\$6,200 WORTH OF BEEF: Tuesday morning's early morning rain was rather expensive for Dr. Calvin Jones of Pampa, owner of 4-J ranch one mile north of Wheeler. The cattle laying here were killed when a bolt of lightning struck a tree near where they were standing. Gwyn Edwards, ranch foreman, discovered the downed cattle as he returned to the ranch. The lightning struck between 8 and 9 Tuesday morning. The bull in the background was the herd bull for the Charliss Cattle which Dr. Jones raises on the ranch. He estimated value of the 3 year old bull is \$4,000. The 3 year old cow on the left is valued at \$1,500 and the 6 month old bull calf was valued at \$700.

Four Mustangs Get Scholarships

Four of Wheeler's graduating seniors have received football scholarships in football. Dunk Porter signed the letter of intent shortly before school closed. Billy Overcast, Jimmy Adams and Jimmy Jamison will all be working out this year on a college squad.

Dunk Porter is the son of Madge Porter and the late Glen Porter. He has been playing football for 7 years. This year he played fullback with a weight of 180 lbs. He signed a letter of intent with Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, Okla. The scholarship will be for four years with all expenses paid plus a monthly allowance.

Jimmy Jamison, Wheeler's 202 lb tackle, will be attending New Mexico Highlands college this year on a scholarship. Jimmy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Jamison and has played football for seven years.

Wagon Train Pass

The group of muleskinners represent 4 states and 12 towns. California is represented with wagons from Sun Valley and Grimes. The other distant state represented is St. Petersburg, Fla. C. of C. MEETING HELD BOY SCOUT CAMP SHOWN

The guests at the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce presented the program Tuesday evening, June 15 at Nora's Cafe. These guests were Frank Phelan, vice Chairman, John Brewer and Tex McCoy, Directors.

For those members present these gentlemen from the Boy Scouts Adobe Walls council area of which Wheeler county is a part explained their plans for the Old Risner place which was recently

purchased by the council for a camp. The farm includes 480 acres and several spring fed ponds. It was explained that this location was picked due to the convenience of good roads, electricity, telephones and central location for 15 counties in the Adobe Walls Council.

Having purchased the place for \$100 per acre, the council has the completed project planned and underway. First on their list was a soil conservation plan to improve the land and water facilities. The Wheeler Soil conservation made a study of the land and presented the group with a 5 year plan. This is the first camp in the nation where soil conservation was the first step. The soil conservation most important suggestion was the raising of the dam to prevent overflowing and washing out. This is being completed and it was noted that the rains we have had could easily have taken the old dam.

With the raising of the dam, the camp now has two swimming areas and a number of smaller ponds for fishing. A survey was run on these ponds and the Game and Fish department intend to stock the ponds for all the scout fishermen that will camp in years to come.

What will this mean to the community? The present plan calls for 8 structures with more if needed. The total amount spent on soil conservation will be \$13,000. The supplies for a camp run around \$1,300 for the 2 week period with several camps planned each year. This community will have the traffic of the parents bringing and coming after their scouts. In some cases, the parents will stop for refreshment or stay for a night or two in town. What the overall benefit to the community will be is uncertain, but the estimated cost of this camp project will be \$200,000.

Following the program a short program was held. Mr. Cordell, president reported that the board of directors had voted to devote \$500 to Park Beautification to get the project underway. Joe Weatherly of the Park committee reported that they also had called upon the soil conservation plan and a practical answer to the water problem.

In Wheeler county Investment Oil Company Inc. of Wichita Falls plans to re-enter No. 1 Ivy E Duncan and deepen to 8,000 feet to test the Granite Wash, Douglas and Missouri. The re-entry is a deepening project of the Cree Drilling Co. No. 1 Duncan which was plugged and abandoned at total depth of 4,300 feet in the Brown Dolomite April 22, 1956.

The test spots approximately three miles south of the Mobeetie area and five miles north of the Panhandle field. It is located nine miles west of Wheeler. Operator plans to get started in about two weeks.

All the trappings of a whole some old fashioned American circus will be in force with clowns galore, aerialists, animal acts and colorful production numbers.

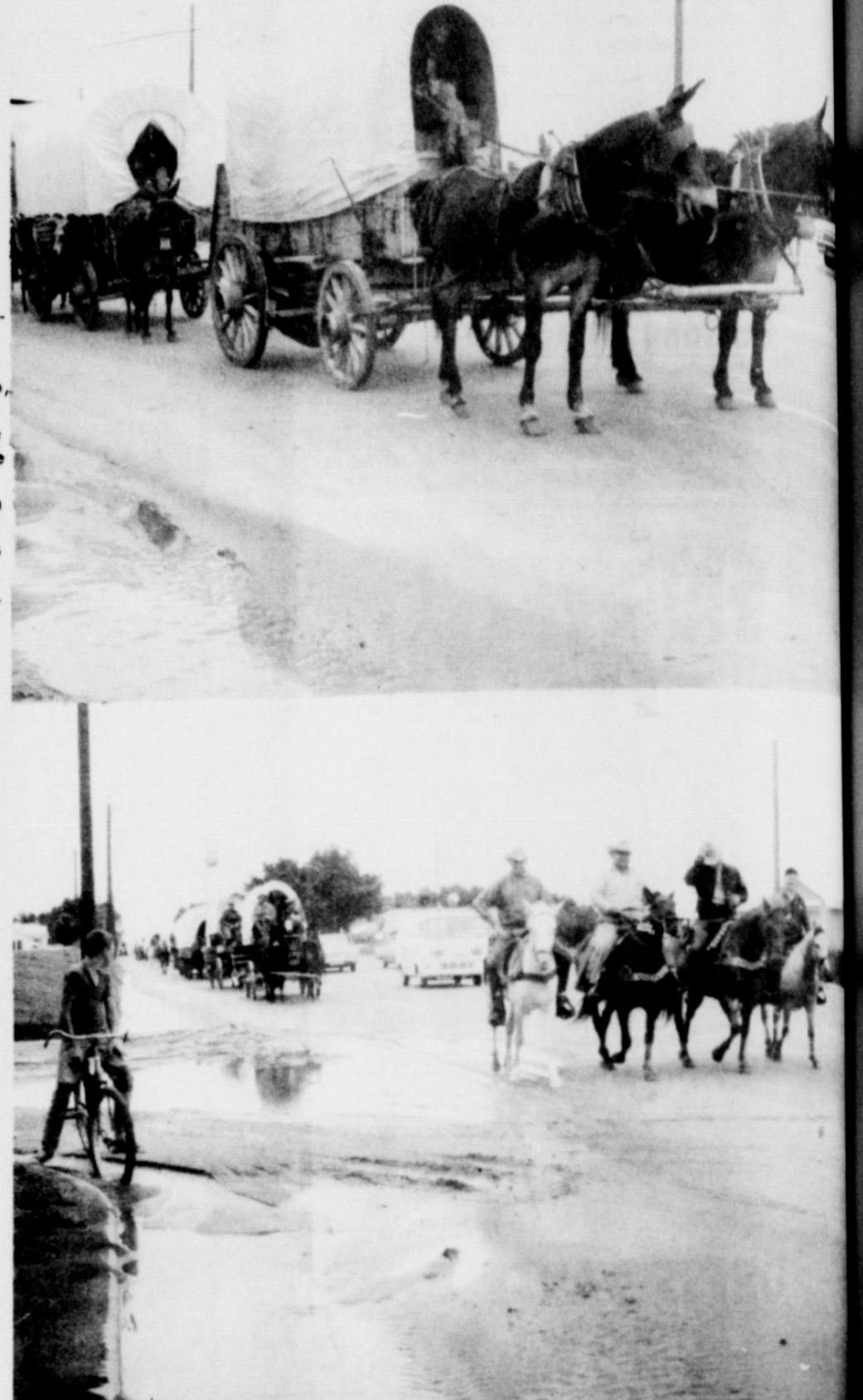
Show times for the 14 act show will be at 1:00, 3:00 and 5:00 p.m. seven days a week.
