WHEELER OBSERVES HOMECOMING

MUSTANGS WIN TENTH 59-0

Wheeler's Championship Mustangs ended their regular season play last Friday night with a resounding 59-0 win over the Lefors Pirates.

The win gave the Black and Gold a season mark of 10 wins and no losses and marks the third year in a row that the Mustangs have had all or a piece of the District 5-B Championship.

A cold wind put a slight damper on the Homecoming festivities but it seemed to only spur the hard running Mustangs. Dunk Porter led the Mustang onslaught scoring three times and gaining 264 yards on the ground for a new record for future Mustangs to shoot for.

All chances the visiting Pirates might have had went with the flying feet of Bobby Vanpool as he sped untouched for 54 yards on the Mustangs first play from scrimmage. Only a little over two minutes had elapsed when Vanpool broke loose. The Mustangs came right back on their next possession and this time it took them two plays. Don Burks got the final 20 yards with a slant off his left tackle. This counter was set up when Nichols, the Pirate fullback, was unable to control a high snap on fourth down and the Mustangs got the ball on the Lefors 24.

The floodgates opened on the Pirates in the second quarter when the home crew pushed over four TD's and took to the warmth of the dressing room at halftime with a 39-0 margin.

Vanpool climaxed a 68 yard drive with 10:26 to go in the second quarter as he circled his right end from 7 yards out. Jimmy Adams kicked the first of his five successful conversions and Wheeler fans started looking ahead to Turkey Day.

A bolt of lightning struck the Pirates late in the second quarter and this bolt came under the name of Dunk Porter. Every Pirate on the field had at least one and some two or three shots at

the powerful Mustang fullback crisscrossed the field for 85 yards and another tally. The Pirates fumbled the kickoff and the Mustangs recovered a short 8 yards away from paydirt. Burks got the 8 on the first play and Adams added the placement.

Wheeler got their last score in the half moments later when Nichols fumbled on the Lefors 34 and once more the alert Mustangs pounced on the ball. Burks got the 22 and then Porter boomed across the double stripe from the 22. Adams kicked true and the score mounted to 39-0.

Aided by a 15 yard personal foul penalty, the Mustangs drove 84 yards late in the third period with Tom

Smith getting the touchdown on a 19 yard scamper behind good blocking by the Mustang forwards. This was the only counter of the period and the final stanza started with the Mustangs holding a 46-0 lead and the fans heading home to the fire.

Porter got his third TD of the night with the patented run off left tackle and this time the distance covered was 37 yards. Adams again kicked the one pointer.

The Mustang second team got the final score with Mike Goad passing 23 yards to Frankie Rogers who outran the Pirate defensive halfback the final 10 yards. Adams kick was good but the Mustangs were penalized and his second attempt was

The contest will be played this Thursday at 2:00 and Arling Cordell, Wheeler Superintendent, said that Wheeler has been designated the visiting team and will be seated on the west side.

This will be the third year in a row for these two old rivals to meet for the bi-district crown. Matador has prevailed for the past two years and the Mustangs will be out for revenge.

This will be the second time that Wheeler has met Matador with a clean slate. Matador has a tie on their record when they met Jayton.

Matador has had a tough game with Wheeler the past two years. The score for the 1962 match at Clarendon was 14-6. When we met last year the score board showed 12 points for our side while Matador had 16 points in their favor.

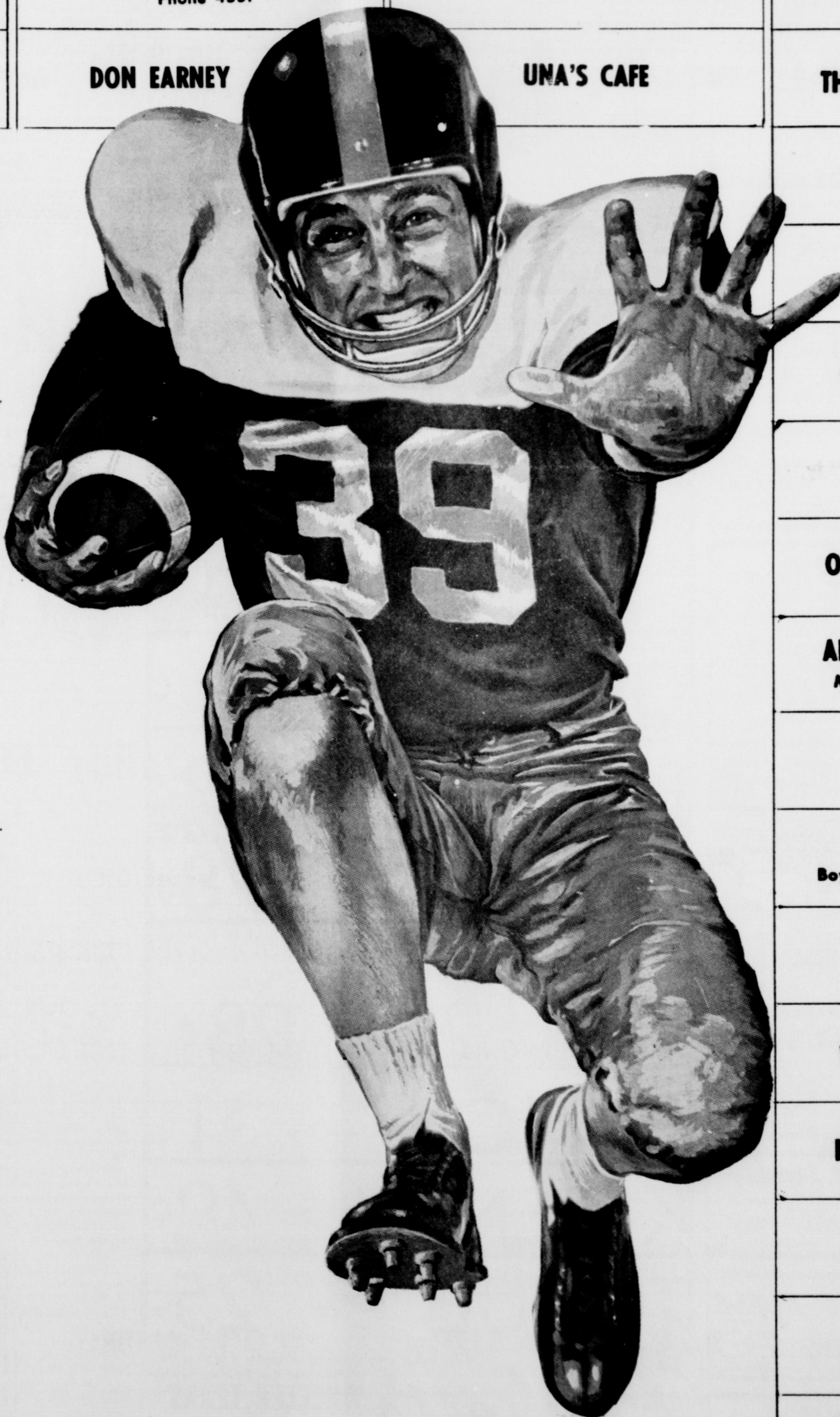

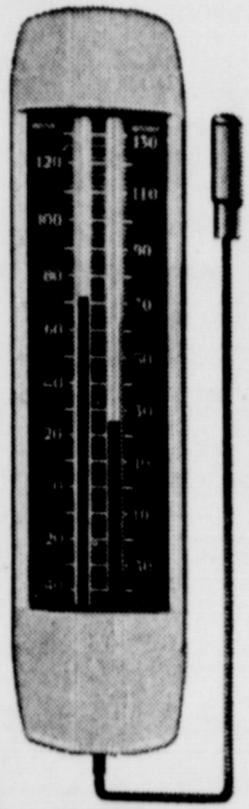

SCD NEWS

Melvin Hyman began construction of a diversion terrace on his place south of Lela.

Diversions are extra large terraces built to stop large concentrations of water. The terrace may be either built to hold the water or be graded so that the water will run slowly to a protected area.

Mr. Hyman's diversion is built above an eroded area to be reseeded to native grass. The diversion will furnish protection to the young seedlings until they become established.

Diversions are also constructed on cropland to protect a field below. A diversion is sometimes needed at the top of a regular terrace system. Broad base diversions may be built so that it can be farmed with four row equipment.

Each case is different and the SCS will work with any individual interested in controlling a water erosion problem. Soil conservation offices are located in the basement of the courthouse in Wheeler.

DAVIS SERVING IN EUROPE

Marine First Sergeant William I. Davis, son of Mrs. Claude D. Davis of 204 Canadian, Wheeler, Texas is visiting parents in the European area following participation in the largest amphibious combat training exercise in the Atlantic since World War II.

He is serving with the First Battalion, Sixth Regiment, Second Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

The operation, called "Steel Pike", featured U.S. and Spanish Marines landing from landing craft and helicopters of a combined U.S.

Spanish Fleet of 94 vessels which included ships of the U.S. Military Sea Transport Service and chartered ships of the U.S. Merchant Fleet.

The mock assault on the beaches of Southern Spain was staged by Marines of the Second Marine Division, Second Marine Aircraft Wing and Force Troops, Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, along with a battalion of Spanish Marines.

"Steel Pike" showed the ability of the U.S. and Allied amphibious forces to rapidly transport large numbers of troops and all their equipment, get them ashore and maintain them for as long as necessary. It also trained the forces of both countries in conducting joint operations.

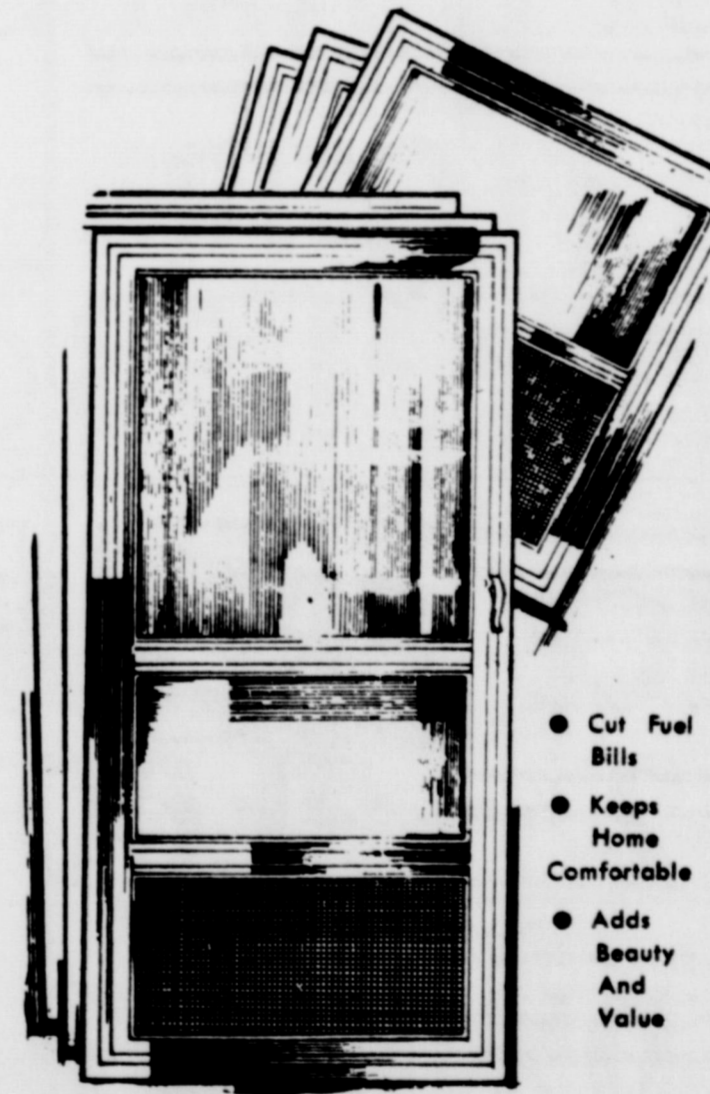
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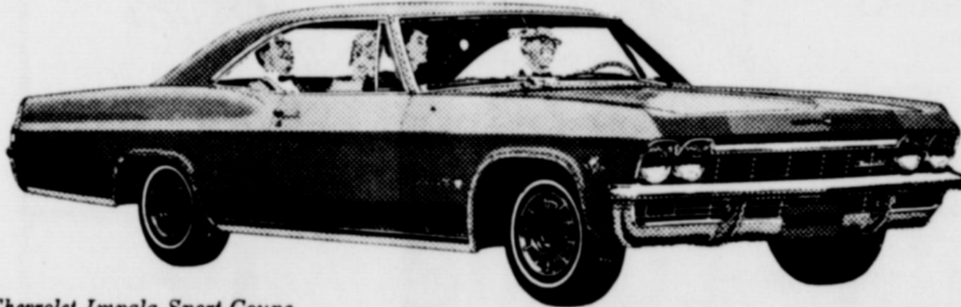

The optimum injection of the vaccine causes the same blood agglutination reaction as the natural infection. Originally the vaccine was used to immunize all female cattle regardless of age. It was discovered later that if used in young animals the vaccine titer could be consistently depended on to disappear by the time the animal was thirty months old and still provide an immunization barrier for brucella abortus. Receding titers have also been noticed in animals vaccinated over 12 months of age but as a rule take a longer time. If adults are vaccinated in herds that are infected or exposed and incubating and have a continuous potent exposure to challenge the vaccine, the titer generally remains for the life of the animal. Brucellosis vaccine is incapable of curing bovine brucellosis and it does not alter the course of disease when injected into infected animals.
Consequently when the eradication program appeared feasible it became necessary to eliminate all reactors regardless of whether or not they are vaccination reactors or natural infection reactors. At this point it became a must to set a specific age limit as to when breeding animals are to be immunized. It had already been demonstrated that it was desirable to accomplish this prior to the time the animal reaches sexual maturity and adult vaccination is no longer recommended or recognized. The response of individual animal to brucellosis vaccine may vary from no immunity to complete immunity. Vaccination does not guarantee that an animal will develop a serviceable immunity; however, approximately 65 to 75 per cent of the calfhood vaccinated animals have complete protection. Calfhood vaccination will reduce animals infection rate approximately 80 percent and herd infection rate approximately 20 percent in areas where a majority of the heifer calves are vaccinated.
As this eradication program has progressed, the tempo of brucellosis vaccination has substantially increased as a result of the requirements of various states for cattle moving in interstate commerce. In herds and areas where brucel-

losis is a problem and the producers are anxious to provide whatever immunization they can for a testing and slaughter program, vaccination has also increased.
At this particular stage of the eradication program, vaccination is extremely important in providing insurance in replacement cattle. Without immunization a herd would be positioned in a "powder keg" status should infection from the non-eradication areas be introduced into the clean areas.
Vaccination at this time is especially recommended and is an essential tool that must be used to accomplish brucellosis eradication.

The average daily gain for 139 bulls, all breeds is 3.51 pounds per day for 112 days.

Grady Harris, Mobeetie, Texas, has the top gaining pen of Angus thus far, the pen averaging 4.38 pounds per day. Carlton Corbin, Fittstown, has the runner-up with an average of 4.13 lbs. Murray Corbin, Tishomingo, had the third high pen with an average daily gain of 3.84 lbs. per day. M. C. Chaffin, Davis, Oklahoma has the fourth and fifth pens at 3.69 and 3.40 pounds.

The top gaining individual Angus is also a Grady Harris bull, gaining 4.73 pounds per day of the past 112 days. The second and third high individuals are Grady Harris bulls, with 4.60 pounds and 4.37 pounds. The next two high gainers are Carlton Corbin bulls, both at 4.24 pounds per day.

In this annual test there are 35 Angus bulls. Sale day for the bulls is December 12, they will be sold at the test site near Holdenville.

The ship provides dock landing facilities for assault craft during amphibious landings.

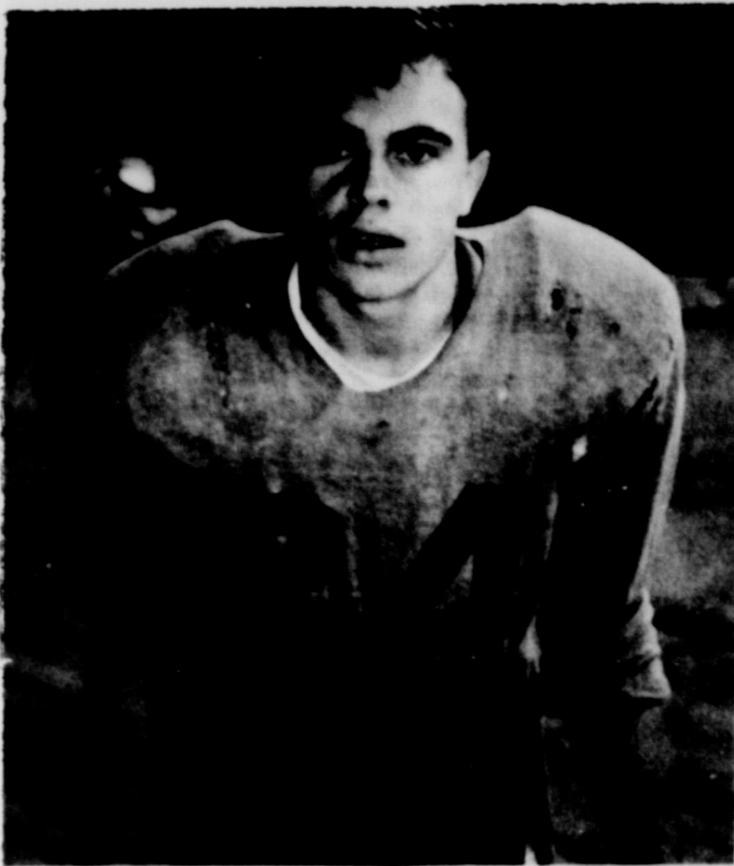
LARRY GARRISON

ARCHER ATTENDS SALES CONFERENCE

Nr. Emory L. Archer, Sayre Modern Woodmen of America District Manager for the Wheeler area, has returned from Dallas, Texas, where he joined nearly sixty other leading managers, and agents at a two-day regional sales conference of the legal reserve fraternal life insurance society. POSTMASTER PUSHES PLANNING

A little planning during the Thanksgiving Holiday can help avoid the "Christmas Rush", Postmaster Jamison said today.

The Wheeler postmaster has some tips which will not only put ZIP into Christmas mailing, but help local postal employees move the record-breaking mountain of mail that is expected this Christmas season.

1. Find last year's Christmas mailing list. If you don't find it, or didn't have one, make one up.
2. Check to see that all addresses are correct. The phone book is usually a good source for local addresses.
3. Wherever possible, add the ZIP Code to the addresses on the list. Because ZIP Codes speed your mail, always include the code for your area in return addresses. This is the best way to inform friends, relatives and business associates of the code number for your area.
4. Determine your list of gift purchases which must be mailed. Such planning allows you to shop early when selections are greatest and you can stock up on mailing materials in advance. Be sure to purchase enough material so that parcels will be packed securely.

The postmaster emphasized that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He also suggested that the address be written on only one side of the exterior wrapping and that a duplicate address be included inside the carton, in case the outer covering is not secure and comes off.

Mr. Jamison said that the Post Office Department in Washington is predicting that a record seven billion pieces of mail will move through the postal system during the peak rush just before Christmas.

"The cooperation of all mailers is vital for us to deliver each holiday card, letter and package before Christmas Day. A little planning will make the Christmas rush less hectic for everyone," he said.

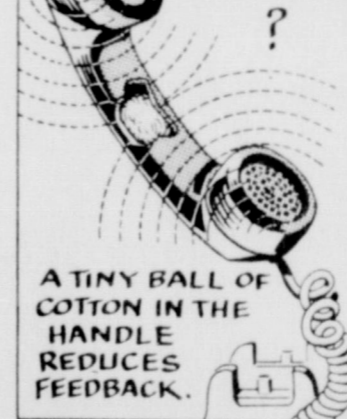

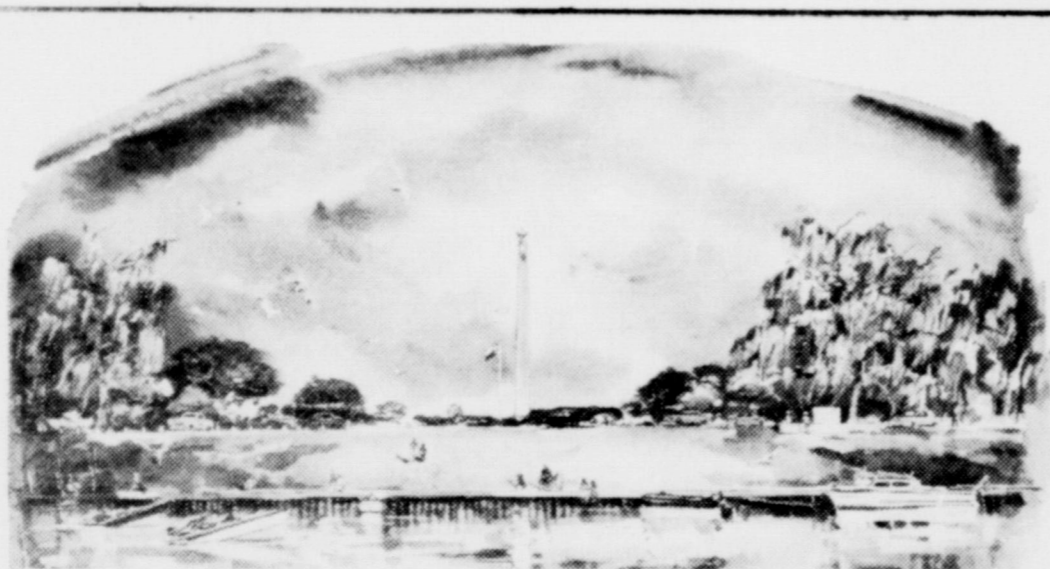
