County Agents' Reports

By Charles Jackson

The U.S. Department of Ag. today warned farmers against grazing livestock on harvested cotton fields that received pesticide treatment late in the growing season.

The likehood of residues n milk or meat from animals grazed on cotton fields after harvest is further increased by late season use of insecticides, defoliants and desic-

Many of these pesticides carry a livestock grazing restriction on their labels. This restriction states that fields treated with such pesticides should not be grazed by livestock. Violation of this restriction may result in meat or milk containing illegual pesticide residues

and possible seizure. Federal regulation require that all pesticides moving in interstate commerce be registered with the Secretary of Ag. These products must be formulated and labeled so that they meet Federal standards of effectiveness and safety when used for the purposes approved in the

Ag. Research Service under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act. USDA has asked the help of State Extension Service

and State Department of Ag. in cautioning farmers against grazing livestock on harvested fields that have been treated with pesticides. Dairyman's Short Course Slated for Nov. 18-19
