UPCOMING ELECTIONS

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION SET FOR SATURDAY, APRIL

School Trustee elections will be held Saturday, April 3. Two have filed for the one position of county at large.

For the county at large Max Wileys term has expired and he and E Bryan Range Jr have filed for the position.

Others who have filed for County trustee are Austin Caldwell, precinct 1 and James Reneau, precinct 3. Wheeler has three filings for the two openings on the Wheeler school board. Joe R Weatherly Arnold T Jones and J M Montgomery are listed on the Wheeler independent school ballots.

The only other contested race is for the two positions open in the Briscoe board. Listed on the ballot are Roy Meadows, Thurman Horn, B F Meadows Jr. and Z G Francis.

Listed on the Allison ballot are Clifton Boydston and Carl Giddens.

Running for position on the Mobeetie school board is Melvin May.

Kenneth Killingsworth and W V Lister have filed for positions on the Kelton board.

The county trustees are Max Wiley, Sol Blonstein, James Reneau and Tom Britt.

These elections are important. The men elected to these posts are the ones who will be spending our

school tax dollars. Mark Saturday April 3 on your calendar and vote for the person you feel is best qualified for this position.

JOIN-UP JOIN-IN

Wheeler's Red Cross Fund Drive will be kicked off with a march by the young people who have benefited from Water Safety program which has been sponsored by the Red Cross. The drive will be on April 5 from 9 to 10 a.m. 50% of the drive funds gathered remain in the county.

March is Red Cross month; but due to conflicting duties in track, interscholastic league and others the drive has been postponed until this date. Roberta Adams, funds drive chairman and water safety chairman will be in charge of the drive.

3 Councilmen Terms Expire

The City Council Election is set for April 6 with absentee voting to end April 2.

Three positions will be vacated on April 30, 1965. Two men have filed for councilman with a write-in required to fill the third post. Retiring are Harold Nash, C O Martin and J C Holcomb. Nash and Martin have both filed for re-election.

The election for three two year terms will be held in the county courtroom in Wheeler county courthouse from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. A B Crump will serve as election judge. A qualified voter is: A legal voter of Wheeler County, Texas and has lived within the city limits of Wheeler, Texas six months preceding the city election.

Any qualified voter is eligible to fill the post and may be written in on the ballot.

Obituary

Death claimed the life of Ruby Annette Hunter a 53 year old resident of Wheeler on March 23, 1965 in Pampa, Texas.

Mrs. Hunter had been seriously ill for several months, but had been at home with her family until the final three weeks of her life.

She resided with her husband and two youngest sons on their farm 8 miles northeast of Wheeler. She is the mother of four sons.

Mrs. Hunter was born in Oklahoma on December 31, 1911. Her parents were Frank Purvis and Ruby Annette Smith Purvis. She was married to Hoy Hunter on December 24, 1931 at Sayre, Okla. The couple moved to Wheeler from Crawford, Okla. in 1952.

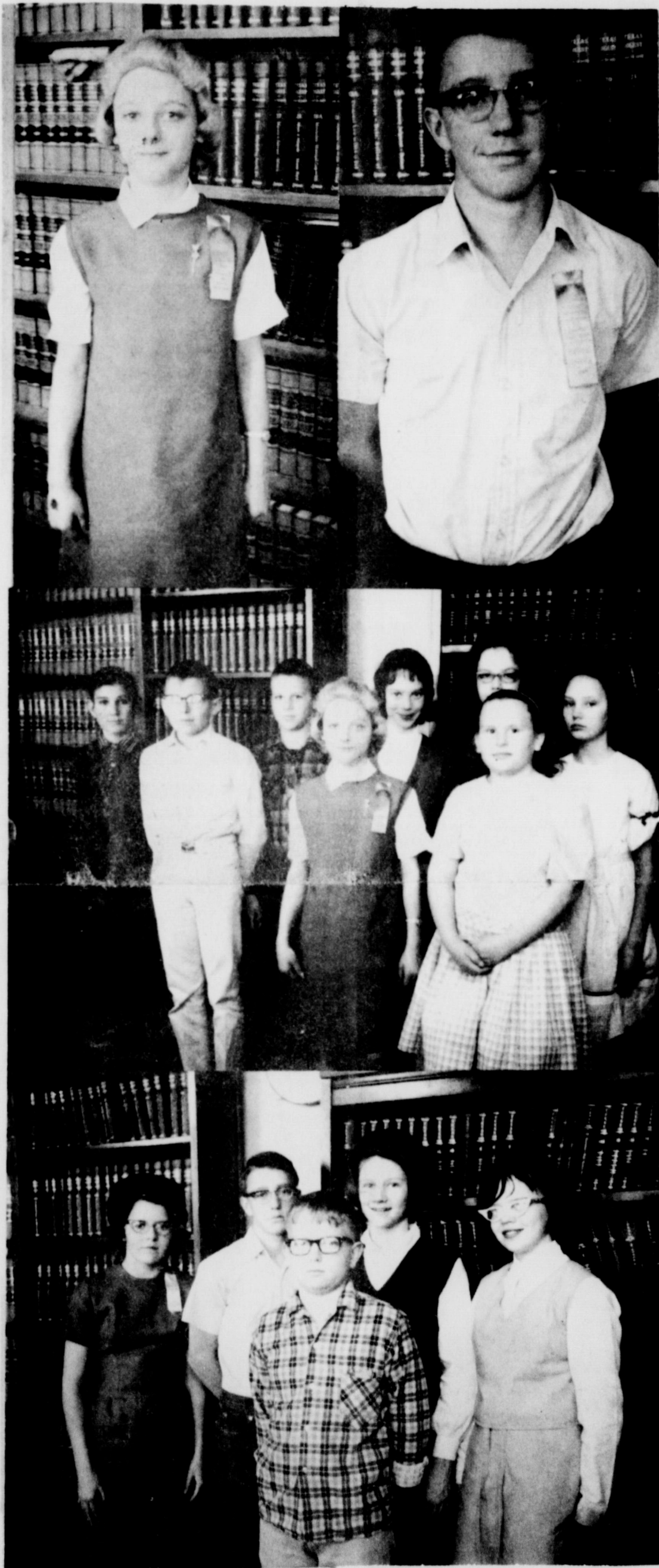
Seventyone Merchants will select the merchandise they wish to show and the models to display the merchandise, products and services.

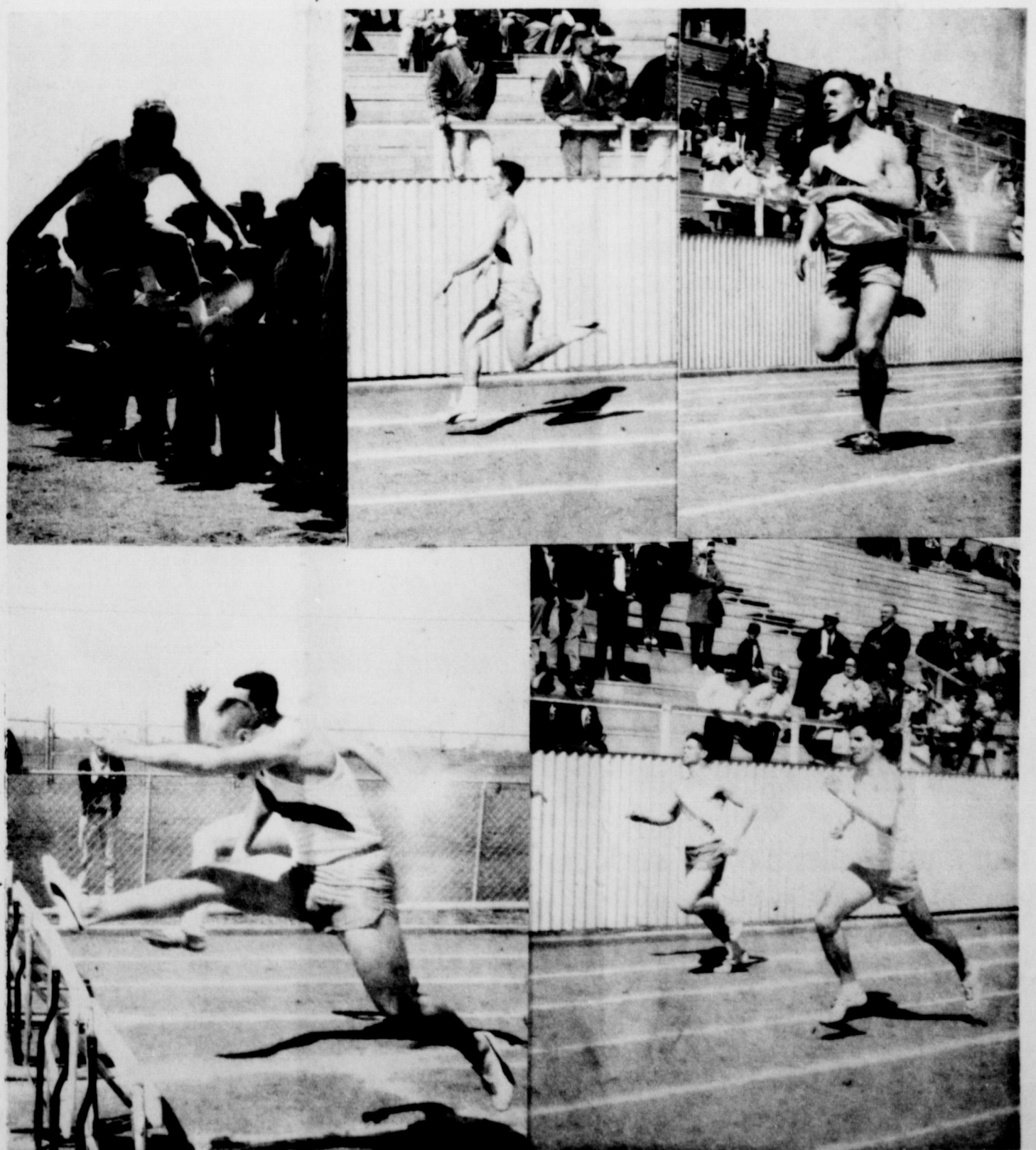
BRISCOE COMMUNITY HONORS BASKET BALL PLAYERS & COACH

Co. Agents News

Many questions have been received lately concerning Guar a new crop introduced to our area this year since the County Guar meeting was held recently. 35 interested farmers attended this meeting and several farmers have indicated that they plan to grow the crop this year.

Guar is a warm weather crop requiring much the same growing conditions as cotton. Varieties grown require 125 to 175 days to mature a crop of seed. Guar will stand long periods of drought and will simply rests when the soil is dry. It will spring into growth with a maximum of hot summer weather for harvesting. It is a soil improving legume.

While Guar will grow on a wide range of soils, it does best on a medium of light sandy loam soil. Production of both beans and forage is greater on light soils. However, production on heavy soils can be improved with successive planting and irrigation.

Guar may be planted on cotton allotment retirement acres and a farmer will receive full government payment on those unplanted acres. On feed grain diverted acres it may be planted and harvested with the farmer receiving 50% of the government payment for those diverted acres. If a farmer decided not to harvest the crop, he should file an intent not to harvest the crop with the ASCS office by August 1 and he would then be eligible to receive 100% of the payment for the feed grain diverted acres.

Richardson grain in Wheeler will be the local buyer for the seed for Stein Hall & Inc and for General Mills. Planting seed may be purchased through the concern for \$6 per hundred for uncertified and \$10 per hundred for certified. This is Mr. Richardson cost on the seed and he will haul the seed free if orders are placed with him immediately.

Selling price for the beans in 1964 was \$3.90 per hundred for no. 1 grade. The outlook for the future market is favorable.

The meal from guar beans is used in feed and the gum is used in the paper industry dairy industry, pharmaceutical industry oil and textile industry.

Feel free to contact the county extension office if

anyone has any specific question concerning this crop. Don't Guess! Soil Test!

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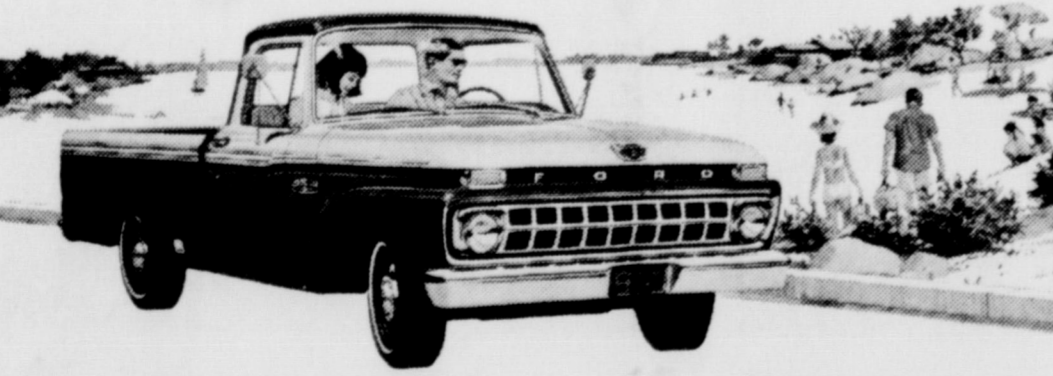
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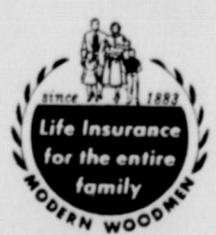

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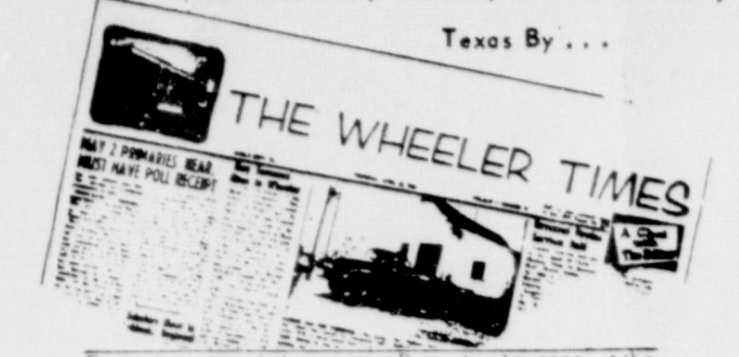

Experts say that towns of less than 2,000 population are doomed to die slow deaths. That each year these towns lose from 2 to 10 percent of their population. That business establishments become fewer and fewer with the passing years. Schools lose students until finally school districts are absorbed by larger and more progressive districts.

Dr. James Conant, authority on schools says that a first class high school should have a graduating class of 100 each year. This would require a population of about 7,000. Towns smaller than this should seek to consolidate with outlying districts and to make the tax load less for school tax payers.

Once a small town begins to slide downhill it soon gathers momentum. This is caused by the fact that it is the young who leave and many of the older folks think the old school is good enough, besides it might raise taxes if a new school was built. They think the same way concerning civic projects, street lighting, sewers and any other undertaking that threatens to cause a raise in taxes.

It really is no mystery why small towns are doomed, especially when one realizes that 60 to 70 percent of the votes in such towns are cast by people who vote yes or no by simply asking themselves whether or not a proposition would raise taxes.

All this is what the experts say. And it is a reasonable and logical explanation of a situation that has long puzzled us.

It is comparable to the explanation of why the rich get richer and the poor get poorer. Both answers, we must admit are probably correct in most instances. But we know that such answers are generalities and may be far from correct in specific situations. Or if they do apply it is entirely possible to reverse the adverse situation. Diagnosis is sometimes

90 percent of solving a problem. That is, if enough people want to correct a bad situation.

Fact is, and we need to fully recognize it, we are on the downhill slide. We will go downhill faster and faster with the passing years, unless we fully recognize the danger and make a determined and prolonged effort to correct it.

It will be a sad day indeed when there are no longer small towns in America. Sad because the small towns represent peace and virtue and true friendship. These small towns have long produced the most honest, sincere, patriotic, high-principled, real God fearing men and women who have made America the greatest nation on earth. What will America be without them?

What will it take to reverse our downhill slide?

It takes stores with a large and attractive selection. It takes good and modern schools. It takes reasonable medical services and most important of all it takes jobs. Not just any kind of job, but jobs with a future and a challenge so our high school graduates will stick around to become our leaders tomorrow.

If we are to have these things we must make personal sacrifices. We must develop a whole hearted devotion to our town, its problems and the solution of them.

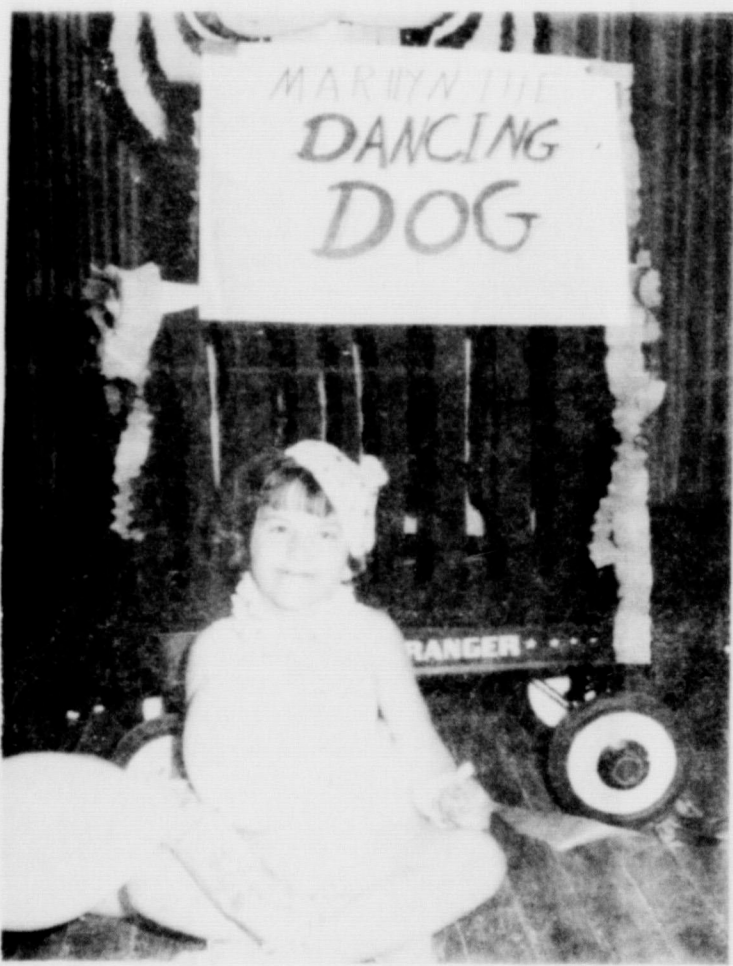

School News

May 1 take a few minutes of your reading time in order to explain some vitally important ending legislation now before our State Legislature? There are two proposed bills concerning teacher salaries:

1. The Governors Bill (Senate Bill 446- House Bill 124).
1. Increases salaries an average of \$113 per teacher for 1965-66.
2. Forces local districts to pay 20% of cost of textbooks for the first time.
3. Forces local districts to pay 20% of the cost of matching funds for teacher retirement for the first time.
4. Abolishes State Ad Valorem tax by 1972. This involves over \$34 million per year for school funds which would have to be raised in some other way.
5. The local district would have to pay 70% of the cost of the Governors program while only receiving 30% of the cost from the state.

(2) Our Bill sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association, The Texas Congress of Parent and Teachers and a large number of legislators. (House Bill 5-Senate Bill 4)

1. Simply raises each teachers salary \$45 per month for 1965-66. This would be paid 80% by the state and 20% by the local district. The same ratio that has been in effect for the past 15 years.

The greatest danger to the local district if the Governors bill passes would be that the personal property owners-the only source for local revenue, while there are many sources from which the State could raise the extra money needed for our bill such as 1c tax on each bottle of beer, or a 2c tax on each package of cigarettes.

Now is the time to do your best for your schools by writing members of the legislature (Mr. Grainger McIlhenny, our representative and Mr. Grady Hazelwood, our senator) what your opinion is on these bills. Do this now-not later than April 15 since these bills will probably be considered by May 1.
