## DR LEWIS JOLLY TO LOCATE HERE SOON



Dr. Lewis Jolly of Madison, Indiana visited in Wheeler January 21 to January 24. He toured the medical facilities offered in Wheeler and surrounding area. After returning to Indiana, Dr. Jolly notified Dr. John Parker of his decision to locate in Wheeler.

Dr. Jolly is a Board Certified Surgeon. A graduate of the University of Colorado School of Medicine, Dr. Jolly has been in Madison approximately 20 years. At the present time Dr. Jolly is on staff at King's Daughters Hospital in Madison.

The visit was arranged by Dr. Parker, a Wheeler physician. R. J. Holt, Jr., flew Hiram Whitener, Sec. of the hospital board, to Indiana where they picked up Dr. and Mrs. Jolly and brought them to Wheeler. Dr. Jolly and family spent Saturday, Sunday Monday and part of Tuesday getting acquainted with the town and meeting numerous businessmen.

Dr. Jolly toured Parkway Hospital and the Medical Clinic. At the hospital, Dr. Jolly met with the nursing staff and Mrs. Snelgroves.

The Board of Directors of Parkway Hospital met with Dr. Jolly, Monday evening.

### Customer's Bill Of Rights

Postmaster Virgil Jamison today called attention of Wheeler mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.

Directed at post office window services, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at the Wheeler office.

1. Poster will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.

2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observance of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instructions also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.

The Posters tell customers they are entitled to:  
1. A neat, clean counter on which to transact business.  
2. Service by a well-groomed rear window employee.  
3. A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.

4. Knowledgeable, well informed interested window personnel to help with postal needs.  
5. Prompt, alert and efficient service.

6. Competent and correct information on inquiries.  
7. An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.

8. The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.  
9. Polite referral to another window or individual when necessary, to give appropriate action or service.

10. A feeling upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.

Instructions for fulfilling "The Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" are being distributed to all window personnel by Postmaster Jamison.

Mr. O'Brien stated in connection with the new postal service improvement effort: "President Johnson

insisted that every federal employee give added attention to providing the American people with the very best service possible—Since your daily duties bring you in direct and continuing contact with our customers, I would like to tell you what I consider the type of service the American people have a right to expect when dealing with the largest business operation in the world."

In addition to improving relations with customers, Postmaster Jamison said, the Customer's Bill of Rights can expedite handling of transactions at the windows and make the service more efficient.

He urged Wheeler residents to assist in this effort, by stating their needs clearly and having money and any necessary filled-out forms ready for transactions.

The Postmaster explained that demands on window personnel, who must deal with a wide variety of information forms and varying services are usually very heavy and postal customers can assist them in meeting the new service goals by being brief and business-like as possible.

The show is getting on the road and already it's quite evident that we have our work cut out for us. They used to say that Ringling Brothers was the greatest Show on Earth, but I have a hunch that this deal down here would be a close second.

There's a whole lot about the way this thing operates that you don't know till you get your feet wet. The chairman of various committees have a lot of power and they can pretty well control what happens to a bill. There were about 1,500 bills introduced the last session. About half of them were killed in Committee and about 500 of them were finally passed. About half of these are local bills that only affect one county.

The scuttle butt around here is that Connally will run for a 4th term and that Pres-

ton Smith will run for Governor regardless. Ben Barnes will probably run for Lieutenant Governor. Connally and Barnes are sorta on the same team and Smith has his own ideas. The House has adopted a new set of rules that Smith is not for and it is doubtful that they will pass the Senate. This is bound to create considerable "flack" as we politicians term it.

You have already seen the Governor's Budget which is going to take like \$125 million more for the next two years and with other things coming up it's liable to wind up in the area of \$200 million. I guess we will get his ideas of where the money is to come from in his Revenue Message next week. Of course it can only come from the people. The Bills are pouring in now and the Committee meetings will get real interesting. Some the "old pros" can really give you a good spiel. The lobbyists are stirring around getting acquainted and there have already been a bunch of conventions here in Austin. Of course, we are invited to all of these things and have met a lot of people. I hope you are finding these columns interesting and if there are some things you would like me to write about, let me know.
