MRS. O.T. GLASSCOCK IS NAMED WHEELER CO. SENIOR CITIZEN

The Aging Committee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee has

selected Mrs. O.T. Glasscock, Shamrock as "Wheeler County Senior Citizen for 1967." The month of May was Senior Citizen month as proclaimed by Texas Governor, John Connally.

Mrs. Glasscock who is 82 years young was selected for her faithful service to Wheeler County, Texas and the nation during the past sixty years. No one has been more dedicated in serving the community than she. Mrs. Glasscock stated, "The way to stay young and happy is to stay busy, help the sick, shut-in and the needy and keep a beautiful yard."

Mrs. O.T. Glasscock was born, March 17, 1885 at Graham, Young County, Tex. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Drives.

On September 20, 1903 she was married to O.T. Glasscock in Graham and a few years later moved to Wheeler County where their three children were born John, Ethel and Adelle. Now Mrs. Glasscock has four grandchildren and nine great grandchildren. Mr. Glasscock passed away in August 1954.

Mrs. Glasscock has taken active part in Civic and Church affairs for the past sixty-eight years. Presently she is an active member of the First Methodist Church where she has taught Sunday School for 68 years. The Wheeler Municipal Pool will open today, Thursday, June 1, with Jerry Newberry as manager. The pool dressing rooms and concession have been completely repaired for the first time since the pool opened in 1959.

The pool will be open seven days a week. Morning swimming will be 10:00 to 11:45 Monday thru Saturday. Swimmers may enjoy pool facilities each afternoon 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. The pool will be open Monday, Tuesday

Thursday and Friday nights from 8:00 to 10:00.

The women will have the pool to themselves two evenings a week. The pool will be open to women only on Monday and Thursday evenings 6:00 to 7:30. This schedule will give working women a chance to enjoy a swim after work.

Jerry Newberry has hired

a senior life guard for the season. Linda Beaty will assume life guard duties. Mrs. Carroll Adams will serve at the pool part time.

Swimming classes will start in June. Due to the cool weather, Newberry stated they will begin swimming classes later in the month.

The pool is available for private parties. If anyone is interested in renting the pool

for an evening, they may do so by calling Jerry Newberry and the pool number is 5641.

The City Council spent several hundred dollars on cleaning and repairing of the pool and facilities. Workmen began draining the pool May 16. The pools were scrubbed with acid and painted white. The carpenters repaired and painted the dressing rooms.

\$148 Million In Loans Available

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced the release of \$148 million in federal insured funds for rural loans.

This action will enable USDA's Farmers Home Administration to commit an additional \$30 million in farm ownership loans and \$118 million in rural housing loans to low and moderate income families.

Previous allocations of funds for farm ownership loans were exhausted in February. There are some 20,000 applications and unfunded loan dockets currently being held by the Farmers Home Administration.

Funds for rural housing loans to low and moderate income families were exhausted in April. The FHA is now holding some 42,000 applications and unfunded loan dockets for rural housing loans.

Both the funds for farm ownership and rural housing loans are being made available immediately.

Farm ownership loans are made to buy land, construct or repair buildings, improve land and refinance debts. They are repayable over 40 years and bear 5 percent interest.

Rural housing loans are made to farmers and other rural residents in open country and small rural communities with populations of not more than 5,500.

Loans are made to construct and repair needed homes and essential farm buildings, purchase homes or buy sites on which to build homes. The maximum term is 33 years. The interest rate on loans to families with low and moderate incomes is five percent.

Farmers Home Administration services are made available through more than 1600 county offices serving the 3,000 rural counties in the United States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Information regarding farm ownership and rural housing loans in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts counties can be obtained from John L. Manning, County Supervisor, Wheeler, Texas. His office day is Monday of each week.

DR. THORNTON KILLED TUESDAY

Dr. William R. Thornton of Amarillo, who was killed Tuesday in a plane crash, was on his way to Wheeler at the time of the crash. Dr. Thornton was associated with Parkview Hospital and Shamrock General Hospital.

Dr. Thornton was killed about 11:05 a.m. Tuesday when the four-seater plane he was piloting and crashed in a dense fog and exploded

2½ miles southeast of Conway. He had taken off from the Tradewind Airport in Amarillo only 11 minutes prior to the crash.

Dr. Thornton, a radiologist, had been regularly visiting Parkview Hospital since March 15. He along with Dr. William Dunnagan did special x-ray work and interpreted all x-ray films.

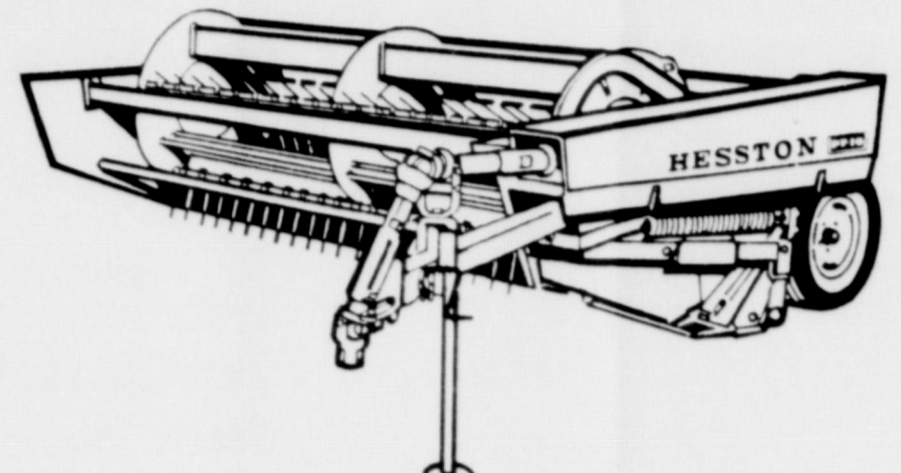
THANK YOU FOR YOUR HELP

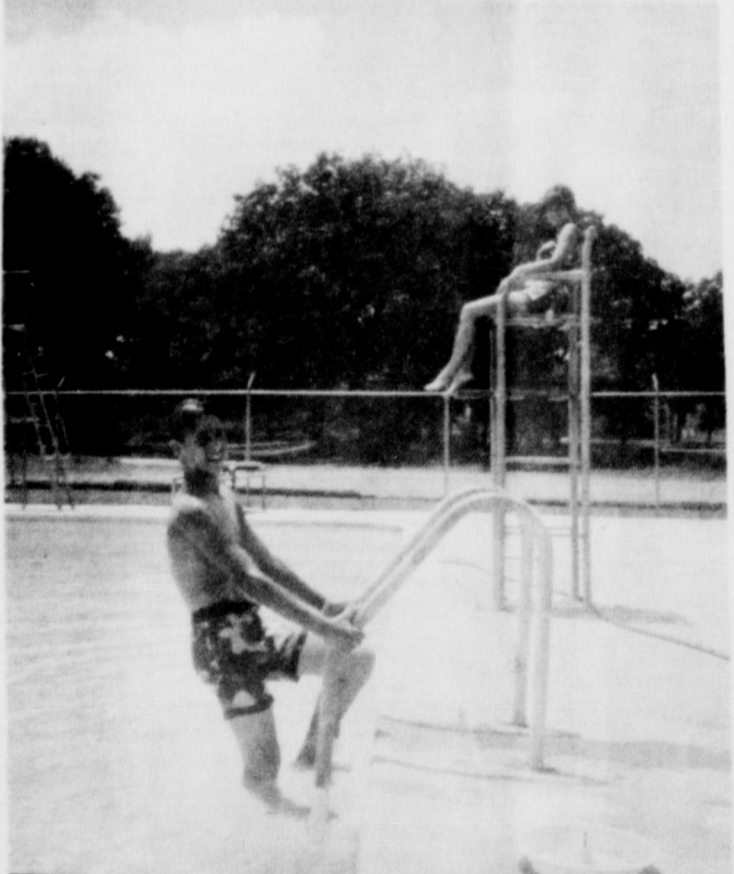

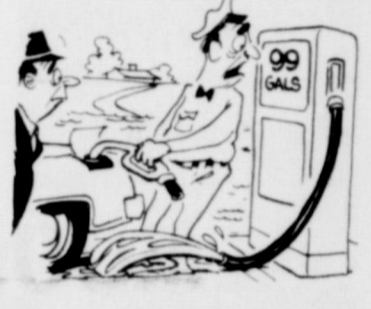

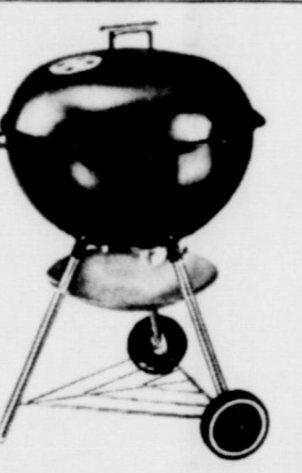
