SPEAKER ADDRESSES CHAMBER ON LOANS AVAILABLE FOR INDUSTRY

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce metTuesday, Jan. 16 with guest speaker Mr. Wayland Nelson of Dallas. In addition to Mr. Nelson, the Chamber was host to guests from Allison, Shamrock, Borger and Wheeler.

The speaker for the evenng was sponsored by the Technical Action Panel of Wheeler. John Manning, incoming director and member of the panel introducted Mr. Nelson of the Small Business Administration of Dallas.

Mr. Nelson informed the group of the loans available through his office which may be used in obtaining industry. In addition to loaning the money, the SBA works with the community in working out their problems.

The loan which would be of the most benefit to a town the size of Wheeler, according to Nelson, is the "502 Program". With the 502, the SBA can loan up to \$300,000 and the community of less than 2500 population, would be required to raise 10% of this amount either in land. buildingsor money.

The total registration in 1966 was slightly under 2, 970, 000, including registrations under the poll tax system and free registrations during a suuplemental registration period in March 1966 after a federal court decision invalidated poll tax payment as a condition for voting. Registrations for 1967, an off year" for elections, normally could have been expected to drop from the previous year's total, but exceeded the 1966 figure by about thirteen thousand. Political observers have explained the increase by the fact that the full four months of the registration period were available for registering voters without cost, while only a 15-day period had been provided for free registrations in 1966.

Hill attributes the expected increase in registrations to several factors. In addition to population growth, he has pointed out that this is the first presidential election year under the new system of free registration and registrations for a presidential election year normally exceed those for any other year in each four-year period. This is also the first year in which all voters will be required to register.
