## WHEELER SCHOOL NEWS

Each school district in Texas determines its school plant needs and what its financial resources are since classrooms are locally planned and locally financed. Local boards and administrators have met the problem of providing school housing for the expanding enrollment and have remodelled old buildings and constructed new modern plants with the facilities necessary to serve them.

There is a definite trend toward air conditioned buildings and at least four school districts are building compact windowless climate-controlled buildings.

Better use has been made of some classrooms by division into two or three units so constructed that the group can be handled by one teacher. This has been used most extensively in a group of schools participating in the Texas Small Schools Project. These schools with limited enrollments are experimenting with a wider offering of courses and students are making use of electronic equipment in studying modern foreign languages, English, Mathematics or other courses for which special material is available.

These and other facilities do not replace teachers nor necessarily lessen the teaching load but it is believed that a judicious use of the new equipment frees the teacher for more personalized work with each pupil while at the same time permitting them to proceed in work at a pace suited to their individual abilities, slow, average, or superior.

To evaluate the new instructional aids accurately and intelligently parents

and school personnel need to become familiar with what is being used and how. Administrators and teachers are available during school visitation periods to explain new teaching techniques and the new developments in teaching aids.

Questions for Consideration

1. Is good use being made of visual aid, maps, charts, models and other supplies needed for pupils to do effective work?

2. Have teachers in the school had the opportunity to view any of the teaching demonstrations now being presented over the State?

3. What consideration has been given to the use of new electronic aids to teaching in your schools?

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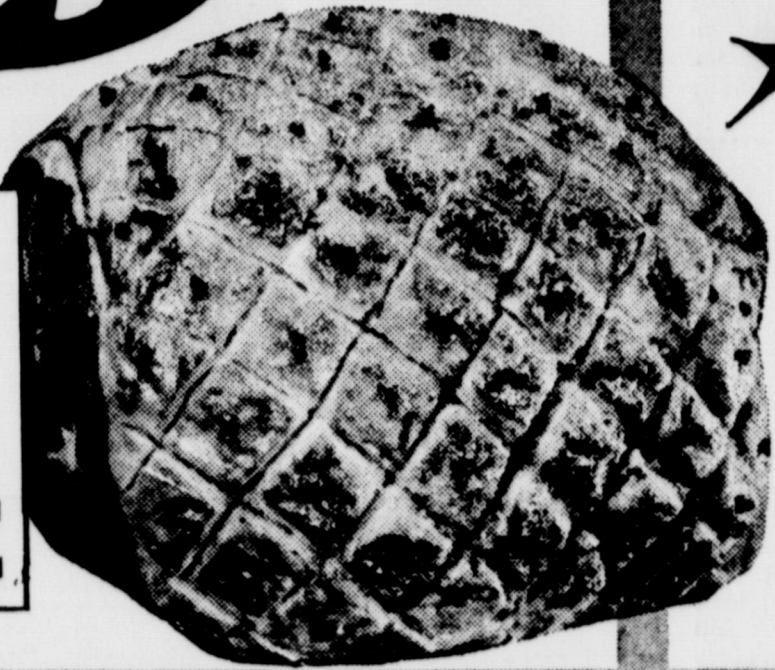

A new loan program recently announced by the Farmers Home Administration, is designed to help rural families finance enterprises that will improve their income.

The FHA County Supervisor, John L. Manning, has informed the County Agents office that the new loans are a part of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. The can provide up to \$2,500 for up to 15 years at 4 1/8 percent interest rate. Rural residents can get the loans on the basis of their ability and character.

According to John Manning, the loans are for people who know a good way to increase their income, but who cannot readily get financing through regular credit channels.

Farmers can borrow for improvements, land, equipment, livestock, machinery, buildings or other items that will add to their income from farming.

Non-farm rural residents can use the same plan to finance a small business, trade or service. This includes loans to set-up such things as small repair shops.

Another provision of the new FHA program provides loans to establish cooperatives for processing, marketing and other services of benefit to farmers.

Anyone interested in additional information about the new loans should contact their county FHA supervisor, located at Wheeler, or the county agricultural agent.

**Weed Control Conference**  
A weed control conference sponsored by the Texas Weed Control Association, Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, and Texas A & M University will be held in the commercial exhibits building on the tri-state fair grounds on March 4, 1965. Anyone interested in weed control of any type should mark this date on the calendar because a very informative and educational program is planned. The program will begin at 9:00 A.M.

Flame cultivation will be discussed by Bedford Forrest of the High Plains Research Foundation.

The use of Caprol 80 W Dacthal, DSMA and MSMA Herban, Karmex DL and DW and Treflan in controlling weed in cotton, soybean, and castorbeans will be discussed by representatives of these various companies. The use of 2,4-D, Dacamine, Propazine and Siazine and Herban will be presented in 15 minute sessions by representatives of industry. Sam Fine, of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration of Dallas, will present a program of pesticide residue. Dr. A.F. Wiese, agronomist, Texas A&M University, Bushland will discuss bindweed and other perennial weeds.

A dutch treat lunch will be served at noon at the fairgrounds and the program should be completed by 2:30 p.m. Anyone desiring a copy of the program may obtain one at the County Agents office.
