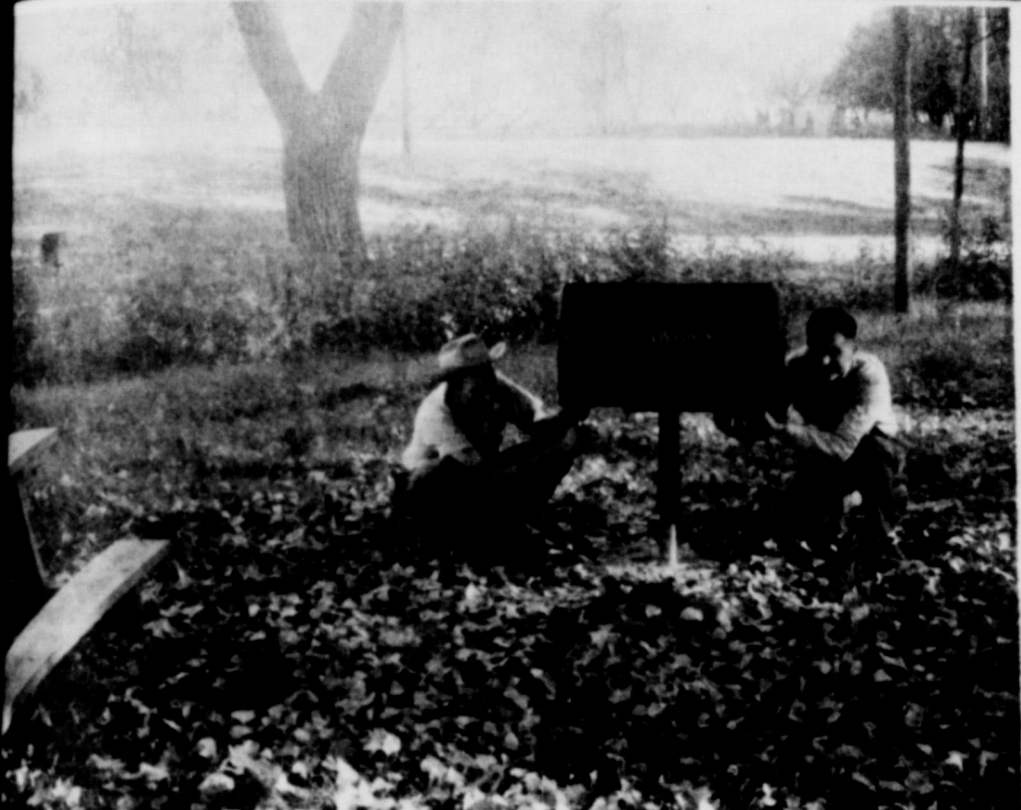

SNOW & 19 DEGREE WEATHER FOLLOW NOVEMBER'S ARRIVAL

Wheeler citizens started the month of November off with the first hard freeze and the first flakes of snow. An overnight low of 19 degrees was reported by Joe Rogers Wednesday morning. The first flakes of snow started to fall at 9 a.m. Tuesday. It was difficult to see the first flakes of snow Tuesday morning, but they were there. The falling snow became thicker around 11:00 and the clouds cleared for the sun to shine before noon. The cold north wind was whistling down the local merchants necks as they washed the Halloween soap off their store windows. The cold front came through Monday evening around 5:00 and a good strong breeze continued through Tuesday to let us know that winter is upon us. In checking with Mr. Rogers, comparisons were made with last year's first freeze and snow. Wheeler County farmers were needing a late freeze last year to insure a cotton crop and the first hard freeze was not recorded until Nov. 27 of last year. 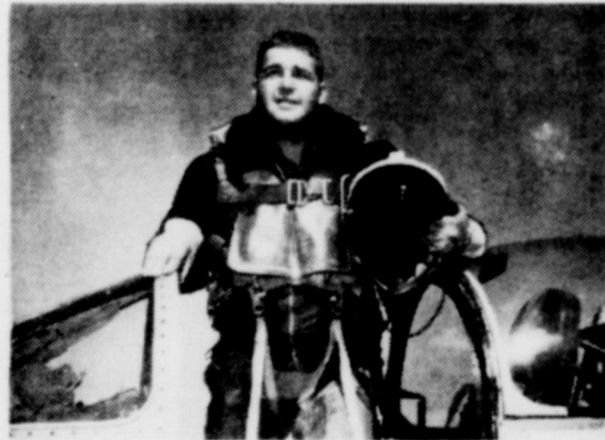

Race With Rising Food Costs

Much emphasis is being placed on ways the homemaker can beat the grocer's cash register. According to Esther Peterson, President Johnson's special assistant on consumer affairs, variety and planning are the keys for homemakers who want to buy to make the most of a dollar. There is no limit to how much homemakers can spend or how much one can save. Unfortunately, research shows that those who need most to know how to shop; teenage brides, poor families and the uneducated-know least how to do it.

Many homemakers ask the question "How do I get the best buy" in the supermarket? Comparison shopping among the liked products to determine which one gives the most for the money seems the only answer. Today, the average supermarket carries 6,000 to 8,000 food items; of which more than 40% of these have reached the market since 1953.

Homemakers seem to be buying more and more of a great variety of pre-washed pre-peeled, pre-cooked and pre-packaged products that are lumped under the heading "convenience foods." For the one in three working American wives, the preparation time saved is like putting an extra helper in the kitchen.

But between farm and retail stores, some one has done the peeling, washing, cooking and packaging. However, economists can show that some convenience foods are actually cheaper than their fresh counterparts because they are more compact to ship and store and they have a longer shelf life. For example, frozen and canned peas are cheaper than fresh ones.

AUTUMN—Time to Rake Leaves

Autumn is here and it is time to get out the old rake and begin the yearly chore of keeping our lawns free of the blankets of fallen leaves which a autumn brings.

Dead leaves should be removed from lawns, not only to make the lawn to look more attractive but also to prevent damage to them.

But, all too often the leaves are burned or hauled to the dump. A much better procedure would be to compost them and provide a ready source of composted soil for flower beds, shrub borders, potted plants and for topdressing the lawn.

The simplest way to compost leaves or other vegetable matter is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of the vegetable matter with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil. Sprinkling a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter will

hasten decomposition. One-half pound or one cupful of 10-10-10, 10-6-4, 10-20-0 or the equivalent, per ten square feet of vegetable matter is sufficient. Manure may also be added to good advantage to the soil layer.

The compost pile should be 4 to 6 feet wide and of any desired length. The top layer should be soil and the surface should slope to the center forming a basin to catch water. The compost should be watered thoroughly when it is completed and additional water should be added to keep the material moist but not soggy.

The compost should be turned or mixed with a pitchfork or shovel every three or four months and within six months to a year it should be ready for use. The process can be speeded up through the use of commercial compost activators which speed up the decomposition process.

Four Home Demonstration clubs met Thursday, Oct. 27 at Kelton for the County Wide Harvest Tea. The highlight of the tea was crowning Mrs. Edgar Blocker of Kelton, "Wheeler County Homemaker of the Year." A complete feature story on Mrs. Blocker's homemaking skills will be completed soon. Other nominees were Mrs. J.P. Hall, Blue Bonnet club; Mrs. Lucy Henderson, Three Leaf Club of Shamrock; and Mrs. Claude Barker, Briscoe club.

Some of the accomplishments of the 55 homemakers for 1966 are as follows: The number pounds of beef and poultry frozen this year was 17,295 lbs. The women of Wheeler County are continuing to freeze and can fruits and vegetables, 3,064 pints of fruit and vegetables were frozen, 3,619 pints of fruits and vegetables canned and 2,381 pints of jams, jellies, relishes and pickles.

Nine hundred and sixty-three garments were made during the year and 811 articles were made. These accomplishments are truly remarkable.

Besides doing homemaking skills the women had time to do community services. All of the home demonstration clubs prepared fruit and visited the Shamrock nursing home once a month. Each club contributes to the Cancer Fund and two clubs send gifts to the boys from Wheeler County at the Travis State School in Austin.

The Briscoe club served

the FFA banquet last April and also served the Junior and Seniors a supper. The clubs engaged in club recreational activities as coffee, supper's picnics, birthday parties and Forty-two parties.

None of us are too old to learn something new in home making skills. This year's programs have been based around housing and home furnishings. Next year the clubs will study clothing selection and new techniques in construction.

It is our hope to form a home demonstration club in Wheeler this next year. If you are interested contact the extension office.

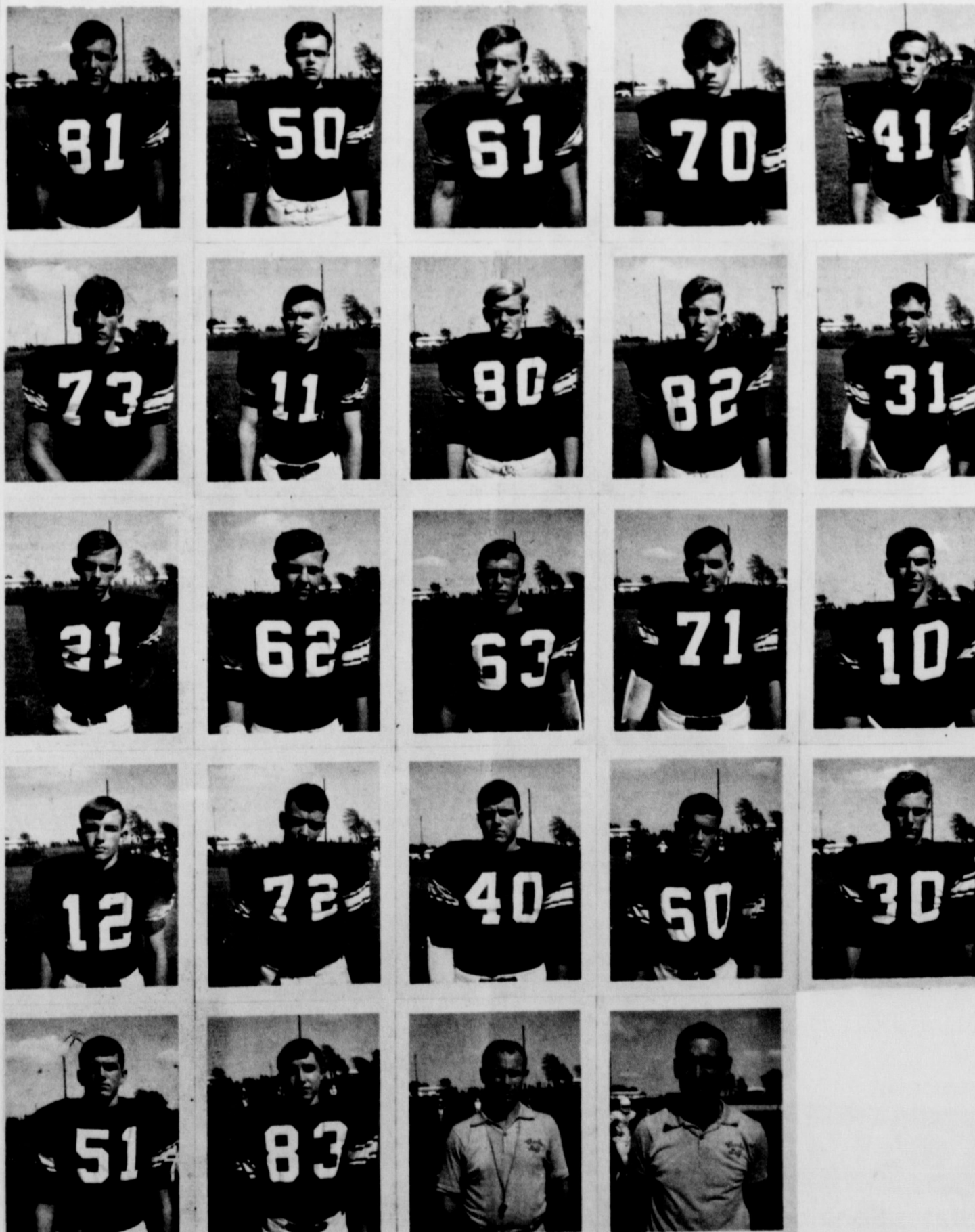
