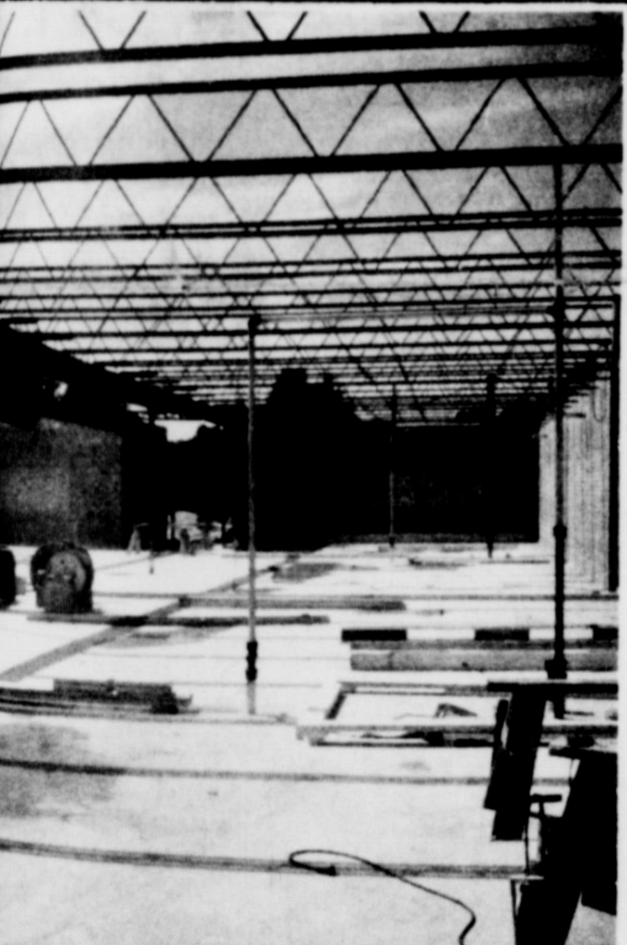

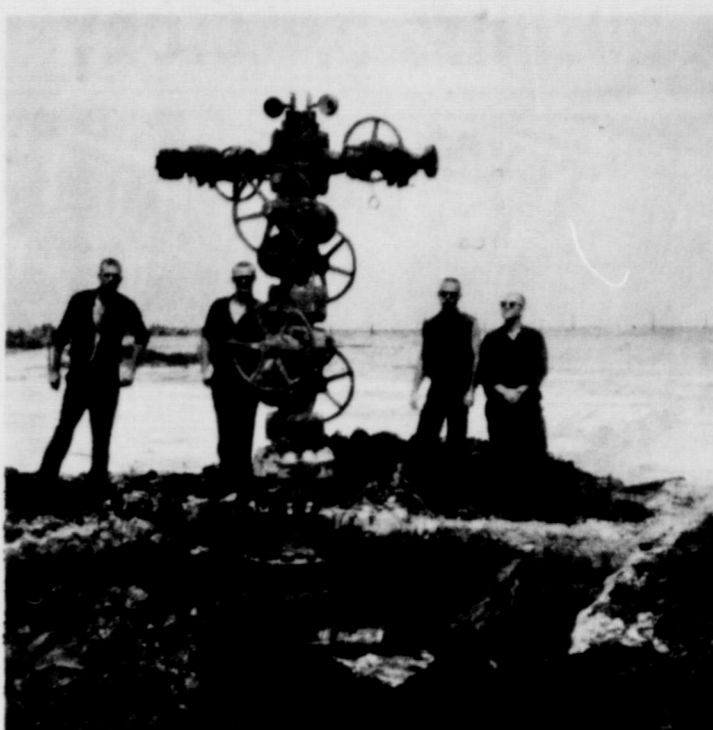

preparing for another term of
 school, we need to talk
 about planning which begins
 at least by the seventh year
 of school.
 By that time the parents
 and the pupils should begin
 to collect information from a
 variety of sources from which
 they can then choose some,
 in which the pupil is the
 most interested.
 Certainly by the time the
 student reaches the ninth
 grade, he should, with the
 parents and schools help,
 have decided whether to pre-
 pare for college or for one
 of the skilled occupations.
 If the decision is for college,
 no student should be satis-
 fied with the minimum require-
 ments of 16 solid credits
 plus the required 1 1/2 credits
 of physical education and 1/2
 credit of health. These coll-

age bound should earn a
 minimum of 20 credits in a
 broad range of subjects, es-
 pecially those in the Lan-
 guage Arts, Mathematics,
 Science and Social Studies.
 If the decision is for one
 of the skilled occupations,
 the student in most cases,
 will need to prepare for at
 least two years of study in
 a technical or vocational
 school. This preparation,
 although perhaps requiring
 less of each, will still be
 based rather heavily upon
 the same areas as the coll-
 ege bound.
 Standards by which colleges
 are permitting students to
 enroll are being steadily
 raised. Each of us, whether
 we are teachers, parents or
 pupils need to do our utmost
 in planning our work so that
 none may be turned aside
 from their goals in life.

In talking with the state Topper named a few of the little noticed flammable substances used in everyday living. Pointed out in the Fire Prevention lecture at flammable was most of your bug sprays. These cans are marked, however, few people notice the warning. Take particular precaution in spraying for bugs around your water heater, pilot light or bathrooms if a heater is spraying.
Another very inflammable substance is hair spray. Do not spray your hair with a cigarette in your mouth. It was advised at the meeting that the user should wait five minutes before lighting a cigarette after using hair spray.
Sun tan lotion may be inflammable. An example was given of a girl applying sun tan lotion and lying on the beach to get a tan. After posing her back to the sun, she rolled over and lit a cigarette. An explosion followed.
Topper urged that people pay close attention to the labels on substances they are using to see if they are combustible.

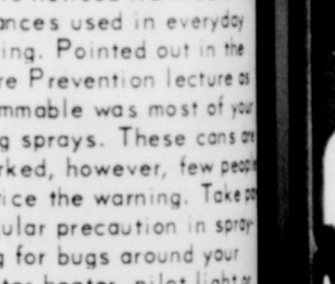
