

G JURY IS DISMISSED

The charge of Murder with Malice was dropped against Riley Bradstreet by the Grand Jury called Monday of this week. Bradstreet stated that the death of Dale Satterfield, 20, of Amarillo, last Oct. 23, was an accident resulting from a quick draw contest.

Six other cases were brought before the Grand Jury with four pleading Guilty. Indicted was Luther Tucker on a charge of the theft of 7 hogs on Oct. 3 from Davis.

Riley Bradstreet pled guilty to charges of receiving and concealing stolen property. He was given a five year probated sentence. A theft charge in an earlier incident was dropped due to insufficient evidence.

Billy Ray Jackson pled guilty to a charge of assault with intent to murder and received three years probated sentence.

Franklin Nall pled guilty to a burglary and was given five years probation.

Burglary charges against Bulb Alexander resulted in two years probation after he pled guilty to the charge.

Mr. John Baird, who farms northeast of Kelton lost the sideboards of his cotton trailer. The Fire Department has had their regular season of cotton gin fires. The most serious was at Wheeler Gin Sunday, Nov. 20 when 10 bales of cotton burned. Damage was estimated at \$8,500. W.D. Mitchell, owner of M. and A. Gin was injured Tuesday when he caught his hand in the machinery. M&A Gin reports 1392 bales and Wheeler Gin reported 904 bales ginned.

Mrs. Grady Harris of Wheeler, county chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey committee, will be on the program of the 1966 annual meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey committee and the Texas Historical Foundation.

The meeting will be Dec. 1, 2, 3 in Ft. Worth at the Green Oaks Inn.

Mrs. Harris's topic will be Beautification. This will be during the session on preservation.

A highlight of the event will be an address on Dec. 2 by Stewart L. Udall, secretary of the U.S. department of the Interior.

Activities at the meeting will include award presentations to outstanding county historical survey committees throughout Texas, orientation of new committees, a review of 1966's work and planning for 1967's work programs.

Workshops will be conducted on the Development of History as a Tourist Attraction, Historical Markers and marker research, history appreciation, preservation, archives, Written and Living history; historic buildings and sites; beautification; methods to acquaint the Texas public with Texas Heritage and cooperation with Commissioners' Courts, Chambers of Commerce and Civic Organizations.
