SWEETWATER CREEK RESERVOIR TO BE DISCUSSED AT OPEN MEETING

BEVERLY CLARK IS CROWNED MISS LAKE MEREDITH, TO VIE FOR MISS TEXAS TITLE



"A dream come true... the glories of youth" - both were reflected in the personality of winsome Beverly Clark of Wheeler, the new Miss Lake Meredith.

Dark and "dreamy," a name bystander called her. Miss Wheeler danced under bright spots of spotlights, laughing in triumph and shortly after receiving her crown before a packed house at Borger High Auditorium about 11 p.m. Saturday she said:

"I feel...its indescribable, I'm bursting all over, and I do not know what to say."

She did, however, between tears of happiness and congratulations from more than a dozen Jaycees and dignitaries, managed to promise to serve this area well in her new position and to "bring honor" to the Panhandle during her tenure.

It was a close contest and judges appeared hard-pressed to make a final decision, as evidenced by several long, long delays in their final pronouncement.

The new Miss Lake Meredith, 19, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.R. (Nig) Clark and a sophomore at West Texas State University. Her talent was a dramatic reading from Thornton Wilder's "Our Town."

First runner-up was Pam Pfalmer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Pfalmer of Borger and Second runner-up was Donna Hogue, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack L. Hogue of Fritch.

Miss Clark delighted her audience when she answered a question about her home town and why she liked it.

"Wheeler is a small town; the people are wonderful, and it's like a big happy family. I'm happy to be from Wheeler..." she said.

All 13 contestants gathered around Miss Clark at the end to congratulate Miss Clark as she literally danced about in her bright red queenly robe.

"I appreciate it so very much," she said before walking off-stage.

"She has the stuff of an actress," remarked one of the Fort Worth judges. "She's got it."

Beverly was sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce after being crowned Miss North Wheeler County the previous week.

Miss Clark made the following remarks upon being queried in

"I'm making so many friends and I find this an invaluable experience...it helps us to become ladies...all of us are getting more casual and forgetting that we are ladies."

Harry Frye of Shamrock urges everyone to be present for the meeting. Mr. Frye is a member of the Red River Authority Board of Directors. He stated, "In this year we move ahead with this thing!"

A luncheon will be held at 12:00. The Wheeler City Council members and the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors have been invited to attend the luncheon.

Anyone interested in seeing this lake come about should attend the meeting to find out what they can do in the coming year.

RABIES CLINIC SATURDAY

Saturday, June 10th has been set for Rabies Vaccination day for all cats, dogs, and other pets kept around the house. Dr. Byron Range, Shamrock Veterinarian will be at the Wheeler Fire Station starting at 1:30 P.M. Saturday June 10th, lasting until all pets have been vaccinated.

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department members will pickup your pet and take it to the station for its vaccination for only the charge of the shot. If you do not have transportation, call 5691 thru Friday or Wright-Denson Funeral Home 2151 all day Saturday and a member of the Fire Department will call for your pet.

Since the end of February there has been 3 positive cases and 7 people taking treatment in a 35 mile radius, which is a very high percentage of people having to take the painful rabie shots. Mrs. C.R. Weatherly has recently completed a series of rabie

shots as a precaution because the cat which bit and scratched her arm could not be located.

Already this year several cases have been reported from skunks and cats. Should rabies break out of wildlife sources into pets, an epidemic could occur.

Charges for the vaccination will be \$2.00 for one year immunization, \$3.00 for 39 months for all dogs above 5 1/2 months of age, but only one year shots can be given to cats. Vaccination tags and certificates will be given each animal immunized. For convenience of pet owners, vaccines against distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis and enteritis will also be available at the rabies vaccination station.

Dr. Range stressed the importance of each animal being brought to the station on a leash to prevent escape and being easier to handle by the attendants.

The Texas Veterinary

Medical Association states that rabies is a virus disease which attacks the central nervous system (brain) is invariably fatal in any warm blooded animal and is transmitted by a bite of an infected animal. This disease is found in wild life as well as in domestic dogs and cats.

However, folks around central Texas where I was raised, would feel right at home. Seems like we got ten inches per year more than you folks and made less.

Part of the past week I spent getting acquainted with people in the area. Stopped in at J.M. Tindall's Gin at Twitty. "That rain was a lifesaver," he said, "our seed were planted and it was just right."

Visited with J.R. Hefley, Twitty and he tells us that he plans to plant a few acres of soybeans to see what they will do. "There's a possibility that I will grind them in my hammer mill and use them as a protein supplement," he said. Mr. Hefley will be assisted by Duane Scott, Farm Demonstrator Assistant. Make a Dress Out of Malimo

 Make your next dress out of Malimo. No, its not a new fake fur or an exotic bird foliage. Malimo is a fabric that is genuinely new in the eyes of the consumer.

Malimo is the trade name of the fabric construction which produces a new breed of fabric--neither woven or knit, not what is commonly considered as non-woven.

As in woven fabrics, two layers of yarn are normally used to make Malimo cloth. A sheet of wrap or lengthwise yarns and a sheet of filling or crosswise yarns, are used. But rather than being woven together, the two layers are placed one on top of the other and passed beneath a needle bar. The needle bar contains hundreds of needles which simply stitch or sew the two layers together. Malimo fabrics can be sewen with eith a lock stitch or trikot knit stitch. In this way, Malimo can be made to look like a knit or woven fabric. Variations of the Malimo machine can also make pile or terry-like material.

The speed of the Malimo machine is so great that it has been estimated that three of these machine can replace ninety conventional looms with respect to the number of yards of fabric produced. Malimo fabrics may provide a real cost savings to consumers.

In general, Malimo fabrics have good lauderability strength and wrinkle resistance. There are no limitations on the fiber content of Malimo fabrics.

The Malimo machine, developed in East Germany and now widely used in Europe is still in its infancy in the United States. A great deal of developmental work and testing is presently being done before Malimo fabrics are placed on the market in huge quantities.

Because of the possible cost savings and the desirable characteristics of these fabrics, they are likely to be readily available in the near future.

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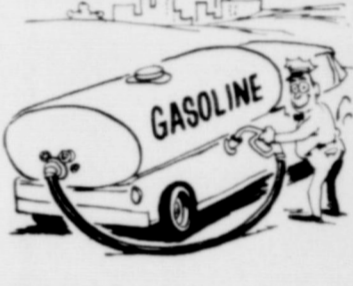

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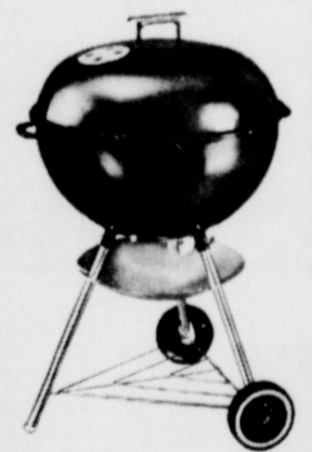

Rodeo Rules

1967 Rules for the Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo Events

Pole Bending:
1. Pole Bending Pattern is to be run around six poles. Each pole is to be twenty-one feet apart and the first pole is to be twenty-one feet from the starting line.
2. A horse may start to the right or to the left of the pole and then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly.
3. Knocking over a pole, touching the pole with the rider's hand or failure to follow the course shall cause disqualification.
4. Pole bending is a time event. Each contestant will begin from a running start. A clearly visible starting line shall be provided.
5. In the event of a tie, the horse declared the winner in the runoff must run the pattern within two seconds of its original time or the runoff must be held again.
6. Western type equipment must be used. Use of a hackmore or other types of bridles is the optional choice of the contestant; however, the timer or judge may prohibit the use of bits or equipment that he may consider severe.

Flag Race:
Three flags used in the contest are about 6 x 8 inches in size, of different colors and should be on flag sticks about 14 inches long. The two buckets used should be conventional three gallon buckets filled nearly to the top with sand. They should be placed parallel to each other, one on each side of the arena and about four feet off the ground. They should be about 30 yards from the starting line and finishing line. To complete the pattern a barrel should be placed in the center of the arena and about 30 yards from and slightly beyond the buckets.

As each contestant enters the arena, he is handed the first flag. His time starts as the horse reaches the starting line. He plants the flag he was handed in the first bucket, grabs the flag already there, and then rides across the finish line. The time ends as the horse reaches the finish line.

The rider can make the circle from either left or right to left. If he or she drops the flag on the ground he must dismount and retrieve the flag in order to continue the race. He must be mounted as the flag exchanges are made. If the flag falls over, but stays in the bucket, the contestant's time counts. But if it falls out of the bucket and the rider does not replace it, then his time does not count. If wind or weather causes it to fall out, the judges will have to rule on whether the time counts. Contestants who use a flag to strike horses should be disqualified.

Bull Riding:
Contestants must ride six seconds. Senior boys one hand; Intermediate Boys, one hand; the more the animal is contested the higher the score.

Calf Roping:
The rope must go over the calf's head. Contestant is allowed two loops or 1 1/2 minutes to catch the calf.

Saddle Race:
Saddles and Blankets are placed at one end of the arena and the boys riding bare back will be at a line on the other end of the arena. All contestants will go at once at the flag of the judges and the first five back riding with the blankie and saddle, place.

Walk and Lead Race:
Boys on horse at a line on one end of the arena, all ride at one time, flagged to start by the field judge and the boys ride to the far end of the arena, get off the horse behind the line and lead their horse back across the line. The first six place.

Barrel Race:
All barrel races will be run in the clover leaf pattern and will be timed between the flags. The contestant must cross their trail each time they round a barrel. Five second penalty for each barrel knocked over. Breaking the pattern will disqualify contestant. The barrel course may be run either to the right or left.

Ribbon Roping:
Contestants will work in pairs, a boy and girl. The boy will choose the girl helper, but the girl will run only once. They boy ropes the calf and the girl takes the ribbon from the calf's tail and runs back across the starting line. The rope must go over the calf's head and the boy must have the calf turned loose by the time the girl gets to the line. This is a time event.

Stick Horse Barrel Race:
Contestants must furnish their own stick horse. They will run the clover leaf pattern and will be timed between flags.

Goat Tying:
Contestants may use either a leather strap or pigging string. Goat will be staked mid-way in the arena. Contestants must be on foot. When contestant crosses the starting line on his way to the goat, time will start. He will run to the goat, throw him, tie three feet, two hind feet and one front foot as he would a calf. When contestant throws hands in the air after a proper tie, he will be flagged by the flag man and his time will stop. Tie will be passed on by the flag man and goat will be given a three second struggle. If goat has been properly tied and stays tied, the contestant will be given the official time by the time keepers. Contestant will receive no time if goat gets up or is improperly tied.

Tire Race:
This is a time event. Time is taken between the flags. Contestants must be horseback. He will run across the starting line to tire (which will be placed at a given spot in the arena) dismount and go through tire, remount and run back across the starting line. The tire can be turned edgewise, but it CANNOT BE LIFTED OFF THE GROUND. If contestant lifts tire off the ground, he will be disqualified. There will be two judges in this contest. The flag man and an assistant at the tire. Flagman's decision is final. Time will be given after qualified run.
