County Agent, Charles Jackson, Receives Tour

Charles D. Jackson, Wheeler County Agricultural Agent since 1962, has been named a recipient of a 1967 Study Tour award. The awards are provided by Dow Chemical Company's Agricultural Chemicals Department of Midland, Michigan. The study tours, one for the west and one for the east, are directed by the Professional Training Committee of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents, part of the Association's professional improvement program. Jackson was nominated for the award by the Texas Association and confirmation of his selection was announced by Oliver J. Reinhart, County Agent and Chairman of the State professional improvement program. Jackson will join county agents from 10 other western states in Fort Collins, Colo., for 4 for the official beginning of the tour. County agents along the five state route will serve as consultants and have charge of visitations in their respective states. The five states to be visited include Colorado, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota and Wyoming. In addition to seeing agricultural enterprises, the agents will tour agribusiness concerns which process and market many farm and ranch products and scenic and historic spots along the tour route. State and Federal agricultural experiment stations will be visited along with outstanding farms and ranch operations in each of the states.

HISTORICAL MARKER TO BE ERECTED FOR MOBEETIE

The official Texas Historical marker for the "Town of Mobeetie" will be erected soon today announced Mrs. Grady Harris of Wheeler, chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee.

The marker will be placed at Mobeetie on Highway 152. Dedication plans will be announced by Mrs. Harris.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 18 x 28" and is sponsored by Isabel and Mabel Huselby in honor of their father, Mark Huselby.

This is the 19th official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Wheeler County. The inscription on the marker reads:

MOBEETIE
Oldest Town in Texas Panhandle. Originally a trading post, 2 mi. south, 1874; moved nearer to Fort Elliott 1875. Earlier called Sweetwater, was renamed in 1879. Courthouse was completed by Mark Huselby, First County Tax Assessor and other citizens.

Popular with Hunters, Cowboys, Gamblers--Town in 1881 became Judicial Center of 35th District.

Temple Houston, son of the hero, Sam Houston, was first district attorney and the first State Senator for this district.

After bypass by the Santa Fe Railroad (1888) and a destructive 1898 tornado, Mobeetie declined. (1967)

(Incase on back) Isabel and Mabel, in memory of their father, Mark Huselby.

The marking of local historical sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5-year RAMPSS program to record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey Texas history. More than 3,300 official Texas Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPSS program was begun in 1964. This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours and to acquaint the people of Wheeler County with their own unique historical past.

More Meat, Less Money

Last year Americans ate an average of 103.3 pounds of beef per person, an all time high. They also ate 58 pounds of pork, 4 pounds of Lamb and 4½ pounds of veal, according to the National Livestock and Meat Board. In contrast to earlier years and other countries, Americans obtain 2/3 of their protein intake from high quality, complete animal protein and only 1/3 from plant foods such as cereals. While eating more meat than ever, Americans now eat less than

half the amount of cereals and potatoes they consumed fifty years ago. The United States, with roughly 6 percent of the world's land area and 6 percent of the world's population, is producing and consuming from 25 to 30 percent of the world's supply of beef, pork, lamb and veal. This represents three times as much beef and veal and nearly twice as much pork as is produced in Russia where consumption averages 68 pounds of meat per person, according to the National

Livestock and Meat Board. Even though we're eating much better than ever before, statistics indicate we have our "cake" and are eating it, too....that is, we eat well and still have ample money for other expenditures. Between 1958 and 1966, sales in retail food stores have increased 45 percent. Of course, part of this can be contributed to an increase in non-food items sold in retail stores. While we're eating "higher on the hog" so to speak, there is a limit to how much we can eat. Americans spent 58% of their earnings on food in the 1870's. Now they spend just 18.2% of disposable income

on food, the lowest percentage in history. In less than 37 hours, the smallest number of hours in history, today's American factory worker earns the cost of his monthly grocery basket. While meat prices have increased only 15% since 1947-49, wages at the same time have increased some 100 percent. Wheeler County cattlemen probably feel as though they are subsidizing the consumer.

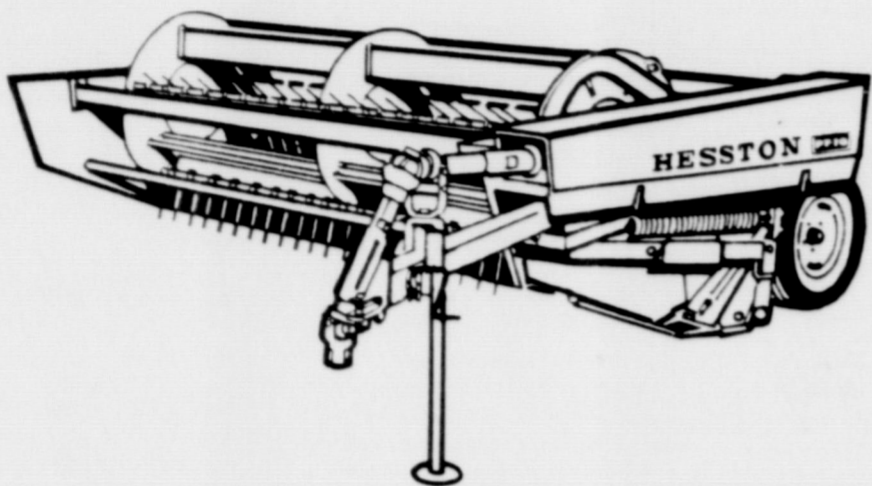

Speaker for the education sessions was Dr. Merrill J. Allen, O.D., Ph. D., who is a professor of Optometry at Indiana University. Dr. Allen has written several books on Driving Safety especially as relating to vision.

Several points made in his talks were:

1. Window shields in cars should not be tinted because of reduction in vision at night.
2. Glare producing objects such as window shield wipers should be painted or made dull.
3. No books, letters or other objects should be placed on dash since they reflect an image into the drivers field of view.
4. Side reflectors and side lights should be installed on all cars.

Dr. Rose was elected to serve two more years on the board of directors of the State Optometric Association.
