Postmaster Exam Open At Allison
An examination for Fourth-Class Postmaster for the post office at Allison, Texas, \$4019 a year will be open for acceptance of applications until May 9, 1967, the Commission announced today.

Applicants must actually reside within the territory supplied by the above-mentioned post office and they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary limited appointments of one year.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color or national origin.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

GRAHAM'S FILM TO BE SHOWN

Evangelist Billy Graham's feature-length dramatic film, "Shadow of the Boomerang," will have its Wheeler showing Friday, April 28, at 7:30 p.m. at the Wheeler school and is sponsored by the North Wheeler Co. Ministerial Ass'n.

Starring vivacious Georgia Lee and television's Buffalo Bill Jr., Dick Jones, "Shadow of the Boomerang" is an outdoor action picture with all of the excitement and breath-taking scope of the land, "Down Under." Setting for the screen drama is Australia's "Outback," the continent's vast interior region where some of the world's largest cattle stations are located.

The two young Americans head an All-Australian supporting cast, playing brother and sister roles in a turbulent story of homestead life. Their arrival in Australia to manage newly acquired family holdings, plunges the couple into strange surroundings and situations with which they find it difficult to cope. His sister is much more democratic, readily accepted by her new friends with whom she joins in an attempt to instill understanding and tolerance in her brother.

NOTARIES TO BE RE-APPOINTED

Secretary of state, John L. Hill, announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967 and May 15, 1967 inclusive.

Mr. Hill emphasized that Notaries Public should not send request for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required Application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Secretary of State Hill further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1967.

Thursday Review's Beauty Pageant

Mrs. Robert Denson, president of the Thursday Review Club announced this week that the club will sponsor once again a pageant on May 29th to select Miss North Wheeler County. The winner of the pageant will represent North Wheeler County in a contest in June at Lake Meredith under the sponsorship of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The winner of the Lake Meredith contest will in turn receive an opportunity to become Miss Texas.

According to Mrs. Denson, the local contest will be composed of two divisions: Senior, which includes girls from 18 through 26 years of age, who have not been married; and the Juniors, which include entrants 13 through 17 years of age.

All contestants must be sponsored by a business firm or organization, of the area. The sponsoring firm will be responsible for furnishing the entrance fee of the contestant, which will be \$15 for a senior girl and \$10 for a junior contestant as well as a banner to be won by the contestant which costs \$1.50.

Girls entering the senior division will model in an evening gown and swimsuit. Senior entrants will also be judged on a talent performance not to exceed three minutes.

HOSPITAL AND YOU

Most all hospitals have regular scheduled visiting hours. Yours would be exception because your hospital operates with the primary thought in mind of giving its patients complete rest and the best possible care to speed recovery.

Hospital visiting hours are scheduled to allow patients Doctor to make his rounds, for prescribed treatments to be given, for the bath, time to change the linens and clean the room and to serve the meals. Following these routine and necessary procedures comes time for patient rest and relaxation. Rest is very essential to the patients recovery.

"No Visitors" signs on the patients door are not put there to keep you out! They are placed there because the doctor has learned that his patients need all the sleep and rest he can get. In any event, this sign should be respected.

While you are a patient, the Hospital is your home and your visitors are welcome-but not to many or to often and your visits should always be short and certainly not at all if your doctor advises against having visitors. Large number of visitors overcrowd the small rooms, create a strain on you and are often disturbing to other patients.

Bring little children (in arms) to the hospital to visit is not recommended. Many patients are confined with diseases that can be contracted by small children and the possibility that a child unknowingly could wander into a contagious area. If it is necessary to bring young children to the hospital, they should remain in the lobby with a member of your party. We believe that the visitors can help the patients recovery and that good judgement of the visitor is better than strict hospital rules and regulations.

Morning visiting - None permitted; Afternoon visiting - 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.; Evening visiting - 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

On April 29 the Mobeetie FFA will have four judging teams in the Texas Tech contest at Lubbock. Teams entered are Livestock, Dairy Cattle, Grass and Crops.

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Sudan-grass May Be Harmful

By Charles David Jackson There appears to be some evidence that Sorghum-Sudan-grass type forage hybrids use extensively for cattle grazing and greenchop may be injurious to horses.

These widely used grazing and feed crops appear to be a factor in causing cystitis syndrome in horses, a little known disease of equines which is characterized by incoordination of the rear quarters, uncrilled urination and possible abortion by mares. Death sometimes occurs in chronic cases. To date, there is no known cure for this ailment, but it is not contagious. In addition to the Sorghum-Sudan-grass type hybrids, cystitis has also been found in horses grazing Johnsongrass, Common Sudan-grass in a few isolated cases.

The cystitis syndrome and possible dietary connections was first reported by Dr. William M. Romane, D.V.M., Texas A&M University and his team of researchers in an article in "Southwestern Veterinarian" (Vol. 19, Winter, 1966) The report described symptoms and indicates it may be connected with feeding of the forages as greenchop or by grazing the horses on the forage. Dr. Romane's research team adds, "Only when the plant is in the growing state does this syndrome develop. To our knowledge cured hay will not produce the syndrome."

The cystitis syndrome of horses has been noted mostly in Texas and a few isolated areas of the Southwest, according to reports from veterinary colleges. Incidence of the cystitis syndrome was reported by veterinarians in Georgia, Alabama, Oklahoma, Washington, and Iowa, but there appeared to be no association with any particular forages. Other areas have not reported cases of the syndrome.

Exact cause of the ailment has not been pinpointed and thousands of horses have probably grazed these forage crops with no ill effects,

however, horsemen should be warned of the danger involved in using the forages in their horse program and they should be very cautious until containing research can establish the exact cause of the syndrome. A&M Scientists say that there is no reason for cattlemen to become alarmed, as no injuries have been

reported from grazing or feeding these forages to ruminants. The seed industry is cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University to help support continued research in an attempt to isolate and avoid causes of the cystitis and to find a cure.

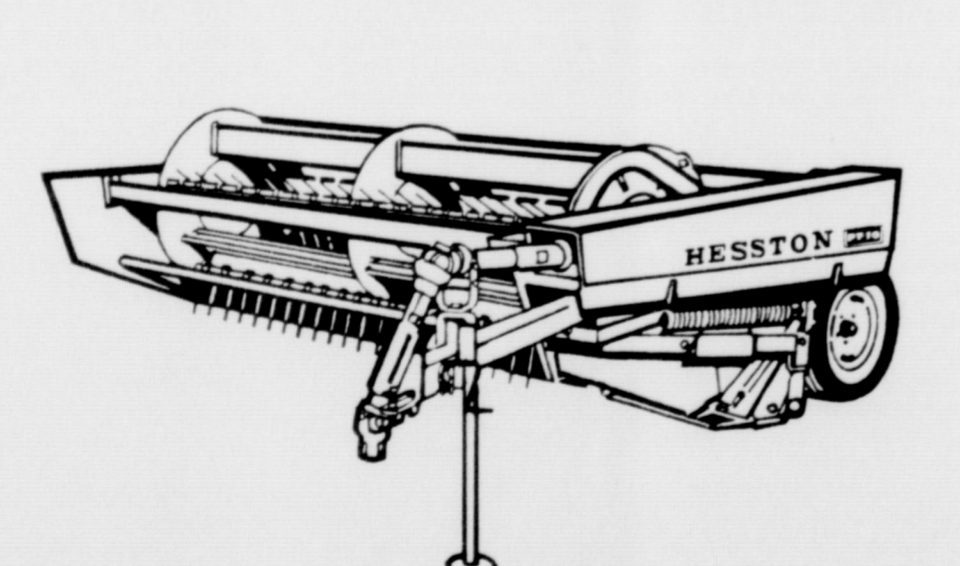

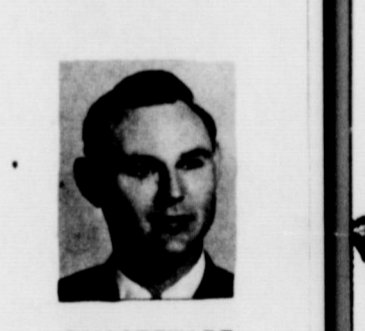

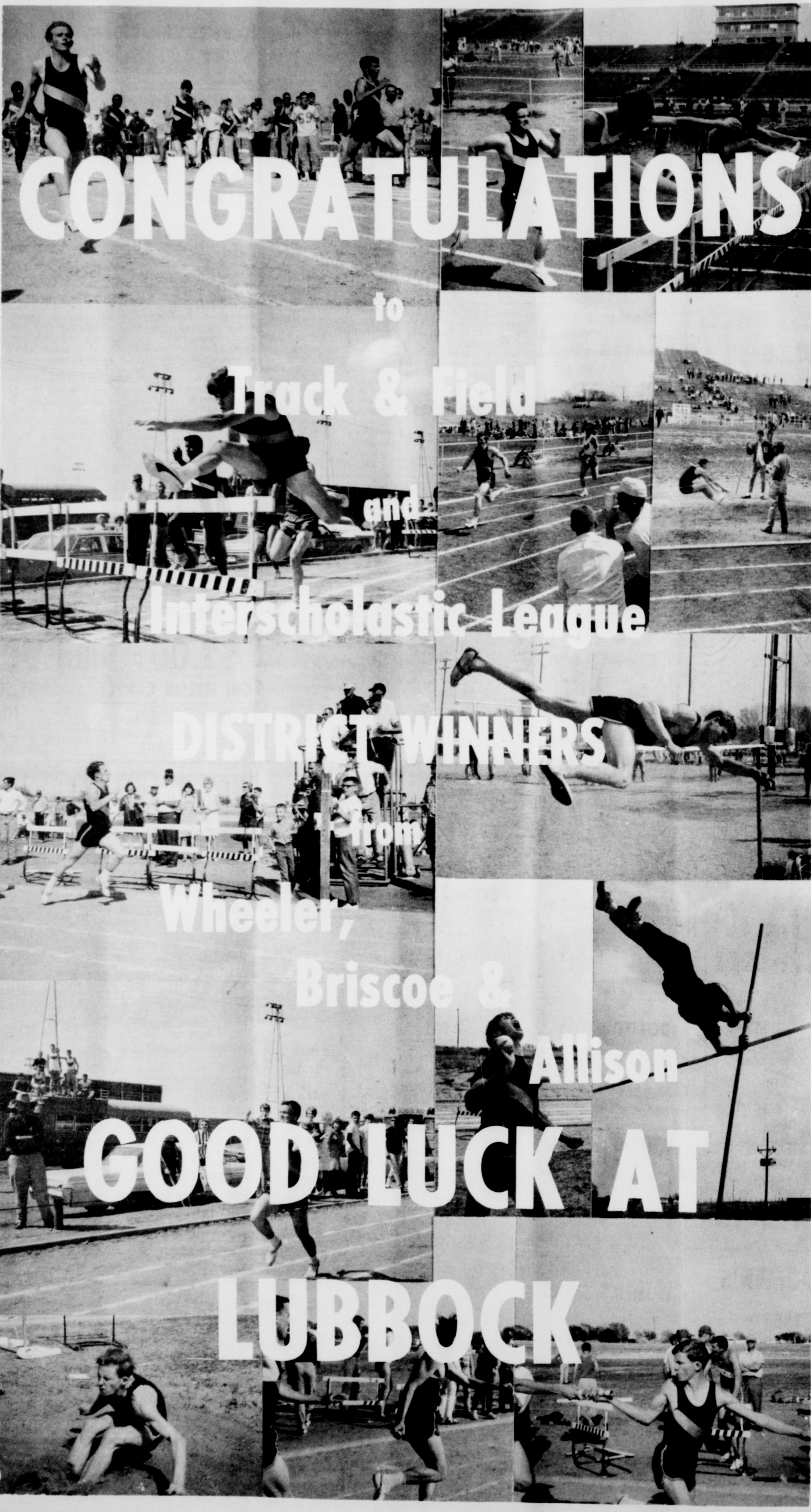
