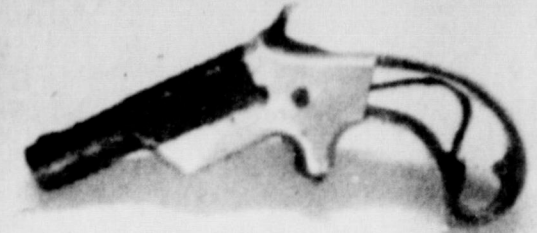

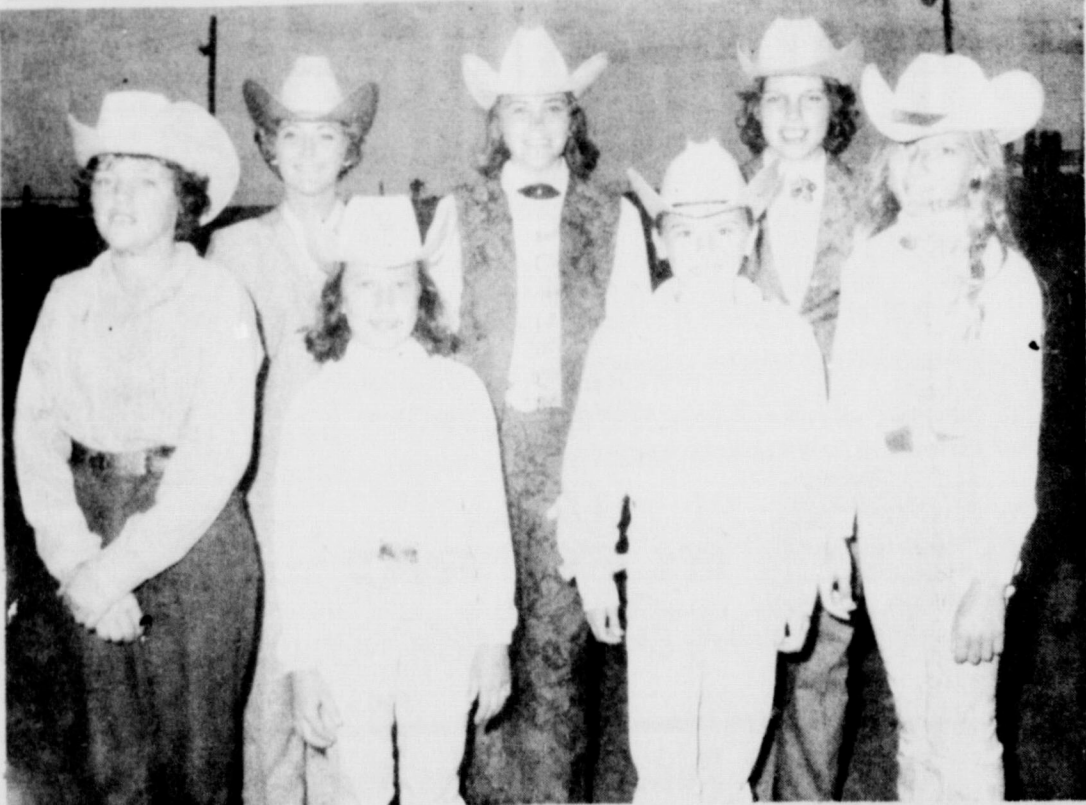
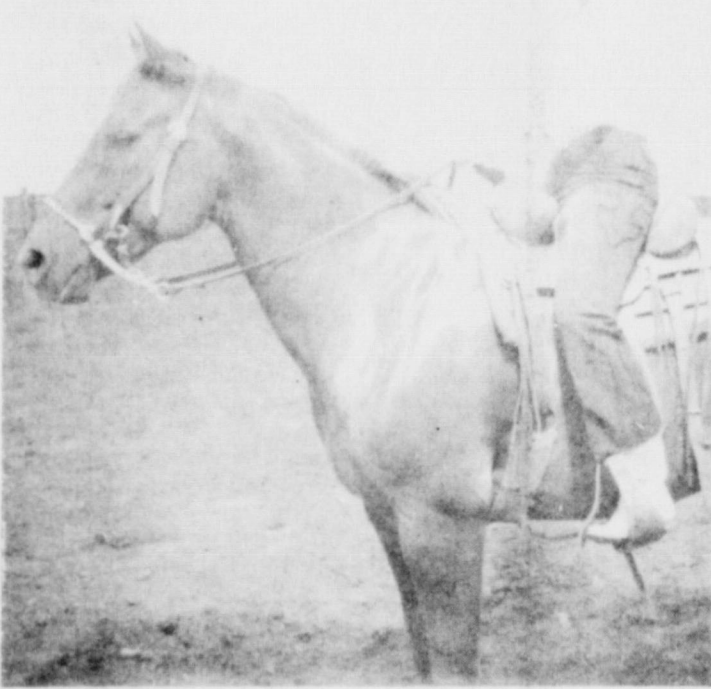

The annual Wheeler County Junior Rodeo will be kicked off Friday, June 25 and continue thru Saturday with the awarding of the trophies and ribbons after Saturday's program. 71 young people are scheduled to participate in the rodeo with age ranging from pre-school thru 19 years of age.

Activities will begin at 7:00 at the Wheeler Rodeo Arena each evening with the rodeo events to begin at 8:00. Thirteen contestants have been entered in the queen contest which will take place at 7:00 both evenings. The grand entry which will be held immediately following the queen event, will be led by Diane Dodd, 4-H Texas queen and president, on Friday night and Judy Finsterwald and Fred Goad, co-chairmen of the Wheeler County 4-H council, Saturday night.

The 71 contestants will be divided into eight divisions with a total of 28 events. Trophies will be awarded best all around in each of the 8 divisions. Ribbons will be awarded the top six contestants in each of the divisions. Each youth participating will receive a ribbon.

Both evenings of the rodeo will be started off with bull riding. The intermediate contestants will perform first both nights with the senior boys closing the nights' rodeo activities. Fourteen boys have entered the Intermediate bull riding and 15 boys have entered the senior bull riding.

The 28 events will be made up of fourteen different events. Contestants will participate in Pole Bending, Flag Race, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Saddle Race, Walk and Lead Race, Barrel Race, Ribbon Roping, Ribbon Goat

Race, Stick Horse Barrel Race, Goat Tying, Tire Race, Sack Race and Rescue Race.

A Sunbeam Mixmaster and a Skill Saw will be awarded to two lucky people Saturday night. Tickets are available from any 4-H member.

The 13 queen contestants will compete Friday evening in their horsemanship. Starting off Friday's activities the top three contestants will be picked and will take part in further competition for the selection of the Rodeo Queen. The crowning of the queen is set for the opening of Saturday's performance.

AMENDMENTS ADVANCE AGRICULTURE LEGISLATION

The 1965 farm bill should be under consideration by the senate committee on Agriculture and Forestry by now. Hearings were delayed these many weeks by its chairman, Sen. Allen J. Ellender, because of his active participation in the voting rights bill.

While the senate committee sat silent on this bill, the measure received a thorough section by section review by the various sub-committees of the House committee on Agriculture.

Witnesses representing the National Farmers Union led the way in the house hearings to improve and strengthen the bill sent to the hill by the administration. This includes the class I Dairy bill, sponsored by congressman W R Poage which was amended to include manufactured milk.

Although many of the final decisions were still subject to last minute change by the committee, at press time it was apparent Farmers Union had scored several major victories.

Notable are the decisions to expand the wheat and feed grain programs from two to four years, to get wheat production by section review by the various sub-committees of parity on domestically consumed production and an informal commitment that growers would receive some certificate payment on export wheat.

Wheat state members of the House Agriculture Committee want a mandatory certificate on export wheat called for in the bill introduced earlier this year by Congress-

man Graham Purcell (D-Tex.) And it can also be reliably reported that sale of crop allotments will not be approved, the rice program will not be changed and the wool bill, reported earlier by the Committee, will be adopted.

A decision is also likely to include both a dairy and a cotton section in the House version when it is finally reported as a clean bill.

Farmers union spokesmen, many of whom were farmers paying their own way to Washington from Montana, North and South Dakota, Arkansas, Texas, Idaho, Virginia and Kansas, have been here constantly to lend support to these successful efforts.

Reuben Johnson, NFU

Director of Legislative Services, attributed the success of Farmers Union Lobbying efforts mainly to "dirt-farmer witnesses who provide the labor, management and capital necessary to their farming operations."

Nematodes are causing a great deal of damage to cotton and several other crops grown in Wheeler County. Tests conducted recently reveals that several fields of cotton are heavily infested with this parasite. It is estimated that nematode damage reduces the nations farmers gross income by one-tenth. Our damage in Wheeler County is more severe than a lot of farmers realize.

I will first explain what a nematode is since many people are not familiar with this parasite. A plant-parasite nematode is a worm-shaped, almost microscopic animal. In some instances, the adults become pear to flash shaped. Both the male and female nematodes contain a complete digestive system, a well-developed excretory system and a type of respiratory system. No circulatory or respiratory system is known. Most plant parasitic nematodes are from 1/50 to 1/10 inch long.

General above-ground symptoms of nematode injury consist of stunted growth, loss of yield and plant deficiency symptoms. Seldom does a

nematode suddenly kill a plant, but the plant often slowly declines. Other symptoms of nematode are yellowing of foliage; forked, crooked or bushy appearance of fleshy tap roots such as carrots; stubby small root systems of plants with excessively branched roots; small roots larger near the tip end; wilting of apparently healthy (but sometimes not vigorous) plants in summer heat, reviving overnight; and abnormal brown or black spots on roots. Often one or more of the above symptoms are absent.

No control measures that will completely destroy all nematodes are known. In many cases control measures are practical, however and can give satisfactory results. Crop rotation, growing resistant crops or varieties, plowing three or four times during hot dry weather, proper cultivation, fumigation and fertilizing for fast plant growth are all methods of control.

Through the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program, fumigation demonstrations have been established on the J. R. Hefley farm at Twitty and the Raymond Moore farm at Kelton. Fumigation cost is ten dollars per acre at the present time and these demonstrations are set up to determine if fumigation will be profitable for nematode control in cotton for Wheeler County.

Anyone desiring additional information concerning nematodes is urged to ask for Texas Agricultural Extension Service Bulletin, MP-156, Plant Nematodes, at the County Agents Office.

Seven administrative districts, each headed by a district forester, are responsible for the activities of the Texas Forest Service. District headquarters are located at Linden, Henderson, Lufkin, Woodville, Kirbyville, Conroe and College Station. The general public can receive assistance on their forest management problems by contacting the district forester at any one of these locations.

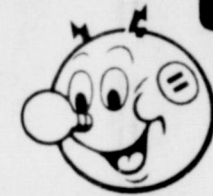
DID YOU KNOW THAT?

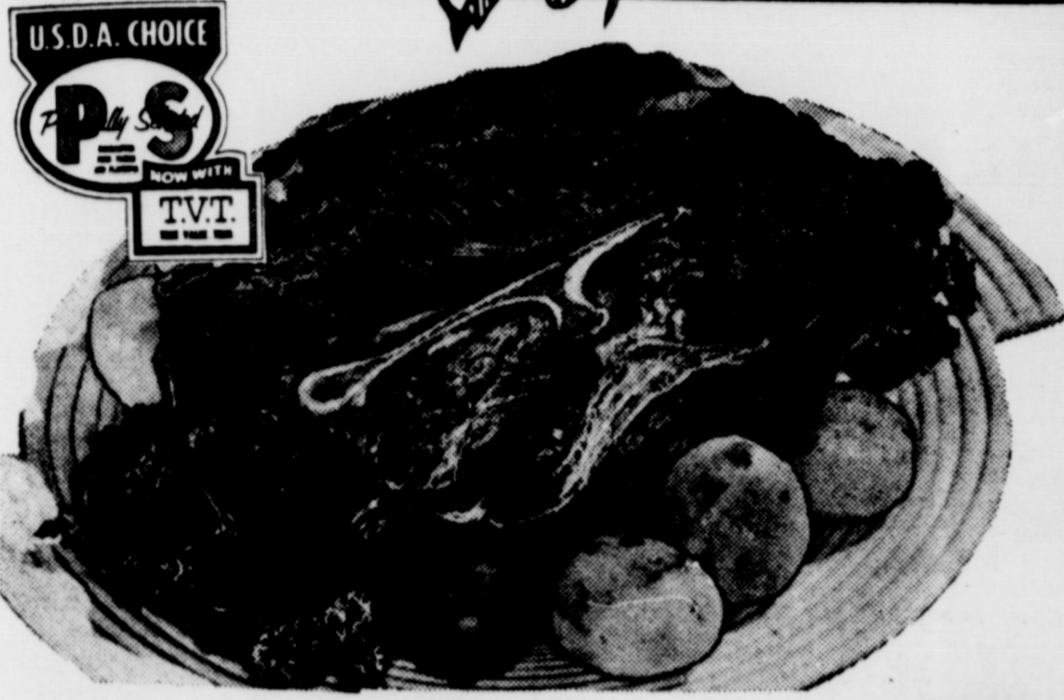

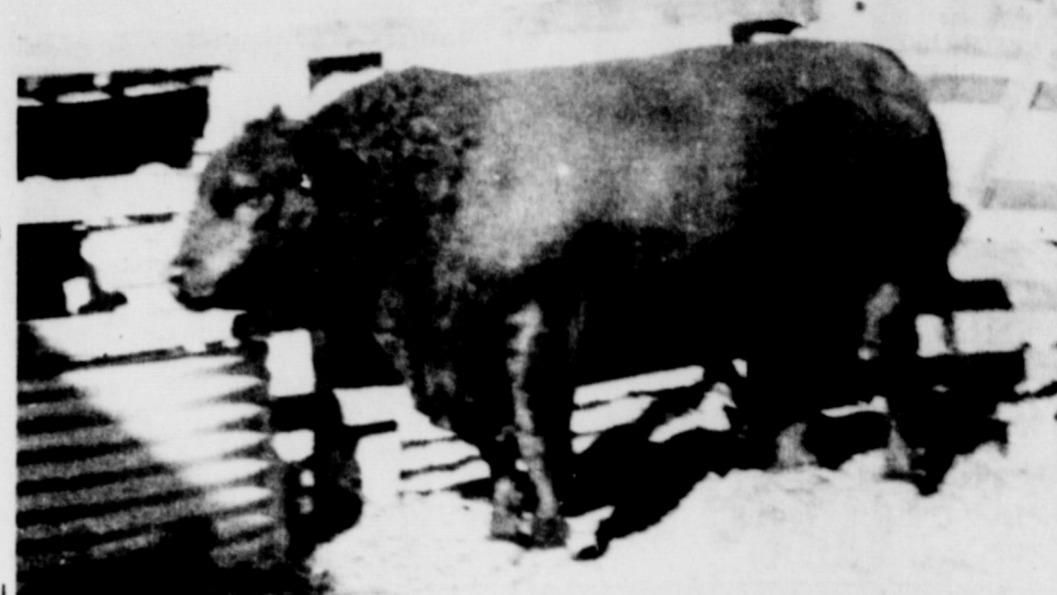

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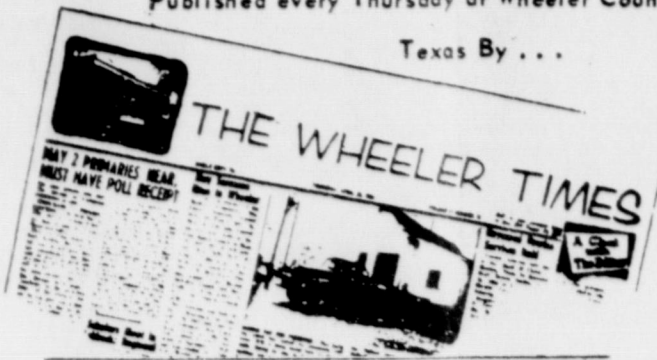

CHARLES JACKSON
Texas farmers and ranchers were asked this spring to contribute additional funds to help finance the screwworm eradication program through July 1. Their response, reported the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in late May, was overwhelming. The contributions almost doubled the \$300,000 requested.
Farmers and ranchmen in Wheeler County participated in the fund drive and showed their appreciation for the outstanding results obtained under the program, said Tom Puryear, Chairman of the County Screwworm program. County stockmen, he added, contributed \$1309.20 to the fund. Contributions, he said were based upon 10 cents per animal unit. Wheeler County quota was \$1400.00 and Mr. Puryear still expects to reach our goal. Over the state 126 counties exceed their goal. Dolph Briscoe, Jr. SWAHRF chairman, praised the livestock industry for its support of the program and gave special thanks to the county committee for their work in contacting farmers and ranchmen.
The foundation chairman said the latest fund drive had brought the total contributed by stockmen and sportsmen in the Southwest to almost \$4 million. Contributions have also come from Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana, Mississippi, Kansas and Indiana.
WHEAT CROP RESIDUE
The advantage of leaving wheat residue on the soil is in maintenance or improvement of soil structure. This reflected in better water intake rate, less runoff after rain and better soil tilth. Under irrigated conditions figure on having about 180 pounds of residue for every bushel of wheat produced. A 40-bushel crop will produce about 3 1/2 tons of straw. Under our dryland conditions straw will leave at least half the

There were 12 rural accidents in Wheeler County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.
