## 1152 REGISTER AT MOBEETIE REUNION

Miss Sorenson, a Wheeler county resident interested in the preservation of history, made the dedicatory speech. Mrs. Harris is chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Society. The marker and fence were erected by Bonnie Reed and Grady Harris last week.

The annual Old Settlers Reunion at Mobettie was bigger than ever this year as 1152 persons registered. 1200 pounds of beef and several gallons of beans were cooked in preparation for the large crowd. The weather was almost perfect for an enjoyable day of eating and visit-

ing with old friends. Chuck Hogan and Harry Wofford shared the position of emcee. Mr. Lester Red of California traveled 1720 miles to be at the annual celebration which gave him the honor of having traveled the farthest distance. Mrs. Mae Simmons of Wheeler at

the age of 91 was the oldest settler in attendance.

The annual Fiddlers contest was won this year by Bobby Scruggs of Amarillo. Shorty Loter of Wheeler placed second and Joe Lewis of Wellington placed third.

J.W. Anglin of Wheeler was recognized as the only person present with five generations of descendants.

Joe Shelton was elected as president of the reunion for the coming year. Lester Leonard will again serve as secretary-treasurer for the big event. Douglas Corse is the retiring president.

In addition to the fiddlers contest, entertainment was furnished by the Miami Stompers and the Hutchins Trio of Pampa.

Both the Democratic and Republican candidates were in attendance at the Labor Day event. Bob Price (R) and Dee Miller (D) candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives were recognized. Seibert Worley (D.) of Shamrock and Malouf Abraham (R.) of Canadian, candidates for State Representative were introduced.

Those in charge of the day's activities and Barbecue are to be congratulated for a fine job. Special recognition goes to Dick Wright for his part in cooking that delicious barbecue. He will have the same job next year.

Forace Dewayne Evans 25, was killed in a train-truck accident in Miami, Texas Wednesday, August 31, 1966.

Dewayne Evans was born in Wheeler, Texas August 16, 1941 to Forace and Newasa Evans. He was married to Ella May Richerson in Pampa, Texas.

Dewayne had lived in Allison and attended school there. He was residing in Wheeler with his wife and family at the time of his death. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Allison.

Surviving are his wife, Ella May; one son, Mike; one daughter, Teresa of Wheeler; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Forace Evans of Allison; one sister, Mrs. Betty Jean Arran of Graham Texas, one brother, Larry Don of Lubbock and his grandfather, A.B. Evans of Allison.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler on Friday September 2, 1966 at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. Joe Jones of Allison and Rev. Dale Cain of Wheeler officiating.

cation Department at Mary Hardin Baylor College. She also taught at Pamona College in Pamona Beach, California. She joined the American Red Cross in 1942 and served for 22 years until she retired in 1964. During that time she had served 3 years in Japan, 2 years in the Philippines, 1 year in Guam and 3 years in Europe.

Surviving are four sisters: Mrs. Joe Clark of Lefors, Mrs. Gordon Reynolds of Shelbyville, Ky., Mrs. Brook Crabb of Dumas and Mrs. Gordon Stiles of Wheeler; three brothers: Dr. A.C. Wood of Marble Falls, Texas, Dr. L.G. Wood of Rockport, Texas and T.O. Wood of Cape Kennedy, Florida.

## TRUCK-TRAIN WRECK FATAL TO 1

From the Miami Chief) A 25 year old Wheeler truck driver became the seventh person to die at the Santa Fe Railroad's Main Street crossing in Miami less than four years, Wednesday, August 31, when the 1964 Mack diesel trailer truck he was driving was struck by an east bound Santa Fe freight train. The accident occurred at 3:26 p.m.

Killed was Forest Dewayne Evans, who died approximately 30 minutes following the accident. He never regained consciousness after being thrown from the truck and approximately 100 feet from the point of

impact. The train, pulled by two diesel units was traveling 62 miles per hour when it struck the truck's cab. The trailer loaded with approximately 46,000 pounds of wheat remained on the street. Evans apparently did not see the oncoming train as he pulled into its path.

The wreckage of the truck was strewn along the track for approximately 200 yards and none of it remained on the front of the train's engine. The engines were covered with flaming diesel fuel after striking the truck and Miami volunteer firemen took almost

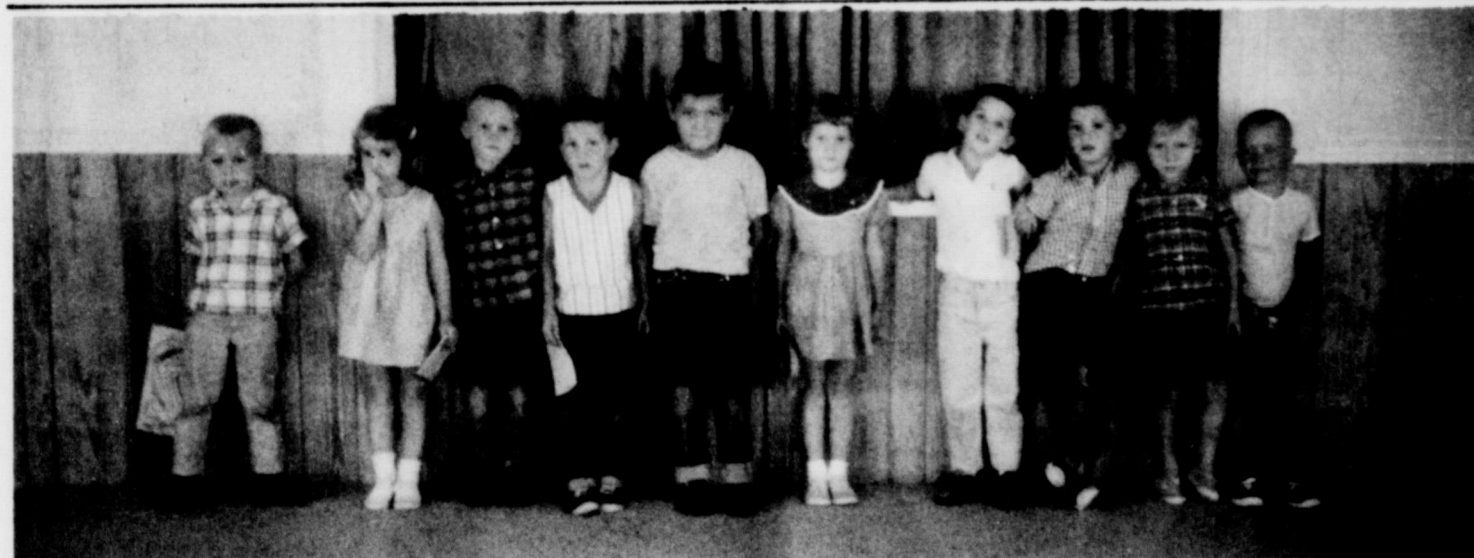
an hour to extinguish the blaze. Each of the two diesel units' tanks were filled with 3,000 gallons of diesel fuel and both tanks were punctured in the crash but firemen kept the fuel from igniting. The train came to a stop some 300 yards east of the Miami Cemetery.

Evans, who observed his 25th birthday on August 16 had hauled five or six loads of grain from the Miami Feed & Grain elevator in the past two weeks. He had just completed loading the truck and was enroute to Dallas. The truck was owned by his father-in-law, Cecil Richerson of Wheeler.

G.P. Williamson, the engineer and Kenneth E. Rowley the fireman, both of Amarillo, both said Evans apparently never saw the approaching train as he pulled into its path.

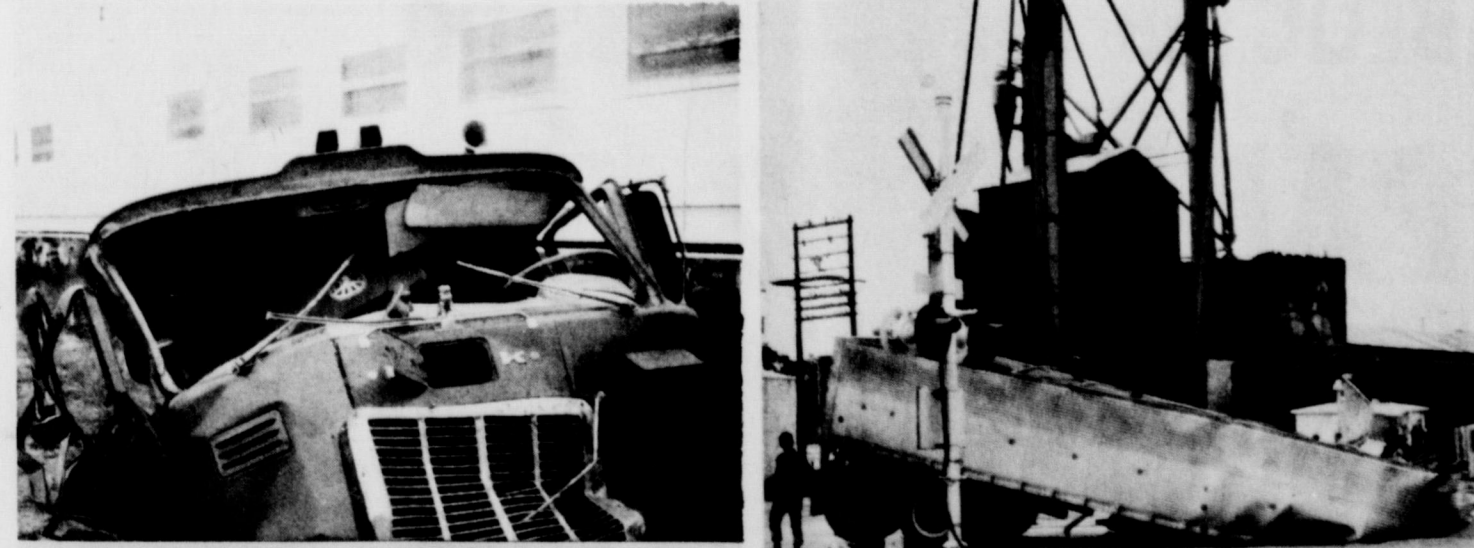
The windshield on the left side of the train's engine was completely broken out and at least two bushels of wheat covered the floor of the cab. Rowley, who was sitting on that side, escaped serious injuries by falling to the floor just before the crash.

Ironically, the accident occurred as railroad employees were working on the installation of gates at the crossing.

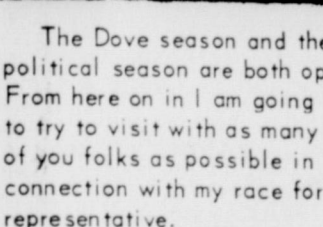

Students usually choose to ignore the nutrition aspect when it comes to satisfying hunger pangs, snacking on only that which is either tasty or filling or handy, says Jacque Filiatreau, secretary for the sausage council. He explains that the hot dog is all three, but in addition it contains Body-building protein, plus many vitamins and minerals and contains only 146 calories.  
 The Sausage council spokesman added that "the hot dog is certainly the noblest dog of all. It feeds the hand that bites it," he quipped.  
 While it is common to think of the hot dog as reclining in a bin, the versatility and flexibility of the popular food knows no limitations. It turns up in casseroles, salads, pizzas and hors d'oeuvres.  
 Selling more frankfurters is one method of selling more beef, pork and veal since the meat that goes into sausage products comes from the same animals that produce steaks, chops and roasts.  
 A wonderful family relationship can be achieved by doing things together, says Miss Lucille Moore, Extension recreation specialist at Texas A&M University.  
 There are many things families can do together, both at home and on vacations. For example, during warm weather the family can plan for facilities to cook and eat outdoors. Good projects include building or installing their own fireplaces, barbecue pits, tables, benches, lighting or a small patio or shelter.  
 Another family "togetherness" project is making recreational equipment. In a short time, some 2'x4' boards and an old pipe can become a chinning and hand-swinging bar. A pole about 10 feet tall with a ball suspended from a 6 foot spring makes an excellent tether ball game. Some small tin cans for cups, golf clubs and balls can provide good family fun in the yard.  
 The whole family can enjoy a program of family fitness, especially during the summer months. Plan a family field and track event daily, whether it be running, jumping or throwing and general calisthenics for loosening up lax muscles. Crosscountry hiking and bicycling are excellent conditioners.  
 A family hiking club can be fun. Have every member of the family in charge of something he can do, whether it be planning the route, checking the equipment or planning something to do along the way. Hike to some scenic spot. At the start, hiking should be done at a slow easy pace. Increase the speed and distance as the family becomes conditioned.  
 Other family fun includes acquainting yourself with local as well as nationwide history and folklore. Start with your own city and then branch out in everwidening circles. For a start, draw a 50-mile circle around your community and visit all the places of interest within it.
