## AUGUST RAINS TOTAL 6.09

Rain, Rain and more rain fell over the past three days leaving 3.16 inches for Wheeler's total. The over-cast skies began to lighten shortly before noon Wednesday.

According to Joe Rogers, the total for the month of August now stands at 6.09 inches. Amounts for the past three days were: Sunday, August 21-1.2 inches; Monday, Aug. 22-1.05 inches and Tuesday, August 23-0.91 inches. Total for August, 1965 measured 3.41.

Wheeler is still behind in the amount of moisture received for the year. As the amount now reads, Wheeler

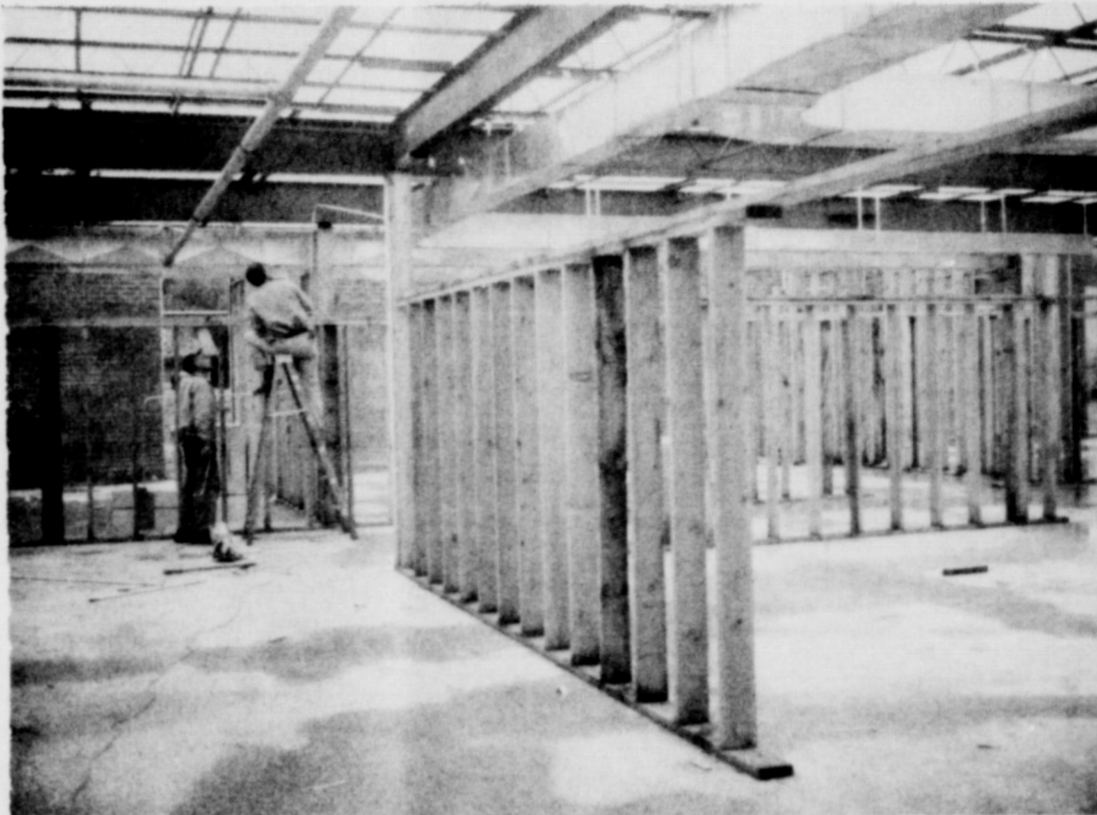
is now 9.17 short of last year's total at this time last year. Rainfall for the year now reads 17.13 as compared to 26.30 inches last year.

Farmers are expected to start planting wheat as soon as the fields dry out.

It is reported the grain sorghum is looking good.

Cotton farmers were helped by the rains if insect activities do not increase. County Agent Charles D. Jackson urged the farmers to watch for boll worms and boll weevils. Mr. Jackson stated, "We have the potential for one of the best crops in years."

The farmers are now looking for warm weather.

### Crops Tour, Fish Fry Are Planned

Final plans were made Monday evening at Wheeler for the second annual Crops Tour Day. The date of Sept. 14, 1966 has been set aside for a Crops Tour and Fish Fry sponsored by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau, Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce.

Those taking the tour will have an opportunity to see eight different demonstration programs under the direction of the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program. Demonstrations to be viewed on the tour will be: cotton variety, weed control, peach orchard, cotton fertility, forage utilization, grain sorghum and performance testing of beef cattle.

The tour will begin at 9:00 at the Kelton school and following the tour the group will return for an old time Fish Fry at 12:30. James Verden will head the fish fry committee and will be assisted by members of the Commissioners Court, Farm Bureau members and Chamber members from Wheeler and Shamrock. Mrs. John Hodges will prepare Hush Puppies for the feed.

The Kelton Home Demonstration Club will prepare the potato salad, coffee and tea for the noon meal. The menu will read Fish, hush puppies, potato salad, pickles, bread, fried pies and tea or coffee.

The County Extension office is mailing cards and letters to the farmers and ranchers in the county. You are urged to return the cards in order to determine the number planning to attend. If you do not receive a card, contact the extension office. Town citizens are urged to attend and are asked to notify their Chamber of Commerce presidents or secretaries. The entire family is invited to attend this crops tour and fish fry.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the dates on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSEHOLD BLEACHES**

The many household bleaches on the market today often confuse the homemaker, says a clothing specialist.

There are two main types of bleaches. The chlorine type comes in liquid or dry form and the oxygen type is a dry form labeled potassium monopersulfate or sodium perborate compound.

Read the labels carefully to tell the difference between dry chlorine and dry oxygen bleach. Oxygen bleach is safe for all fabrics. Dry chlorine bleach should not be used on silk, wool or noncolorfast fabrics. Water softeners, fabric brighteners and detergents can be added to dry bleaches. This is not possible with a liquid bleach.

After reading the directions on the bleach package

measure the amount you need accurately using a standard measuring cup. Chlorine bleach should be diluted before it is added to the wash. If there is a doubt about colorfastness, don't pour dry bleach directly on clothes.

Liquid bleach can be added to wash water in two ways. Pour the measured bleach into the water while the tub clothes are added or dilute, the measured bleach in a quart of water first and add it to the wash load after agitation has started. If the bleach is poured directly on the fabric without being diluted, fabric damage will result. This damage may or may not show up immediately afterwards.

Many washer manufacturers have simplified the process of adding bleach by providing automatic bleach dispenser. Some allow the bleach to be added at the proper time during the washing process and in correct amount.

The bleaches which come in packet or tablet form are able to you to add the correct amount of bleach without having to measure. Directions should be followed carefully since all packets or tablets are not the same.

Chlorine bleaches get rid of hard-to-remove spots on collars, cuffs, undershirts and pillowcases. They whiten clothes and serve as an effective disinfectant.

Dry oxygen bleaches which can be used on all fabrics are more effective in keeping things white. They are used regularly in the hottest water the fabric can stand. The potassium monopersulfate bleaches form well in warm water. They can be used on silk and wool which should be washed in cool water. Use hot water for whitening pillows and for bleaching wool and wear and resin-treated cottons.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.

"It is the further intention of the Legislature in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officers and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness existing and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

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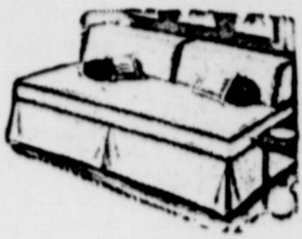

on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools or the maintenance of a junior college, as the case may be, and the payment of principal and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as changed, for the payment of principal and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows: Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(c) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this State.



### Brush Control

**By Charles David Jackson**  
Proper management following brush control is more important than the particular method used.

The objective of brush control is to get the longest control for the least cost, with the largest increase of forage and livestock production. It's always important to maintain a good grass cover too.

Since brush control is only one important phase of the overall ranch management program, it should be combined with proper stocking and deferred rotation grazing to be most beneficial.

Deferred grazing following any brush control operation is a must. If a livestock man plans to kill trees without a followup of other good range management practices, he would be better off spending the money for supplemental feed.

It's a good plan to use brush control practices on an entire pasture rather than parts of a pasture. The reasoning behind this is that livestock will concentrate their grazing in the areas where brush has been controlled, since this grass will be more nutritious and palatable. Soon the controlled areas will become badly overgrazed. If the entire pasture cannot be treated, it should be deferred following control measures.

Returns from brush control amount to much more than just increased grass production. Added benefits are: (1) Ease of working and caring for livestock, (2) Increased offspring numbers (3) Less Parasite damage (4) Livestock is more tame (5) Increased food and cover for deer and quail and (6) Less breeding males are required.

If a good seed source is not available on the area to be controlled, defer for one growing season to determine the kind of grasses present and to determine whether additional native grass seed should be planted.

For methods of brush control, there are several Extension bulletins available in the County Extension Office.

### Help Your Child Want To Learn

#### You Can Help Your Child Want To Learn Before He ever Enters Schoolhouse Door

School cannot make your child learn...it can only help him toward learning. And he won't unless he wants to.

And that's where you, his parent, come in. His teacher's job is a big one, and a little help from your goes a long way. A new booklet published by a department of the National Education Association, called *The First Big Step* has some advice on how to go about showing your child what learning is, that it can be fun, and that you want him to learn.

These are some of the tools you can use to help your child build skills: paper (from grocery bags, old newspapers, magazine ads) paste made from flour and water, small scissors with blunt edges and crayons.

Cutting and pasting. Your child will spend a lot of time with scissors and paper in school. You get him started when you draw big shapes on paper for him to cut and paste...when you let him draw his own pictures for cutting...and when you have him cut pictures from magazines or other paper.

To teach him about the differences in objects, have him cut out big newspaper headlines to find out which words or letters are alike, and ask him to match other letters, numbers, words, and pictures that are the same.

To teach about sizes: Is an apple bigger than a grapefruit? Which buttons are the same size?

To build skill in knowing shapes, cut items from paper that are round or square or like a triangle...gather a group of things from around the house that are of different shapes...show him how to draw shapes.

It takes skill for a child to see what he doesn't see...missing parts. You help him learn this when you take pictures which show only a part of a person or thing and ask, "What's missing?" You can also draw stick people with missing parts, and line up small objects, remove one and ask him what's gone.

You can make puzzles by cutting cereal, cracker, soap and potato chip boxes into pieces...by cutting pictures from magazines, pasting them to a shoe box top and cutting up the box...and

by cutting up a picture your child has drawn on a shoe box and having him put it together again.

Old calendars and playing cards teach your child what numbers come after which. And you can write the numbers up to ten and drill a little on them.

In your house there are a l kinds of things to count--beads, macaroni pieces (he can also string these,) popsicle sticks, bottle caps, buttons, seeds. For holding things you have empty potato sacks, egg cartons, net fruit sacks.

These are not the only games which can help your child to build his skills. You may be able to think of some that are better for him.

Some children are not ready to play skill games until they get to school. You can tell. If your child likes to play, fine. If he squirms and fusses, let him wait, and don't worry.
