grass is run down and decreasing, the best treatment production. is to defer it or take the cattle off f a the entire summer. The best management system is to divide your place into 3 or 4 pastures of about equal forage production and rotate the use of them on a regular scheduled basis, this schedule should be arranged to give each pasture some summer deferments at least one year in 3 or 4. See some of the SCS men for more information about this.

Item two- Tall grasses and bottomland grasses are usually better used in the summer since they produce larger amounts of forage, are usually high in protein and respond to grazing better than short gras;es. The tall grasses also tend to become weaker or lose protein in the winter than do the shat grasses. Short grasses and weeping love-
