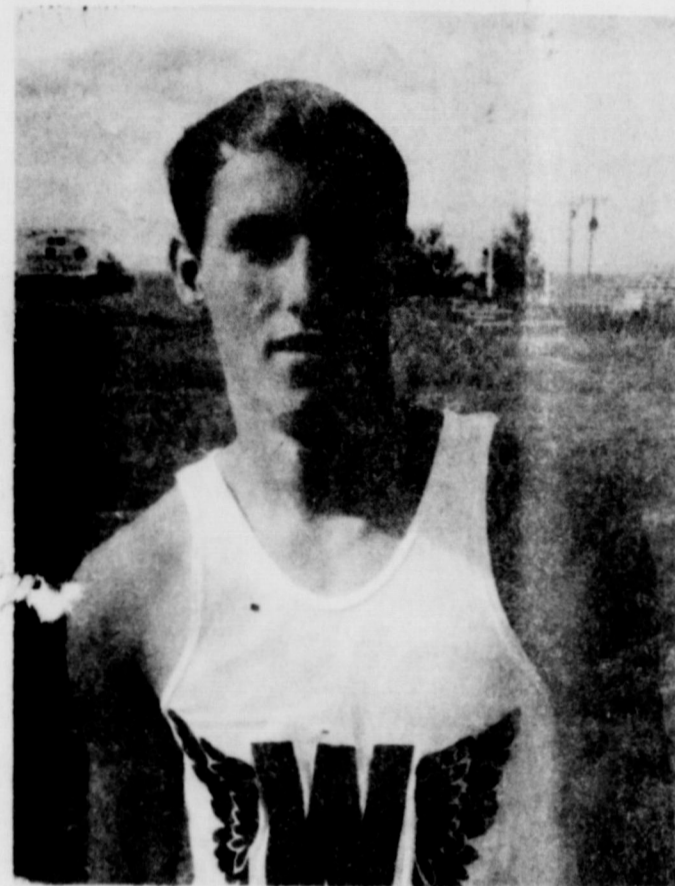

## STUDENTS TO COMPETE AT STATE IN LITERARY AND TRACK EVENTS

Wheeler schools will be sending four students to state for the literary and track meets which are scheduled for May 7-8. Those

going to state will be Mike Holt, John and Linda Moore in literary contests and Tom Smith in track. These four students won the right to

represent Wheeler schools at the regional contests which were held April 23-24. Punk Childress a member of the Allison track team

will be entering the track meet at state. Punk came in first in the 100 yd dash at the regional meet. At the state meet, Tom Smith will be entered in two track events. They are the broadjump and the 880 yd dash. Tom came in second at regional in broadjumping with a distance of 21'-9 1/2". The first place winner jumped 22'6". Tom's best jump is 22'6". He ran

the 800 with a time of 2:03.5 to place second at the meet. His best time is 2:03.5. Mr. and Mrs. Spud Moore are the proud parents of two of the regional winners, Linda and John Moore. Linda is a speech student of Mrs. Richard Brown. She competed against 11 other district winners to come in first in prose reading. John is in his first year of typing at Wheeler high school. He

was competing against 23 district winners in 2-five minute timed writings. John got 48 words per minute with no errors to place first at the meet. Mrs. Harvey Davis is the typing instructor. Mike Holt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R J Holt Jr.

He entered the Prose reading contest and placed first. Mrs. Paula Britt since March in preparation for the contest. Mike was in competition with 11 other students at the meet. Of the nine students going to state from Wheeler all entered the finals but none of the others placed. Kelton's Penny Puryear placed third at regional in

The North Wheeler county hospital board has announced that the Parkview hospital located in Wheeler, Texas will officially be opened May 9, 1965. The hospital is comprised of 15 patient rooms with beds to accommodate 20 persons. The latest modern equipment has been used to furnish the operating room, laboratory and a nursery with an explosion-proof incubator.

A highly qualified staff of trained personnel consists of the following: Mrs. Cecil Snelgroos R.N. She will also serve as hospital administrator and supervisor of the personnel: Mrs. Florence White R.N. of Wheeler; Mrs. Kathy Williams LVN of Wheeler; Mrs. Lorna Mayfield P.N. of Lela; Mrs.

Verna Bell Markham of Wheeler P.N.; Mrs. Leo Lamb P.N. of Wheeler; Mrs. Gene Pike of Wheeler receptionist; Mrs. Cora Lee Lowden Lab Tech; Mr. Glen Markham, custodian of Wheeler; Mrs. Bernice Hooker and Mrs. Lucille Laycock are the kitchen personnel.

This hospital district is fortunate in having the following doctors practicing in this immediate area: Dr. Larry Barbour, Dr. H.E. Nicholson, Dr. Paul Stewart and Dr. Glenn Walker.

The construction of Parkview hospital, an attractive all-brick, fire-proof structure has been financed by local taxation of the North Wheeler county hospital district. The hospital is located one block east of U.S. Highway 83 at Sweetwater and 9th in view

of the city Park. Its location assures both privacy and convenience.

The hospital board is composed of Tom Puryear, president, Herbert Finsterwald, Vice-president, Hiram Whitner, Secretary; Clyde Dukes and Lester Leonard have cordially invited the public to attend the hospital opening May 9, 1965. The hours designated are from 2 p.m. until 6 p.m.

## SPEEDY MUSTANGS BRING FIFTH PLACE HOME FROM REGIONAL

Although still slowed by injuries to key individuals the Mustangs gave good account of themselves at Lubbock placing fifth behind powerful Booker who walked away with the class B division. The Mustangs however gave notice that they would be a team to be reckoned with in the future as several younger athletes turned in good performances.

Tom Smith a junior placed second in the broadjump with a leap of 21'9 1/2". Also Tom placed second in the 880 dash as he was nosed out by Stevens of Happy. Tom's time was his best of the year 2:03.5 He will go to the state meet at Austin in both the broadjump and the 880. Congratulations Tom! Bobbie Vanpool did not place, but did himself proud as he ran a 10.35 in the 100 yd dash, although being slowed by a pulled muscle in his left leg. He also ran the anchor legs on the 440 relay and the mile relay. He

has done an outstanding job all year and should be a prime contender in the 100 next year.

Dunk Pater finished out an outstanding four years Wheeler high school with a fifth place finish in the 180 low hurdles. His time was 21.6 and could have either tied or bettered his record of 21.2 had he not hit the last hurdle. Dunk ran the first leg of the mile relay and sprint relay.

Frankie Rogers a freshman ran the low hurdles and set a new school record in the 120 yd high hurdles. His time of 17.2 eclipsed his old record set a week earlier at the Olton meet. Coach Hill is expecting great things from Frankie in years to come. Gary Hardcastle, a sophomore vaulted to a new school record in the pole vault with a leap of 11'6". Clarence B Holt 53 independent Oil Producer in Gray and Hutchinson counties died shortly before noon Monday in the North Plains hospital following a heart attack.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church in Borger. Officiating will be the Rev. Weldon Butler pastor assisted by the Rev. Lloyd Hamilton, former pastor and now district superintendent of the Methodist Conference.

Burial will be in Wheeler Cemetery by Ed Brown funeral director. A member of the Holt Bros. firm, Mr. Holt became an independent oil producer in 1931 in fields in and around Gray county. He moved to Borger in 1940. The firm has offices in Borger and Pampa.

Born in Branson, Kansas Mr. Holt was a member of Isom Masonic Lodge 1242, El Paso Scottish Rite, Rotary Club and the North Plains Knife and Fork Club.

He was a member of the Frank Phillips College Board of Regents and the Hutchinson county airport board. A resident of 621 Austin, he also was a member of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Jewel, sons Dennis and Joe of Borger, Brothers Demaris E. of Pampa and Robert J. of Wheeler and a sister Claire Holt of Fort Worth.

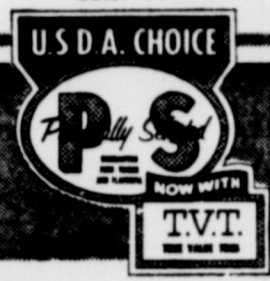

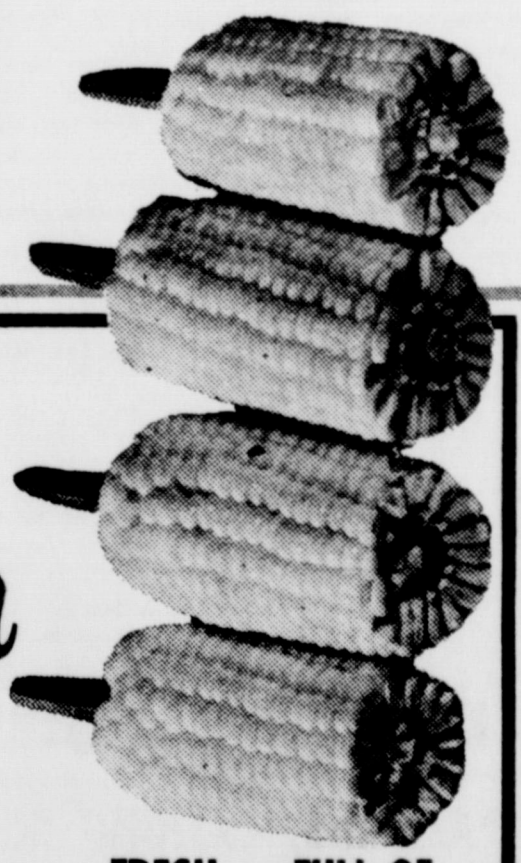

## SCD NEWS

With the dawn of a new grazing year, ranchers in the Wheeler county soil conservation district are casting a thoughtful eye as to how to manage their cattle to get the best use of their grass. Each rancher will have a different problem and in turn a different answer. These problems and answers would probably take up a good sized book if written down in detail sufficient for everyone to understand. We will not attempt that here, besides we really do not know all of them.

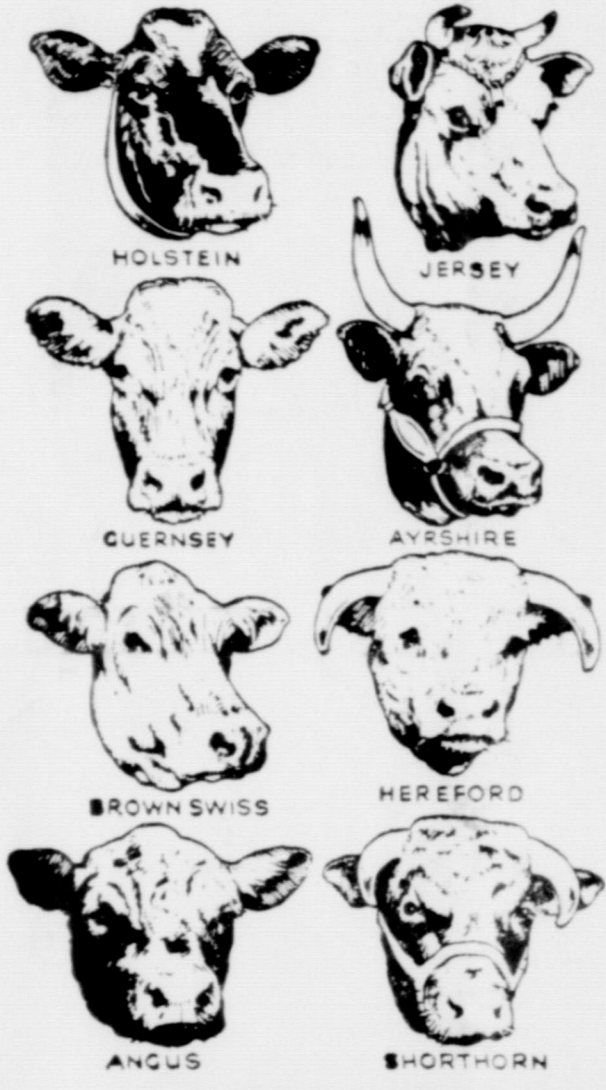
Two or three points should be enough to tickle most cattlemen's imagination. One—it takes grasses to grow grass. Two—certain grasses are better used some time of the year than others, three—you are really making money off your grass that you have converted into beef.

Item One: No grass man can expect to handle his grass as he would like to until he has it in the shape that he wants it. If your grass is run down and decreasing, the best treatment is to defer it or take the cattle off for the entire summer. The best management system is to divide your place into 3 or 4 pastures of about equal forage production and rotate the use of them on a regular scheduled basis, this schedule should be arranged to give each pasture some summer deferrals of at least one year in 3 or 4. See some of the SCS men for more information about this.

Item Two— Tall grasses and bottomland grasses are usually better used in the summer since they produce larger amounts of forage, are usually high in protein and respond to grazing better than short grasses. The tall grasses also tend to become weaker or lose protein in the winter than do the short grasses. Short grasses and weeping love-

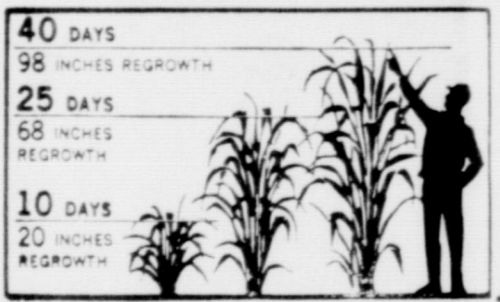
