BRONCOETTES WIN REGIONAL-STATE NEXT

The Briscoe community and surrounding towns are speechless with joy & pride that their own Briscoe Broncoettes have won the Regional 1-B Championship.

They were rated at the bottom of the list but came forward game by game to the top.

The Broncoettes played Benjamin for the first game. They started with a lead and led all the way. Part of the time by a narrow margin. Briscoe owned a slim 21-20 edge over them with 1:02 left in the third quarter but Micky and Dianne sank 10 straight points to lead 31-20 with 5 minutes left in the fourth quarter. Benjamin rallied with the next seven points but could come no closer than 6 points of Briscoe in the waning moments.

Micky made 23 points, Diane 1 and Lou 7 for the final score of 35 to 29.

Their second game was against highly rated Vega. They leaped out in the first quarter to a 20-7 lead, but Vega came back in the second quarter to narrow the margin to a 27-22 score. At the end of the third quarter the score stood 32-28 and at the close of the fourth quarter 43-36.

Micky scored 31 points and Dianne 12.

The final game of the tournament was played against Sundown. A 39 point spree by Micky Fulks plus a superb rebounding job by Dianne Dodd the wonderful teamwork of our other players and the coaching of Don Johnson caused an eclipse of Sundown's title.

It was the girls 32nd win in 36 games.

Briscoe jumped ahead to stay ahead in the first quarter.

Briscoe was riding tall with a 34-23 lead in the third quarter but Sundown made 9 points in the next few minutes.

Briscoe made the next 5 points and Sundown pulled up to a 44-42 margin. Micky was fouled in the last 12 seconds. She made both points & ended the game with a 4 point lead.

Briscoe placed 3 on the regional team: Micky Fulks, Dianne Dodd and Patty Hall. Micky was the tournaments leading scorer with 39 points. She tied the individual high score record in one game and also individual high scorer in Championship game. She broke the record of free throws in one game with 21 out of 23.

Smiles and tears were seen on the faces of everyone including players and fans. Allison and Wheeler sent telegrams that were deeply appreciated.

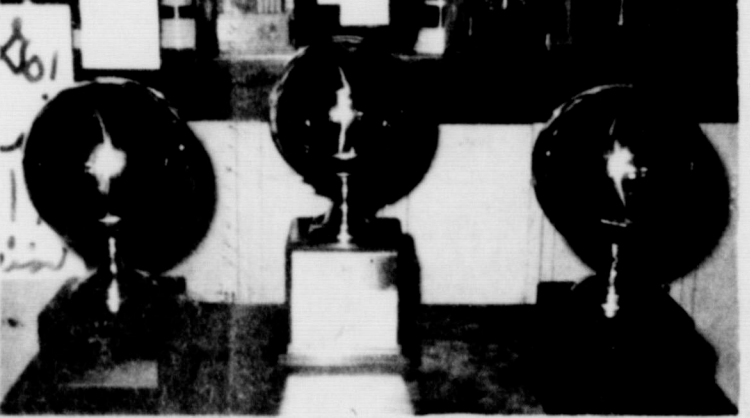
Pipeline Surveys Mobeetie Wells

The male Irishmen of Shamrock are wearing high-top green hats and jeweled green ties and many of them are sporting attractive (?) chin whiskers in an all out effort to call attention to the March 17 party. Members of the community's fairer sex are taking care of their share of the publicity chores by wearing green and white costumes decorated with eye-catching "ERIN Go Bragh" buttons.

Wheeler Gr. Jury Indicts Nine

Grand jurors meeting yesterday in Wheeler returned a total of nine indictments.

Six indictments were returned against James Keelin of Pampa on burglary charges. Of the six one indictment named C. J. Phelps and one named Richard Keelin as aiding James Keelin.

In other action by the grand jury, Newt Ashley Jr., Franklin Ashley, Willi Odom, Davis R. Loyd and Frankie D. Murray, all of Sayre, Okla., were indicted for the Dec. 12 burglary of the Williams building in Wheeler.

In other indictments Dwayne Watson of Shamrock was true billed on charges of swindling with worthless checks and J. B. Ferris on charges of car theft.

Following actions by the grand jury, seven persons were sentenced by District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich.

Newt and Franklin Ashley were sentenced to five year prison terms each in connection with the Wheeler burglary. Willie Odom was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for the same offense.

Charles R. Geron who was indicted by an earlier term of the grand jury, was sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary on each of two counts of burglary and seven years on a car theft charge.

The resulting explosion burned Steven Rays face and ears and burned Terry Don on the face. The boys were admitted to Shamrock hospital Saturday and were released Sunday morning.

Terry Don returned to school Tuesday but Steven is still recuperating at home. The room appeared to have been scorched by the fire but did not catch fire.

SURVEYING STARTED ON "BIG DAM" PROJECT

A survey party began staking the "Big Dam" which will stretch 12,00 feet and hold 60,000 acre feet of water.

The dam site is located 8 miles east of Wheeler on Sweetwater Creek on the Tom Puryear ranch. The dam will back water 6 miles and cover some of the best farm land in Wheeler County.

This state project was fought by the farmers and ranchers thru the Civil Court of Appeals, where the farmers and ranchers lost their fight. The State Supreme Court could not find anything which would reverse the decision of the Court of Appeals. The water would cover 6,000 acres of land with the average depth of 10 feet. In addition to covering up the choicest farm land many homes will be put under water. The dam is being built by the Texas Red River Authority as a future reservoir for the surrounding towns.

Total cost will run from 6 to 12 million dollars.

If Dick does not have a beautiful yard it will be no fault of his. He has the enthusiasm, know-how and the will to work.

The best known way of making a reality out of an intention is to set up some plan of accomplishment. This is encouraged by the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District for the application of conservation practices. A conservation plan of operations is the heart of a soil conservation district agreement document.

There have been 658 such plans of operations prepared by farmers and ranchers in the district. There have been 161 of these plans of operation tied to a Great Plains Conservation program contract. This contract provides cost share assistance of 80 percent of the cost of applying some permanent practices to permit the application of a complete conservation plan.

Recent farmers ranchers who have developed Great Plains contracts in the district are: Mrs. Florence Burgess- who plans to build terraces and division fences. She will also apply conservation cropping system of high residue crops such as wheat and manage stubble for erosion control. Mr. J. T. Richardson who will seed native grass. He will also defer this grass to permit establishment and manage the grazing of the grass to get maximum benefit for 60th erosion Control and Forage Production.

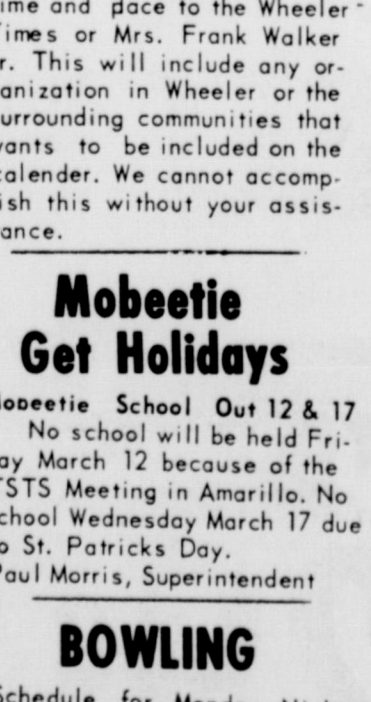

New Bulletin Explains Modernization of Farm Leases

Through the production side of agriculture has made great progress in recent years farm leases have changed little since such arrangements were first made.

Examination of these leases to determine if they still fit the needs of a changing agricultural economy, is the purpose of a publication of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. MP-677, Adopting Leases for Successful Farming, explains that a lease is a legal agreement where by both the tenant and the landlord can employ their resources for a fair return.

A lease is also like credit and can serve as a modified type of farm transfer. To fulfill the purpose of a lease two requirements are important. First, income from products must be divided into portions equal to each parties contributions to the production, harvest and sales process. And second, farm efficiency should be promoted by the provisions of the lease.

Since young farmers can not reasonably expect to obtain enough capital to set up an economical size farm unit, the lease is a means for him to stay in farming. With the price for farm machinery up 38 percent during the period from 1949-1959, and the price of farm real estate up 52 percent, young farmers face a real barrier to their ownership of farms.

The publication points out ways that farm leases can be improved. It reminds that even with a strict outline to follow, such as the one it suggests, there is still room for bargaining between the parties in a lease to make it acceptable to them.

CO. AGENT REPORTS

Plain Research Center 25 Bushland will present a program on weed control concerning all crops in our area. The latest information on weed control will be presented. Dr. Weise is considered to be the top weed authority in the United States.

Refreshments will be furnished by the Shamrock and Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. We hope that every farmer will be able to attend these two very important meetings.

Don't take chances on losing a stand to soil and seed-borne disease organisms.

Chemical seed treatment is inexpensive and effective and the recommended chemicals are safe and easy to use.

The chemical forms a protective coating around the seed and protects it from micro-organism growth during the period of germination. However, seed treatment will not control damping off after the seedling grows out of the treated zone. Damping off organisms develop most rapidly when weather conditions are unfavorable and causes growers to associate damping off of seedling with cold weather.

Most commercially purchased planting seed will be treated and this will be noted on the container tag. Growers who save their own planting seed can purchase seed treatment chemicals at most agricultural supply houses.

If seed are treated on the farm, the important thing is to get a uniform covering of the protective fungicide over the seed coat. This can be done with a homemade device which will tumble the seed and mix the fungicide thoroughly with the seed being treated.

It is very important that the proper dosage is used. Lower than recommended dosage may cause the treatment to be ineffective while excessive rates may damage the seed. Some diseases are borne inside the seed, and these must be treated by different methods.

The Texas Guide for controlling Cotton Insects, L-217 has been revised to include the results of containing research conducted throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Entomology Research Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Copies are now available at the county agents office and I would like to urge all county cotton producers to pick up a copy at your convenience.

The development of resistance to insecticides, deposit of harmful residues in the soil or on neighboring crops and destruction of beneficial insect parasites and predators dictate the judicious use of insecticides. If possible their use should be restricted to actual need based on inspections.

The guide, in addition to listing the recommended control measures, points out many other important factors involved in the overall problems in controlling cotton insect and the safe use of insecticides.

All insecticides are poisonous and I would like to emphasize the need for using them in strict accordance with the manufacturers labeled instructions.

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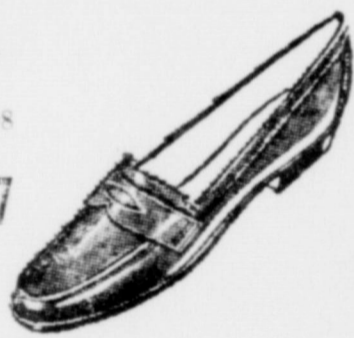
