### MUSTANGS TO HOST ERICK BEARCATS

After successfully inaugurating the 1966 football season with a 26-0 victory over Lefors, the Wheeler Mustangs go after their second win of the year this Friday night as they play host to the Erick Bearcats.

Sayre and no doubt are looking forward to meeting the Mustangs who have completely dominated them the last few years.

This game will mark the second of four consecutive non-conference games to be played on Nicholson Field. Game time is 8:00 p.m. and another big crowd is anticipated.

### SHERIFF'S DEPT. HUNTS DOG; GIRL BITTEN SUN.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Henson were in the house at the time. Ross heard the commotion and went out to find the dog fastened to the girl's cheek and nose. He kicked the dog hard enough that it let go and ran off. They have no idea who the dog belongs to or where it went after the incident.

The dog was described as a dashound, yellow in

color with white spots. No collar or tags was noticeable. It was noted that the dog held its tail high. If you own or know the whereabouts of such a dog, please contact the County Sheriff, Bus Dorman.

After a listless and sluggish first half, the Wheeler Mustangs came to life and rolled over the Lefors Pirates for a 26-0 victory before a near capacity crowd at Nicholson Field last Friday night.

This was the first encounter for Coach J.T. Hill's Mustangs since they made the move into Class A competition and the 1966 season promises to be one of the most competitive the Mustangs have faced in several years.

Only 6:45 remained in a scoreless first half when the Mustangs drew first blood as Fred Goad capped a 64 yard drive with a scoring dash of 8 yards up the middle. The Mustangs had driven inside the Pirate 30 yard line on two occasions in the first quarter but the Pirates held for downs and a fumble stopped the other drive.

Two plays after scoring their initial TD, the Mustangs had another golden opportunity when they recovered a fumble on the Lefors 24 but this drive fizzled out on the 10.

The Mustangs came back in the second half and continued to probe the inside of the Pirate line and completely dominated the contest in the last two quarters. Doing nothing but running straight at the Pirates, the Mustangs got on the scoreboard for the second time with 4:21 to go in the third period. Twelve

plays were needed to grind out the 53 yards on this drive and Goad once more found the hole at left guard and drove in from 11 yards out. Bobby Vanpool skirted right end for two points.

Lefors was unable to get any kind of a threat mounted in the final two periods as the Mustangs defense proved to be too tough for the visitors. The Pirates made only 2 first downs and 19 yards the last half as the Wheeler line stopped the running game cold and put enough pressure on the passing attack to make the Pirate quarterbacks rush their throws.

Forcing Lefors to punt following the second half kickoff, the Mustangs drove 61 yards to paydirt with the score coming on the second play of the last quarter. Donald Rives got the TD on a 2 yard charge at right tackle. The big ground gainer in the drive was a 28 yard screen pass from David Jamison to Rives.

The Mustangs final score of the game came moments after their third TD as a Pirate fumble was recovered on the Lefors 10 yard line. Just two plays were needed and Goad barged up the middle from three yards out and with the try for points failing the scoring was finished for the night.

Rives and Goad made 120 and 71 yards respectfully to lead the Mustang ball carriers as Coach Hill was able to play his entire squad in the second half.

### FORMER EDITOR OF TIMES DIES AT SILVER CITY, N.M.

**OBITUARY NOTE:** Douglas Merriman was received Friday afternoon June 30 of J.D. Merriman, Jr., editor of the Wheeler Times during the summer months. He was with his parents in Silver City, N.M. and graduated from the State Normal School. The following obituary was written by his sister, Mrs. J.M. Merriman of Pampa.

Mr. Douglas Merriman, born June 26, 1898, in Wheeler, Texas. He was the best son of J.D. Merriman, Jr., school teacher and newspaper editor and Ida Belle Merriman of West Virginia. Mr. Merriman was reared in the practical pieties of his father's Methodist faith and his father's passion for knowledge, industry, and poverty, depression, and war, through the hardships that touch all men.

Illnesses of the flesh and two strands of loving care to his family and embracing love of the world—these were the motifs. Merriman received his education in the schools of his home, where he grew to manhood. He attended Clark Junior College and graduated just before the First World War. A year as a country teacher, he took up his profession of journalism. He edited papers in Wheeler and Pampa, Texas and later in Pampa and Silver City, N.M.

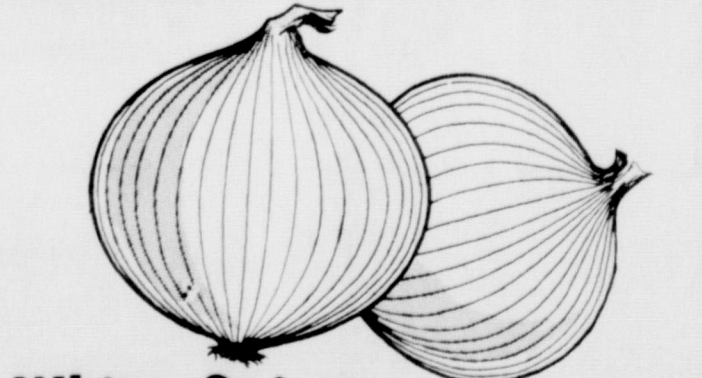

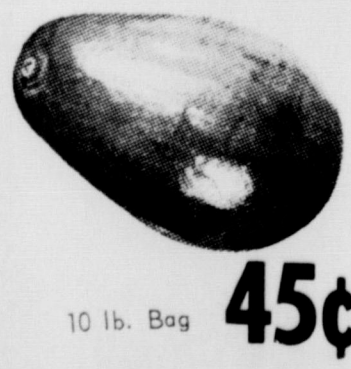

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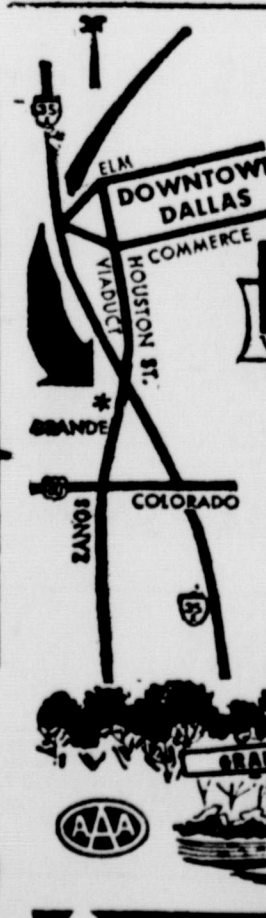

**S.C.S. SUMMER EMPLOYEE**

As a summertime employee of the Soil Conservation Service, I have learned much in the field of soil conservation. There are many operations connected with conservations

and I was introduced to some such as engineering, conservation planning, map reading and measuring. Engineering is the laying out of projects to be constructed such as ponds, dams, diversions, fences, waterways, standard terraces and parallel terraces. Conservation planning is preparing a conservation plan for farmers and ranchers in developing their land. Reading and measuring of maps is important in locating property and determining acreages. These are some, but in order to achieve these, one has to know government procedure and how to cooperate with others. All of these are essential in developing a good plan of operation.

Before going to work for the S.C.S., I had little knowledge of what its purpose was or how it was carried out. After working with them I found their aim was to help farmers and ranchers use their soil and water resources efficiently, profitably and without waste. In doing so a cost share is available to help carry this out. 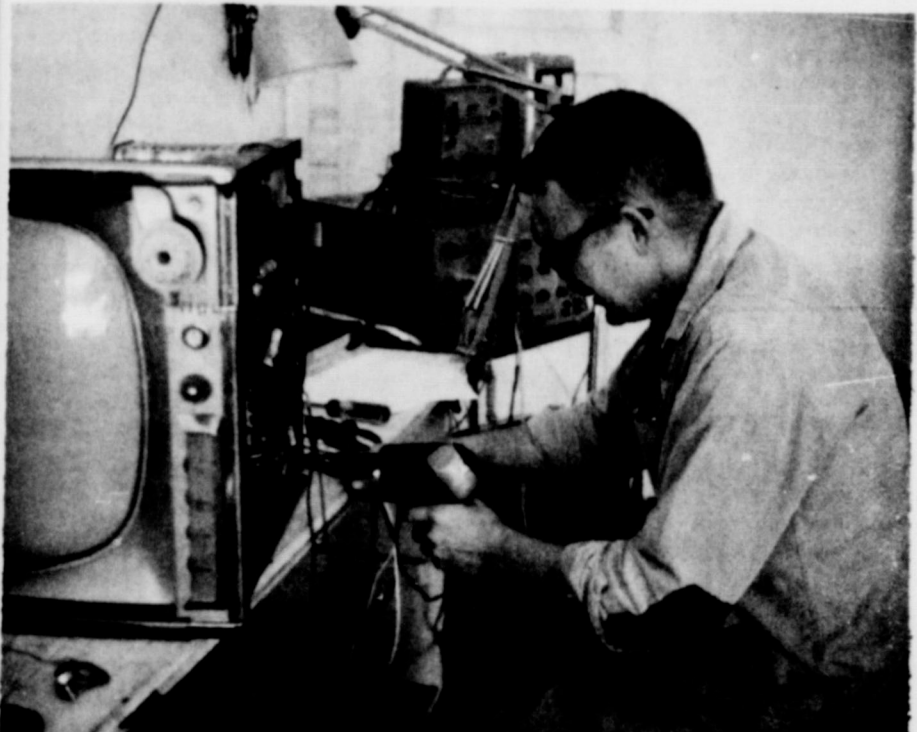

## How To Care For New Fabrics

By Vivian Warminski

With many new fabrics on the market, homemakers often are confused about how to care for them.

Here are some answers to commonly asked questions about shirt materials.

1. Should the new Durable Press sport shirts be drip-dried? They don't have to be. Let them go through the whole wash-rinse-spin cycle and put them on hangers to dry. Through they won't look as good when dry-dried, hanger-drying on many fabrics gives about as good results as drip-drying. And you won't have to stop the washer before the final spin to remove the shirt.

2. Are madras shirts machine washable? Usually madras shirts can be machine laundered, but be sure to wash them separately. Genuine madras dyes will bleed--they're supposed to. Some fabrics, however, are woven to look like real madras, but are dyed with colorfast dyes that will go through machine-laundering with no color change. You will usually find an assurance of colorfastness on hangtags accompanying these shirts.

3. Is there any way to freshen dingy looking shirts? Sometimes putting shirts through a hot-water, full cycle wash will do the trick even though your normal washing procedure calls for a gentle approach. But wash whites only with whites. Some fibers especially nylon pick up color from garments that normally don't bleed. Yellowed or grayed shirts can often be whitened with a bleach or with a color remover.

4. How can you remove wrinkles from tricot fabrics. High temperatures (above 160 degrees F.) in either washer or dryer are what really set wrinkles into polyester or nylon tricot fabrics. When you machine-launder such fabrics, use a short wash cycle on warm water setting and dry at lowest temperature setting on the dryer.

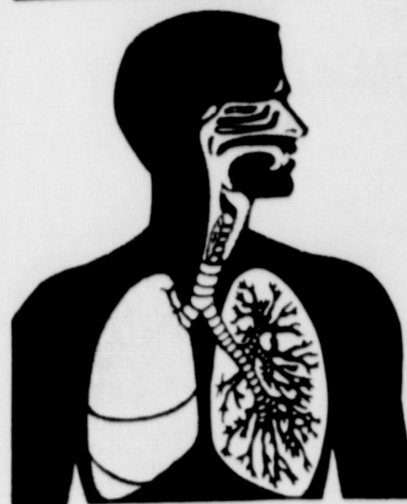

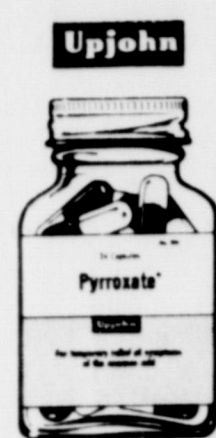
