PAVING TO BE VOTED ON TUES CITY TAXES WILL NOT BE RAISED FOR CITY'S PART

Tuesday, March 14, will be the day Wheeler Citizens will decide the fate of a 30 block paving program for the city. The ballots will be cast at the city office with the polls open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The bond issue does not call for an increase in taxes for Wheeler citizens. The \$55,000 cost to the city will be obtained through an increase in water and sewer rates. By increasing the water and sewer rates, the City Council feels that everyone (including temporary residents) will pay their share of the cost.

The only cost to the property owner will be \$3.95 per front foot of paving, curb and gutter. The City of Wheeler will pay 40% of the cost of the paving project. The cost to a property owner with a 50 ft. front would be \$197.00. The total cost to the property owner can be divided into four payments.

The minimum water and

sewer rates would be raised 50¢ each. The proposed raise in rates would mean \$6,000 increased income per year for the city. The increased income would be sufficient to pay off the city's \$55,000 portion of the paving without increasing taxes. With the increased water and sewer, water would be \$2.50 per 3,000 gal. and minimum sewer rate would be \$2.00 per month. This would mean a total cost to the residents of \$12.00 per year.

The program is a revision of the Nov. 22 program which was voted down 213 to 130. The new program calls for the paving with curb and gutter for 30 blocks. The earlier project called for the paving of 84 blocks.

In referring to the second bond election, Mayor Don Earney stated, "We aren't trying to cram a paving program down anyone's throat. We feel that the city needs the paving in order to prosper and progress. And wouldn't it be a shame to let our new

\$750,000 school overlook dirt streets.

"The first paving program called for the paving of 84 blocks. Mayor Earney stated, "We have tried our best to cut out the blocks where we received most of our opposition in our first bond election and we hope this reduced program will satisfy the majority of our citizens."

"In our first bond election we were apparently hitting some of our senior citizens pretty hard. Many of them living on corners with paving in front and on the side would have found it very difficult to pay for the paving. We have tried to eliminate as many of the side streets as possible," the Mayor stated.

If you have any questions on the program, call the Mayor or one of the councilmen.

Two reminders: Your taxes will not be raised and be sure to vote Tuesday, March 14, at the city office between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

As good weather prevailed Saturday, the Lefors annual relay track meet was held with Class A and B teams competing for top honors. Wheeler came in 5th in Class A competition.

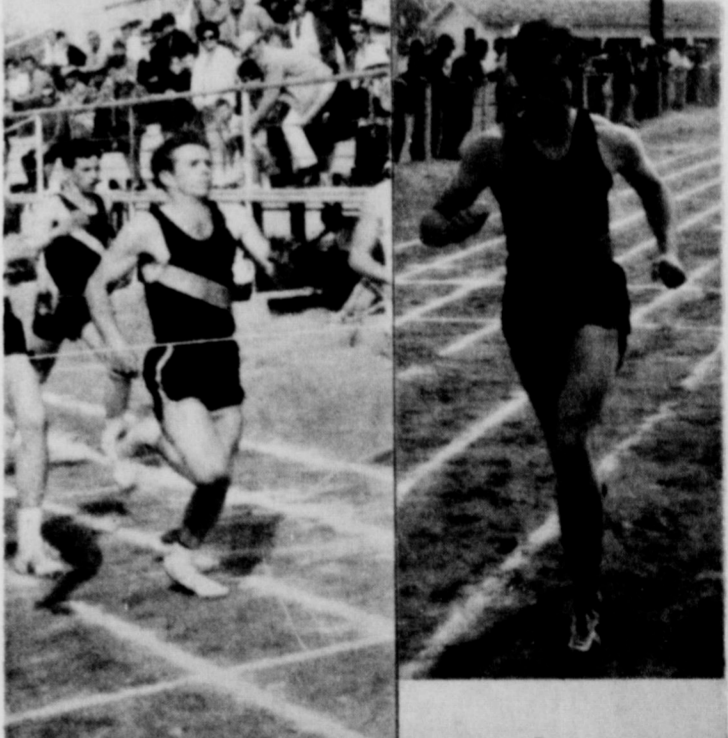
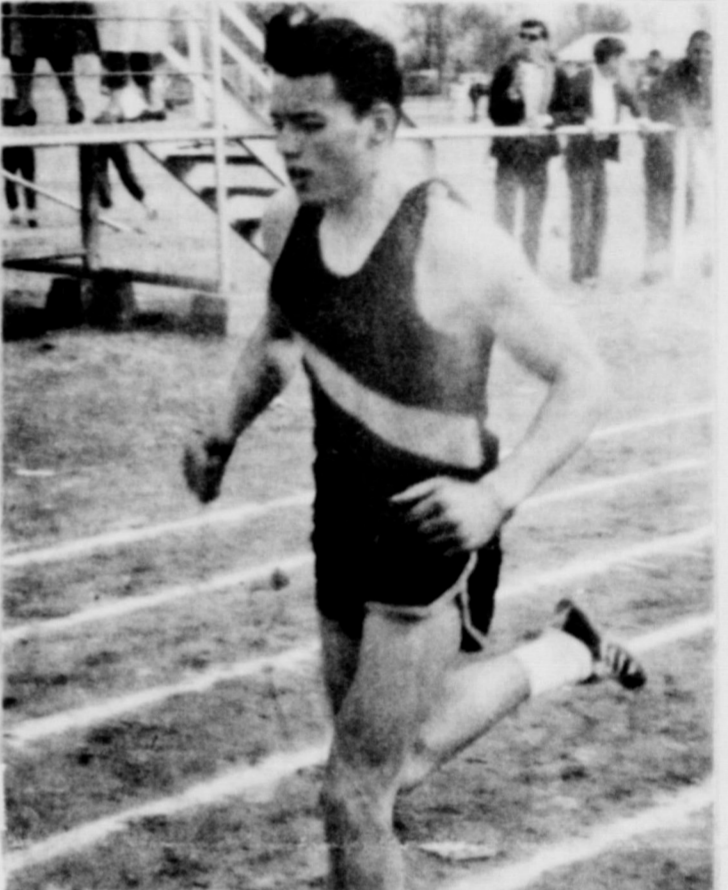
Several old records held by Wheeler County youths were broken that day.

A Chat with The Editor

You the citizens will have an opportunity to decide the fate of the proposed 30 block paving program in Tuesday's election. The decision as to whether Wheeler will have paved streets will be left up to you.

Think carefully before you cast your ballot. Study the map and then look at the streets which the City Council has mapped for paving. One well traveled street which would be paved-if the election carries-is Canadian Street. The proposed paving of Canadian street would run from Eleventh street to the north City limits.

Of the most importance in the proposed paving is the two blocks which run in front of Wheeler's new \$750,000 school plant. This area will have to be paved and if this election does not carry, the City Council will most likely have to find a way to do the necessary paving around the school.

If the March 14 election fails to carry, it looks like to me you might as well get ready for the water and sewer rates to be raised anyway. I feel they will take this means of obtaining the money to pave in front of the school.

Easter Seal Appeal Letters

Easter Seal Appeal letters are being delivered this week in Wheeler County, according to Mr. Joe D. Rogers who is the Easter Seal Representative for the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

As Representative, Mr. Rogers serves as contact representative for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also serves as treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in Wheeler County.

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal.

The Society also provides for research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions, finances public education programs and provides scholarships for training of personnel to staff rehabilitation centers.

Mr. Rogers pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1966, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services to 11,045 children and 4,986 adults who were in need of rehabilitation services.

These services are available to anyone disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Rogers added.

The Easter Seal campaign will run through Easter Sunday March 26, Mr. Rogers urged increased support for the Easter Seal Society and its program of services to crippled children and adults.

Raisins For Meals And Snacks

By Vivian C Warminski
Raisins are grapes that have been dried in the sun. They are a rich source of natural fruit sugar which is nature's way of giving quick energy.
The seedless sun-dried raisins now being distributed to families are packed in one-pound cartons. Each carton contains about three cups of raisins.
Store raisins in a cool dry place. Once opened, store in the refrigerator in an airtight container, such as a fruit jar, to keep them moist and by rinsing them in cold water or by keeping them overnight under a clean damp towel.
USE RAISINS TO FURNISH QUICK ENERGY ANY TIME OF THE DAY:
For Breakfast: Serve hot or cold cereal and toss in a handful of raisins, or add some raisins to pancake or waffle batter for an extra taste treat.
Use your homemade raisin bread to make delicious French Toast. Dip slices of raisin bread in an egg and milk

mixture, (1/2 cup milk per egg) Brown on both sides in hot fat. Serve with honey or syrup.
For Lunch:
Enhance fruit salads, vegetable salads or cottage cheese salads by adding raisins.
Try Sloppy Jones with raisins added--1 tablespoon raisins per sandwich.
For Dinner:
For a taste surprise add raisins to vegetables, salads meats or desserts.
Make an east raisin sauce to serve over ice cream, puddings or baked desserts: Cover the raisins with fruit juice or syrup from canned fruit. Chill for several hours.
RAISIN BREAD:
1 3/4 Cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
2 Eggs
3/4 cup milk
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 Tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon, if you like
1 cup raisins
Mix shortening and sugar well in large bowl. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in half

the milk. Mix together flour, salt, baking powder and cinnamon. Add half of dry ingredients to egg mixture and mix well. Stir in rest of milk and rest of dry ingredients. Add raisins and mix well.
Pour into a well greased loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. 40 minutes. Makes one loaf.
RAISIN STUFFED BAKED APPLES:
6 baking apples
1 cup raisins
1/2 cup honey
1 tablespoon margarine or butter
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg if you like
1 cup hot water
Wash apples well. Core apples and put in baking pan. Mix raisins, honey, margarine and nutmeg. Fill apples with raisin mixture. Pour hot water into pan. Bake at 375 degrees F. 45 minutes until apples are tender. Makes 6 servings.
HINTS FOR PREPARING RAISINS:
Chopping Raisins: Add one teaspoon melted margarine, butter or oil to a cup of raisins, stir well, spread on chopping board and chop with straight bladed knife.

To chop raisins very fine, without the added fat, freeze them first.
Plumping Raisins: When recipes call for plumped raisins, cover raisins with cold water and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and

let stand 5 minutes or longer. Drain.
Another good method of plumping is to cover raisins with fruit juice or drained syrup from canned fruit. Cover and place in refrigerator. This can be also used as a sauce for desserts.

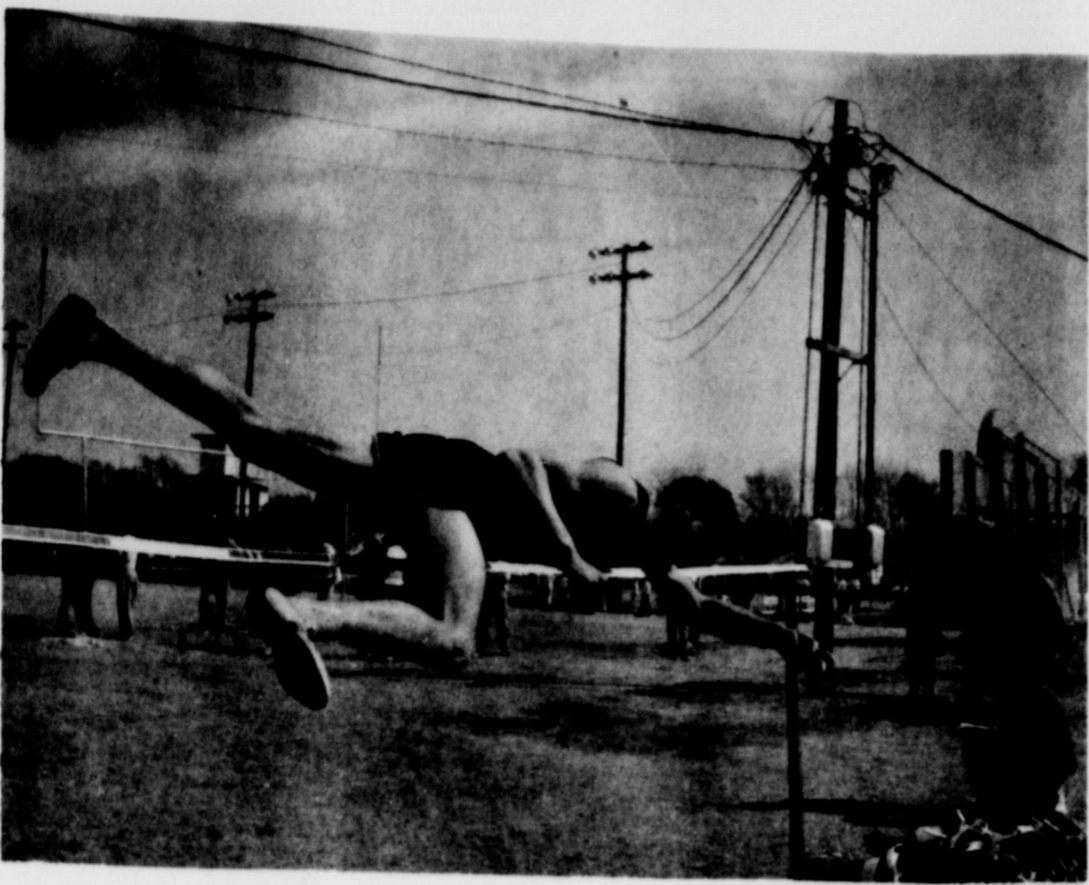
Harold Perdue Attends Briefing

Harold C. Perdue, has returned from the 1967 Crusade Briefing Session of District III-N held in Amarillo February 17, 1967.

Leaders of the Crusade against Cancer of the American Cancer Society participated in a day long session to evaluate past successes and to chart the future of the statewide campaign which will culminate in the House-to-Home Drive, in April.

New aspects of the Crusade were emphasized by Dr. Charles Gholston of Amarillo who discussed the Health Education Survey to be conducted by volunteers during the Residential Crusade. This Survey, first planned and carried out in Texas, seeks to discover from householders what information they have learned about cancer's warning signals and what they have done about their health in the past year. Answers to the confidential survey will be used to plan more effective public education programs in Texas in the coming year. Dr. Gholston emphasized that, in spite of enormous progress made in detection and treatment of cancer, over 96,000 Americans will die needlessly of the disease because they did not see their doctors in time.

The 1967 Crusade, led in Texas by the Honorable Ben Barnes, has as its goal two million dollars. Two million also equals the number of Texans now living who will have cancer unless present trends are changed. The two million goal—dollars to raise, lives to save—will result in

Farmers Union Convention

More than one hundred members of Texas Farmers Union will be in Oklahoma City March 12-15 for the annual convention of the National Farmers Union. An attendance of over 2,000 is expected for the four-day meet at the Sheraton-Oklahoma Hotel.

Texas delegates Joe Rankin of Ralls and Robert Cathy of Dublin will join the delegates from other state Farmers Union organizations across the nation to debate and adopt a national program for the 250,000 member nationwide general farm organization. The alternate delegates from Texas are Forest Creamer of Paducah and W.R. (Buck) Breeding of Wellington.

Several leading political figures, including Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Senator Robert Kennedy and Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, will address the convention. The Vice President will address the convention on Monday at 2 p.m.

The convention begins Sunday night, March 12 and closes with the annual banquet on Wednesday evening March 15.

Other major speakers include Senator George McGovern of South Dakota, Okla. Senator A.S. (Mike) Monroney, Representative Wilbur Mills, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and Howard Bertsch, administrator of the Farmers Home Administration.

Two new features aimed at increased delegate involvement in convention business have been added to this year's program.

One is a panel discussion on Monday afternoon featuring NFU's Washington Representative.

Savings Bonds Sales Report

The 1967 United States Savings Bond goal for Wheeler county is \$260,000, according to an announcement made by Mr. R.J. Holt, chairman of the Wheeler County Savings Bonds committee. January sales in the county totaled \$22,743 which represents 9 percent of the 1967 sales goal.

The Texas 1967 Savings Bond goal is \$181.3 million. E and H sales during the month of January totaled \$15,191,696 which is an increase of 18 percent over January 1966.

"The County Savings Bonds Committee was happy to learn about the new 'Freedom Shares' announced by President Johnson on February 21. They will go on sale May 1, 1967. Freedom Shares along with E and H Savings Bonds play an important role this year in supporting our forces in Vietnam and in helping stabilize the Nation's economy," Chairman Holt stated.

31% of the American Cancer Society's funds raised in Texas being spent in Research and related programs and 28% spent in public education programs. An additional 14% will be used in professional education, reaching physicians and nurses with up-to-date methods in cancer treatment and 13% will be spent in services to cancer patients and rehabilitation services.

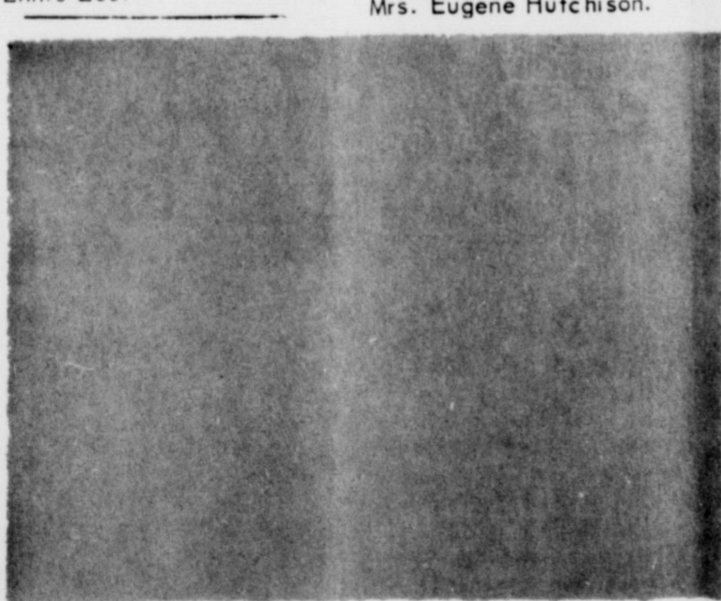

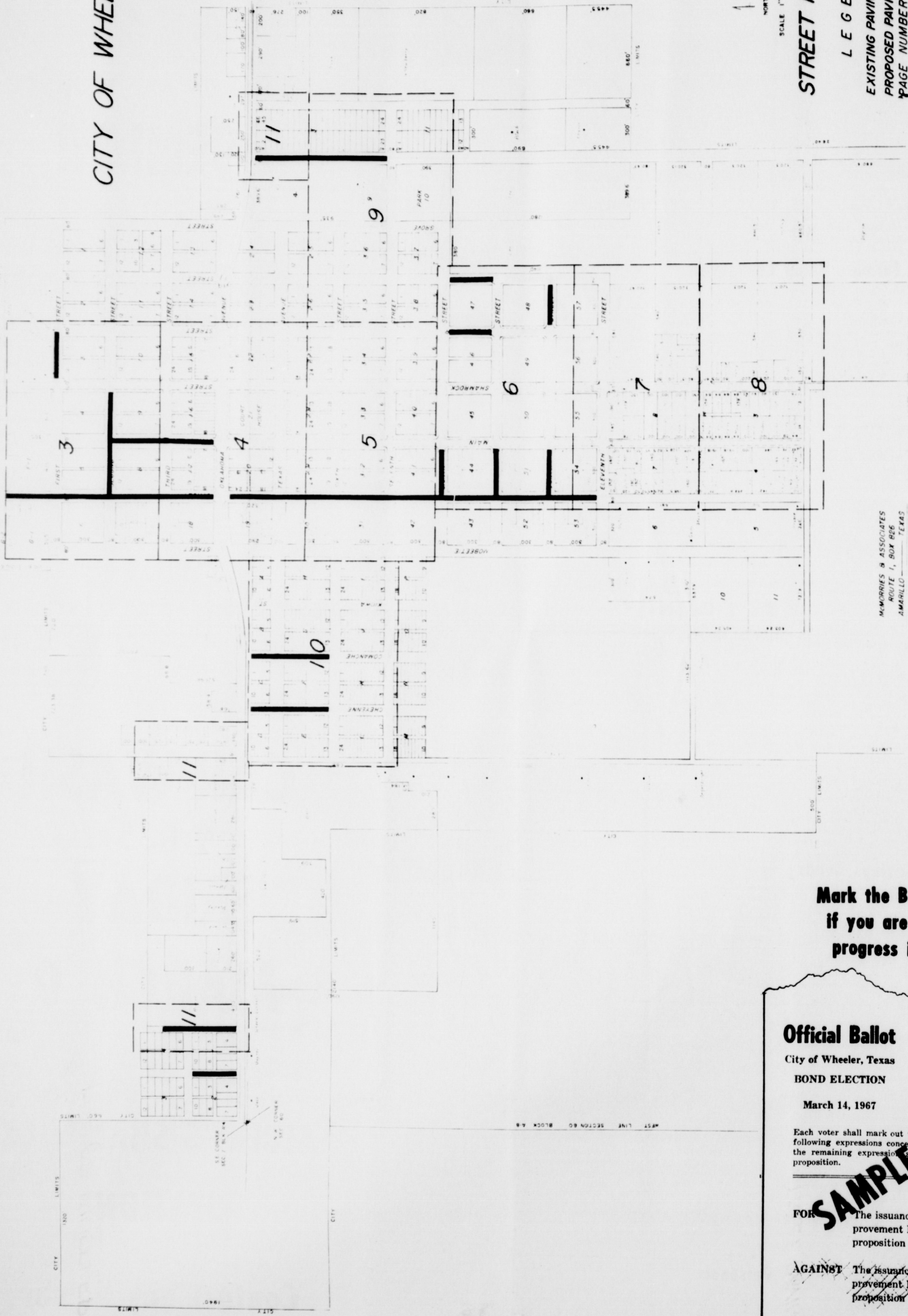
