"Fort Elliott Flagpole. the northwest, at Fort Elliott, established 1875 to protect the Texas Panhandle from

J.J. Long, teamster-mer chant, who arrived with the soldiers, was hired to provide a flagpole for the fort. In Cedar Breaks near Antelope Hills, 30 miles away, he cut two huge trees and hauled them here by wagon to build this 50 foot pole.

After Fort Elliott closed in 1890, Long bought the pole and placed it in front of his store. Later at Mobeetie school for 20 years: it was erected here 1949."

If you already have a tool

If this is not possible, large multiple. shelf metal cabinets are available. One of the lower shelves can be removed for tall equipment. Buy the type of cabinet with two doors and double door Sunday at the Baptist Church pulls. Use a long bicyclewith Bro. Botman from Lelia type padlock to secure the doors. An enclosed table-box arrangement can double as a storage unit and a workbench at the same time.

Each pesticide applicator comes with cleaning and operating instructions. If between uses, follow these instructions--particularly the directions for cleaning. Application equipment may give off smelly and dangerous fumes, so provide for adequate ventilation in the storage area and follow the cleaning instructions. Make sure your equipment is not leaking or leaving drip spots in the storage area. A minor hose repair or slight adjustment to tighten a loose connection

may be all that's needed. It is a good idea to have separate app ication equipment for herbicides and for insecticides. If you do, mark them for their intended use and do not mix the two pesticides by mistake. You might end up with dead potato pests and plants as well Never store a chemical that has lost its label.



The conventional type terrace has always been a little bit of a hindrance to the the farming operations. There has always been the point rows and the odd areas between the terraces that were a nuisance to work.

With the new type of terraces (parrallel terraces) that are becoming popular in this area, most of these point rows and odd areas are eliminated. Parallel terraces will also do the job of erosion control and the preservation of moisture. When a farmer decides to

construct parallel terraces on a field, one of the first jobs to be done would be to make a topographic map of the field. This will show all of the high points, the low pints, draws and ridges that may exist. From this map the parallel terrace system can
