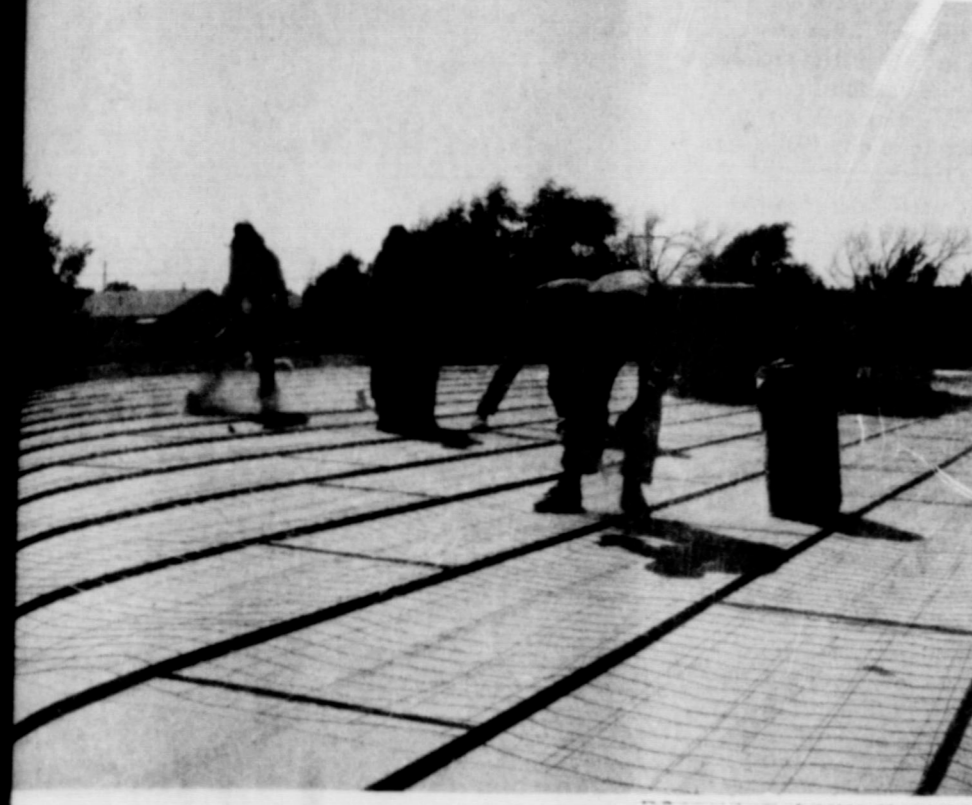

DR. JOHN PARKER TO LOCATE IN WHEELER



The Board of Directors of Parkview Hospital announced this week that John B. Parker, M.D., of Versailles, Ind., plans to set up a medical practice in Wheeler. The Board members spent Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday showing Dr. Parker the facilities available at Parkview Hospital and Wheeler Medical Clinic. Hiram Whitener, sec. - treasurer of the Board of Directors of Parkview Hospital, was in residence by November 1. The acquiring of a license, according to Whitener is merely a matter of paper work. Dr. Parker, a graduate of a Virginia Medical School, has been in practice at Versailles for the past seven years. The lack of hospital facilities was given as Dr.

Parker's reason for leaving Versailles. The nearest hospital is located 25 miles away and tending to business and patients requires an average of 4 trips per day. Dr. Parker arrived in Wheeler Tuesday morning. He looked over the town and toured the hospital before contacting the board of directors. After being given a tour of Wheeler

and meeting a number of citizens at the Chamber of Commerce meeting, Dr. Parker stated that he was much impressed by the town as a whole and seemed enthusiastic to get his practice set up here. Dr. and Mrs. Parker are the parents of two children. Their son is in the eighth grade and their daughter is a sixth grader.

MUSTANGS THRASH GROOM

Eleven months is a long time to wait to seek retribution for the only defeat suffered in two years but the Wheeler Mustangs were patient and did it with vengeance when they got the chance... final score, Wheeler 29, Groom 0! The score doesn't begin to tell the story of the Tigers downfall and unlike last year, there was no doubt as to who was the best. So completely did the Mustangs throttle the Tigers, they were unable to cross the mid-field stripe all night and got to their 49 twice and once was the result of a recovered fumble. The Mustangs put points on the board each time they were in Groom territory, but twice. A raging Mustang line pushed Groom back to the one yard

line midway of the first quarter and forced the Tigers to punt. The ball traveled only 16 yards and the gold clad Mustangs were in business. Four plays on the ball was on one and Vanpool sent the home fans into hysterics as he circled right end for the TD. Going around the other terminal on the extra point try, Vanpool added the two points. Wheeler added to the total with 1:10 to play in the first half with a 76 yard drive in 13 plays which was aided by a 15 yard personal foul penalty against the Tigers. All the distance was covered on the ground except for a 7 yard pass from Ware to Hardcastle to put the pigskin on the eight. Vanpool found paydirt with a dash around right end on the

next play. The Tigers were able to gain only 9 yards in the first half and could add only 43 yards passing and running in the final two quarters. Tommy Wiley intercepted a desperate Groom pass midway of the third quarter on the Groom 30 and just three plays were needed to score. Vanpool scored from 28 yards out but it was called back for a clipping penalty but the Mustangs were not to be denied. Vanpool got six and Jamison hit Hardcastle in the open and the pass and run netted the third Mustang touchdown. Hardcastle kept the Tigers deep in their end of the field with his punts and then the Mustang defense would put the damper on any hopes the Tig-

ers had of getting on the scoreboard. A recovered fumble gave the Mustangs another good scoring opportunity late in the game but an attempted field goal try was no good and it looked as if the Mustangs would have to be content with a 22 point margin. With 27 seconds left in the game Fred Goad broke through and threw the Tiger quarterback for a 13 yard loss which forced a punt. Another short punt, this one for 17 yards, put the ball on the Groom 27 with time running out. Ware found Rives with a 21 yard toss for a first down on the six and three plays later the same combination worked for the touchdown with only 13 seconds to go. Hardcastle put the icing on the cake as he booted the ball straight and true through the uprights and the Mustangs long wait was worth it.

ERADICATION PROGRAM KICK-OFF

By Charles David Jackson
A kick-off meeting to ini-
tiate an eradication program
for psoroptic cattle scabies
in the Panhandle Area will
be held in Plainview on Oct.
3rd. This meeting is being
called by Dr. S.B. Walker,
Executive Director, Texas
Animal Health Commission.
The eradication program will
involve checking each indi-
vidual cow in Wheeler County
for this costly parasite.
Two inspectors will be sta-
tioned in Wheeler County to
complete the program. One
will represent the Texas
Animal Health Commission
and the other will represent
the U.S.D.A. Animal Dis-
ease Eradication Division.
At the present time all
Texas Cattle shipped to Colo-
rizona and California must
meet dipping requirements in
order to be shipped to these
states.

Following is information
concerning cattle scabies
that should be of interest to
all persons interested in the
Livestock Industry.
WHAT IS IT?
Scabies in cattle common-
ly known as "common cattle
scab" is caused by parasitic
mites of the psoroptic vari-
ety. Psoroptic mites live in
groups on the surface of the
skin producing lesions that
spread in all directions from
the spot first affected.
The first lesions usually oc-
cur on the withers, over the
back and around the root of
the tail. The scab mite pricks
the skin to obtain food and in
so doing cause a slight in-
flammation, but this early
stage of the disease is rarely
detected. As the mites mul-
tiply, larger numbers of small
wounds are made and are
followed by intense itching
and oozing of serum to the
surface. Serum soon hardens
into yellowish or grayish
color scabs which are fre-
quently stained with blood.
In the early stages the scab
may be about the size of a
pea but gradually increases
in size. Some of the mites
migrate to other parts of the
body and start new lesions
which extend until they cov-

er large areas. As the dis-
ease advances, increasingly
large areas show loss of hair
and become covered with
thick adherent scabs. The
itching is severe and the ani-
mal is constantly irritated.
In its effort to relieve the
itching and irritation, the
animal spend so much time
licking, rubbing and scratch-
ing that it has very little
time for feeding; consequent-
ly it loses weight, becomes
weak and emaciated and oc-
casionally dies from heavy
infestations.
WHAT TO WATCH FOR?
It is a good practice to
observe all cattle carefully
at regular intervals for evi-
dence of scabies. Select a
location from which you can
watch the animals without
disturbing them looking for
restlessness, scratching,
rubbing, licking, excessive
tail switching and rough hair
coat.
TREATMENT:
Texas statutes require
that all animals in an infest-
ed lot be dipped twice in an
approved manner and solution
at ten to fourteen day inter-
vals. All animals in exposed
lots must be dipped once.
All dippings must be accom-
plished under the supervision
of a representative of the
Texas Animal Health Commis-
sion. Spray dipping or box
spraying is not approved for
eradication purposes in Texas
WHY LOOK FOR IT?
It has been estimated that
losses may run as high as
one dollar per head per day
for infested animals on full
feed.
Cattle scabies not only
causes losses due to the con-
stant irritations, but the eco-
nomic impact on movements
of cattle from Texas to other
states is severe when an out-
break occurs. In order to pro-
tect the livestock industry
of the states of destination,
the individual states impose
dipping requirements for movement
of animals from scabies
infested areas that cost the
producers and shippers an
untold number of dollars.
The Texas livestock indus-
try cannot afford to live with
cattle scabies. Every source

of infection must be located
and completely eradicated.
DISEASE RESEMBLING
SCABIES:
Symptoms of scabies re-
semble those of mange and
the disease are a ten confus-
ed. Mange includes a group
of contagious skin diseases:

1. Chorioptic Mange - caused by the chorioptic mite.
 2. Sarcoptic Mange - caused by the sarcoptic mite.
 3. Demodectic Mange - caused by the Demodectic mite.
- Lesions caused by lice are often suspected as being scabies. Cattle may be

infested with more than one condition at the same time.

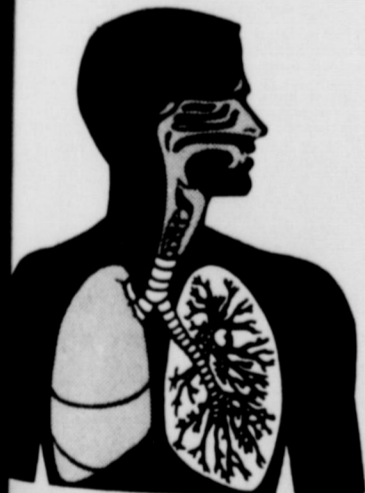
