7 BURGLARIES SOLVED WITH ARREST OF YOUTHS

A string of burglaries committed in Wheeler County during the last several months was broken last Saturday night in Pampa following a stabbing and robbery of a man near Pampa stated Sheriff Bus Dorman.

Being held in the Gray County jail under \$3,500 bond each on charges of felony burglary are C.J. Phelps, 22, of 216 Sunset Drive, Pampa and James Linden Keelin, 23 of 1037 Varnon Dr. Pampa. Also pending charges is Richard Keelin, 21 of Pampa, cousin of James L. Keelin.

Deputy Sheriff Doyle Ramsey related that Phelps and James L. Keelin were in a bar in Pampa about 9:00 p.m. Saturday when they met Allen H. Moser, 43 of Amarillo. After a few drinks they talked Moser into driving them to another bar to "meet some girls." Instead of going to the bar, the trio drove Moser to a secluded spot four miles northwest of town.

Ramsey said that Phelps told of dragging Moser out of the car and attempting to take his wallet. During the fight that followed, Phelps stabbed Moser in the throat with a pocket knife.

Phelps said he then took Moser's wallet containing \$25 to \$30. They then loaded the injured man back into the car and drove back to Pampa. Keelin told officers that Phelps got out of the car while he drove Moser to Highland General Hospital.

The authorities were then notified and Keelin was taken into custody. During questioning, Keelin related the stabbing incident and after lengthy interrogation began admitting the long string of burglaries.

The string of thefts in Wheeler, Gray and Hemphill Counties began in September when James L. broke into Vanpool-Burton Motor Company. The firm was broken into three times by James L. Keelin - on September 24, 1964, October 1, 1964 and December 13, 1964.

Richard Keelin is charged with breaking into the Motor Company on October 1, 1964. During these break-ins some pistols and quite a lot of money was taken. The pistols have been recovered.

The Frank Cocke residence was robbed on two different occasions; on Nov. 10, 1964 by James L. and on Jan. 15, 1965 by James L. and Phelps. Taken from this residence were several pair of boots, a radio, rifle, pistol, \$25.00 change, T.V., 2 electric razors and several other small articles. Most of the merchandise has been recovered except 2 pair of boots and the rifle.

James L. Keelin also broke into the Briscoe School Lunch room and stole about 50 lbs. of packaged meat.

The pair related entering the John Bowers residence in Pampa where three saddles were stolen along with a set of silverware. The saddles were valued at \$500. The men told the officers they took the saddles to the dump grounds and burned them. They said they buried the silverware,

however it has not been located.

They admitted entering two homes in Pampa and taking several guns and a vacuum cleaner. They also told of taking an electric battery charger from the Joe Taylor Used Car Lot.

They will also be charged in Hemphill County with the burglary of a building owned by LaFoy Vise.

Officers are continuing their interrogation of the men and said they expect several more break-ins to be solved.

In all, the trio admitted over 15 different burglaries amounting to over \$10,000.

Phelps is on probation from Gray County on charges of theft. Neither of the Keelins had a previous record.

Officers are busy trying to locate the endless list of stolen items the men had hidden over the three counties.

They told officers that after stealing the items they would drive to the country and hide them. They said they had no special hiding place and would

The grandsons served as pall bearers for the funeral. Mrs. Pannell is survived by two daughters, Mrs. R.A. Sims and Mrs. Johnnie Newman of Mobeetie, two sons, Eddie Pannell of Skellytown and W.L. Pannell of Ft. Worth, two brothers, Jeff Dysart of Sallisaw, Okla. and Will Dysart of Arizona; twenty grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband, three daughters, one son, three sisters and three brothers.

Interment was in the Wheeler Cemetery under direction of Wright-Denson Funeral Home.

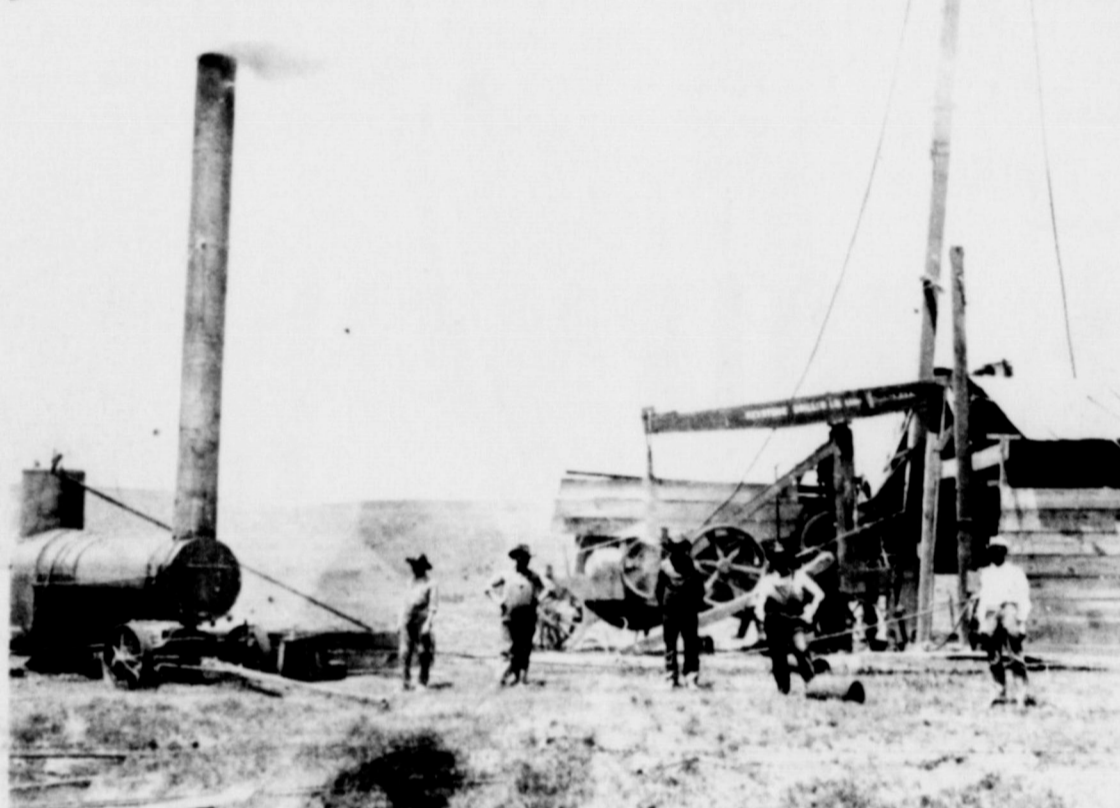

WHEELCO INC. CHARTERED, HOME OFFICE IN WHEELER

A Charter was issued by the State of Texas on January 11, 1965 to Wheelco, Inc. with the home office in Wheeler, Texas. The original stockholders and organizational meeting of Wheelco, Inc. was held in Wheeler in the Don Earney Building Friday, Feb. 5.

The new organization with a working capital of one-half million dollars will buy and sell oil and gas leases, buy and sell royalty and minerals; promote and drill oil and gas wells.

Officers and directors were elected at the meeting Friday. Heading the new organization will be Don Earney, president and manager. G. C. (Chief) Barton will serve as vice-president, with Harry Wofford acting as secretary-treasurer. Directors will be E.R. Sidwell, Pete Burton, Bill Davis, Spencer Sitter and Jack Huttleston.

Don Earney has been a resident of Wheeler since 1958, at which time he owned the Wheeler Times. He has been interested in the Anadarko Basin and Panhandle field for the past five years.

Mr. Barton recently resigned as district landman with Sinclair Oil and Gas Corp. to join Don Earney in Wheeler. He and his wife now live in Wheeler.

Harry Wofford who is the County Clerk for Wheeler County has been a resident in Wheeler County since 1909. He came to Wheeler in 1920 and stayed until 1923. FARM BUREAU MEMBERSHIP WEEK

The week of Feb. 8-13 has been officially designated "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Wheeler County. The local county farm organization will have a special enrollment drive underway as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas to 100,000 by Oct. 31.

An official proclamation signed by County Judge G.W. Hefley called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wheeler County Farm Bureau."

Earlier Gov. John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Membership Week in Texas." The statewide drive is to be launched with big area rallies Feb. 2 in San Antonio and Feb. 4 in Lubbock and Dallas.

Coy Revis of Wheeler Co. is chairman of the local county Farm Bureau Membership Committee. Other volunteers will be working on the drive.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed "as a member and a leader" by the Farm Bureau.

"Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment in capital, time, and labor," he declared.

Dr. Dixon Hubbard, area livestock specialist for Texas agricultural extension

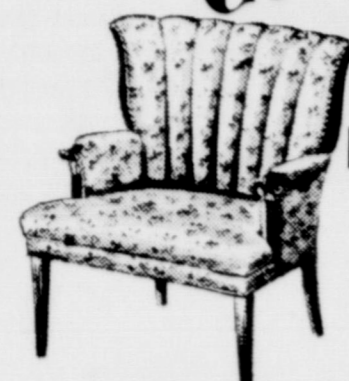

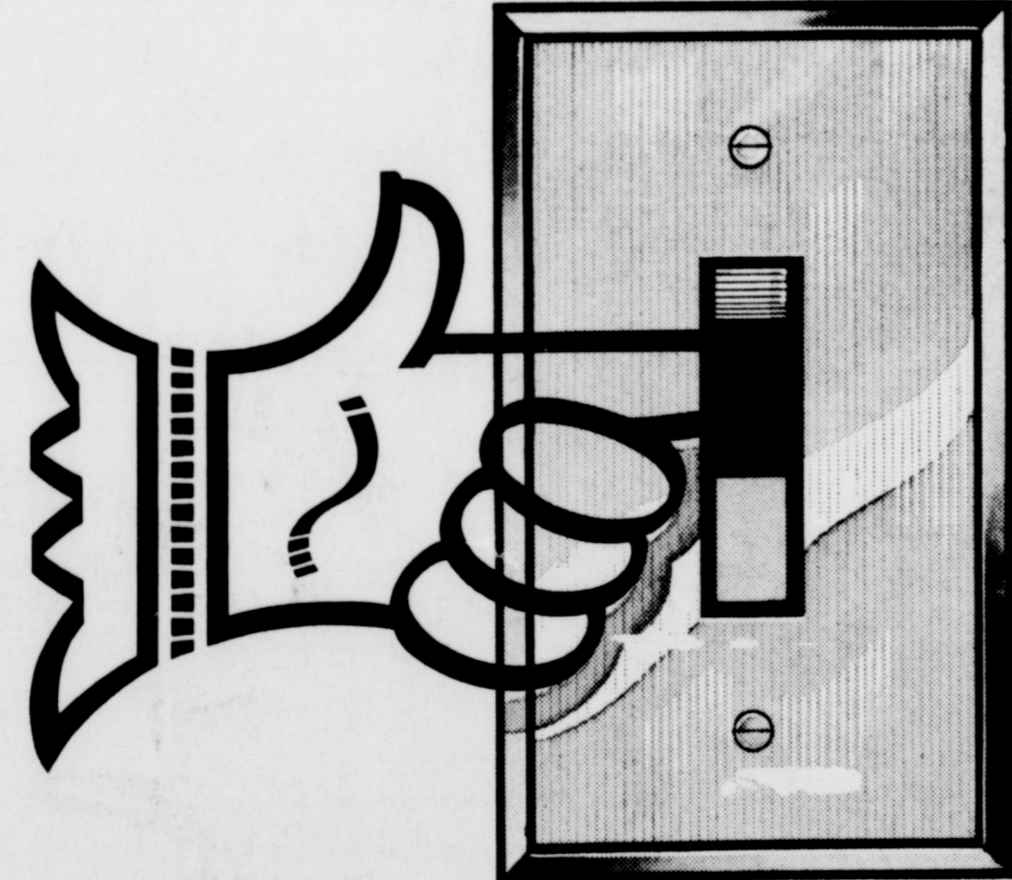

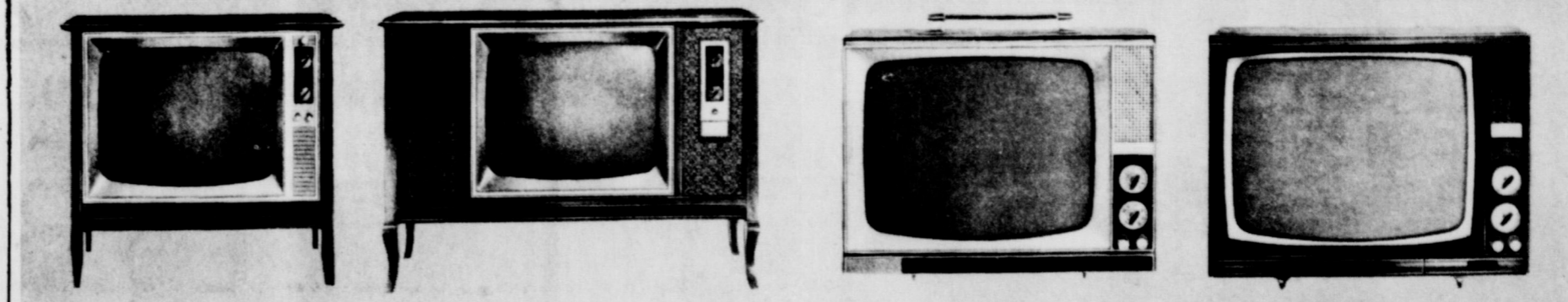
