### Sen. Strom Thurmond on the 1964 Presidential Race

September 16, 1964



The Democratic Party has abandoned the people. It has turned its back on the spiritual values and political principles which have brought us the blessings of freedom under God and a bountiful prosperity. Senator Strom Thurmond, of Aiken, South Carolina, is a lawyer admitted to practice in all Federal Courts, including the United States Supreme Court. He is a senior member of the Armed Services and the Commerce Committees of the United States Senate.

Senator Thurmond is a veteran of World War II, a member of the Baptist Church, American Bar Association, and numerous veterans and farm organizations.

It has been wisely said that "For evil to triumph, it is only necessary that good men do nothing." Particularly is this true in time of crisis. Seldom before in the history of our Nation have we faced so great a crisis.

The people of South Carolina have placed me in a position of trust in the National Government. From this position, I have observed at first hand the conduct and factors which have brought about this crisis. I would, therefore, be most derelict in my duty were I at this time to remain silent.

I have no choice but to speak openly, frankly, and fully to the people of South Carolina on the crisis that confronts us.

The Democratic Party has abandoned the people. It has turned its back on the spiritual values and political principles which have brought us the blessings of freedom under God and a bountiful prosperity. It has breached the trust reposed in it by the people. It has repudiated the Constitution of the United States. It is leading the evolution of our Nation to a socialistic dictatorship.

The Democratic Party has forsaken the people to become the party of minority groups, power-hungry union leaders, political bosses, and big businessmen looking for government contracts and favors.

The Democratic Party has used the Government as a propaganda machine to distort the truth and deceive the public to the extent that a sub-cabinet official can publicly defend the Administration's "right to lie" and remain in office, unrebuked.

The Democratic Party has invaded the private lives of people by using the powers of government for coercion and intimidation of individuals.

The Democratic Party has rammed through Congress unconstitutional, impractical, unworkable, and oppressive legislation which invades inalienable personal and property rights of the individual.

The Democratic Party has encouraged lawlessness, civil unrest, and mob actions.

The Democratic Party has violated its trust by using the power of government to suppress information on scandals and corruption of its leaders in government and party offices.

The Democratic Party has succeeded and assisted our Communist enemies through trade and aid at the expense of the American people.

The Democratic Party has established and pursued for our government a no-win foreign policy of weakness, indecision, accommodation, and appeasement.

The Democratic Party, as custodian of government, faltered at the Bay of Pigs and in the Cuban crisis of 1962—at the very moment when victory was at hand—and thereby forfeited Cuba to Soviet domination, subjected our Nation to the peril of an armed enemy camp 90 miles from our shores, and opened the doors of the hemisphere to Communist subversion.

The Democratic Party, as custodian of government, has sent our youth into combat in Vietnam, refusing to call it war, and demanding of our youth the risk of their lives without providing either adequate equipment or a goal of victory.

The Democratic Party, while hiding behind the deceitful gimmick of a darkened White House, has increased deficit spending and squandered, at home and abroad, billions of hard-earned dollars taken from the American people.

The Democratic Party has nominated for Vice President a key leader of the Americans for Democratic Action, the most influential Socialist group in our Nation.

The Democratic Party has encouraged, supported, and protected the Supreme Court in a reign of judicial tyranny, and in the Court's effort to wipe out local self-government, effective law enforcement, internal security, the rights of the people and the States, and even the structure of the State governments.

The Democratic Party is converting our Constitutional Federated Republic into the same type of disciplined and submissive servant of an elite power group as it has made of the Democratic Party itself, as all who watched the Democratic Convention on television can bear witness.

The top leaders of the South Carolina Democratic Party have chosen to abandon the traditional independence of the State Party, and to lead the people of South Carolina down the road to serfdom mapped by the National Democratic Party. The party of our fathers is dead. Those who took its name are engaged in another reconstruction, this time not only of the South, but of the entire Nation.

If the American people permit the Democratic Party to return to power, freedom as we have known it in this country is doomed, and individuals will be destined to lives of regulation, control, coercion, intimidation, and subservience to a power elite who shall rule from Washington.

Fortunately, for those of us who cherish the traditional freedom entrusted to us by our forefathers, there is another choice this year. Although the party of our fathers is dead, the principles of our forefathers live now in the cause of a Presidential nominee. The man who has gained the Republican nomination for President against all the odds and opinion polls, and who now has control of the Republican Party, is one who believes in and abides by our Constitution. He has demonstrated his fidelity to freedom, independence, and the Constitution by his actions and his votes in the United States Senate. I personally know him to be able and responsible. He is an honest man of courage and conviction, who trusts the American people to hold the reins of government and rule themselves.

I cannot foretell what success will reward Senator Barry Goldwater's efforts to return the National Government to its Constitutional role and our Nation to its rightful place of strength and respect in the world. Nor can I predict with certainty how long those ideas and ideals of Senator Goldwater which I share will prevail in the councils of the Republican Party which he now heads. I do know that we have a fighting chance under Barry Goldwater's leadership and that we are welcomed to his banner.

I know also that the course for the Democratic Party has been set toward socialism and arbitrary rule. I know further that the Democratic Party's line of succession is Hubert Humphrey and Robert Kennedy, with Walter Reuther and Joseph Raah pulling strings behind the scenes.

I have worked within the framework of the Democratic Party, because experience proves it necessary to work within the framework of one of the two national parties to be effective. I have, nevertheless, maintained independence of judgment on issues and have conscientiously tried to represent the people of South Carolina, seeking to protect their rights and freedom. I shall always maintain my independent judgment and action and put the people of South Carolina first. To do this in the future I must work within the framework of the Goldwater Republican Party.

For me, there is no alternative. The future of freedom and constitutional government is at stake, and this requires that I do everything in my power to help Barry Goldwater return our Nation to constitutional government through his election to the Presidency. This also requires that I join him in his fight, successful as of now, to make the Republican Party a party which supports freedom, justice, and constitutional government.

It will be a long and hard struggle, with many battles to be fought. At this time, one objective takes precedence over all others—electing Barry Goldwater President. As we give the Presidential race our undivided effort, I hope all our people, and particularly our young people whose future hangs in the balance, will join this cause with enthusiasm.

To my friends who have conscientiously advised me against this step, because of a sincere belief that I could best serve the country by following a course designed to keep myself in office, I can only say that I fully realize the political risk involved in this step and that my chances for re-election might, because of this step, go down into oblivion. But in the final analysis, I can only follow the course which, in my heart and conscience, I believe to be in the best interest of our State, our country, and the freedom of our people.

I have chosen this course because I cannot consider any risks in a cause which I am convinced is right.

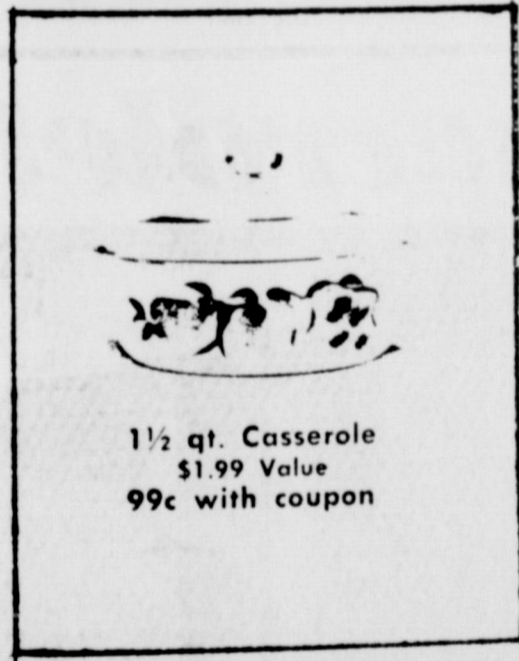

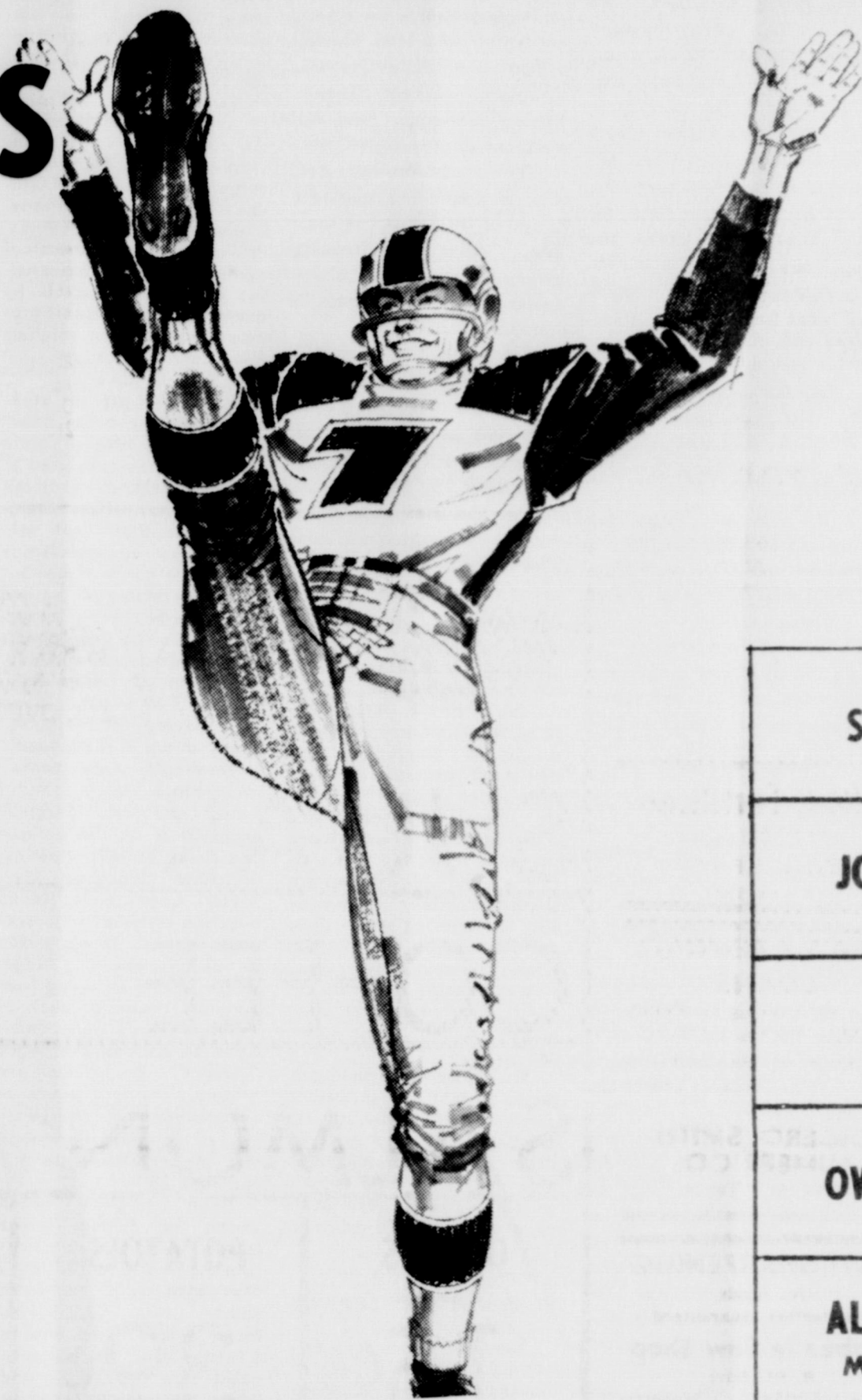

**GIRLS BABYSIT TWIN INDIAN BOYS IN FLIGHT FROM BOLIVIA TO TEXAS**

Twenty-eight hours of babysitting twins may not be a world record but it made a lot of friends for Miss Kathy Harrison of Denton, Texas, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.B. Leake of Moberly and great granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jap Johnston.

It brought happiness to the household of Mr. and Mrs. Don Rule of St. Anthony, Fremont County, Idaho, who will provide a home for the boys, Pedro and Pablo, born in La Paz, Bolivia.

Miss Harrison, 18, a freshman at North Texas State University and Miss Nancy Cooper, who has now begun her first year of teaching at Arlington, spent the summer at the American Institute in La Paz.

When the Rules, in Idaho heard that the two girls would be returning to Texas in late August, they started proceedings to bring the boys to this country with the prospect of babysitters on the way.

"People were so nice," Kathy says. "Everyone on the plane was helpful."

"The babies were wonderful. They are Aymaran Indians. Apparently Aymaran babies do not cry. They slept most of the way. Of course we did attract some attention, getting on the plane with two black-haired babies."

The panicky moment came when they landed at an unscheduled eight-hour stopover in Lima.

"We had no idea what it would be like with two babies in a strange foreign city over night."

People were helpful again. The girls got hotel reservations and a night's sound sleep.

After stops in Miami and New Orleans they arrived in Dallas with their charges. Mrs. Rule had flown down from Idaho Falls to be on hand and to take the babies home to St. Anthony where her husband is a lineman with Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co.

The Rules signed the legal papers in May to begin proceedings to bring the boys to this country.

Babies, it seems, require Bolivian passports and American visas like other travelers.

They have passed their first birthdays, Pedro on August 27, Pablo on Aug. 29. Actually they are not "twins" but two of a set of triplets. A sister was born in between, on Aug. 28. The family decided to keep her; girls are useful as sheepherders in Bolivia.

The two boys, in a family which included seven older brothers, were taken to Methodist Hospital in La Paz. They were sent to foster homes but had to be returned to the hospital for care.

Mr. and Mrs. Rule heard about Pedro and Pablo, or Peter and Paul, last Easter from a visiting missionary. Papers were signed by proxy.

Then Miss Margaret Dickson, formerly of Denton, a director of the American Institute at La Paz, suggested Nancy and Kathy as babysitters for the flight.

After six months of negotiations, the Rules now have the boys. Pedro and Pablo have a family which

**CO. AGENT'S REPORT**

On September 18 several interested people of the Twitty and Kelton area met in a general meeting to have explained to them the Water Facility loan available to them from the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. J. J. Roan, Area Supervisor, and John L. Manning, Wheeler County Supervisor, explained the program to those present. A steering committee was then elected composed of Billy Cantrell, Chairman, Ernest Blake, Haskell Sammons, John Ambler, and Ernest Henderson.

The committee has met with a consulting engineer to see of the project is feasible. After a preliminary survey of the area the engineer believes it can be done satisfactorily.

The committee is now in the process of obtaining membership fees and signatures from the prospective water users of which there are approximately 150 in this area. To become a member of the water association one must sign a survey data sheet and deposit \$50 membership fee. All interested parties are urged to contact one of the steering committee members in the very near future.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to groups of farmers, ranchers and rural residents to develop water supply systems for irrigation household and livestock use. These loans are made under the provision of the Consolidated Farmers Home Administration Act of 1961 as amended by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962. Loans are made only to groups who are unable to obtain the credit they need from other sources at reasonable rates and terms.

Mr. Cantrell, chairman, requests that any interested parties contact one of the members of the steering committee in their community to sign and make their deposit in order to help speed up the necessary steps in obtaining this loan.

# COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

Is the storage bin on your farm insect-free and ready for those soon-to-be harvested grains?

Stored grain insects inflict enormous losses upon grain producers each year. Insects destroy an estimated two percent of the nation's farm-stored grain each month.

Among the most destructive stored grain insects in Wheeler County are corn weevils, lesser grain beetles and Angoumois grain moths.

Protection against these pests is begun by storing grain only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned. Old grain, trash, feed sacks and other debris that furnish living quarters for insects should be removed. Cracks should be covered to prevent grain from collecting, and grain and other material beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.

After cleaning, spray the inside surfaces with either methoxychlor or malathion at the rate of about two gallons per 1,000 square feet of surface area.

It should be remembered that grain to be stored should be clean and sound and have a moisture content of 12 percent or less.

Also, when filling the bin, allow adequate working space for fumigation and inspection of grain.

Premium grade malathion may be used as a grain protectant on wheat,

oats, corn, rye, barley, grain sorghum, peanuts and field or garden seeds. It can be applied as a dust or spray at the time the grain is being placed in final storage.

Several liquid fumigants are effective in killing weevils and beetles which feed below the grain surface. Some of these include ethylene dichloride, carbon tetrachloride and carbon disulphide (Hi-Life).

Before fumigants, spray the outside of the bin with a residual spray such as malathion to kill insects that may be forced out of the building by the fumigant. The bin should be made as tight as possible before fumigation and that the grain surface be level to insure even penetration.

Fumigants, when applied properly, will penetrate grain and in most cases kill all stages of insects to a depth of 10 to 12 feet. Best results are obtained if fumigants are applied when the air is calm.

Since fumigants are dangerous, precautions listed on the manufacturer's label should be followed carefully. When applying fumigants, always work with someone who can assist you in case of an accident or excessive exposure.

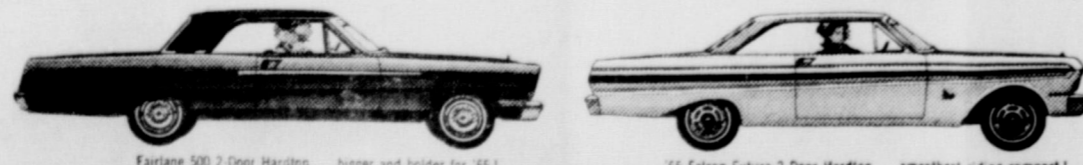
