200 LIVE WASPS NEEDED FOR MAKING OF SERUM FOR MARVIN LEE GRIMES

NEEDED: 200 live Wasps. If you know where some can be found or have captured some, notify Jerry Grimes, phone 5911.

This is a classified ad, but if it appeared in the classified section, we would be maddened with calls to find out what anyone would want with live wasps.

Marvin Lee Grimes, 6 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Grimes, who live west of Wheeler, is allergic to wasp stings. In order to overcome this allergy, it is necessary that he receive a series of injections of serum made from the wasps.

The Grimes, both Jerry and Katherine, are becoming experts at capturing and handling the insects. The first shipment was made up of 50 wasps and the second shipment was composed of 200 wasps.

The wasps are sent to

Spokane, Washington, where the serum is made. They are cut open and the venom sacks are removed. Six bottles of serum are made from the 200 wasps. The six bottles lasted only a few months, as the injections were made every four days.

The new batch of serum will be given to Marvin Lee at three week intervals.

We asked Mrs. Grimes how they caught the wasps and she stated, "by hand." The wasps are placed in jars and a pear is placed in the jar for food for the insects to eat. The trip to Washington is made in a wire box and shipment is by air, as you can not send them through the mail. In order to transfer the wasps from one container to another, they are placed in the deep freeze. When they are too cold to move around, the transfer is made without any trouble.

The Wheeler Basketball team entered the Samnorwood tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week. The teams each play three games and won only one first game. The boys met Shamrock, Memphis and Quail. The girls played Memphis, Shamrock and Wellington.

High point girl in each of the games was Sue Richerson. In the game with Shamrock, she scored 40 points of the game scored by Wheeler. She scored 34 in the Memphis game and 31 in the one with Wellington.

Villard Hunter was top scorer in two of the three games and came in second in points in the game with Quail. Villard scored 25 in the Shamrock game and 21 in the Memphis game.

MOTION OF CONTINUANCE GIVEN BY GOODRICH IN COURT CASE

Judge Lewis M. Goodrich granted a motion of continuance in 31st District Court Monday in four cases involving suspects charged with burglarizing a Mobeetie bank in March.

The motion came on a plea by the five defendants that their attorney, H.J. (Doc) Blanchard, of Lubbock, is a member of the State Senate.

The provision in the state law, removing any discretion

from the court because of an attorney's legislative connection, caused Judge Goodrich to comment unfavorably about the law.

The state law specifies that if an attorney in a criminal or civil action is a legislator and the legislature is in session, or has been in session during the past 30 days, or will be in session within the next 30 days, a continuance is mandatory.

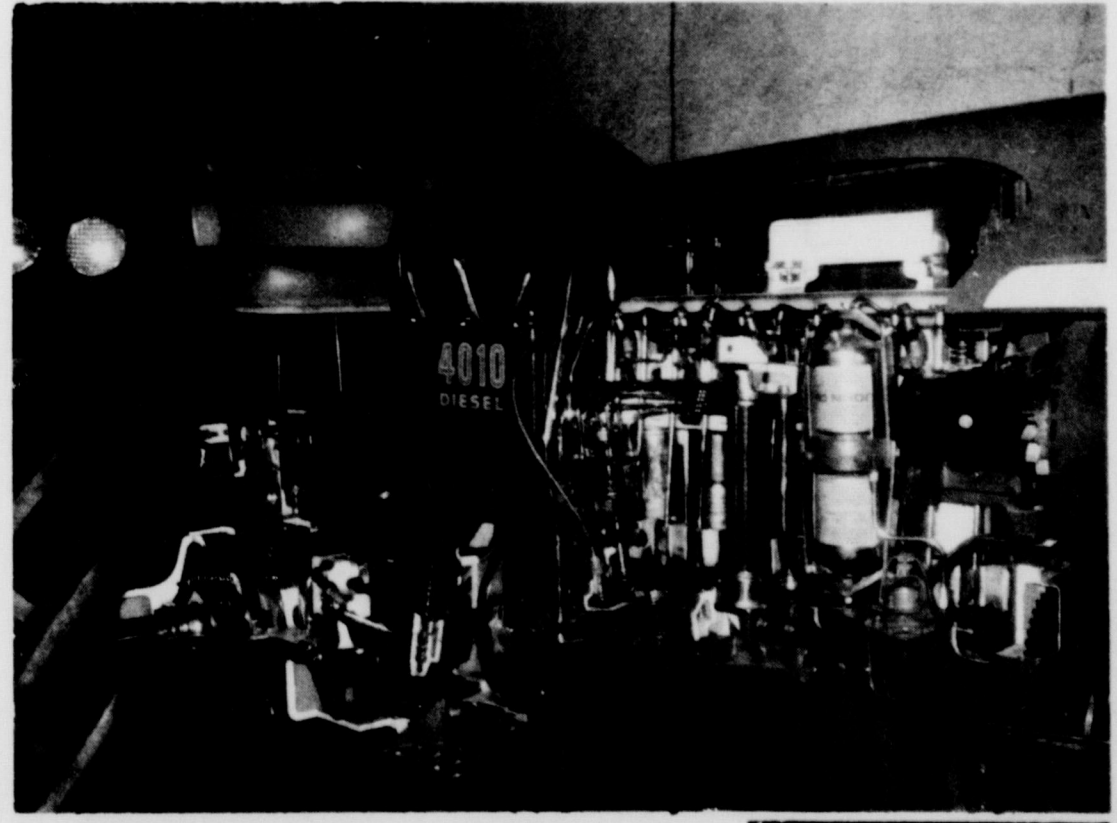
Judge Goodrich said that under the old law, a continuance was not mandatory and was under the discretion of the court.

The trials will probably not be held until June or July, depending on when the legislature convenes.

The defendants are James T. Overton, William Robert Brown, Jerry Ray James and Clifford Henry Bowen, all charged with theft in two separate cases.

In other cases Overton, Brown, James, Bowen and Fred Clinton Hedges are charged with burglary.

The five men allegedly attempted to burglarize the First State Bank in Mobeetie about 2 a.m. on March 16. No money was taken from the bank. Bond was set for the quintet at \$50,000 each. A federal charge of grand larceny is on file in the U.S. District Court in Amarillo with the trial scheduled for January. Judge Sarah T. Hughes of Dallas will preside.

Chlorosis Of Sorghum

By Charles David Jackson Iron Chlorosis In Milo and Suggested Control Measures

Quite a few farmers between Twitty and Kelton have had difficulty growing sorghum due to iron chlorosis. This condition doesn't affect cotton but it shows up in all plants related to the sorghum family. If a farmer owns land that has this deficiency, then it would be wise to start making plans now as to next year's crop.

Chlorosis of sorghum is characterized by a yellowing between the leaf veins and often occurs on high lime soils of the Portales and Mansker series, is the result of the plant's inability to assimilate sufficient iron, apparently due to excess calcium. Rarely is a field uniformly affected, with spots and irregular patterned areas being common.

This deficiency is usually observed early in the season soon after emergence and there is a tendency for the crop to grow out of the condition as soil temperature rises. It is more pronounced in wet cold seasons. If your land has a history of producing milo with this disorder you may wish to try the foliar application of iron sulfate which has been proven effective when applications of 2 1/2 percent iron sulfate have been adequate and timely. Applications of chelated iron will also be effective when applied at the manufacturer's suggested rate, but it may be too expensive to be practical.

The 2 1/2 percent solution of iron sulfate may be prepared by dissolving 10 lbs. of iron sulfate (copperas) in 50 gallons of water. Fresh material will have a light blue or bluish green color but will become yellow on prolonged exposure to the air. When it becomes yellow due to oxidation it is less soluble. A wetting agent should be added at concentrations suggested by the manufacturer to insure good coverage of the leaf surface. If the wetting agent is omitted only the

spots where droplets stick will green up. Approximately 20 gallons of this solution per acre appears to be necessary to wet the leaves thoroughly, however, if they can be wet with less it will be equally effective since that portion goes on the soil will not help.

The first application should be made within 10 days after emergence and should be followed with another application about 2 weeks later. Should yellowing occur in the season a third application may be necessary.

Soil application of iron salts have shown little promise in controlling iron chlorosis in milo.

It is not presently possible for the laboratories of the A&M University to predict the occurrence of chlorosis by soil tests, however, where the pH value is 8.0 or above and/or the soil test shows an excess of 14,000 lbs CaO per acre, conditions are favorable for its occurrence. Cropping history is the

best single guide. Some varieties are more susceptible than others and the seed grower may assist in variety selection.

The application of additional nitrogen or phosphorus cannot correct iron chlorosis. There is a possibility that phosphates can make the condition worse under certain conditions.
