SPEAKER ADDRESSES CHAMBER ON LOANS AVAILABLE FOR INDUSTRY

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday, Jan. 16 with guest speaker Mr. Wayland Nelson of Dallas. In addition to Mr. Nelson, the Chamber was host to guests from Allison, Shamrock, Borger and Wheeler.

The speaker for the evening was sponsored by the Technical Action Panel of Wheeler. John Manning, incoming director and member of the panel introduced Mr. Nelson of the Small Business Administration of Dallas.

Mr. Nelson informed the group of the loans available through his office which may be used in obtaining industry. In addition to loaning the money, the SBA works with the community in working out their problems.

The loan which would be of the most benefit to a town the size of Wheeler, according to Nelson, is the "502 Program". With the 502, the SBA can loan up to \$300,000 and the community of less than 2500 population, would be required to raise 10% of this amount either in land, buildings or money.

A film "Town On The Move" was viewed by those in attendance at the meeting. This film depicted the process by which a "dying"

town organized and through a Small Business Administration loan acquire their first industry and later other industries.

Industry is moving to Texas and Nelson urged Wheeler to be prepared if an industry shows an interest in Wheeler.

The Technical Action Panel was organized to serve as advisors in helping promote the county and stop the flow of people to large towns. The panel consists of John Manning, County Supervisor of Farmers Home Administration, Bill Brooks, Soil Conservation Service Work Unit Conservationists, Lewis Grayson, ASCS Office Manager, Max Hatter, County Agricultural Agent and Larry Howe, Vocational Agricultural Instructor.

Jim Wright, president of the Chamber, introduced the officers for the coming year and announced the date for the Installation Banquet. John C. Vise will serve as President for the coming year and Garland Abernethy will be vice president. The installation banquet is set for Tuesday, February 6 at 7:00 p.m. in the High School Cafeteria. Speaker for the Banquet will be Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon, Texas.

JANUARY 31 VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE FAST APPROACHING

Texas voters are again warned that they must apply for a voter registration certificate by the end of this month if they want to participate in this year's elections.

Application may be made either by mail or by personal appearance at the county tax assessor-collector's office or at a registration substation. A representative will be at the City Hall in Shamrock, Thursday and Friday, January 18 and 19, 1968. A form for applying by mail is published in today's paper.

Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill, who is sponsoring a statewide voter registration drive, has predicted that this year's registrations will show a very substantial increase over former years. The previous high was in 1964, the last presidential election year, when a total of 2,984,766 registrants were reported by county tax assessor-collectors under the poll tax system then in force.

The total registration in 1966 was slightly under 2,970,000, including registrations under the poll tax system and free registrations during a supplemental registration period in March 1966 after a federal court decision invalidated poll tax payment as a condition for voting. Registrations for 1967, an "off year" for elections, normally could have been expected to drop from the previous year's total, but exceeded the 1966 figure by about thirteen thousand. Political observers have explained the increase by the fact that the full four months of the registration period were available for registering voters without cost, while only a 15-day period had been provided for free registrations in 1966.

Hill attributes the expected increase in registrations to several factors. In addition to population growth, he has pointed out that this is the first presidential election year under the new system of free registration and registrations for a presidential election year normally exceed those for any other year in each four-year period. This is also the first year in which all voters will be required to register. Another important factor, Hill said, is that this registration period marks a high in the activities of groups conducting organized registration drives.

Voters who have not already applied for registration are urged to do so immediately.

COMMISSIONERS CONFERENCE

County Judges and commissioners from 80 Texas counties attended and participated in the 10th annual County Judges' and Commissioners' Conference held on the Texas A & M University campus, January 10-12.

Attending from Wheeler were Commissioners Clois Hanner and E.E. Henderson.

This year's program featured discussions on the county and district retirement system created by the last Texas Legislature as well as other common problems.

The conference this year was dedicated to V.G. Young, assistant director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Judge J.C. Davis of the Texas Attorney General's office. The association officers made the dedication as a tribute to the two men for their contributions in making the annual conference a most successful event. Young was the prime mover in getting the conference started and has actively organized and directed each of the meetings.

Judge Davis has appeared on each conference program and has given it his support as a means for helping both county judges and commissioners cope more effectively with their numerous and increasingly complex responsibilities.

Board Raises Cafeteria Prices

This is a subject which is of vital interest to all our patrons - our school cafeteria. As we all know, prices of all the items a family must buy, as well as our school costs, have risen steadily for several years. However, prices of cafeteria lunches have remained the same, 30c per lunch for grades 1-3 and 35c per lunch for grades 4-12. Occasional lunches have been 50c for students when they only eat once in a while.

Our Board and I, after studying the problem of cafeteria finances for the past semester, have decided that in order to keep these funds at a level which will pay current bills, we must charge 5c more for each lunch - that is 35c for grades 1-3 and 40c for grades 4-12. These prices will go into effect on February 1, 1968.

I hope that each you - parents and pupils - will examine the first semester grade marks carefully, determine those which need to be improved and make plans to bring them up during the second semester.

Let's make this semester a time of improvement for our total school program.

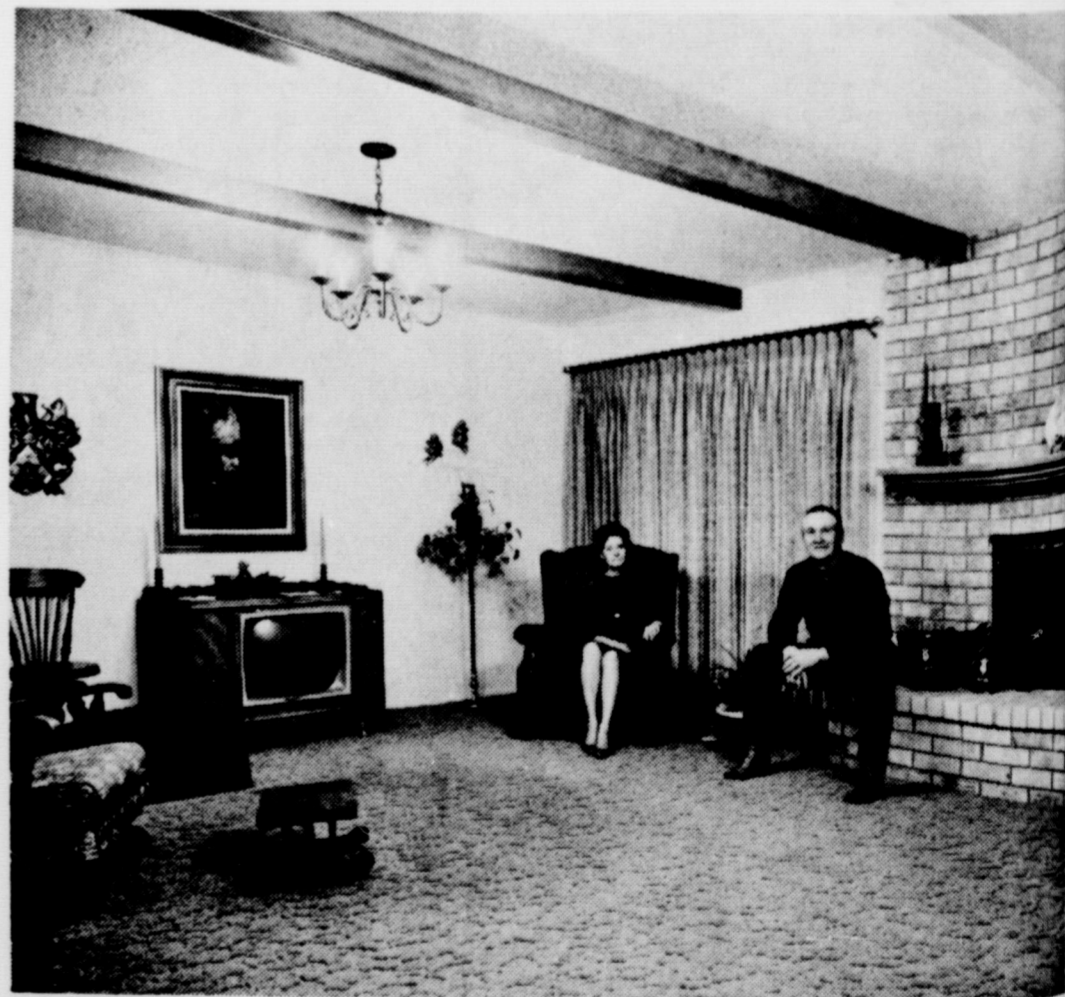
