys-called RAMPS by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, originator of the program.

This announcement was made by Mrs. Sallie B. Harris, Chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee, appointed by County Judge, G.W. Hefley.

The purpose of Wheeler County in joining the RAMPS program is to promote knowledge and appreciation of Texas history on the part of local citizens and visitors.

Immediate steps are being taken to determine what sites in Wheeler County should be marked for their importance to Texas history. These include early settlers' homes, business sites, first churches and schools and many other places important in Texas history.

Throughout the state 5,000 sites of historical significance are to be designated by Official Texas Historical Markers during the next five years.

Local people and visitors will then be able to know the pattern of historical development through seeing spots where Indians traveled and lived, sites of colonial settlement, localities where political steps were taken and scenes that were background for economic growth.

"This program will enable us to establish our country's history in the broad pattern of Americanism," says Mrs. Harris, County Chairman.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee serves as a clearing house of historical suggestions and evaluations. Enrichment of county resources through the organizational leadership of the TSHSC is one of the immediate steps contemplated. Public records and private resources in the form of business data, diaries, memoirs that tell the trend of historic development will become useful to the county under the field supervision of the TSHSC.

Calendars of historical events, maps of 1000 historical tours, directories of museums are all prepared by the TSHSC with county cooperation.

CHRISTMAS "RUSH"

The Christmas "Rush" brings a very old quote to mind when one thinks of the Post Office Department. "Neither snow nor rain, nor heat, nor glare of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." This was said by the greek historian, Herodotus in the fifth Century B.C. but it still is true of the Postal Service.

However, Postmaster Virgil Jamison recently added a thought. "While it is true that bad weather doesn't stop the mails, it certainly can slow them down."

He mentioned that planes can't get off the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up. Trucks must move more slowly and cautiously over highways. And in many places, mailmen might wish for the warmth of an igloo. Even the impish Mr. ZIP can't assure next-day delivery under these conditions.

"Why," you may ask, "as the Postmaster bring this up?"

"Simply to let people know that there is a factor that we just can't control, the weather." "It is important that people make every effort to shop early and mail early to assure on time delivery. This is especially true during the Christmas Rush when an ever increasing avalanche of mail moves through the Postal System."

The Post Office Department has several new tools to use in this year's mail service. The most important is the new ZIP code and transportation distribution system that came into being with the Zoning Improvement Plan (ZIP). Postmaster Jamison is urging everyone to use the five digit numbers because in most cases the code cuts down the number of times a piece of mail must be handled.

CO. AGENT'S REPORT

CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE QUESTIONNAIRES BEING MAILED TO FARMERS

Questionnaires for the 1964 Census of Agriculture are now being mailed out to farmers and ranchers of Wheeler County, County Agent Charles D. Jackson reported today.

The forms are expected to reach the farmers within a few days. This will allow farmers a period of time to consult their 1964 business records in order to answer questions of the forms before census enumerators begin calling on the farmers to collect the forms. Best estimates for the year will be sufficient to answer questions in cases where complete records for the year are not available, according to the County Agent.

The visits by enumerators will start on November 9 in this county, according to the County Agent.

Enumerators will call on every farmer in the district under his or her supervision, the County Agent explained. At the time of the call, the enumerator will help the farmer complete answers to any questions in the form that the farmer was unable to answer, and will review the form to see that it is completely filled out.

By mailing the forms ahead of the visits, officials of the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce, hope to save both time and effort.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on U.S. Agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, number of persons living on the farms, acreage and harvest of crops, a livestock and poultry inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, and an income and some production expenditures.
