FRAGILE LINEN - CARE

By Vivian C. Warminski Lacy doilies and other fragile linens need special treatment after the holidays

To avoid snags and pulls wash small, fragile pieces in a container which eliminates handling and rubbing--aplastic shaker or wide mouth glass jar will do. Fill it half to three-fourths full of hot soap or detergent suds. immerce the doilies, cap the container and shake this miniature "washing machine". Then rinse the same way with clear water until all the soiled suds are flushed away

Cigarette ashes wash righ out in hot suds, but other spots may require special treatment. Wine or other alcoholic begerage stains should be soaked or sponged promptly with cool water before washing in warm suds. For old stains that have turned brown on white cotton or linen, use bleach according to container directions; then re-launder.

Soft drink stains are often colorless at first but may turn brown if allowed to stand, so sponge them at once with cool water or with equal parts of alcohol and water. Then rub glycerine into the stain. Let it stand half an hour, rinse with clear water and finally launder in hot suds. Treat coffee or tea stains by pouring boiling water through the stained fabric stretched taunt over a bowl. Then wash in hot suds, using bleach to remove By Charles David Jackson any remaining stain.

With this year's drouth stricken pastures, cattlemer may begin noticing signs of vitamin A deficiency in their Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Roper herds.

Vitamin A deficiency in J.B. Roper and other relatives the early stages is character ized by night blindness. In later stages, cattle become less alert and lose their appetites. Watery eyes, swelling at the joints, rapid breathing and staggering are some more symptoms.

Many cattlement have bulls with their herds now and are breeding for next year's calf crop. Vitamin A deficiency can seriously affect reproduct ive perfor mance of cattle, according to some research reports.

In the Texas A&M Univer sity test, 35 bred yearling heifers were injected with vitamin A. Thirty-five bred heifers were given no supple mental vitamin A.

From the 35 heifers in jected with vitamin A, only ome Derrie c of Booker, Tex., one calf was lost at calving time and 28 cattle needed help calving.

In the group which got no supplemental vitamin A, seve Mr. and Mrs. Earl Wallace calves died at calving. Tw of the heifers also died at calving time and 28 heifers needed help calving.

Doses of synthetic vita A--either injected or fed concentrates--would help both of these conditions.
